TOWN OFFICES CLOSED FOR PRESIDENT'S DAY

Town offices will be closed on Monday, February 20, in observance of President's Day. Trash will be collected as normal. The Vienna Community Center will be open from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.; no classes will be held.

SPECIAL PICKUP PROGRAM RESUMES THIS MONTH

Vienna's Special Pickup program resumes this month. To dispose of furniture, homeowner-generated building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording at 703-255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount and type of debris. COUNCIL TO CONSIDER CHANGES TO TOWN'S TRASH, RECYCLING AND SPECIAL PICKUP PROGRAMS

The Vienna Town Council is considering changes to the Town's refuse program as part of the Fiscal Year 2013 budget process. Any changes made to the Town's refuse program will not go into effect until July 1, 2012. During this process, the Town will continue its current trash, recycling and Special Pickup Programs. LAST CHANCE TO ORDER LEAF MULCH

Wednesday, February 29, is the last day to order a free delivery of ground leaf mulch from the Public Works Department. To place your order, call 703-255-6388 and leave your name, address, daytime phone number and the number of loads to be delivered. One load is estimated to be 2.5 cubic yards (equivalent to 33-34 store bought bags.) Half loads are also available. Orders may also be placed online at www.viennava.gov/index.aspx?NID=164. Please note the following important conditions:

- All mulch deliveries are based on availability of mulch.
- Mulch deliveries will be placed only in the driveway at the end closest to the house.
- Once mulch is delivered, it becomes the property of the homeowner and the Town will not remove any excess mulch ordered.

Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday (except holidays) through March 30. The mulch is stored on Town-owned property off Beulah Road near Glyndon Park. Look for the sign, "Free Leaf Mulch.

ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT AVAILABLE

The Town of Vienna's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for fiscal year ending June 30, 2011, is now available for review online at www.viennava.gov/Archive.aspx?AMID=39. It is also available for review in the Finance Department at Town Hall or can be purchased for \$5 per copy.

The report summarizes the Town's financial position and results of operations of the various funds and account groups. It also includes the Auditor's Report on FYE 2011, information on internal controls for managing and safeguarding Town assets, and selected financial and demographic information from the last ten years.

According to the report, the Town ended last fiscal year in stable financial condition. General and Debt Service funds had combined revenues of \$21,287,438, an increase of \$469,520, or 2.2 percent, over the previous fiscal year. Other local taxes accounted for all of the increase, rising by \$779,137, or 12 percent over the preceding year. The change was due to the vehicle license fee implemented last year and a 6 percent increase in meals and lodging tax collections.

Total expenditures of the General and Debt Service funds declined by \$87,945 or 1 percent from the year before. The

decrease was primarily due to a reduction in transfers out of the General Fund.

Last year's Water and Sewer operating revenues were up slightly by \$231,725, or 4 percent, to end the year at \$6,071,383, primarily due to an increase in sewer rates. Operating expenses ended the year at \$5,521,436, down \$240,774 or 4.2 percent due to decreases in all expense categories.

\$1,926,667 worth of 1996, 1998, 1999, 2002 and 2006 general obligation debt was retired last year, offset by \$4,990,000 in new general obligation debt, bringing total outstanding debt to \$12,180,002 at the end of last year. The balance is the equivalent of about 4/10ths of a percent of the Town's 2010 taxable assessed values, well below the constitutional limit of ten percent and well within the Town's debt retirement capacity.

The Town's cash was invested in the Commonwealth of Virginia Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP) and interest-bearing deposit and cash accounts during the year. Interest income for the year declined by \$15,296, or 22 percent, to end the year at \$54,141, reflecting market yields that for the year averaged .27 percent as compared to .3 percent the year before.

TOWN ACHIEVES CLASS 8 RATING IN FEMA'S COMMUNITY RATING SYSTEM

On Monday, January 9, FEMA representative Mari Radford presented the Town of Vienna with a plaque in recognition of Vienna's move from a Class 9 community to a Class 8 in FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS) program, a program that includes ten class rating levels based on the number and types of activities voluntarily initiated by the community.

The Town of Vienna participates in FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and as part of this program, the CRS program recognizes communities that choose to go above and beyond the minimum requirements for NFIP participation. The Town of Vienna is one of only 20 Virginia communities to qualify for participation in the CRS program.

The Class 8 rating qualifies each Vienna NFIP policy holder for an average \$42 savings on their annual premium. Overall, the rating change results in a total annual savings of \$5,072 for all NFIP policy holders in town.

BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWAL DEADLINE: MARCH 1

Town businesses are reminded that March 1 is the deadline for payment of the annual business, professional, and occupational license (BPOL) tax. All businesses in the Town of Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business licenses each year.

The amount of the tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. The gross receipts threshold is \$50,000, below which the tax does not apply. Businesses with gross receipts of \$50,000 or less pay only the minimum license fee of \$30 per year.

License tax renewal forms were mailed at the end of January, and forms are also available in the Finance Department at Town Hall and online at www. viennava.gov. For more information or assistance in figuring license taxes, call 703-255-6321.

SEWER BACKUPS ARE EXPENSIVE; BACKUP INSURANCE IS NOT!

The Town of Vienna makes every attempt to prevent sewer backups from occurring. Sewer lines are specially designed to reduce accumulation and stoppages. In addition, a maintenance crew is devoted to inspecting and cleaning sewer lines throughout the Town on a regular basis. Degreasing chemicals are also injected into lines in areas that are prone to stoppages, such as those near restaurants and apartments. Even with this rigorous maintenance schedule; however, backups can still occur.

All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company. The Town's insurance carrier rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

RECYCLING AT NORTHSIDE: DROP OFF USED MOTOR OIL, ANTIFREEZE AND BATTERIES

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries is Saturday, March 3 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill St., N.E. (entrance at the dead end of the street). This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. Too often, used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, releasing toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic into the environment. Recycled oil is a valuable resource that can be remanufactured into new fuels. Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison. Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia it is illegal to dispose of automobile batteries with refuse.

NO WHITE GOODS IN SPECIAL PICKUPS

White goods are not collected as part of the Special Pickup program. White goods include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, large toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cook-tops, dehumidifiers, and furnaces.

Please call the Special Pickup number as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard. It is illegal to place debris in the public right-of-way without arranging for a Special Pickup. When an illegal pile of trash is spotted by or reported to Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a Special Pickup within 48 hours. If no action is taken by the resident after the notice is issued, the Town will seek legal remedy to gain compliance.

Each residence is allowed two free Special Pickup loads each year. Additional pickups may be arranged at a charge of \$75 per load for all items except brush; additional loads of brush will be charged at \$25 each. Each Special Pickup is limited to one single-axle dump truck load.

If you employ contractors for home renovations or other services, they must take any waste away with them. The Town's Special Pickup program is meant to aid residents in disposing of bulky materials after performing the work themselves. Contractor-generated

waste material will not be picked up.

Special Pickups are for the sole use of the property where the trash has been generated and cannot be transferred to another property in the town. All items must be placed at the curb or edge of pavement in front of your property. Discards should not be placed so that they block the sidewalk or street, are under power lines or trees, or are close to shrubs, walls or vehicles. Place all piles in an open area accessible to a crane truck.

PLEASE REVIEW THESE GUIDELINES BEFORE CALLING FOR YOUR SPECIAL PICKUP

The amount and type of debris are limited to the following:

- 1. Discarded furniture (except plastic), swing sets and playground equipment (except plastic).
- 2. Sod and brush. Brush must be separated from other Special Pickup materials.
- 3. 300 pounds of scrap metal, small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires. All tires must be removed from the rim.
- 4. Trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches, and no more than 8 feet in length.
- 5. Building materials (not generated by contractor), which include the following items: wood, broken concrete, bricks or block, fences, drywall and paneling. Each residence is limited to 300 pounds (approximately two wheelbarrow loads) of masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. per pickup. If you employ contractors for home renovations or other services, they must take any waste away with them. The Town's Special Pickup program is meant to aid residents in disposing of bulky materials after performing the work themselves. Contractor-generated waste material will not be picked up.

All sharp items such as box cutters, razors, saw blades, and large panes of glass should be wrapped in several layers of newspaper. In the interest of safety, parents should caution their children not to play in or around debris placed at the curb for a Special Pickup.

The Public Works Department will <u>not</u> pick up the following items:

- 1. Gas tanks.
- 2. Fuel oil tanks.
- 3. Any motor powered by gas or diesel fuel.
- 4. Pressurized tanks such as propane, air, or Freon.
- 5. Mounted tires. (Town crews will pick up the tire and the rim as long as they are separated.)
- 6. Tree stumps and tree parts over 6 inches in diameter. Large tree stumps or tree parts over 6 inches can be disposed of at the Fairfax County Transfer Station located on West Ox Road or at the Fairfax County Landfill located in Lorton.
- 7. Paint cans. Hazardous materials such as fuel tanks, paints, solvents, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes, etc. can be disposed of through the Fairfax County Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. The drop-off center for hazardous waste is the I-66 Citizens' Recycling and Disposal Facility at 4618 West Ox Rd. (just beyond the Fire and Rescue training academy). Call 703-324-5068 for more information.
- 8. Biohazardous waste, including needles and syringes.
- 9. Contractor-generated material.
- 10. Brush and trash that are mixed.
- 11. Dirt.
- 12. White goods, including stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cook-tops, dehumidifiers and furnaces.

THE BENEFITS OF TOWN OF VIENNA LEAF MULCH

This is the time of year that piles of mulch are beginning to appear in driveways around town. Did you know that this mulch is free and so is the delivery? This mulch is made from leaves that have been collected locally from the properties of town residents, which are then partially composted in the town yard during the winter months and then delivered back to many of the properties from where it originally came.

This leaf compost provides a local, sustainable option for providing organic matter to your garden and is one of the best kept secrets available to town residents. This leaf compost is an excellent mulch source for your landscape and or vegetable garden. Simply apply a two to three inch layer of shredded leaves to your beds. The mulch will help the soil retain moisture, stay cool and limit weed seed germination. As a bonus, the leaves will add nutrients to the soil as they break down, and the worms and soil microorganisms will work on them as well, resulting in lighter, fluffier soil over time.

If you are interested in creating vegetable beds you may add an even greater amount of leaf compost to the soil in these beds to create an excellent soil loam which is ideal for growing edibles.

TOWN ELECTION FILING DEADLINE

Tuesday, March 6, is the filing deadline for candidates in the May 1 Town election. This year, voters will elect the Mayor and three Town Council members for two-year terms beginning July 1. Candidates must be qualified to vote for and hold the office sought, a resident of the Commonwealth of Virginia for one year immediately preceding the election, and a resident, by the time of filing, of the Town of Vienna.

Candidates for office are required to file specific documents in order to appear on the ballot. The information packet for candidates is available at the State Board of Election's website, www.sbe.virginia. gov, or call toll-free 1-800-552-9745 and ask for the Election Services Division.

FIREPLACE SAFETY - CAN YOUR ASHES

In light of the recent fatal fire apparently caused by live embers thrown out near a home, please be reminded of these fireplace safety tips:

- Have your chimney inspected annually, and cleaned as necessary.
- When cleaning the fireplace, store ashes in a noncombustible container with a tight fitting lid and place the container away from the house. **Do not** place ash containers on decks, porches or in garages.
- Dispose of ashes in a metal container.
- Never leave a fireplace fire unattended.
- Make sure the fire is completely out before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Allow ashes to cool before disposing in a metal container. (Sometimes it takes four days for ashes to cool down.)
- Call 911 immediately when a fire occurs. Residents should not attempt to extinguish the fire themselves.
- Teach all family members to be safe with ashes from your fireplace or wood-burning stove.

What is the Vienna Green Homes Initiative?

The Vienna Green Homes Initiative promotes reduced household energy consumption by recognizing builders, homeowners and others choosing to build or renovate their homes to meet the branded energy efficiency requirements of a third party certifier. The program will also recognize homeowners and builders who invest substantially in solar and geothermal technologies.

Why did the Community Enhancement Commission (CEC) create this program?

The CEC seeks to increase public recognition and understanding of the benefits of independent branding of energy efficient homes and to publicly recognize Vienna residents, builders and other leaders in home energy efficiency. The brands include Energy Star, Earth Craft House, LEED for Homes and Passive House Institute US.

Where: Northside Park, meet at entrance off of How do Vienna residents and businesses benefit from this program?

Participating businesses will benefit from the public recognition.

Owners of certified energy efficient homes will enjoy lower utility bills, inside air quality improved by fresh air exchange enhancements, reduced noise intrusion, increased natural light using Energy Star or better windows and high-efficiency lighting packages. These attributes are likely to support a stronger resale.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

February 2002: The Vienna Parks and Recreation Department has proposed creating an off-leash dog exercise area at Moorefield Park, an undeveloped Town park located on Courthouse Road, S.W., just off Nutley Street and adjacent to Fairfax County's Nottoway Park. The proposed Vienna dog park would be 13,500 square feet enclosed by a chain link fence five feet high. The site would include benches, "doggie bag" dispensers and waste receptacles, and a source of water for the dogs.

February 1992: The Town Council's public hearing on the proposed reconstruction of Cottage Street is set for February 24. The deteriorating condition of Cottage Street has led to this proposal. A recent soil analysis indicates that the subsoil structure is inadequate and the street needs to be undercut and filled with enough material to extend the life of the street by another 30 years.

February 1982: The Town Council has created a citizen action team to assist the Town staff in planning for the Vienna Metrorail station. The three-man group is known officially as the Vienna Area Metro Station Citizen Action Team (VAMSCAT). Its members are Bennett Moss, Neil Walp and Frank Willingham, all selected by Council because of their expertise in the fields of transportation planning, land development engineering and urban affairs.

February 1972: The Town Council is considering the advisability of a parking prohibition along one side of Cottage Street from Tapawingo Road to Cedar Lane, at least during peak traffic periods. A parking prohibition for the section of Lawyers Road near the Church Street intersection is also being considered, with no left turn being permitted from Lawyers on to Church.
