### Vienna Alerts! A New Notification System for Town Residents Beginning September 1st.

Vienna is your home and community. As a resident, your daily routine depends on the working infrastructure of the Town, which should be reflected in our informative sources you rely on. Starting September 1st the Town of Vienna will be launching a new and improved public alert system, "Vienna Alerts", supported by Everbridge Mass Notification program. Vienna Alerts will keep residents informed before, during and after Town events. Notifications provide information happening in real time on incident management through secure, mobile communications.

With Vienna Alerts, subscribers receive notifications from the Town of Vienna as events arise via the mobile app, text messaging, email address or a telephone call. The new system tailors to location, targeting precise neighborhoods or geographical regions, definable by street address; specificity and accuracy ensures you receive informa-

tion only solicited by you. Vienna Alerts aims to prioritize your information in the quickest, most efficient manner while remaining accessible at will. Sign up this fall by visiting viennava.gov and clicking on the green "Vienna Alerts" button at the bottom of the homepage. VIENNA

### COMMENT FROM THE COUNCIL TABLE

I hope everyone is having an enjoyable summer. As a Council member, it is my privilege to write an article for the August Town Newsletter; I would like to highlight some great news from our local Vienna Volunteer Fire Department (VVFD) and fire station located at 400 Center Street South.

Founded in 1903, the VVFD is one of the oldest Vienna based organizations. It began with Leon Freeman storing a hand-pulled cart under the present Freemen Store porch. Once fully organized, the first fire station in Vienna was constructed on Church Street near Center Street North, and would eventually move in 1958 to its present location at 400 Center Street South. In 2003-2005, the fire station was renovated at cost of \$3.8 million but still retains its local Vienna character. It is organized as a community focused, non-profit,



volunteer organization to protect and preserve the lives and property of Town of Vienna citizens and surrounding Fairfax County areas in the event of fire, medical, and other emergencies.

The VVFD works in partnership with the Fairfax County Fire & Rescue Department. While the VVFD owns and maintains the fire station, it purchases and owns all the equipment. In conjunction, Fairfax County provides 24-hour staffing with 20 paid firefighters and paramedics on three shifts at Vienna's station. Over 80 Vienna Volunteers work closely with these professionals. They provide supplemental staffing on the career fire engine and paramedic unit, ambulance and engine responsibilities, and work on various administrative tasks including fund raising to support operations of the VVFD. Principle funding for the VVFD comes from the weekly Sunday bingo program and the annual fund drive letter.

Under the leadership of Volunteer Chief John Morrison, the VVFD purchased and placed in service a new Medic unit this year: a 2015 Horton International medium-duty ambulance that cost \$270,000. The ambulance is painted red and black in honor of the James Madison High School Warhawks. The colors *Pictured to the left and right is the new VVFD medic unit.* 



match the recently purchased front line 2012 Pierce fire engine; it is the latest in a long series of ambulances purchased by the Vienna Volunteers. This is the 112th year the VVFD has been serving the Vienna community, and this latest vehicle purchased by the volunteers for the community is another great example of why the Vienna community is so special. As a 28 year long life member of the VVFD, I am always immensely proud of this organization for what it has done, and continues to do for the Vienna community.



### HALLOWEEN PARADE REGISTRATION

Work has started on this year's 69th Annual Halloween Parade which will be held on Wednesday, October 28th at 7 p.m. This year's parade theme is Vienna's Quasquicentennial (125th Anniversary). The Parade Committee encourages everyone entering this year's parade to focus on celebrating 125 years of the incorporation of the Town of Vienna.

### FISCAL YEAR 2015/2016 BUDGET ADOPTED

The Town's adopted budget for fiscal year 2015/16, which began July 1, totals \$33.1 million for all funds, an increase of \$784,080, or 2.4 percent, from the prior year adopted budget.

The General Fund budget is based on reducing the real estate tax rate to 0.2250 per \$100 of assessed value, a reduction of 0.0038 per \$100 of assessed value from the previous year's adopted rate.

The average existing residential property assessment increased by 6.48 percent. Commercial real estate values increased less than 0.5%. Real estate taxes are assessed and paid on a calendar year basis. Taxable value of all real property increased \$227,305,630, a 5.41 percent increase.

The Water and Sewer rates will remain the same for FY 15-16. Water and sewer rate structure was changed to a block structure to incentivize water conservation for the previous year, FY E 14-15. A water and sewer rate study will be performed during FY 15-16 for updated rates in the future.

The Debt Services Fund expenditures for Town supported projects totaled \$2.6 millon. The Stormwater Fund increased to \$382,130. Prior year surplus will be used for the Hunters Branch project construction.

### The Multiplier Effect of Shopping Locally

In Vienna we take great pride in that fact that we have small town character and we are also situated between two of the country's largest commercial zones: Tysons and Reston. We have wonderful neighborhoods in which to raise kids and get to know our neighbors. At the same time we have high employment, multiple major employers nearby or within the town, and world-class shopping all around us.

The Town of Vienna appreciates all employers that provide jobs to residents of the TOV and especially those who choose to locate within the town. From time to time, we also like to recognize the importance of entrepreneurs within the town, and encourage our residents, where possible to support local businesses.

On average, 48 percent of each purchase at locally owned businesses are recirculated in local businesses, versus 14 percent at chain stores. This is caused by the 'multiplier effect' of shopping locally. There are three parts to the multiplier effect. First is the direct impact or the dollars invested in the business to run the business. This includes salaries, utilities, rent, et cetera. Secondly, is the indirect impact. This refers to the money spent by a local business at another local business, which is then re-circulated by other local business. Finally, is the induced impact. This refers to the additional consumer spending by business owners or local employees in the local economy.

By understanding the three elements of the local multiplier effect, it is easy to understand how impactful local spending can be. When making your own spending decisions, please consider local businesses. Support those who support our community.

### Farmers Markets Are in Full Swing

Many folks these days are trying to buy more "locally grown" food (grown within about 150 miles of home). Local food is grown in season, is fresher, and often tastes better than produce shipped across the country. Additionally, by buying locally grown food, you make a small reduction in the energy costs needed for shipping, and every little bit helps! One of the best parts of buying locally grown food is supporting local, smaller farms.

Interested in learning how important "buying local" is to farms in this area? Check out Forrest Pritchard's book, *Gaining Ground*, about his experiences as a small farmer right here in VA. When you're trying to buy local, does all of your food have to come from the local area? Nope – some items just aren't grown locally. In Barbara Kinsolver's book, *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle: a Year of Food Life*, her family tried to buy only locally grown food for an entire year, but each person was allowed two "non-local" items, for example, coffee, orange juice, some wines, even candy. If you're interested in trying to buy more locally grown food, check out the Maple Ave. Market and these farmers markets right near Vienna:

### PET SUMMER SAFETY GUIDANCE

Summer is a time for both you and your pet to enjoy the sunshine and be outdoors. Along with the fun, the season also offers up some situations that can endanger your pet. By taking the necessary precautions, you can decrease the chance that disaster will happen. The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) offers some guidance for pet owners to keep their furry friends safe this summer.

#### Never Leave Your Pet in the Car

In nice weather you may be tempted to take your pet with you in the car while you travel or do errands. But during warm weather, the inside of your car can reach 120 degrees in a matter of minutes, even if you're parked in the shade. This can mean real trouble for your companion animals left in the car. Dogs and cats can't perspire and can only dispel heat by panting and through the pads of their feet. Pets that are left in hot cars even briefly can suffer from heat exhaustion, heat stroke, brain damage, and can even die. Don't think that just because you'll be gone "just a minute" that your pet will be safe while you're gone; even an air-conditioned car with the motor off isn't healthy for your pet. To avoid any chance that your pet will succumb to the heat of a car this summer, be sure to play it safe by leaving your pet cool and refreshed at home while you're on the road. And if you do happen to see a pet in a car alone during the hot summer months, alert local animal control or the police department immediately. With a little care, we can all enjoy this season together here in Vienna.

### Yard Sale Reminder

Yard sales are a great way to recycle things you no longer need. Each household in town may hold two yard sales per year. Each sale must be conducted during daylight hours for no more than two consecutive weekends. To advertise your sale, two signs of no more than four square feet each are permitted at the residence where the sale is being conducted. Four additional signs of no more than two square feet each are permitted as directional signs, provided permission is received from the owners of the property where the signs are to be placed. No sign may be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the sale. Signs are not allowed in town rights of way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement) or on util-ity poles. (All signs placed illegally will be removed.) For more information or to report violations, call the Planning and Zoning Department at 703-255-6341.

**4.** Define borders and add Mulch: This little trick helps in fooling the eye to see clean lines when viewing landscape. Mulching is a great way to add attractive lines. This tip is also great for keeping weeds down in the garden beds and smooth's out uneven soil while adding color.

### Weekly Trash Collection Information

The Town of Vienna Department of Public Works Sanitation Division collects many types of debris each week including trash, recycling, yard waste, brush and bulk items. However, there are items we cannot collect including:

1. Gas tanks, fuel oil tanks, any motor containing fuel, pressurized tanks like propane, air or Freon

2. Tires on rims

**3.** Whole tree stumps

**4.** Hazardous materials including solvents, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes/bulbs, wet paint cans, etc.

**5.** Commercial Biohazardous Waste (Properly contained home-generated medical waste may be included in your regular household trash.)

- 6. Contractor-generated materials.
- 7. Brush and trash that are mixed
- 8. Dirt, mulch, sod or rootballs

**9.** White goods including: stoves, cooktops, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, convection ovens, toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, dehumidifiers, humidifiers and furnaces.

## THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

**August 2005:** Money Magazine has selected the Town of Vienna as one of the top ten "Best Places to Live" in the United States for 2005. Vienna ranked number four behind Moorestown, NJ, Bainbridge Island, WA and Naperville, IL.

**August 1995:** The National Safety Council has awarded its "President's Citation" to the Town of Vienna Vehicle and Equipment Maintenance Division. The award was earned for operating 58,496 employee-hours without a death or a case involving days away from work due to an on-the-job accident. The Town always encourages safety on the job through its own safety award programs for Public Works and Parks Maintenance employees.

**August 1985:** The newly formed Town/Business Liaison Committee has established a meeting schedule and rules governing its proceedings. The committee was created by the Town Council "to study, analyze, evaluate and offer recommendations to the Town Council on matters of public policy which in any way may affect the Town's business community or the relationship of the business community to other segments of the Town."

**August 1975:** The historic residence of the famous colonial religious freedom fighter, Jeremiah Moore, has been conveyed to the Town by DeLuca Enterprises. DeLuca had earlier conveyed some 11 acres of land adjacent to Nottoway Park to the Town. Slated for the remaining section of the tract are 150 townhouses.

### Vienna Excels in the Solarize Challenge

With 288 signups, Vienna has finished first in the competition to see whose community could enroll the greatest number of participants for free home energy checkups and solar PV reviews. The friendly race among Vienna and Falls Church heightened community awareness of efficient energy, as part of the Solarize NOVA campaign.

On June 30th, Solarize NOVA completed its local campaign for easier and affordable home solar power by offering bulk purchasing discounts, and free solar site assessments to homeowners in select communities in Northern Virginia. The campaign encouraged community members to learn more about home solar power options, facilitating the installation of solar panels and financing of their own project.

Following the spring campaign, Solarize NOVA welcomes 904 families who signed up for home energy checkups and/or solar PV reviews. Since its inception in the fall of 2014, the total number of sign-ups for Solarize NOVA has reached 1,278. Overall, Solarize NOVA has 27 signed contracts for 196.6 kW of new solar PV, a 7% increase in the region since 2013, with a construction value of nearly \$700K. The initiative expects future contracts added to accumulate close to \$1 million in construction, all handled by local construction companies.
