### The Community Emergency Response Team Program

Scenario: Severe storms -- like 2012's derecho, only worse -- strike Fairfax County, causing widespread flooding, power outages, and road closures. Many buildings are damaged; people are injured, and 911 is overwhelmed and unreachable. If the town of Vienna was affected, would you know what to do?

The Community Emergency Response Team program (CERT) teaches regular people emergency preparedness and disaster response skills so they can safely help themselves, their families and their neighborhoods during major emergencies where first responders may be delayed.

Taught by experienced instructors from the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department and CERT volunteer instructors, the free class combines 20+ hours of classroom learning with hands-on training in light search and rescue techniques, disaster medicine, fire suppression, lifting and cribbing, and other necessary skills. CERT training is free to students, and all people 18 years or older who live, work, worship, or spend significant time in Fairfax County are eligible for CERT training. Students of all abilities are welcome to participate.

Also, CERT students are given a basic kit of disaster response and personal protective equipment, including a helmet, reflective vest, backpack, headlamp, and more. Fairfax County CERT classes are generally held in the spring and fall at the Fire and Rescue Academy in Fairfax, meeting in the evenings from 7-10 PM weekly for seven weeks.

CERT classes are also held year-round at locations in the community. If you're a member of a faith-based group, workplace, homeowners' or condo association, or other community organization and are interested in having CERT training for your group, please email training@fairfaxcountycert.org for more information. All that we require are a minimum of 12 students, a location to hold the classes, and a commitment that the students will attend all seven sessions. ### Town Election Filing Deadline: March 3

Tuesday, March 3, is the filing deadline for candidates in the May 5 Town election. This year, voters will elect three Town Council members for two-year terms beginning July 1. Candidates must be qualified to vote for and hold the office sought, a resident of the Commonwealth of Virginia for one year immediately preceding the election, and a resident, by the time of filing, of the Town of Vienna.

Candidates for office are required to file specific documents in order to appear on the ballot. The information packet for candidates

### Property and Liability Coverage for the Town of Vienna

Often times homeowners try to do all they can to protect their homes from natural disasters and fires. Many take out warranties for appliances. But some property owners may not have adequate insurance protection against potential sewer or water damage, in which the utility is not legally liable.

Virginia localities are financially responsible for private property damage only in instances in which the locality is legally liable for damages. In those cases in which the Town is liable, Vienna, like many other localities, carries property and liability coverage through a municipal liability insurance program.

In addition, the Town carries \$10,000 in no-fault coverage that applies to certain situations in which the Town is not legally liable. This no-fault coverage can be used for damages during certain unfortunate instances such as a sewer or water main break. However, if damages exceed the "no-fault" amount, the Town does not pay for the additional damage.

Some homeowner and tenant insurance providers do not cover all types of property damage. Some will cover certain classes of damages if you pay for specific types of coverage. For that reason, the Town strongly suggests residents and customers of the Town's utilities check with their insurance provider to ensure that they have purchased an adequate amount of coverage to protect their property. ### Board and Commission Spotlight: Board of Architectural Review

Vienna's Board of Architectural Review encourages the construction of attractive buildings, signs and landscaping while helping to prevent the deterioration of the physical appearance of the town, which could create hazards to public safety and health.

The Board is charged with reviewing all applications for construction, alteration or restoration of any structure, building, landscape feature or sign within the town, except for detached single-family residences in singlefamily detached residential zones.

Recent applications before the Board have included renovations to the Vienna Community Center, exterior modifications for the former Wu's Garden and improvements to Glyndon Park.

The Board of Architectural Review meets at 8 p.m. on the third Thursday of each month in the Council Chambers at Town Hall, 127 Center Street South.

### Why Not Begin a Vegetable Garden to Reduce Your Carbon Footprint?

Looking for simple ways to reduce your carbon footprint? Why not start your own vegetable garden? An edible garden can save on fossil fuel and reduce the carbon emissions.

You can save about two pounds of carbon from entering the atmosphere for each pound of produce you grow. That is because most produce sold in stores must be shipped thousands of miles before it reaches our plate. These food miles equate to a lot of energy. Growing your own food will reduce the miles your food travels. A home vegetable garden will reduce the use of fossil fuels necessary to bring fresh produce to your table and can help reduce your grocery bill as well.

Even a small garden can provide a great deal of produce for a family of four. Two 8x4 foot raised beds are enough to grow up to five tomato plants, salad greens, green beans and eggplant and squash, for example. A common mistake is starting too big and growing too much. It is easy to become overwhelmed with a garden, so start small and grow only things that you would buy at the store on a regular basis to begin with. Early crops such as peas, radish, kale, spinach and lettuce enjoy our early spring temperatures and do not mind the cooler soil temperatures. They can be sown as early as mid-March to early April. These plants are best grown from seed; one \$2 packet of each plant type is typically all you will need to get started. Growing plants from seed helps save money and reduces our footprint by reducing the need to ship small plants from grower to retailer. Many types of vegetables are best grown from seed sown directly in the garden. Tomatoes, peppers; eggplant and basil are an exception to this rule. These plants must be started indoors and moved out in early May when the soil temperatures warm.

Once you begin to grow plants from seed the many different varieties of seeds available is significantly greater than plants. It is fun to explore the various heirloom varieties that are available. There are many seed catalogs on line that provide valuable gardening information; www.seedsofchange.com is one of my favorites however there are many to choose from. Excellent seed selection can also be found at your local grocery store as well as nearby garden centers.

So why not begin a vegetable garden this spring?

### Water Mains Flushed in Spring Recycling Events in Fairfax County

Each spring the Town of Vienna flushes the water mains in its distribution system in order to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. The preventive maintenance program begins in early April, and flushing usually occurs between 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.; however, some flushing will be performed during nighttime hours due to the hydrant's location or avoid traffic disruptions on major roadways.

Water mains are flushed by opening the fire hydrants and allowing the water to flow freely for a short period of time. The flushing cleans out sediment that normally accumulates during the summer and winter and enables the Town to test and perform routine maintenance on the 800+ fire hydrants within its service area.

Flushing may result in some discoloration and sediment in the water reaching your home or business. These conditions are not harmful and should be of short duration. If you encounter discolored water in your home, run the cold water faucet until the water is clear. The Town appreciates your tolerance of this inconvenience. Vienna's First Mayor: Orrin Eugene Hine (1836-1899) By Anne Stuntz, President of Historic Vienna, Inc.

Vienna's first mayor, in 1890, was Orrin Eugene Hine (1836-1899). Hine and his wife Alma Delano moved to Vienna after the Civil War, in which he had served in the 50th NY Volunteer Engineers. Hine was a local agent for the Freedmen's Bureau, and became active in local and state politics. By the early 1880s he was selling real estate in the Vienna area, as evidenced by his 1884 pamphlet, FARMS, VILLAGE HOMES, MILLS, AND TIMBER LANDS IN FAIRFAX COUNTY, VIRGINIA. Read about Vienna in his own words below.

VIENNA.

Vienna is regularly laid out, but as yet a straggling village of three hundred inhabitants, situated on the Washington Ohio & Western Railroad, fifteen miles north from Alexandria, and about the same distance west from Washington. Is near the center of the county on one of the most public roads leading to the city, and from present indications is destined to improve into a beautiful village, and a considerable business and manufacturing center.

Already it has in operation a planing mill, grist mill and saw mill, two lime kilns, shoe and harness shop, stores, blacksmith and wagon shops, &c., &c. White and colored schools are maintained here and the white school has been advanced to a graded school the past year. It is connected with the county seat five miles distant by stage twice a day; with Washington by two trains each way, and with the whole world by telegraph. Is the center of a fine dairy region settled almost entirely by northern farmers, nearly all of whom are engaged in sending milk to the city. Over 300 gallons are sent daily from this neighborhood, averaging the farmer at his door, 10 to 12 cents per gallon in summer, and from 14 to 18 in winter. This is an excellent place to locate in, but property is advancing in price and it will soon be difficult to obtain such bargains as I can now offer.

### Spring Street Sweeping Schedule

Residents are requested not to park on the street during the scheduled time for their section to allow the street sweeper to do a thorough job. As the time for each section approaches, signs will be placed on streets as a reminder, and residents can also call the Public Works Department at (703) 255-6380 to obtain a more definitive date of when the street sweeper will be on their block. The schedule is subject to change in case of inclement weather.



# Only Rain Down The Storm Drain

Nutrients in stormwater runoff have been identified as the number one pollutant and threat to the health of the ecosystems of the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay watersheds. Much of this pollution is the result of the activities of watershed residents who are unaware of the link between their daily behavior and the water quality downstream.

Stormwater runoff pollution comes from many sources, including parking lots, lawns, driveways, golf courses, and roads. Rainwater that runs off these surfaces picks up contaminants like motor oil, fertilizer, pesticides, and bacteria from pet waste. This stormwater runoff flows into storm drains and then into local streams and the Potomac River, the sources of drinking water for many residents in the Washington, D.C., area. The runoff ultimately contributes to the pollution affecting the Chesapeake Bay.

What can you do to prevent water pollution? Follow these simple tips:

• Dispose of used motor oil and household hazardous waste (paint, household cleaners, etc.) properly, rather than pouring it on the driveway or into the storm drain.

• Avoid excess fertilizer or pesticide use, especially before rain is predicted;

• Wash your car at a commercial carwash, or in a location where the soapy water will not run into the storm drain.

• Sweep up grass clippings and other yard waste instead of washing them down the driveway or into the gutter.

• Always pick up pet waste from your yard, sidewalk, or park area.

• Report storm drain dumping. During business hours, call the Town's Environmental Concern Line, 703-255-6343. Afterhours, call the Police Department's non-emergency number, 703-255-6366.

### **Vdot Surveyors**

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT, www. virginiadot.org) is considering the improvement of Interstate 66. The purpose of this proposed improvement is to enhance safety and improve the existing highway.

In order to plan improvements to existing highways, it is necessary for a location survey to be made to determine the safest and highest quality alternatives. VDOT Surveyors or their consultants may need to enter your property to locate physical features, property lines or to set aerial targets for photogrammetric mapping, etc.

This survey work does not indicate that a highway across your property is imminent or that a decision on an improvement has been made. This survey is simply for the purpose of gathering data and is one of the early steps toward determining the feasibility of highway improvements. ### **THIS MONTH IN HISTORY** From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

**March 2005:** Locks of Love is coming to Vienna! Locks of Love is a national organization created to help children with hair loss. Town residents are invited to let their hair grow until September 26, when free haircuts will be given to those who wish to make a donation to the program, which provides hairpieces to children who suffer from an auto-immune condition called alopecia areata, for which there is no cause or cure, and other medical condition that result in hair loss.

**March 1995:** The Virginia Department of Transportation will hold an open forum on the Cottage Street reconstruction project on March 27. The project includes the reconstruction of the street at its existing width between Moore Avenue and the rear of the Vienna Shopping Center; replacement of curb, gutter and sidewalk; addition of storm sewers; and replacement of water and sanitary sewer lines.

**March 1985:** The Vienna Jaycees and the Vienna Elementary School PTA are building the Center Street Playground. This "creative playground" is designed for children of all ages, including the handicapped. Another creative playground is planned for Louise Archer Elementary School.

March 1975: The Town's long -awaited curbside newspaper pickup program will begin March 19. The program will continue on a biweekly basis with a series of Town trucks covering the entire Town. Trash crews will not pick up refuse that includes newspapers.
