TOWN RECEIVES HISTORICALLY LOW RATE ON BONDS; MAINTAINS AAA RATING

During a special meeting on June 26, the Town of Vienna received a 1.71% interest rate on the sale of its Series 2012 Public Improvement Bonds in the amount of \$6,450,000. The interest rate at which the bonds were sold is almost a third less than the previous lowest rate of 2.49% of the 2010 bond issue.

In preparation for the bond sale, The Town's AAA and Aaa bond ratings were reaffirmed by Standard & Poor's and Moody's, respectively; however, a 'negative outlook' remains in place due to the Town's proximity to Washington, DC. These excellent bond ratings have enabled the Town to sell bonds at more favorable interest rates compared with those of municipalities not so highly rated, resulting in substantial savings for Vienna taxpayers over the life of the bonds.

Bond financing spreads the cost of major capital projects over a period of many years, rather than charging the full cost to today's taxpayers. By having such a low interest rate, the Town will see substantial savings over the life of the bond, ultimately saving taxpayer money.

The Series 2012 Public Improvement Bonds will finance several projects contained within the Town's Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) including street improvements, storm drainage improvements, facilities improvements and water and sewer system improvements. COMMENT FROM THE COUNCIL TABLE

Getting the Word Out

Reminders of June's devastating storm are still with us, from the bare spot in the yard where a tree toppled to the unfamiliar contents of a newly-restocked refrigerator. The aftermath prompts us to look at how we as a Town serve our citizens in times of crisis. In particular, I think it's important to review how we communicate with Vienna residents.

A crucial role of government in an emergency is to provide the public with information about impending danger and the status of essential services. (Government must also respond to calls for help. The performance of our regional "911" system during the emergency is being investigated, and we await those findings.) The ways the Town disseminates information have expanded dramatically in the past few years. Vienna now uses a website, a cable channel, a Facebook page, a Twitter feed, and "Community Alerts" by email. How well did these new technologies serve us during the storm?

As we—and millions of others in the region—found, when the power goes out and telephone and cable systems are compromised, using the internet

to spread information has its limits. Our Town staff had trouble accessing the website to update information, and residents who were without power and phone service couldn't reach it anyway. What did work? Traditional broadcast media, especially radio.

A battery-powered radio was the best thing to have during the crisis. From it listeners got news about the scope of power outages, the problems with "911", reports on road conditions and boil water alerts. I think it is important to recognize the value of broadcast radio and TV. We need to maintain our connection to it as an information outlet. It also needs public support in response to a push by the federal government to transfer spectrum space from broadcasters to wireless providers, to feed the growing demand for streaming content to mobile devices. True, this is a battle between the very rich and the extremely wealthy where it is hard to feel sympathy for one side or the other. But when we are reminded of the public safety value of traditional, free, over-the-air broadcasters, we see that we do have a stake in the debate.



I am not suggesting that we drop our "new media" efforts, just that we be aware of their limits. Sometimes they are unavailable; at other times they can create an information overload. During the heat wave after the storm the Town had a spate of water main breaks and leaks, which were duly reported through our various outlets. The notices created an impression that Vienna, alone, was having a breakdown of its infrastructure. Instead, what we were alone in was our reporting of the incidents—other jurisdictions were experiencing similar breaks. Disseminating the information Townwide, rather than to just the affected homeowners, may have caused unnecessary alarm.

We will continue to examine the Town's communication efforts, in emergencies and in routine matters. You will hear from us, and we always want to hear from you.

KEEP BURGLARS AT BAY WHEN YOU ARE AWAY FROM HOME

Your Vienna Police Department has the following tips for residents who plan to be away on vacation this summer:

- Let your neighbors know you are going to be away and where you can be reached.
- Ask a neighbor to pick up your mail, packages and newspapers.
- Ask a neighbor to mow your lawn.
- Ask a neighbor to use your trash cans or set his or her refuse at the curb in front of your home on trash collection day.
- Invite a neighbor to park a car in your driveway to give your home an even more lived-in appearance.
- Make your home look like you are August 2012

- there. Lights turned off and on by timers give your home that livedin look while you are away.
- Have good locks.
- Never leave your home unlocked, even for a brief trip to the store or a visit to the neighbor across the street.
- Do not hide a key outside your home. Leave that extra key with a trusted neighbor or friend.
- Do not put a name or address tag on your house or car keys.
 That is an open invitation to an unwelcome visitor should you ever lose your keys.
- Plug a radio into a timer set to Vienna Newsletter

- go on when you are away. Set the radio to an all-talk station, leave the volume low, and give a would-be burglar the impression you are talking to someone.
- Have a free home security inspection and be an active participant in Neighborhood Watch. A thief wants to take the path of least resistance; your participation in Neighborhood Watch provides the most resistance!

FISCAL YEAR 2012/2013 BUDGET ADOPTED

The Town's adopted budget for fiscal year 2012/13, which began July 1, totals GENERAL FUND \$31,775,591 for all funds, an increase of \$1,934,032, primarily in the Water & Sewer Fund.

The General Fund budget is based on maintaining the current real estate tax rate of 24.21 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. Based on the estimated median market value from 2012 assessment data. the average Vienna property owner will pay an annual real estate tax bill of \$1,455, a decrease of \$37.

In the Water and Sewer Fund, water rates increased by 91 cents per 1,000 gallons and sewer rates increased by 93 cents per 1,000 gallons for all users effective July 1.

The Debt Service Fund continues to be supported by receipts from the meals and lodging tax.

SEWER BACKUPS ARE EXPENSIVE; BACKUP INSURANCE IS NOT!

The Town of Vienna makes every attempt to prevent sewer backups from occurring. Sewer lines are specially designed to reduce accumulation and stoppages. In addition, a maintenance crew is devoted to inspecting and cleaning sewer lines throughout the Town on a regular basis. Degreasing chemicals are also injected into lines in areas that are prone to stoppages, such as those near restaurants and apartments. However, even with

this rigorous maintenance schedule, backups can still occur.

All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company. The Town's insurance carrier

rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS

The Public Works Department does $\overline{\text{NOT}}$ pick up the following items:

- Gas tanks
- 2. Fuel oil tanks
- Any motor containing fuel

- 5. Tires on rims
- 6. Tree stumps
- 7. Hazardous Materials including solvents, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes/bulbs, wet paint cans, etc. These items can be taken to Fairfax County's Hazardous Waste Disposal at the Fairfax County Transfer Station, 703-324-5068

- 12. White Goods including: stoves, cooktops, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, hot water heaters, large toaster ovens, convection ovens, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, dehumidifiers, humidifiers and furnaces.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Collection for regular household trash, single stream recyclables, brush, yard waste and bulk items will occur once weekly on the same day of the week.

If you have any questions regarding which day is your collection day, please do not hesitate to contact us at 703-255-6380.

Collection will not be scheduled for Sundays, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day or New Year's Day. When a regular trash collection day is missed because of adverse weather conditions, an observed holiday or mechanical difficulties, collections will be rescheduled for the next collection day for that week. The rescheduling information will be listed on www.viennava.gov and Facebook and Twitter. 

HOUSEHOLD TRASH, RECYCLING, YARD WASTE, BRUSH AND BULK ITEMS will be collected on the assigned day of the week for your area:

Mondays: North of Maple Avenue and West of Mill Street

Tuesdays: North of Maple Avenue and East of Mill Street

Wednesdays: South of Maple Avenue

and East of Park Street

Thursdays: South of Maple Avenue, West of

Park Street and both sides of Tapawingo

Fridays: South of Tapawingo Road and West of Park Street

Each type of debris should be clearly separated at the curbline for ease of identification and collection.

All debris must be placed at the curbline or edge of pavement by 6:00 AM on the collection day (but not earlier than 6:00 PM the preceding evening) where it will be easily and safely accessible. Debris containers should not be placed on a sidewalk or in the street where they would interfere with traffic.

All cans and containers should be removed from the curbline as soon as possible. The Town reserves the right to designate the collection point where there is question or doubt.

Container size shall be 55 gallons or less, be watertight with handles and tight fitting lids. Plastic bags may be substituted (opaque for household trash, clear for recycling and yard waste). Recyclable items may be placed together in the same container (single-stream recycling). Residents may use plastic bins, clean trash cans, a cardboard box or clear plastic bags for containing recyclable materials.



WEEKLY COLLECTION GUIDELINES

Household Trash: non-recyclable items that are generated during normal household activities and all garbage.

Recyclables: including newspapers, books, magazines catalogs, junk mail, flattened cardboard, paper, aerosol cans, glass, aluminum cans and foil, any plastic items, bagged plastic film and plastic bags, juice and milk cartons.

Yard Waste: consists of grass, leaves, small clippings, acorns, walnuts, etc. and must be bagged in clear plastic or kraft paper bags with a 20 bag maximum per week. Dirt and mulch will not be accepted with yard waste.

<u>Brush</u>: may be bundled, placed in a trash can or if longer than 4 feet may be stacked neatly at the curbline Brush shall be separated from the trash, single stream recyclables, yard waste and bulk item(s).

WEEKLY COLLECTION GUIDELINES, cont.

Bulk Items:

- Discarded furniture and playground equipment (except plastic which is collected as recyclables)
- 200
- Three hundred pounds of scrap metal, small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions
- Tires removed from the rim
- Building materials (not generated by contractors) including wood, broken concrete, bricks or blocks, fences, drywall and paneling. Each residence is limited to three hundred pounds (approximately two wheelbarrow loads) of masonry items such as brick, concrete, block, stone, rock, etc. per collection day

Computers and Televisions: Fairfax County offers "Electric Sundays" events at the I66 Transfer Station or the I95 Landfill once a month. For more information about recycling computers and televisions, please visit www.fairfaxcounty.gov. Christmas Trees: are collected any collection day with brush. Please remove decorations, including

tinsel. Please do not bag the tree.

Styrofoam: Styrofoam is not recyclable and should be included with regular household trash.

- In the interest of health and safety, trash crews will only dispose of defective trash cans that are no longer suitable for use when the cans are upside down and clearly marked "TAKE FOR DISPOSAL."
- Please refrain from placing piles of debris or brush under or around power lines and poles, signs, fire hydrants, fences, vehicles or other obstructions. Place all items in an open area accessible to a crane truck Parents should caution their children not to play in or around debris

placed at the curb.

SAVE YOUR NEIGHBOR'S LAWN; BE MINDFUL WHERE FIDO TAKES HIS POTTY BREAK

Did you know that the content of your dog's urine can cause brown or yellow spots to appear on your (or your neighbor's) lawn? The main culprit is nitrogen and while it is found in many fertilizers, it can be damaging to your lawn in large doses and cause what's known as "lawn burn." Here are some ways to save your lawn:

- After your dog urinates, pour water on the area.
 This helps dilute the nitrogen content and reduce the chance it will kill the grass.
- Train your dog to urinate in one area and plant a urine-resistant ground covering like clover.
- Don't allow your dog to urinate on your neighbor's lawn.

When you are out walking your dog around town, keep in mind the impact that your dog's potty break may have on another home's lawn. Most dog owners are aware and abide by the Town's pooper scooper ordinance that requires owners to clean up their dog's waste when out for a walk by using a bag and disposing of it in their own trash can. What you may not be aware of is that it is considered a nuisance for any pet owner to knowingly and willfully permit his/her dog to urinate on someone else's property.

As you're taking your pet for a stroll about town, please be mindful of your neighbor's lawn and don't allow your dog to urinate on someone else's property. If you have any questions, please contact the Town's Animal Control Officer at (703) 255-6377 or jfbarker@viennava.gov.

WE'RE ON CALL 24/7 FOR WATER EMERGENCIES

EMERGENCY PLANNING: BE PREPARED, STAY CONNECTED

The recent derecho that passed through our area recently and caused power outages and property damage across the region reminds us of the importance of emergency preparedness and being ready for anything. Residents should have a disaster supplies kit ready to go before the next emergency. Kits should include items like water, food, batteries, battery powered or hand crank radio, first aid kit, manual can opener, local maps and a whistle, to name a few. Also, your household may not be together when a disaster strikes so it is important to plan in advance. For information about disaster readiness, visit www.ready.gov.



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

August 2002: Phase II of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project - from Park Street to East Street - is well underway. The project is not just a matter of brick sidewalks, planter boxes and other aesthetic improvements. Its purpose is to draw shoppers to downtown Vienna, thus maintaining the commercial tax base, which amounts to over a quarter of local tax revenues. This project during the month of August. will be completed in the fall.

August 1992: Effective August 1, the Town Council has banned smoking inside the Vienna Community Center and in all public areas inside Town Hall. Increasing evidence has linked passive exposure to tobacco smoke to a variety of health hazards and it is the intent of the new policy to reduce the danger to the health of Vienna's citizens and employees.

August 1982: At its August 16 meeting, the Town Council will discuss the subject of video games. The Board of Zoning Appeals recently rejected an application to install video games in a record shop and another application to open a video arcade in a shopping center was withdrawn after a large number of citizens expressed opposition.

August 1972: Forty-three more acres have been acquired by Fairfax County for the Vienna District Park. The park now includes 83 acres near the intersection of Old Courthouse and Nutley Roads. The park has been named "Nottoway", an Algonquin Indian word meaning "adder," also designating alien tribes.
