COMMENT FROM THE COUNCIL TABLE

Our Vienna This Year!

As we enter the holiday season and 2011 draws to a close, I would like to highlight some of the accomplishments, milestones and events that have occurred and the community spirit that is alive and thriving here in Vienna this past year.

The first part of the year saw the Mayor and Council recruiting and hiring a new Town Manager to replace John Schoeberlein who retired after 27 highly successful years as Town Manager. His steady management, fiscal discipline and dedication are major factors in Vienna's reputation as a well-run and managed local government jurisdiction. The hiring and appointment of his successor, Mercury Payton, as the new Town Manager allows for Vienna to continue its reputation as a well-run jurisdiction. By all reports John is thoroughly enjoying retirement, still living here in Vienna and not missing at all the Monday evening Council meetings!

Reinforcing the strong spirit of community, Vienna successfully held a number of major outdoor events: Viva!Vienna! in May, the 4th of July celebration and fireworks, the Oktoberfest and the 65th anniversary of the Halloween parade. We look forward to the annual Church Street Holiday Stroll on November 28th. All of these draw on a large number of Vienna

organizations to run and generate large public attendance. Then there was a unique fifth event held in June. As part of the Civil War Sesquicentennial commemoration, Vienna saw an actual reenactment of the famous Vienna train battle fought in June 1861. Canon fire, rifle shots, a train and confederate and union troops attacking each other both on foot and by horseback were the backdrop of that exciting day.

This fall, the James Madison High School Warhawk varsity football team that was 2-8 last year, has had an impressive winning season with numerous games decided by incredibly close scores. Under new coaches, many of whom played for the team a generation ago, Madison made it to the playoffs, which has added to the excitement and spirit in the Vienna community. At most home games this fall, there was not a vacant seat in the bleachers! The Warhawk name is proudly on display on the Town's Nutley street water tower! In the spring, the girls' varsity lacrosse team won the state title and the Madison Crew Rowing team freshmen boys' and girls' boats each won 1st place state titles and the girls varsity 8 boat placed 2nd at the U.S. Youth National Rowing Championship in Tennessee. The playing fields of our town are full of young athletes and the sounds of their fans proudly echo.

The Vienna Theatre Company is marking its 40th year, a major feat. This is a nonprofit, award-winning Community Theater that is supported by both the Town and the local community and always has great productions!



The now annual November Vienna Turkey Trot, started nine years ago by the Vienna Jaycees to help raise funds for the Vienna Fire Station Capital building campaign, has grown from 250 runners the first year to over 1,100 this year! It is now sponsored by the James Madison High School Marching Band Booster Club with funds raised to support both the Band and the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department. This is another example of the great spirit that is alive in our community.

In October, the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department placed an order for a new fire engine that will cost about \$600,000, compared to the original cost of the '46 maxim fire truck that is now an antique but still owned by the volunteers that cost \$7,863 when purchased new in 1946.

The month of December will see the Christmas tree sales by the Vienna Host Lions Club, Santa riding the Vienna Fire Department's antique fire truck and other special events at the Community Center and Freeman House.

As the year comes to a close, I hope you and your family have a wonderful holiday season and as a community we continue to thrive in 2012.

VIENNA JOINS REGION-WIDE DROUGHT PLAN

On October 17, Town Council approved making modifications to the Town Code Chapter 12-3: Water Shortage Control Plan in order to conform to the Northern Virginia Regional Water Supply Plan. This brings the Town of Vienna into compliance with other entities nearby so that there is a comprehensive plan that ensures a uniform response from the many individual cities and towns to drought throughout the region. The approved amendment lays out definitions of responses to the different stages of drought and outlines penalties for violating any provision of the drought warning stages. The definitions and penalties are as follows:

Stage 1- Drought Watch: When moderate but limited supplies of water are available and a drought watch is declared, the Town Manager or their designee will call upon the residents to exercise prudent restraint in their water usage. Public outreach will keep residents informed of any changing conditions. There are no penalties at this stage.

Stage 2- Drought Warning: This stage includes voluntary water conservation acts due to the arrival of a major drought event. Residents will be asked to reduce outdoor water use by only using water before 10 a.m. and after 7

p.m. and by decreasing turf watering, using a broom to clean driveways and sidewalks, not washing vehicles often, using a bucket to water instead of a hose and turning off ornamental fountains.

Residents will be asked to reduce indoor water use by finding and repairing any leaks, turning off water while shaving or brushing teeth, decreasing time in showers to five minutes or taking baths with less water, only using a washing machine or dishwasher when they are fully loaded, storing water in the refrigerator to ensure it is cold and installing water-saving devices in the home.

Civil penalties apply at this stage. The first offense leads to a warning that will be delivered in person or posted by a representative of the Town. The second offense carries a fine of \$50 which will appear on the violator's next water bill. The third offense carries a fine of \$100 which will appear on the violator's next water bill. For any subsequent offenses, the violator will be subject to water service termination and reconnection fees. Each violation by a person shall be counted as a separate violation, regardless of location.

Stage 3- Drought Emergency: As drought conditions worsen a drought emergency may be declared and

mandatory restrictions will be imposed, such as all public water uses not related to health or safety will be prohibited, outdoor watering will be severely reduced, washing vehicles, sidewalks, driveways and house exteriors will be prohibited, ornamental fountains and similar structures will cease operation, filling and refilling swimming pools and wading pools will be prohibited, restaurants will be prohibited from serving water unless a customer specifically requests it and fire hydrant use will be limited to fire protection only.

Residents who exceed 5,000 gallons a month in water usage, or use more than their base usage for the same time period in the previous year, will be charged for water at two-times the rate. Residents who continue to overuse water will be subject to water service termination and reconnection fees.

People who have received penalties have the right to challenge the penalty by submitting a written notice to the Town Manager within ten days of receiving the penalty. The Town Manager will determine if the penalty was assessed correctly and notify the complainant of the decision in writing. The Town Manager may waive the penalty if they determine that the violation occurred through no fault of the person.

VIENNA REMEMBERS LONGTIME EMPLOYEE CAROL ORNDORFF

On Tuesday, November 2, longtime Vienna employee Carol Orndorff passed away at Fair Oaks Hospital. She was hired by the Town of Vienna in 1985 and appointed as Town Clerk in 1987 where she served the Town until her retirement in 2009.

"I have known and worked with Carol for over 20 years and during that time she provided invaluable assistance and advice to me and my staff. She was a dedicated public servant and cared deeply about the Town of Vienna community. Carol was more than a co-worker; she was a dear friend and she will be sorely missed by me and the community as a whole," said Town of Vienna Finance Director and friend Phil Grant.

Mrs. Orndorff is survived by her son, Councilmember Michael J. Polychrones and his wife, Patti. The funeral was held at Money and King Funeral Home on Saturday, November 5.

RECYCLING AT NORTHSIDE

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries is Saturday, December 3, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill St., N.E. (entrance at the dead end of the street). This service of the Department of Public Works (DPW) provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products.

DPW also offers recycling of small rechargeable batteries at the quarterly recycling events at Northside as well as at Town Hall and the Community Center. Rechargeable batteries include nickel-cadmium (NiCd), nickel-zinc (NiZn), lithium-ion (Li-ion), nickel-metal hydride (NiMH), and small sealed lead-acid (SSLA or Pb). Rechargeable batteries come in many types, including standard AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt, or a special design for a specific device. They may be removable or internal to a device.

Alkaline batteries (non-rechargeable) are not recyclable; however, they have been redesigned to have a very low toxicity and may now be disposed of safely in your household trash. For more information, call 703-255-6381.

ENERGY SAVING TIPS FOR THE HOLIDAY SEASON

The holidays are quickly approaching, which for many of us means unpacking boxes filled with lights and decorations, baking cookies and other treats, or hosting parties for friends and family. Here are a few ways you can save yourself from sticker shock when it comes time to pay those post holiday energy bills.

Upgrade your lights.

Did you know that those old light bulb strands use upwards of ten watts per bulb? Switch them out for miniature lights that use 70% less energy and last longer. Or better yet, switch over to LED lights that use 80%-90% less energy. As a bonus LEDs are shatterproof, shock

resistant, safe to touch and can last up to 20 years! Hooked on the bright lights, then switch over to the newer traditional strands that use five-watt bulbs. They use 30% less energy than the 10-watt varieties.

What's Cooking?

Resist the urge to open the oven door to take a peek. Every time you open the oven door you lose 25 degrees. Instead, turn on the oven light and look through the window, or use a temperature probe with an external monitor to gauge doneness. If cooking something for a long time like a turkey or holiday ham then skip the preheating. While the oven is on, throw in that extra pie. It

takes just as much energy to heat a full oven as it does an empty one.

Body Heat.

Having some friends and family over this holiday season? Try turning down that thermostat before they arrive. The additional people in the house will help keep it warm. Lowering the thermostat by just one degree Fahrenheit can reduce energy use anywhere from 1%-3%.

Hopefully you can implement some of these energy saving tips during this holiday season, a few of which might also be useful for year round energy savings.

PLEASE SHOVEL SNOW IF POSSIBLE

This winter, residents who are physically able are requested to shovel snow from sidewalks next to their property for the safety of pedestrians, especially schoolchildren. Although some jurisdictions in our area require residents to shovel sidewalks, the Town of Vienna has no such requirement, mainly because it would impose a hardship on elderly and disabled residents.

Vienna area teens are available to shovel snow and help with other odd jobs. The teen and the person needing the work decide on the amount to be paid for the service. Teens can sign up at the Community Center, and residents can call 703-255-6360 to be matched with a young worker.

Town businesses that hire snowplows to clear their parking lots should make sure that snow is not piled onto adjoining sidewalks or pushed into the street. Also, it is illegal to block handicapped parking spaces with snow.

PENNYWISE CELEBRATES 50 YEARS

November 3 marked the 50th anniversary of the Pennywise Thrift Shop located on Beulah Road. In 1961, as Chairperson of the Church of the Holy Comforter's Ways and Means Committee, Lillian Croy lead the way and founded Pennywise Thrift Shop.

In the beginning, Pennywise was located at 215 Maple Avenue, W where Rite Aid currently stands today. When the store opened on November 3, 1961, its first day's profits mounted to \$11. By the end of its first year, Pennywise brought in \$2,588.96 in profits. Over the years, Pennywise grew and as such, needed a new location. A new building was built and Pennywise moved to its current site on Beulah Road.

Since its inception, Pennywise Thrift Shop has been a volunteer-run organization with no paid staff. It takes approximately 12,000 volunteer hours per year to support Pennywise operations; almost 33 hours per day. LEAF MULCH DELIVERY

The Public Works Department will take orders December 1 through February 28 for leaf mulch to be delivered free of charge to residents who live within the corporate limits of the Town. Delivery will likely begin mid-February. To place your order, call the "Mulch Line" recording at 703-255-6388 and leave your name, address, daytime phone number and the number of loads to be delivered. You may also order leaf mulch online by visiting www.viennava.gov/index. aspx?NID=164. One load is approximately 2.5 cubic yards, which roughly equals 30 bags of mulch from a home hardware/lawn care store. Half loads are available on request.

Please note the following important conditions:

- All mulch deliveries are based on availability of mulch.
- Mulch deliveries will be placed only in the driveway at the end closest to the house.
- Once mulch is delivered, it becomes the property of the homeowner and the Town will not remove any excess mulch ordered.

Residents may pick up leaf mulch themselves in any amount between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday (except holidays) from January 2 through March 30 while supplies last. Please call the DPW Administration office at (703) 255-6380 to arrange a pickup time so that we can ensure a staff member will be on site. The mulch is stored on Town-owned property at 442 Beulah Road NE, near Glyndon Park.

Businesses, Non-profits May Order Mulch

Free leaf mulch delivery is also available to all in-town businesses as well as churches, schools, the fire station, library and other non-profit organizations within the town limits. Call 703-255-6388 beginning December 1 to place an order. Please note the conditions outlined above, which also apply to non-residential deliveries.

By grinding leaves into recyclable mulch the Town saves thousands of dollars in landfill fees each year. To save even more, citizens are encouraged to recycle grass clippings as mulch or compost. For how-to information, call the Fairfax County Recycling Hotline at 703-324-5052.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

December 2001: Early next year, the Finance Department will be able to accept credit card payments for water and sewer bills and real estate taxes. Payments will be accepted in person at Town Hall, over the phone or over the internet.

December 1991: The Town's Water and Sewer Division employees have bringing in donations of unwrapped received the Silver Performance Award from the American Water Works Association for reducing their disability injury rate by 50% over the last three years. The drop in injuries is due largely to the implementation of a formal safety program, many features of which were suggested by the employees themselves.

December 1981: At its December 7 meeting the Town Council requested the Transportation Safety Commission to study the traffic situation in the Branch Road/Beulah Road/Maple Avenue area. The study is to include the possibility of realigning traffic lights to provide a complete intersection or the installation of additional lights to accomplish that purpose.

December 1971: The Alcohol Safety Action Project has postponed its December 17, from 1 to 5 p.m. in the planned December road survey until after the new year. It was felt that results historic Vienna Depot, located at 231 during the holiday season would not give an accurate sampling of typical driver conditions. (A sampling indicated that one-third of the drivers had something to drink, which hopefully is not normal throughout the year.)
