This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

AUGUST 1999 - Under the newly adopted Church Street Vision Plan, property owners within the street's Pedestrian Commercial Zone will be encouraged to renovate and develop properties in accordance with guidelines that will reflect a main street urban architecture reminiscent of the small-town America streetscape of the late 19th century. In exchange, owners will receive additional building square footage, a reduction in parking requirements, and an expedited review process.

AUGUST 1989 - This summer the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors approved the sale of \$15.2 million in Metrorail Parking Revenue Bonds to fund construction of the Vienna Metrorail parking structure. Construction of the facility, which will provide 1,864 parking spaces, is expected to be completed in September 1990. Meanwhile, parkand-ride users may use the alternative parking and shuttle bus service on Lee Highway.

AUGUST 1979 – As the gasoline shortage continues, more Vienna residents are joining the Town's carpool system. If you work for the federal government in Washington, DC, or nearby military installations, chances are a neighbor is going your way. To join the carpool system, complete a participation card and return it to Town Hall to get the names and phone numbers of fellow commuters to form your carpool.

AUGUST 1969 - On August 25, the Town Council and the Planning Commission will hold a joint public hearing on a proposed ordinance prohibiting the riding of horses and other animals on the streets and sidewalks within the town limits.

Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Motor **Vehicle Safety Survey Inside**

As part of the Vienna Police Department's continuing effort to maintain safe and passable routes for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motor vehicles, we would like to hear from all citizens that travel in and through town. Please take a few minutes to complete our survey on pages 7 and 8 of this newsletter.

The Vienna Police Department continually assesses the pedestrian/bicycle crossings in an effort to maintain safe passage for all parties involved. At times we receive input from the Vienna community about the safety of pedestrians and bicycles crossing at locations where motor vehicles are present. Our department has begun making presentations to civic associations, clubs, schools, and other community groups in an effort to spread the word about safety at crossings. Additionally, enforcement of various laws and ordinances takes place at key locations throughout town.

Statistical analysis shows that Vienna has between seven and ten reportable bicycle and/or pedestrian vs. vehicle crashes per year. While this is not an enormous amount when compared to other jurisdictions, it is still an area where we strive for a zero statistical balance. The Vienna Police Department has met with individuals from area bicycle shops, representatives of the W&OD Trail, and other entities in and around town in an attempt to come up with the best possible solutions to reduce the number of crashes.

Our agency has looked into speed tables (humps), markings, barriers, lighting, road grooving, and signage, and now we would like to hear from you.

Vienna Needs Better Bus Service

On July 4th, a Washington reporter came out to Vienna to cover our "hometown" style festivities. I met up with her at the Freeman Store, walked around the caboose and Farmers' Market with her, pointed her in the direction of the Community Center, and wished her a good time in Vienna.

A few hours later, I got a phone call from the reporter. It was time to get back to DC to file her story, and she wanted to know how to get back to the Metro station. The bus wasn't due for another hour, and she wasn't sure if it was even running on a holiday. Never mind, I said, I'll give you a ride.

During our drive to the Vienna Metro station, I got to expound on two of my fa-

vorite Town topics: our need for reliable, frequent bus connections; and our position as Town and County taxpayers. And it was a very timely opportunity, since earlier that week the Town Council and Transportation Safety Commission (TSC) had been briefed on the "Fairfax County Transit Development Plan" by the County's Department of Transportation and its consultants. The transportation planners are mapping out (literally) how bus service will operate in our area with the advent of the Silver Line in Tysons.

Vienna must be part of this planning. To get the bus service we need – to get to and from Metro, to get customers to our commercial area and to Tysons – we have to be part of the larger regional system.

When I was first elected to Council, I was hopeful that Vienna could operate a midday shuttle service in our commercial core. Working with our Planning staff, I looked at other local jurisdictions for models. A similar system in Bailey's Crossroads had folded because of lack of use. The George system in Falls Church, then newly launched with the substantial support of grant money, was already cutting back routes and schedules. (This year Falls Church turned over operation of George to Arlington County.) The bottom line was that the bottom line doesn't work well for a small system. Fare box revenue doesn't come close to covering operating costs; some sort of subsidy is necessary. And Vienna does not have the resources to provide that subsidy for an independent system.

But as Fairfax County taxpayers we are already supporting a larger system, with Metro and Fairfax Connector buses. And this is as good a chance as we have had in a long time to become better served by that system. We need to let the County transportation planners know what routes we want and when we want them to run. At the meeting, I raised the need for a connection from the Metro station to our commercial area. Andrew Meren of the TSC urged consideration of an express connection from Vienna to Tysons. Keely Lauretti, a new TSC member, asked for better service to residential areas in Northeast. What are your ideas? Please, share them with the planners (mzisman@atcsplc. com). Let's get on the map.

Bikeway Plan Amendments Would Regulate Riding on Sidewalks

At its August 17 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on proposed amendments to the Vienna Bikeway Plan (Town Code Chapter 21) concerning riding on sidewalks. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

Unlike some other jurisdictions, the Town of Vienna permits children under 11 years old to ride a bicycle on a sidewalk at any time, and bicyclists of any age may ride on the sidewalk wherever it is hazardous to ride in the roadway. With the overall increase in traffic in Northern Virginia, pedestrians are having to share the sidewalks with more and more bicyclists.

Bicyclists sometimes seem to forget that while riding on a sidewalk they must follow the duties and obligations of a pedestrian when crossing a roadway or a crosswalk. The proposed Bikeway Plan amendments clarify the legal duties and obligations of bicyclists riding on sidewalks and bikepaths.

Dogwood Street Sidewalk Hearing

One of the Priority One sidewalk projects recommended to the Town Council by the Sidewalk Task Force is Dogwood Street, S.W., between Center and Cottage Streets. A four-foot wide sidewalk is proposed for the north side of the street.

The Town Council will hold a public hearing on the project at its August 17 meeting, which begins at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. Project drawings will be posted and Department of Public Works staff will be available to answer questions beginning at 7 p.m.

FY 2009-10 Budget Adopted

The Town's adopted budget for fiscal year 2009-10, which began July 1, totals \$29,483,929 for all funds, an increase of \$16,564 or 0.06% over last year.

The General Fund budget is based on a real estate tax rate of 22.81¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase of 1.9¢ from last year's tax rate. Based on the estimated median market value from 2009 assessment data, the average Vienna property owner will pay an annual real estate tax bill of \$1,156.17, an increase of \$9.01. Many property owners will actually experience a decrease in this year's tax bill due the overall drop in assessments.

In the Water and Sewer Fund, based on current revenue projections it will not be necessary to increase either the water or sewer rates this fiscal year. The Town is continuing to work on a wholesale water agreement with the City of Falls Church and also examining the feasibility of an acquisition by Falls Church with the joint Town-City appointment of a firm to value the Town water and sewer systems.

The Debt Service Fund continues to be supported by receipts from the meals and lodging tax. Even with an expected decline in revenues in excess of 10%, there are still sufficient revenues in reserve to pay principal and interest payments on existing debt. No funds have been included in the Debt Service budget for a 2009 bond issue.


