This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

JULY 2000 -Vienna's Church Street Vision Plan has been awarded first place among small jurisdiction planning projects for the year 2000 by the Virginia Chapter of the American Planning Association. The Church Street Vision Plan is an innovative concept in commercial development- an incentive based development program-to preserve the unique character of what was once Vienna's main street. The voluntary program encourages property development and renovations reminiscent of the small town American streetscape of the late 19th century in exchange for modifications of land use requirements to increase the economic value of the property.

JULY 1990 - Ideas wanted for time capsule. Items to be included in the Vienna Centennial time capsule will be displayed at Centennial closing ceremonies at the Community Center on December 16. The time capsule will be opened in the year 2040, the 150th anniversary of the town.

JULY 1980 - Town residents are invited to celebrate the inauguration of the Vienna-Oakton-Tysons Corner Jitneybus System. Opening ceremonies and festivities will be held on Saturday, August 2, from 9 a.m. until noon. The two 17-passenger Jitneybuses will run on Route 123 between Tysons Corner and Oakton, and within the town will carry passengers to the Community Center, library, Post office, Town Hall, the commercial areas on Maple Avenue and Church Street and many parks and schools.

JULY 1970 - On June 12, groundbreaking ceremonies were held at the site of the new County library at Maple Avenue and Center Street. The Little Library was moved on June 17 to its new site on the Freeman property to become a part of Vienna's Historical Preservation project.

Town Reinstates

Town Council has voted to reinstate the Town's vehicle license tax. Residents should expect to begin receiving their bills in the fall of this year. The fees include \$33 for vehicles and \$18 for motorcycles. No Town sticker will be issued.

Two years ago, Council approved the abolition of the Town's vehicle license tax and terminated the requirement for residents to display a Town sticker on their vehicles. Now, in response to the economic downturn, Fairfax County has reinstated a County vehicle license tax at the rate of \$33 per vehicle. If the Town of Vienna did not reinstate its own tax, Vienna residents would still be required to pay the tax, but Fairfax County, not the Town of Vienna, would receive the tax proceeds.

Please <u>Do Not</u> Feed Wild Animals in Vienna

A message from your Animal Control Officer

As you may be aware, we have several foxes that live among us here in Vienna.

While the foxes can be very beautiful to look at, they may also pose a hazard or become a nuisance to our fellow citizens.

The Town of Vienna Police have had a number of reports of well meaning citizens who, out of the kindness of their hearts, have been feeding foxes. This practice is not helpful to the foxes nor to our fellow citizens.

The best thing you can do for wild animals is leave them alone, unless they are injured. Some areas of concern relative to feeding wild animals are:

- The animals may become comfortable around people. As they lose their natural fear of people, they will become bolder in approaching people and may put themselves in hazardous situations which would normally be avoided. Additionally, raccoons and foxes are frequent carriers of rabies disease.
- The animals, if fed regularly, will come to depend on humans for their food. The animals won't starve if you stop feeding them, (we have an abundant amount of natural prey), but they will be hungry and unafraid of people and could become aggressive in approaching other people when looking for food.
- Feeding wild animals also draws them out more in the daylight hours when people are out and about, or when children are outside playing. They begin to view humans as a source for food.
- All of us need to remember that these are wild animals. They may act tamely around humans for weeks on end, then one day they may be startled by something and react aggressively.
- If you are bitten by a wild animal, you should immediately seek medical treatment from a doctor and report the bite to the Vienna Police Department. Unfortunately you will probably have to get a series of rabies shots, which are both expensive and uncomfortable. Officers will have to try to find the particular animal that bit you, in which case it will then have to be killed for testing.

Vienna is a great place to live and as you know, we share our Town with various types of wildlife. This adds to the character and charm of our community. Please help them and us by enjoying them from a distance.



The Precarious Balance of Virginia's Budget

Virginia.

It's not just the economy putting Virginia in a bind. The General Assembly has relied on one-time fixes, postponing and exacerbating the situation. Federal stimulus funds are used up, and spending pressures are mounting, especially for Medicaid as more seniors qualify for assistance.

But wasn't there a big tax increase in 2004? Sort of. Two-year revenues were up \$1.6 billion, but car tax relief alone cost \$1.9 billion. And those "extra" revenues have been expended again by the elimination of estate taxes and the land preservation taxexemption program. Revenues in Fiscal Year (FY) 2012 are projected to be lower than those in FY2007. (The fiscal year starts July 1 of the previous calendar year, so FY 2012 begins July 1, 2011.)

How does one balance such a budget? Largely by kicking costs into the future and down to others, such as parents, students and local governments. For this two-year cycle, the General Assembly made spending cuts of \$2.8 billion, increased revenue forecasts \$450 million, and borrowed \$850 million from the employee retirement

> Virginia's colleges are getting less funding, leading to fewer seats for Virginia students. 55% of the freshmen accepted by the University of Virginia last year were out-of-state. Colleges without name recognition are raising tuition and cutting professors. Students and parents pay higher tuition, and many have to spend a fifth year on campus in order to schedule all the classes they need.

Other burdens passed down to localities include less funding for police officers and road maintenance, keeping prisoners in local jails rather than state prison, and cuts to funding for statemandated positions (sheriffs, Commonwealth's Attorneys, etc.) and local health and social services. Localities are also being made to take over payment of the state's "Line of Duty" benefit, \$100,000 plus lifetime health insurance paid to any public safety employee (and/or surviving spouse and dependents) disabled or killed on the job.

At the same time, revenues that once were paid to local governments, or were shared by the state, are being kept by the state. For instance, although Virginia law requires alcoholic



beverage taxes to be shared with localities, the state now retains the entire amount. Another example is telecommunications taxes for E-911 and other local services. The state began collecting them to "simplify" the process, and now the state retains more of this revenue every year.

Governor McDonnell's Government Reform Commission has received news coverage because of Chairman Fred Malek's past, but scant attention has been paid to its mission. Virginia citizens need to identify our spending priorities, and decide how we want to pay for them. Is the state income tax appropriate, or real estate taxes, or increased fees (like cigarette taxes, vehicle registrations, and highway tolls), a new revenue source, or some combination? Then we must communicate our opinions to our state representatives: Delegate Mark Keam (DelMKeam@house.virginia.gov or 703-350-3911), Senator Chap Petersen (district34@senate.virginia.gov or 703-349-3361), and Governor Robert McDonnell

MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER

This is the Town of Vienna's twelfth annual report to inform you about your drinking water quality. As a part of the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1996, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires all water utilities across the nation to mail their customers a Water Quality Report by July 1, 2010. Our goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water, and we want you to understand our efforts to protect your water supply.

The quality of your drinking water must meet state and federal requirements administered by the Virginia Department of Health. We constantly monitor for various contaminants in the water supply to meet all regulatory requirements. The tables in this report list only those contaminants that had some level of detection. Many other contaminants have been analyzed but were either not present or were below the detection limits of the laboratory equipment. All of our water quality data are from testing done in 2009. However, the Commonwealth allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once a year because the concentration of these contaminants does not change frequently. Even though some of our data may be more than one year old, they are accurate.

GENERAL INFORMATION

As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Substances (referred to as contaminants) in source water may come from septic systems, discharges from domestic or industrial wastewater treatment facilities, agricultural and farming activities, urban storm water runoff, residential uses, and many other types of activities. Water from surface sources is treated to make it drinkable while groundwater may or may not have any treatment.

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. Environmental Protection Agency/Center for Disease Control guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline.

WATER SOURCES

For the calendar year 2009, the Town of Vienna was supplied with treated surface water from the Potomac River by the City of Falls Church. The Town purchases treated water from the Washington Aqueduct supplied by Falls Church. The final source is groundwater from two wells in the Town of Vienna. Well water is blended in the Town's delivery system and comprises approximately 1% of our total usage. In November 2009 the two wells were taken out of service.

HOW DO I READ THIS CHART?

Our water is tested to assure that it is safe and healthy. Contaminants in the drinking water are routinely monitored according to Federal and State regulations. The table contained in this report shows the most recent results of our monitoring. Typical sources of contamination show where this substance usually originates. The following definitions are provided to help you better understand terms and abbreviations.

- The Washington Aqueduct sampling program includes cryptosporidium. Their results and information are included.
- Non-detects (ND) laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.
- Parts per million (ppm) one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.
- Parts per billion (ppb) one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years or a single penny in \$10,000,000.
- Parts per trillion (ppt) one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.
- Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.
- Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity, or cloudiness, of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person. Turbidity is monitored because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of the filtration system.
- Action Level (AL) the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
- Treatment Technique (TT) a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set at very stringent levels by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. In developing the standards EPA assumes that the average adult drinks two liters of water each day throughout a 70-year life span. EPA generally sets MCLs at levels that will result in no adverse health effects for some contaminants or a one-in-ten-thousand to one-in-one million chance of having the described health effect for other contaminants.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) the maximum level of total chlorine allowable by regulation.

PERCHLORATE RESEARCH

Perchlorate is a naturally occurring as well as man-made compound. Its presence in drinking water is currently unregulated and utilities are not required to monitor for it. The Washington Aqueduct has been voluntarily monitoring for perchlorate since 2002. The EPA initially established a reference dose of 24.5 parts per billion (ppb) for perchlorate and beginning in 2009 has proposed an interim health advisory of 15 ppb. A reference dose is a scientific estimate of a daily exposure level that is not expected to cause adverse health effects in humans. The reference dose concentration was used in EPA's efforts to address perchlorate in drinking water and to establish the interim health advisory.

In 2009, finished water samples sample results for perchlorate collected by Washington Aqueduct at both treatment plants ranged between none detected and 2.3 ppb. LEAD IN DRINKING WATER

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Town of Vienna is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in private plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 15 to 30 seconds or until it becomes cold or reaches a steady temperature before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. TURBIDITY IN DRINKING WATER

Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can interfere with disinfection and provide a medium for microbial growth. Turbidity may indicate the presence of disease-causing organisms. These organisms include bacteria, viruses, and parasites that can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea and associated headaches.

2009 SOURCE WATER CRYPTOSPORIDIUM INFORMATION

The Town's water supplier has been monitoring the source waters for compliance with the EPA's Long Term 2 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule (LT2ESWTR). The EPA created this rule to provide for increased protection against microbial pathogens, such as *Cryptosporidium*, in public water systems that use surface water sources. *Cryptosporidium* was monitored in the source water monthly in 2009 but was not detected in any sample.

WATER TREATMENT PROCESS CHANGES

To improve the water treatment process and reduce operational risk, projects at the Washington Aqueduct are underway to replace the use of bulk liquid chlorine with sodium hypochlorite in the disinfection process and to install a new caustic soda feed system to allow better fine tuning of the pH levels for corrosion control. These projects are scheduled to be completed by the end of 2010.

The use of sodium hypochlorite and caustic soda may increase the level of sodium in the finished drinking water by up to 6 mg/L. The U.S. Environmental Protection agency has identified 20 mg/L of sodium in drinking water as a health-based value for an individual on a 500 milligrams per day restricted sodium diet. In 2009, sodium levels in the finished water ranged from 10 to 22 mg/L.
