This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

JUNE 1999 - Congratulations to Thomas Gray, a 3rd grader at Louise Archer Elementary School, who was the first person to collect the full set of 47 Town of Vienna Police Department "Collect-a-Cop" trading cards. The objective of the Collect-a-Cop program is to enhance the introduction and acceptance of police personnel among Vienna's children. Each card contains a photograph of an officer with his or her name, rank, service history, and a message from the officer. The project is funded by the Vienna Rotary Club and the Optimist Club of Vienna.

JUNE 1979 – The co-ed softball league is new this year and will act as the pilot for a new program designed to involve young mothers, housewives, and girlfriends who are interested in participating in co-ed recreational activities. The league comprises 10 teams and will play Sunday afternoons beginning June 24 at Cunningham Park. There must be five men and five women on the field at all times for a team to participate.

JUNE 1969 – Proposals for changing the name of Beulah Road to Symphony Hill Road were dropped by the Town Council. There will, therefore, be no public hearing on June 2 as previously announced. The name change was suggested because of the impact the new Filene Center for the Performing Arts will have on the town in future years. One of the outcomes of the proposed change was the discovery of the name's origin. The street was originally named for an early Methodist church. The congregation later was divided and one section formed the Antioch Christian Church, still on Beulah Road

Recycling Rate Remains High

Vienna's Department of Public Works (DPW) recorded a recycling rate of 53.9%, reported in tons, for 2008. A 25% recycling rate is mandated for most localities in Virginia.

Thanks to the participation of Vienna residents, DPW was able to collect the following amounts of recyclable materials last year: mixed materials (paper, cardboard, cans, plastic, glass), 237.64 tons; newspaper, 718.53 tons; expanded single-stream recycling program (implemented last fall), 1,078.85 tons; brush, 1,006.10 tons; leaves/ grass, 804.22 tons; leaves (delivered back to residents as mulch), 2,198.88 tons; tires, 3.69 tons; ferrous materials, 29.39 tons; automotive waste (oil and filters, antifreeze, batteries), 9.55 tons.

Recycling helps to reduce the amount of trash going into landfills, saving tax dollars, and helps the environment by taking materials out of the waste stream to be recycled. Public Hearing on FY 2010 Tax Rate

At its June 1 meeting, the Vienna Town Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed Town real estate tax rate for fiscal year 2009-2010. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

The FY 2010 budget is based on a real estate tax rate of 23.31¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, which represents an increase of 2.40¢ from the FY 2009 tax rate. Citizens can use the online calculators available at the Town's Web site, www.vi ennava.gov, to see how the proposed budget will affect their taxes compared to the current year.

Adoption of the budget is scheduled for the June 15 Town Council meeting. The new budget will take effect July 1. For information about the budget or to obtain printed copies when they become available. call the Administrative Services Office at 703-255-6350. The budget will be posted at www.viennava.gov following adoption.

Help the Police Catch Scammers

Over the past year or so our department has seen a rise in reports of scams and fraudulent activity. As the area's population continues to age, it seems that individuals intent on committing fraud are seeking out senior citizens, many of whom reside in Vienna. Reasons for this vary but most times it is because they prey on the honest, trusting nature of seniors who may now need to use outside resources to accomplish projects, repairs, and tasks they once did for themselves.

NO LEGITIMATE SOLICITOR'S LICENSES ARE CURRENTLY ISSUED IN THE TOWN OF VIENNA. Although this may change in the future, chances are that anyone who knocks on your door is not in compliance with the Town Code requirement for a background check. This includes anyone going door to door distributing flyers unless he or she is affiliated with a political organization or charitable purpose. A Fairfax County or State of Virginia license is not sufficient in Vienna; a Town-issued license is required. (Churches, schools, and other non-profit groups may be exempted from licensing requirements by the Town Manager.)

Democratic Primary Tuesday, June 9

The Democratic Party primary election for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and State Delegate will be held on Tuesday, June 9, from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. All qualified voters are eligible to vote in this election. (Republican Party members were scheduled to nominate their candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and Attorney General at a convention rather than holding a primary election.)

If you will be out of town on election day or are unable to go to the polls because of illness or disability, you may vote by absentee ballot. In-person absentee voting will be conducted in the Office of Elections at the Fairfax County Government Center on weekdays through June 5 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday, June 6, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The deadline to apply for an absentee ballot by mail is June 2, and voted ballots must be received in the Office of Elections by 7 p.m. on Election Day in order to be counted.

On June 30, 2009, an era will end in Vienna. Councilwoman Maud F. Robinson will step down from her seat on the Town Council.

Maud and her late husband, Charles A. Robinson, Jr., began their association with the Town in 1951 when they moved into their home on Courthouse Road, S.W. Report Solicitors to the Police ...

PLEASE CALL THE VIENNA POLICE AT 703-255-6366 ANYTIME A SOLICITOR COMES TO YOUR DOOR. Our officers can then respond to stop and identify these people; they may be legitimate solicitors, or they may be career criminals. Examples of scams and fraudulent operations include:

- **\$ Tree Worker Scam** A "tree worker" tells you that your home is in danger from old trees and limbs. He asks for a down payment and tells you he will return at another time to do the work. Either he returns and tells you that you need additional work or roofing repairs and then asks for more money, or he disappears along with your down payment.
- **\$ Home Repair Scam** You will typically be told that some part of your house needs fixing, which you would have a difficult time reaching. Either minimal work is done or none at all.
- **\$ Driveway Sealing Scam** A crew tells you that they can fix cracks in your sidewalk or driveway. After an "inspection," they come back and tell you that they can seal your driveway as well. After you pay them, they spread used motor oil or black paint or some similar substance on the driveway. They then leave with your money and leave you with the mess.
- **\$ Distraction of the Homeowner –** A "repairman" comes to your home to give you an estimate for some repairs. He asks you to go to the basement and knock on a pipe or some similar excuse. Meanwhile he is stealing from your drawers and bedrooms and other places while you both are in two different areas of the home.
- \$ Counterfeit Money to Make Good on an Accident A "workman" says that his company has accidently severed a water line and some of your water escaped. He says they want to be good folks and repay you for the water they used up. After he asks to go into your bathroom to "assess" how much water they used, he comes back and offers you a sum of money. The sum is significantly larger than what they "owe" you so you give him change for the larger bill. You have just traded your genuine cash for a counterfeit note.
- \$ Impersonating a Town of Vienna Employee A subject purports himself to be a Town employee needing to inspect something inside your home or around your property. Please ask for Town-issued identification. All Town of Vienna employees have a photo ID with them when performing work in the community.

Recycle Your Rechargeable Batteries!

The Department of Public Works (DPW) now offers recycling of small *rechargeable batteries* at Town Hall, the Community Center, and at the quarterly recycling events at the Northside Property Yard. Rechargeable batteries include: nickel-cadmium (NiCd), nickel-zinc (NiZn); lithium-ion (Li-ion), nickel-metal hydride (NiMH), and small sealed lead-acid (SSLA or Pb). Rechargeable batteries come in many types, including standard AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt, or a special design for a specific device. They may be removable or internal to a device.

Simply bring your small rechargeable batteries to one of the above locations, place them into the plastic bag provided, and put the bag in the box. DPW will do the rest!

Alkaline batteries (these are non-rechargeable) are not recyclable; however, they have been redesigned to have a very low toxicity. As result, the alkaline batteries manufactured today may now be disposed of safely in your household trash.

Automobile batteries can be recycled at the Northside Property Yard (along with used motor oil and antifreeze) at the quarterly recycling events. The next recycling event is Saturday, June 6, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Yard Sale Regulations

A reminder from your Vienna Planning & Zoning Department

- Each residence and/or family household may conduct no more than two yard sales during any calendar year. No permit is required.
- Each sale must be conducted during daylight hours for no more than two consecutive weekends (Saturday and Sunday).
- To advertise your sale, two signs of not more than two square feet each are permitted at the residence where the sale is being conducted.
- Four additional signs of not more than two square feet each are permitted, as directional signs, provided permission is received from the owner of the property where the signs are to be placed.
- No sign may be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the sale.
- Signs are not allowed in Town rightof-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement) or on utility poles. All signs placed illegally will be removed.
