This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

SEPTEMBER 1998 – The Vienna parks and Recreation Department has been awarded a grant of \$6,000 by the Virginia Department of Forestry to help fund a townwide inventory of street trees to document the location, species, size, condition, and maintenance needs of the estimated 6,000 trees now growing on the roadsides and median strips, and to record the results on a computer software program specifically designed for tree management and care.

SEPTEMBER 1988 – The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has approved the addition of \$1.23 million to its bond issue for downtown revitalization projects to be used for Church Street in Vienna, Centreville District Supervisor Martha Pennino offered the amendment following a public hearing last month at which both Mayor Charles Robinson and Greater Vienna Chamber of Commerce President T.R. Cook spoke of the need to revitalize the town's commercial areas.

SEPTEMBER 1978 – Some 200 people attended the Town Council's September 23 public hearing on the proposed widening and improvement of Park Street, the majority of whom expressed strong opposition to any major changes. Council scheduled the hearing in response to a State Highway Department memorandum comcerning the project's impact on the trees along Park Street. The memo states that about 700 trees will be removed, die, or decline if the street is widened.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries is Saturday, September 6, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill St., N.E. (entrance at the dead end of the street). This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 703-255-6381.

Too often, used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, releasing toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic into the environment. Recycled oil is a valuable resource that can be re-manufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia it is illegal to dispose of automo-

bile batteries with refuse.

Sidewalk Priority Hearing Sept. 22

At its September 22 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed list of sidewalk construction priorities. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall, and all interested citizens are encouraged to attend.

In 2006 the Vienna Sidewalk Committee, composed of representatives from the Town's Planning and Transportation Safety Commissions, conducted a survey to get citizen input on the need for additional pedestrian facilities. Based on the responses to that survey, the committee prioritized projects into four groups to recommend to the Town Council, giving top priority to areas without any sidewalks followed by areas with sidewalks already on one side of the street. Other criteria included providing walking routes to schools, bus stops and shopping, and infill where sidewalks are not continuous.

Comment from the Council Table

Asking the Right Question

It may seem obvious that how we frame a question can influence the answer we get. But recently I saw an article that brought this point home for me in a very important context for Vienna's future – how we go about planning development.

A Portland, Oregon, magazine posed the question: "With about a million more people arriving in the Portland metro area by 2030, what is the most important thing for the city to preserve?" This simple question turns upside down the approach to planning we've been dealing with in our area, where the object of planning typically is to identify what changes we want new development to bring.

Putting the emphasis on what we have now that we consider worth preserving seems a natural for our Town. It's perhaps just another way of saying that we want to keep Vienna's "small town feel." I'd like to see us make it an explicit planning principle as we move forward on planning Vienna's, and the region's, future.

For Maple Avenue, what would we like to preserve? I would like to preserve the opportunity for small, independent businesses and shops to locate there. These businesses serve the community not just by the items they sell or the services they provide, but also by providing places where we meet each other and share a "hello." This is a vital part of our community life that I value.

As a Town government, we can set policies to make our commercial districts attractive and desirable, to encourage businesses to locate here. We recognize that we can't compete with Tysons Corner and the retail stores that will choose to locate there. But we can provide an attractive alternative for business that serve our residents and support our economic base.

For the greater Tysons area, and the


planning discussions that continue about its future, is there anything we can say we would like to preserve? I would like to preserve the boundaries separating Tysons development from the surrounding communities of Vienna, McLean and Falls Church, to protect our neighborhoods from encroachments of traffic and visual blight. I would also like to preserve our ability to move to and through Tysons, so we can share in the benefits of a more functional Tysons and so that we can maintain contact with our County neighbors in McLean, Falls Church and the rest of the area.

What would you like to preserve about Vienna? And – because it is still a valid question, just not the only question – what would you like to see changed? I hope all our citizens will join in these discussions as we plan our community's future.

Special Pickup Deadline Oct. 1

Wednesday, October 1, is the last day for Town of Vienna residents to call for a Special Pickup this year. No orders for Special Pickups will be taken in October, November, December, and January so that Town crews can concentrate on leaf collection.

To dispose of unwanted furniture, building materials, brush, and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording *promptly* at 703-255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount of debris, and type of debris.

Each residence is allowed two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle"). Additional pickups cost \$75 dollars per load for all items except brush. The fee for additional loads of brush is \$25 each.

Special Pickups are for the sole use of the property where the debris has been generated and cannot be transferred to another property in the town. Place all items at the curb or edge of pavement in front of your property.

Special Pickup Guidelines

The amount and type of debris allowed are limited to the following:

- 1. Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment.
- 2. Sod and brush.
- 3. 300 pounds of scrap metal per residence, small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires. All tires must be removed from the rim.
- 4. Trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches, and no more than 8 feet in length.
- 5. Building materials (not generated by contractor), which shall include the following items: wood, broken concrete, bricks or block, fences, drywall, and paneling. Each residence shall be limited to 300 pounds (approximately two wheelbarrow loads) of masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. per pickup.
- 6. Please refrain from placing piles of brush under power lines or trees, or close to shrubs, walls or vehicles. Place all piles in an open area accessible to a crane truck.
- 7. All sharp items such as box cutters, razors, saw blades and large panes of glass should be wrapped in several layers of newspaper.
- 8. In the interest of safety, parents should caution their children not to play in or around debris placed at the curb for a special pickup.

The following items will **not** be picked up:

- Gas tanks
- Fuel oil tanks
- 3. Any motor powered by gas or diesel fuel
- 4. Pressurized tanks such as propane, air or freon.
- 5. Mounted tires (Town crews will pick up the tire and the rim as long as they are separated.)
- 6. Tree stumps and tree parts over 6 inches in diameter
- 7. Paint cans
- 8. Biohazardous waste including needles and syringes
- 9. Contractor generated material
- 10. Brush and trash that are mixed
- 11. Dirt
- 12. White goods, which include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, large toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cooktops, dehumidifiers and furnaces

Call Promptly for Your Special Pickup

Please call the Special Pickup number, 703-255-5727, as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard.

It is illegal to place debris in the public right-of-way without arranging for a Special Pickup. When an illegal pile of trash is spotted by or reported to Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a Special Pickup within 48 hours. If no action is taken by the resident after the notice is issued, the Town will seek legal remedy to gain compliance with the Town Code.

No White Goods in Special Pickups

White goods are not collected as part of the Special Pickup program. White goods include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, large toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cooktops, dehumidifiers and furnaces.

Many appliance dealers will remove an old unit when a new one is delivered. Also, residents may take white goods to the Fairfax County I-66 Transfer Station, 4618 West Ox Rd., or the I-95 Landfill Complex, 9850 Furnace Rd. in Lorton. There is a \$1 disposal fee for each appliance. The hours of operation are 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday.

Contractor Debris Will Not Be Picked Up

If you employ contractors for home renovations or other services, they must take any waste away with them. The Town's Special Pickup program is meant to aid residents in disposing of bulky materials after performing the work themselves. Contractor-generated waste material will not be picked up.

Oktoberfest activities on Saturday, October 4, at Vienna's historic Freeman House, 131 Church St., N.E., will include a book signing by local Civil War authors on the porch from noon to 3 p.m. and a Halloween Hunt for ages 4-9 on the lawn beginning at 1 p.m. (no costumes required). Dear Neighbors,

For the \$5 billion that will be spent for Metrorail through Tysons Corner to Dulles Airport, you'd think we would get some relief from traffic congestion at Tysons Corner. Instead, we may simply get more congestion.

With the promise of Metrorail's extension to Dulles Airport, Fairfax County began planning for the "redevelopment" of Tysons around the four proposed rail stops there. In 2005, a special group was appointed by the Board of Supervisors - the Tysons Land Use Task Force. The mission of the Task Force is to study how to take advantage of Metrorail to improve the vitality and functionality of Tysons, while protecting the character of the surrounding communities.

What has resulted from the Task Force's three years of study—and \$1 million in consultants' fees—is not what we need. What we need is a plan for how Metrorail can help relieve our oppressive traffic congestion and improve our environment by getting cars off the road and commuters into mass transit. Instead, the Task Force has recommended greater density of offices and condos at Tysons, resulting in (by the consultants' own studies) more (not less) traffic. In addition, their recommendations will cause huge demands on our schools, parks, water and sewer systems, with ultimate responsibility falling on the taxpayer for much of the new infrastructure.

The promise of Metrorail now looks less like a benefit for commuters, and more like a windfall to developers.

The Greater Tysons Citizens Coalition (GTCC) is a group of citizens and civic associations in Fairfax County, formed to represent the concerns of the communities most affected by the untrammeled growth at Tysons Corner. We understand that economic growth at Tysons can benefit the County and the region, but we are concerned that the Task Force has lost sight of its initial mission: to plan a transformed Tysons that respects and protects the established communities surrounding it.

We, as neighbors and taxpayers want better. For this reason, the GTCC is reaching out to citizens' groups and homeowner associations in the greater Tysons area to bring this critical planning process to your attention. As the Task Force prepares to wrap up, and the planning process moves to the next stage (to include a George Mason University assessment of traffic, sewer/water and school requirements for high-density development at Tysons) we must let our County Supervisors know that we expect and deserve a Tysons plan that benefits everyone living in the community—not just those who profit from it.

The GTCC would be glad to meet with your group to share information about the future of Tysons Corner and the critical issues ahead. Together, our voices can carry our common concerns to the discussions that will shape our future.
