October 22

- Approved a PPEA interim agreement with Arrington Properties, LLC for the proposed Church Street Municipal Parking structure project.
- Awarded the Town Hall HVAC reconstruction contract to SIGAL Company in the amount of \$2,161,950. (Approved 5-2, DiRocco and Sienicki voting Nay)
- Accepted the Surrey
 Estates subdivision public
 improvements into the Town's
 system for maintenance and
 reduced the surety amount to
 \$24,304.
- Approved site plan modifications to permit construction of a two-story classroom addition and additional parking spaces for Marshall Road Elementary

- Adopted an ordinance that amended the Chapter 11, Personnel Code of the Town of Vienna to remove directors from the Town's grievance procedure and outlines termination practice for directors for separation without cause.
- Accepted the resignations of Janet Hoffman and Arthur Bishop from the Community Enhancement Commission.
- Approved a salary increase for the Town Clerk in the amount of \$16,000 in recognition of her assumption of additional duties.

November 5

 Adopted the re-codified Town Code, which will be available online in a more accessible and searchable format.

- Voted to begin the process to dispose of excess public alley right-of-way between 108-110 Church Street NE and 120 Church Street NE; and excess public alley right-of-way adjacent to 112 Ayr Hill Avenue NW.
- Awarded a survey and design contract for Mill Street NE to Wiley|Wilson for an estimated cost of \$33,705. (Approved 5-2, Polycrhones and Springsteen voting Nay)
- Approved the Walk to Downtown Vienna Initiative Transportation and Community System Preservation Program grant, which will reimburse the Town for project expenses to a maximum of \$1,000,000 with a 20% local match.
- Adopted a proposed ordinance that amended Chapter 9, Motor Vehicles and Traffic, Article I, In General, Section 9-3, Adoption of State Code, of the Code of the Town of Vienna. (Relating to traffic offenses and Driving While Intoxicated.)

COMMENT FROM THE COUNCIL TABLE

Are You Ready For Severe Storms?

Given the highly unprecedented Derecho wind and rain storm in June that hit the Washington metropolitan area, knocking out electrical power to many of our Vienna homes and businesses for several days, and the glancing blow from Hurricane Sandy in late October that created immense destruction farther north in the New York and Northern New Jersey areas, how prepared are we for similar severe weather in the future?

In the November 2011 Vienna Newsletter, Councilmember Carev Sienicki wrote a very good information article about Community Preparedness in which she outlined some simple strategies that include creating a Go-Bag, establishing a family or business emergency plan, identifying a shelter in place, creating a communication plan, and subscribing to the Town's community alert and notification service. Her article is still available online at www.viennava.gov and I encourage you to re-read it. With two serious storms this year and winter approaching, and memories still fresh from the large snow falls that occurred in 2010/11, what can you do to prepare yourself and your family for future storms? While emergency experts will say, "When you have a catastrophic

event, no matter how well prepared you are, residents will be hurting," there are still key steps we can take to protect ourselves and our families.

Here are some basic "nuts and bolts" preparations you should make when adequate warnings of storms are issued:

- 1. Make sure your car(s) fuel tanks are full.
- 2. Make sure there is a sufficient supply of batteries available.
- 3. Have several flashlights available.
- 4. Charge up your cell phones.
- 5. Ensure a multi-day supply of water and food that is non-perishable and easy to prepare is available.
- 6. If a large snow storm occurs, help shovel out your closest fire hydrants and sidewalks.
- 7. Stay off the roads as much as possible.
- 8. Make sure you have a supply of vital medications with dosages for each person.
- 9. Maintain contact with your neighbors, especially those at risk, and offer to help each other.
- 10. Have a battery-equipped radio available.
- 11. Have extra blankets and warm clothing for each household member.



Basic year round precautions include making sure rain gutters are cleaned and trees are properly pruned and hazardous and dead trees removed.

The Town of Vienna is fortunate to have a great Department of Public Works, Police Department, Volunteer Fire Department, and Parks and Recreation Department, and they have been highly responsive to these recent storms and the heavy snows. Our streets are plowed quickly and tree and storm debris removed.

In ending on a positive note, I hope you and your family have a wonderful holiday season and we as a community continue to thrive in 2013. Together, we can weather any storm.

LEAF COLLECTION CONTINUES

Town crews will continue to collect leaves through the month of December. In lieu of a collection schedule, the Town will post signs in neighborhoods when leaf collection crews are approaching. In addition, you can sign up for Vienna Community Alerts - Town Services Announcements to receive text and email notifications of quadrant locations of the crews. Register online at www.viennava.gov-click on the Community Alerts graphic on the front page.

Rake Leaves to the Curb by December 31

As in previous years, crews will make three collection passes through Town. Residents should ensure leaves are raked to the curb by **December 31**. If they are not, you may miss the final collection pass as collection crews will only pass your house once during each of the three collections. If you miss the final pass, you may be asked to bag your leaves in clear plastic bags so that they can be collected on your regular weekly collection day.

PLEASE SHOVEL SNOW IF POSSIBLE

Fight this winter's feelings of being cooped up and trapped by getting out and helping your neighborhood clear its sidewalks of snow! Get a group together, fill your thermos with cocoa and get some muscle warming exercise. Help your neighbors, mail carriers, dog walkers, kids walking to school and others using the public sidewalks and clear the snow.

Please note that businesses who hire snowplows to clear their parking lots should make sure that snow is not piled onto adjoining sidewalks or pushed into the street. Also, it is illegal to block handicapped parking spaces with snow.

Hire a Teen to Help Clear Snow

If you are unable to shovel snow, the Community Center can help by matching you with a Vienna area teen who will work with you individually to shovel snow and help with other odd jobs for a mutually agreeable fee. Teens can sign up at the Vienna Community Center and residents can call (703) 255-6360 to be matched with a young worker.

RECYCLING AT NORTHSIDE

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries is Saturday, December 1, from 8 am to 2 pm at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill Street NE (entrance at the dead end of the street). This service of the Department of Public Works (DPW) provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products.

DPW also offers recycling of small rechargeable batteries at the quarterly recycling events at Northside as well as at Town Hall and the Community Center. Rechargeable batteries include nickel-cadmium (NiCd), nickel-zinc (NiZn), lithium-ion (Li-ion), nickel-metal hydride (NiMH), and small sealed lead-acid (SSLA or Pb). Rechargeable batteries come in many types, including standard AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt, or a special design for a specific device. They may be removable or internal to a device.

Alkaline batteries (non-rechargeable) are not recyclable; however, they have been redesigned to have a very low toxicity and may now be disposed of safely in your household trash. For more information, call (703) 255-6380.

TREES IMPROVE OUR LIVES

I recently had the privilege of attending a tree canopy symposium sponsored by The Casey Tree Foundation in Washington DC. The attendees of this conference were primarily professionals in the horticulture and arboriculture fields; however, the primary focus of this symposium is one I think many individuals can relate to. The various speakers of the day in one form or another addressed how trees improve our lives. Topics varied from how tree plantings have been proven to reduce crime in economically disadvantaged urban communities to how trees encourage positive attitudes in humans and improve over all wellbeing.

More concrete topics of the day addressed the positive benefits of tree canopy such as energy savings; a house shaded by tree canopy can decrease cooling costs during the summer months by as much as 30%. Trees improve the air quality by absorbing pollution and storing carbon thereby reducing the amount of carbon dioxide in the air. Trees also reduce stormwater runoff by helping water soak into the ground and reducing over flow. Stormwater mitigation is a topic of great concern in densely populated areas where increased development creates a greater burden on stormwater management systems. Tree plantings can help alleviate this issue.

I reflect on the benefit of trees in our community while strolling the neighborhood of Vienna Woods. The fall colors this year have been spectacular; the large shade trees of Vienna truly make this town special and are most likely a major calling card for newcomers desiring to live in the wooded community. Trees do truly improve the quality of our lives. I am also reminded that as towns and cities grow often times the older tree canopy is displaced by development. This often cannot be avoided as new homes replace older homes and new buildings emerge. I would like to take this opportunity to encourage each of us to think about how we might replace or increase the tree canopy in our community. Winter is an ideal time to asses our landscapes and to determine where we might have an opportunity to plant trees in our own landscape. Spring planting season is just around the corner so now is the perfect time to research the right tree species for your location. FIREPLACE AND HOME FIRE SAFETY

From the U.S. Fire Administration
The U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) encourages you to practice the following fire safety steps to keep those home fires safely burning. Remember, fire safety is your personal responsibility ...Fire Stops With You!

Keep Fireplaces and Wood Stoves Clean

- Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist.
- Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations and flammable materials.
- Leave glass doors open while burning a fire. Leaving the doors open ensures that the fire receives enough air to ensure complete combustion and keeps creosote from building up in the chimney.
- Close glass doors when the fire is out to keep air from the chimney opening from getting into the room. Most glass fireplace doors have a metal mesh screen which should be closed when the glass doors are open. This mesh screen helps keep embers from getting out of the fireplace area.

- Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces that do not have a glass fireplace door.
- Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- Keep air inlets on wood stoves open, and never restrict air supply to fireplaces. Otherwise you may cause creosote buildup that could lead to a chimney fire.
- Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves.

Safely Burn Fuels

- Never use flammable liquids to start a fire.
- Use only seasoned hardwood. Soft, moist wood accelerates creosote buildup. In pellet stoves, burn only dry, seasoned wood pellets.
- Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke.
- Never burn cardboard boxes, trash or debris in your fireplace or wood stove.
- When building a fire, place logs at the rear of the fireplace on an adequate supporting grate.
- Never leave a fire in the fireplace unattended. Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house.

Allow ashes to cool before disposing of them. Place ashes in a tightly covered metal container and keep the ash container at least ten feet away from your home and any other nearby buildings. Never empty the ash directly into a trash can. Douse and saturate the ashes with water.

Protect the Outside of Your Home

- Stack firewood outdoors at least 30 feet away from your home.
- Keep the roof clear of leaves, pine needles and other debris.
- Cover the chimney with a mesh screen spark arrester.
- Remove branches hanging above the chimney, flues or vents.

Protect the Inside of Your Home

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home and inside and outside of sleeping areas. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Consider installing the new long life smoke alarms.
- Provide proper venting systems for all heating equipment.
- Extend all vent pipes at least three feet above the roof.

- Percentage of members or participants who live in town or who own or are employed by town businesses;

- Organization budget showing all income and expenses for the year in which the donation will be used;
- Amount of funding requested from the Town;
- Purpose for which the donation will be used;
- Synopsis of the fundraising activities being conducted during the current year; and
- Statement signed by the principal officer that membership or participation is open to all residents and business people in town without regard to race, national origin, religion or sex.

LEAF MULCH DELIVERY

The Public Works Department will take orders December 1 through February 28 for leaf mulch to be delivered free of charge to residents who live within the corporate limits of the Town. Delivery will likely begin mid-February. To place your order, call the "Mulch Line" recording at (703) 255-6388 and leave your name, address, daytime phone number and the number of loads to be delivered. You may also order leaf mulch online by visiting www.viennava.gov/index.aspx?NID=164. One load is approximately 2.5 cubic yards, which roughly equals 30 bags of mulch from a home hardware/lawn care store. Half loads are available on request.

Please note the following important conditions:

- All mulch deliveries are based on availability of mulch.
- Mulch deliveries will be placed only in the driveway at the end closest to the house.
- Once mulch is delivered, it becomes the property of the homeowner and the Town will not remove any excess mulch ordered.

Residents may pick up leaf mulch themselves in any amount between the hours of 9:30 am and 3:00 pm Monday through Friday (except holidays) from January 2 through March 30 while supplies last. Please call the DPW Administration office at (703) 255-6380 to arrange a pickup time so that we can ensure a staff member will be on site. The mulch is stored on Town-owned property at 442 Beulah Road NE, near Glyndon Park.

Businesses, Non-profits May Order Mulch

Free leaf mulch delivery is also available to all in-town businesses as well as churches, schools, the fire station, library and other non-profit organizations within the town limits. Call (703) 255-6388 beginning December 1 to place an order. Please note the conditions outlined above, which also apply to non-residential deliveries.

By grinding leaves into recyclable mulch the Town saves thousands of dollars in landfill fees each year. To save even more, citizens are encouraged to recycle grass clippings as mulch or compost. For how-to information, call the Fairfax County Recycling Hotline at (703) 324-5052.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

December 2002: The National Recreation and Park Association has honored the Friends of the W&OD Trail with one of its top annual honors, the 2002 Voluntary Service Award. FOWOD is a nonprofit citizens' organization dedicated to preserving, enhancing and promoting the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority's nationally acclaimed Washington & Old Dominion Railroad Regional Park Trail. The volunteer affiliate was established in 1992 to raise funds for capital projects associated with the trail.

December 1992: As of January 1, Vienna will welcome about 300 new residents and four new businesses into town as the result of a boundary adjustment with Fairfax County. At the same time, several properties will be moved outside the town limits. The selection of parcels for inclusion in Vienna was guided by several criteria, including elimination of bisected lots and better delivery of municipal services.

December 1982: The 10-mile segment of Interstate 66 between the Capital Beltway and the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge is scheduled to open December 22. Weekdays from 6:30 to 9 am, inbound lanes will be restricted to buses and carpools carrying at least four persons. The same restrictions apply to the outbound lanes between 3:30 and 6:30 pm.

December 1972: Residents of the town and surrounding county areas have received survey forms asking their opinion regarding the location of the Vienna Metro Station as well as the amount of usage and probable impact on local streets. On December 11, the Vienna Town Council will hold a public meeting to discuss the results of the survey.

Effective November 1, dog license fees changed to a flat rate of \$10 per dog.
