to the first 90 approved applicants, the parade may fill before the entry deadline.

The parade will step off at 7 p.m., sharp on Wednesday, October 26, on Maple

Avenue. The theme of this year's parade is "Celebrating 65 Years of Tradition: The Vienna Halloween Parade through the Decades, 1946-2011." ## **SPECIAL PICKUP DEADLINE: OCTOBER 1**

Town of Vienna residents have until Saturday, October 1, to request a Special Pickup for this year. Residents must call no later than October 1, in order to ensure receipt of a Special Pickup this year. No orders for Special Pickups will be taken from October through January as leaf collection will be performed during these months.

To dispose of furniture, building materials, brush and other debris not included in regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup between February 1 and October 1 of each year. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup hotline at 703-255-5727 and leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number and type of debris. Special Pickups can also be ordered online at www.viennava.gov/Town\_Services/trash. htm#pickups.

## BANNER APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE OCTOBER 3

Applications to display banners across Maple Avenue in 2012 will be available in the Public Works Department at Town Hall beginning Monday, October 3. Applications may be submitted by non-profit community organizations anytime through November. Organizations displaying banners this year will automatically receive application forms in the mail. Banner space will be awarded in December via a lottery. Each banner will be displayed for two weeks. For more information, call 703-255-6383.

## SPECIAL PICKUP GUIDELINES

Please order your Special Pickup as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard. It is illegal to place debris in the public right-of-way without arranging for a Special Pickup. When an illegal pile of trash is spotted or reported to Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a Special Pickup within 48 hours. If no action is taken by the resident after the notice is issued, the Town will seek legal remedy to gain compliance.

Each residence is allowed two free Special Pickup loads each year. Additional pickups may be arranged at a charge of \$75 per load for all items except brush; additional loads of brush will be charged at \$25 each. Each Special Pickup is limited to one single-axle dump truck load (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle".) Special Pickups are for the sole use of the property where the trash has been generated and cannot be transferred to another property in the Town. All items must be placed at the curb or edge of pavement in front of your property. Discards should not be placed so that they block the sidewalk or street, under power lines or trees, or close to shrubs, walls or vehicles. Place all piles in an open area accessible to a crane.

## NO CURB PAINTING ALLOWED

Some residents have recently received offers to paint their house numbers on the curb. Not only have these solicitors failed to apply for a license, but they cannot legally paint the curb because it is technically Town property. If you receive such a solicitation, please call the Police Department's non-emergency number at 703-255-6366.

Residents should display large house numbers at least five feet above the ground near the entrance or garage door that faces the street. This will ensure the numbers can be seen on the darkest night, in the worst of weather and not be hidden by foliage or parked vehicles.

## VIENNA SUSTAINABLE HOME AND GARDEN TOUR

For a little over a year the Community Enhancement Commission (CEC) has been operating with a new mandate focused on sustainability. I've been so impressed with the support we've received from the Town Council, the Director of Parks and Recreation and the passion of my fellow CEC members in their various areas of interest: native gardening, energy efficiency, zero waste, recycling and related topics.

On Sunday, September 18, from 12 noon to 4 p.m. the CEC will host Vienna's first Sustainable Home and Garden Tour. The most exciting thing about organizing this tour is the enthusiasm of our neighbors for adopting sustainable choices. Some have been quietly reworking their gardens with native plants to support the birds and butterflies that we all love to see. Some Viennans have invested in highly efficient geothermal HVAC systems to cut their use of fossil fuels. Certain builders are building homes to exceed recognized efficiency standards, thus raising the value of these homes while reducing their operating costs and their carbon footprint. Other neighbors have permeable driveways constructed to reduce run off in heavy rainstorms to help protect the health of local streams and the Chesapeake Bay.

Many of our neighbors are investing in our community through longterm sustainable choices and they are very enthusiastic about sharing their experiences with you. I invite you to join me on the 18th and see these very interesting improvements that you may want to make to your little corner of Vienna.







## THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

**September 2001:** A party to celebrate the completion of the mural near the Vienna Railroad Station will be held at 7 p.m., Wednesday, September 5, at the mural. The mural, painted on the rear wall of the building on Mill Street, NE is 25 feet tall and 108 feet long. It faces the W&OD Regional Trail in the heart of Vienna, near the old train station and the red caboose, and highlights the role of the railroad in Vienna's history.

**September 1991:** The Town Council will hold a public hearing at its September 16 meeting on a proposal to reconstruct Beulah Road. The Virginia Department of Transportation has proposed that the road be reconstructed with a 33-foot paved width; however, VDOT officials have indicated that the Town could use a 30-foot width if it wishes.

**September 1981:** At its September 14 meeting, the Town Council directed the Transportation Safety Commission to undertake a review of intersections controlled by stop signs, taking into consideration both the usual warrants for traffic control devices and local characteristics of each intersection. The Commission is to report to council within six months with recommendations as to which, if any, stop signs should be downgraded from 4-way or 3-way to 2-way or less, and from 2-way or 1-way to "yield" or less.

**September 1971:** Recently, Mayor Wilson organized a Mayor's Advisory Committee made up of representatives from all the different organizations in town. At the first meeting of this group, Mr. William Nutter, representing the Vienna Lions Club, explained the details of planning for a Vienna Community Center and asked the other groups represented to work with the Lions Club on this much needed recreational facility.
