

Budget Schedule

Copies of the proposed Town budget for fiscal year 2009-10 will be available for public review beginning Monday, April 6, in the Administrative Services Office at Town Hall and at Patrick Henry Library. A "Budget in Brief" summary may be obtained free of charge, and the entire budget document may be purchased or viewed online at www.viennava.gov. For more information, call 703-255-6350.

Town Council budget work sessions are scheduled at Town Hall on Monday, April 13, at 7:30 p.m.; Saturday, April 18, at 11 a.m.; and Tuesday, April 21, at 7:30 p.m. Work sessions are open for the public to attend. A public hearing on the proposed budget is scheduled for the May 11 Council meeting.

Tax Relief Forms Due April 1

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for low-income homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. Total household income and total combined assets requirements must be met, and both Town and County applications must be filed.

Applications for 2009 for all programs are due April 1. This date may be extended to December 31 of next year for first-time filers or if hardship conditions exist which, through no fault of the applicant, prohibit applying by April 1. July 4th Fireworks to Return at Southside Park

The Town Council has approved a fireworks show at Southside Park as part of this year's July 4th celebration. Last year a laser light show was presented at the Vienna Community Center in lieu of fireworks after the Fairfax County Fire Marshal ruled that the Community Center grounds could no longer be used for the fireworks show. The Southside Park site meets all County and national requirements for fireworks.

Council also approved the following street closures for the fireworks show: Ross Drive, S.W., from Cottage Street to George Street, Patrick Street, S.W., from Cottage to Ross (including Patrick Circle), and George Street, S.W., from Cottage to Ross. The Police Department may make other closures as needed.

Almost 1,000 households surrounding Southside Park were notified of the proposal to use Southside for the fireworks show, and their responses have been mostly positive.

Daytime activities this July 4th – arts and crafts vendors, food and drink sales, live music, children's games and entertainment, etc. – will be held as usual at the Community Center. Federal Funding for Sidewalks, Emergency Communications

Congressman Gerald E. Connolly has announced that the Town of Vienna will directly benefit from the fiscal year 2009 Omnibus Appropriations Act.

The Vienna Police Department will received \$160,000 for technology upgrades, including an archiving of all 911 calls and public safety radio communications through the purchase of a digital recording system, and an update of the reverse telephone notification system to alert citizens in case of an emergency. Additionally, there is a dedication of \$237,000 for sidewalk construction within the town. Town residents will also benefit from the \$10.8 million directed to improving the quality of the Chesapeake Bay and its marine life.

"In these challenging fiscal circumstances, it remains vital that we continue to provide for the needs of our residents by making critical investments in our transportation infrastructure, environmental protection, and public safety," Congressman Connolly stated. "I was happy to help preserve this funding, which was originally requested by my predecessor (former Congressman Thomas M. Davis III), and I was proud to vote for its final passage."

Northside Park Proposed for New Conservation Zone

At its April 22 meeting, the Town Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on a proposed rezoning of Northside Park from the PR-Park and Recreational Zone to the PC-Park and Conservation Zone. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. at Town Hall and all interested citizens are encouraged to attend.

The new PC zone was established to help protect the Town's green spaces. Indigenous plants and trees will be preserved whenever possible. Northside Park remains in its natural state with development limited to park trails and a trail bridge over Piney Branch.

Storage "Pods" Now Require Permit

The Town Council has adopted an ordinance regulating portable storage containers and requiring a permit for their use.

A portable storage container is defined as "a portable, weather-resistant receptacle designed and used for the storage or shipment of household goods, wares or merchandise." Temporary outdoor containers are allowed only on single-family residential lots for a maximum of 30 days in any 12-month period unless a construction project is underway.

Town Council Election May 5

Vienna's annual Town election will be held on Tuesday, May 5. All voting will take place at the Vienna Community Center from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

This year, Vienna voters will elect three Town Council members, who will begin new two-year terms July 1.

If you will be out of town on election day or are unable to go to the polls because of illness or disability, you may vote by absentee ballot. In-per-son absentee voting will be conducted at the Fairfax County Government Center on weekdays, April 3 through May 1, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday, May 2, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The deadline to apply for an absentee ballot by mail is April 28, and voted ballots must be received in the Office of Elections by 7 p.m. on Election Day in order to be counted.


MIKE J. GADELL

Fairfax County Bike Map Available at Town Hall

Fairfax County bicycle route maps are available free of charge in the Public Works Department at Town Hall. The map identifies a network of both on- and off-road routes and highlights the most desirable routes and major trails for recreational and commuter bicyclists.

Because Fairfax is such a large county, the map has been divided into a north and south side with an overview map to make route planning more convenient. The overview shows the mileage between major intersections, Metro and VRE station locations, interstate highways, and major parks.

Based on input from local bicyclists and the County's Bicycle Program staff, roadways are classified as "preferred" or "less preferred" for bicycling. The map also identifies locations where bicyclists are encouraged to use extra caution because of narrow shoulders, limited sight distance, or difficult intersections.

This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

APRIL 1999 – Great news for Town of Vienna recyclers! Beginning April 1, Vienna residents can begin to recycle cardboard and "mixed paper" (magazines, catalogs, junk mail, telephone books) at the curb along with their other recyclables. In addition to the convenience of expanded curbside recycling, it is estimated that 100 tons of mixed paper will be diverted from the waste stream, creating a potential savings of \$3,600 each year in disposal fees.

APRIL 1989 – Mayor Charles Robinson has proclaimed April 15 as "Drug Awareness Day" in support of that day's "Just Say No to Drugs" march and rally sponsored by the Vienna (Host) and Ayr Hill Lions Clubs in conjunction with the Vienna and Oakton Optimist Clubs. Washington Redskin Terry Orr, the Hogettes, and McGruff the Crime Prevention Dog are among the personalities expected to attend.

APRIL 1979 – At its April 2 meeting, the Town Council approved the Windover Heights Historic District Ordinance. A public hearing on the ordinance was held in March, with the majority of citizens in attendance expressing support for the district, the purpose of which is to protect sites of historic significance and preserve the character of the Windover neighborhood. Under the ordinance, any new construction or major exterior alteration of buildings within the district is subject to approval by a Windover Historic Architectural Review Board.

Permit Required for Block Parties

Planning a neighborhood block party? If your event will require closing a street, you must submit a petition for a permit at least two weeks in advance. The petition must include the following information:

- Date, location (street to be closed), and starting and ending times of the block party;
- Names, addresses, and signatures of all residents who will have their driveways blocked during the street closure; and
- Name, address, and daytime phone number of the person who is organizing the event.

Petitions must be submitted in original form (no e-mails or faxes) to the Town Manager at Town Hall, 127 Center St., S., Vienna, VA 22180. The event organizer will be notified in writing of the approval, denial, or modification (e.g. changing the hours) of the event.

The Town will deliver barricades prior to the event and pick them up the next business day, but residents are responsible for erecting and dismantling the barricades.
