COMMENT FROM THE COUNCIL TABLE

The Madison High School - Town of Vienna Connection

James Madison High School and the Town of Vienna have a very special relationship. As a kid growing up in the 70's and 80's, my memories of the Town and school go hand in hand. The black and red flags lining Maple Avenue to Madison on game days and pictures of our teams and cheerleaders in store windows made me so excited to attend James Madison High School, and to be a part of that spirit. My mother was one of the parents who sewed those flags and I became one of those cheerleaders in the pictures.

Today, we still carry on some of the same traditions, but have also begun many more. Since 1975, the Vienna Police have been closing one lane of traffic every year for about an hour to accommodate the Madison Homecoming Parade. Traffic is an issue in Vienna, but one that can be set aside in order to hold a tradition that brings together the Town, students, parents, and Madison staff. All fall sports, the cheerleaders and dance teams, the princes and princesses, the marching band and many additional clubs either walk or ride in trucks down Maple Avenue. The Mayor rides with the Madison Principal, and all the Principals in our Pyramid ride in a truck. Parents, families with alumni, and current students find their spots on the sidewalk and many business owners come out to wave and yell their support. The Town and the Vienna Police work with Madison and its Student Government Association to coordinate this huge effort.

In 1992, the Vienna Rotary Club started sponsoring the Rotary Bowl This is the Football game between Madison and its rival, Marshall High School. At a regular Wednesday afternoon meeting, the team captains, coaches, Directors of Student Activities and Principals from both schools are invited to lunch. The players are introduced and the coaches remark on the game that has traditionally pitted childhood friends against each other for decades. It is a fun rivalry and one that brings the schools together with the Vienna Rotarians.

Another event the Rotary Club sponsors is Ethics Day. Marshall currently participates in the event, and the Club hopes to reinstate this important learning experience at Madison.

At the September 14th Town Council Meeting, all Madison individual and team State Champions and team runner-ups were recognized. The Chamber was packed showing the immense pride and honor The Town and Community feels for Madison.

The relationship goes both ways. For the past four years the Student Athletes have given back to the Town on Community Service Day. The Mayor first welcomes the students at Madison,



and then they head off to various locations in Town that the Parks and Recreation Department deem in need of work. Many parks and streams are cleared of debris and sometimes areas are mulched.

The Town of Vienna and James Madison High School work well together in other aspects as well. If an issue arises concerning field space or anything else, the problem is solved in a joint effort.

While the shared spirit of Madison students and alumni is profound, Vienna citizens get hyped for the school as well. Vienna residents rally around all the sports teams and attend games, concerts and shows even without having a participating child.

We live in an area surrounded by Tysons and Washington DC, but one of the things that keeps Vienna a small town is the unique relationship between the Town and its high school, James Madison.

The Town of Vienna is Prepared for Winter

Vienna's Department of Public Works and other Town staff are ready to roll, clearing snow and ice from public streets and communicating with residents this winter. The Town's fleet of plows and chemical spreaders are on duty 24 hours a day until all streets have been cleared and made safe. During these operations safety is our main priority.

Treating roads immediately begins at the onset of a winter storm. Plowing begins when the snow reaches a depth of approximately two inches. Primary streets are cleared first, followed by secondary streets. In the event of an extended storm we may have to return to the primary routes to remove additional accumulation, but crews will return to the secondary street they were clearing as soon as possible. The Town clears snow accumulation from streets by widening lanes as much as possible, this may require several passes in each direction; if possible wait to shovel your driveway until crews have had a chance to complete operations on your street to avoid snow being pushed back into the areas you have cleared.

Residents can assist in the efficiency of snow removal by doing the following:

Avoid travel unless absolutely nec-

essary during snow and ice storms.

- Avoid parking on snow emergency routes when snow or ice is predicted.
- Avoid parking on the street during plowing. On- street parking limits clearance for the snow removal equipment and makes snow removal difficult if not impossible. Parking in a driveway will reduce chances of having to shovel a vehicle out of a

• Avoid shoveling sidewalks and driveways into the roadway. Shovel snow to the right-hand side of the driveway (facing the street) to avoid snow plows from

pushing snow back into cleared

areas.

snow drift.

• Please clear snow from fire hydrants. In case of emergency, firefighters will be able to respond more quickly.

• Shovel sidewalks as soon as possible after the storm has ended.

• During winter weather, please keep water meter enclosures clear of snow and ice. If the meter cannot be read due to obstruction from snow or ice an estimated water bill will be rendered.

Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Donation Requests Due December 11

Friday, December 11, is the deadline for non-profit Vienna organizations to apply for donations of Town funds in Fiscal Year 2016-2017. Applications should be addressed to Town Manager Mercury Payton, Vienna Town Hall, 127 Center Street S, Vienna, VA 22180. All requests must include the following information:

- Name of the organization and names and addresses of its officers;
- Purpose of the organization and a description of its programs and activities;
- Percentage of members or participants who live in town or who own or are employed by town businesses;
- Organization budget showing all income and expenses for the year in which the donation will be used;
- Amount of funding requested from the Town;
- Purpose for which the donation will be used;
- Synopsis of the fundraising activities being conducted during the current year; and
- Statement signed by the principal officer that membership or participation is open to all residents and business people in town without regard to race, national origin, religion or sex

2015-2016 Leaf Collection Program

Fall leaf collection has begun and will continue through December. As in previous years, Town crews will make a total of three passes (beginning in north Vienna and moving to south Vienna at the start of each pass) during the leaf collection period. All residents are asked to rake their leaves to the curb at any point between late October and December 31, 2015 for collection. Leaf piles should be free of limbs, sticks, acorns or other debris which may clog the vacuum hose.

In an effort to keep residents informed, and to provide flexibility for weather delays, signs will be placed at en-

trances to neighborhoods advising of the projected date that the leaf vacuum truck will be in the area.

Town residents also have the option to bag leaves for collection on your regular weekly collection day. Please place leaves in clear plastic bags or paper yard waste bags, available at garden and home supply stores. In accordance with anti-pollution laws, the burning of leaves is prohibited. Information on Water Main Breaks

Water mains are pipes that carry drinking water to people's homes and businesses. The Water Division of the Department of Public Works is responsible for the maintenance of these pipes.

During times of extreme weather fluctuation, pipes, soil, and water expand and contract at different rates which occasionally cause water main breaks. When there is a break, crews may need to shut off the water flow which will interrupt resident's services until the repair is completed. Once water is back on, residents may want to run their "cold water only" for a few minutes from a bathtub or other fixture, without an aerator, to ensure that the water is completely clear. Residents should be advised that the water is safe to drink, but after every pipe repair (inside your house or outside) there is often discoloration from tiny particles of rust or scale that is dislodged. Letting the water run for a few minutes washes the pipe clean again so the water is clear.

Town residents' water bills are not affected when a break occurs. If a water main break happens in your area, call the Department of Public Works immediately at (703)

255-6380. After regular business hours, call the Vienna Police non-emergency number at (703) 255-6366. The top priorities of crews responding to water main breaks are to perform the work safely and minimize water service disruptions. Residents are encouraged to sign up for Vienna Alerts to receive updates on major water main breaks. For breaks that affect a smaller area, public works representatives will make every effort to contact homeowners during daylight hours as time allows during emergency repairs.

Often times homeowners try to do all they can to protect their homes from natural disasters. However, there are instances where some property owners may not have adequate insurance protection against potential sewer or water damage that stem from natural occurrences. For that reason, the Town strongly suggests residents and customers of the Town's utilities check with their insurance provider to ensure they have purchased an adequate amount of coverage to protect their property. Boards and Commission Spotlight: Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committees

The Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) serves as an advisory committee to the Town of Vienna's Transportation Safety Commission (TSC) by providing citizen input in planning the bicycle transportation infrastructure improvements and in promoting bicycling initiatives within the Town of Vienna. Similarly, the Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) serves as an advisory committee to the Town of Vienna's Transportation Safety Commission (TSC) by providing citizen input in planning the pedestrian infrastructure improvements and in promoting pedestrian initiatives within the Town of Vienna. The BAC and PAC report directly to the TSC who then reviews any recommendations and reports to the Mayor and Town Council.

A general Vienna Pedestrian Master Plan was adopted by Town Council in April 2015 to allow enforcement of a new Ordinance requiring developers to dedicate land for future sidewalks. This Plan will be expanded and included as an element of the next update of the Vienna Comprehensive Plan. Complete pedestrian networks provide safe routes for children and adults to walk or bike to their destination, eliminating a motor vehicle trip. Walking and biking promotes healthy lifestyles, promotes neighborhood cohesiveness and encourages residents to patronize our local Vienna businesses.

The BAC meets every other month (alternating months with the Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) before the regularly scheduled TSC meeting, on the last Tuesday of each month except December). Work sessions are held on the non-meeting months. Joint meetings with the PAC or the TSC may be held as deemed necessary by the TSC.

Is Your Old Fridge Running? Dominion Offers to "Go Catch It"!

We're told paying bills online is green, but if you paid your electric utility bill online last month you may not have learned of the green option for responsibly recycling old, working (yes, it must be capable of "running") fridges and freezers. This option is described in a leaflet included with the mailed August bills. Dominion is partnering with JACO Environmental to encourage us to replace older, inefficient refrigerators with new efficient units. In disposing of the non working units there has been an added incentive, you receive \$50 and the old unit is removed at no cost. JACO describes its approach to recycling as a "deconstruction" of the unit into its basic components for recycling the metals and other material, as well as capturing and disposing of the refrigerant properly. JACO's process stresses that it properly disposes insulation. Until 1995, Styrofoam was formed using the refrigerant CFC-11, which is both a potent greenhouse gas and an ozone-depleting compound.

This recycling option is much greener than the one usually available, which is to arrange, at a cost, for your appliance dealer to deliver the old fridge to the County's I-66 transfer station. There, the refrigerant is captured, but little is revealed about the disposal of the remaining bulk of the old units.

Today's Energy Star top-freezer style refrigerator typically saves over 400 kilowatt-hours per year when replacing a comparable unit built before 2001. The savings are greater the older and larger the replaced unit.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

November 2005: At its November 21 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed ordinance to prohibit parking of watercraft, boat trailers, motor homes and camping trailers on public streets. The proposed ordinance was prepared at the request of Council in response to changes made by the Virginia General Assembly last session that allow Fairfax County and towns within its boundaries to regulate parking of these vehicles.

November 1995: The Town Police Department has created a Youth Recourse Officer position, funded through a federal grant, in response to the many and diverse problems among Vienna's juveniles. The Youth Recourse Officer will assist troubled juveniles and their families and develop positive, proactive programs in the schools and the community such as this month's drug awareness seminar for parents.

November 1985: The Town of Vienna was saddened by the death of long-time Director of Finance W. Gordon Brady. Mr. Brady was Vienna's first Director of Finance. He developed a sound accounting system for the Town at a very difficult time in its financial history and was always recognized as a person of unquestioned integrity.

November 1975: After nearly nine years, the debates concerning the width of Park Street, S.E., may be over. Council agreed at its November 17 meeting to pursue construction of Park Street to a maximum width of 36 feet its entire length from Maple Avenue to Fardale Street. The street is currently only 18 to 20 feet wide, and has dangerous soft shoulders and poor drainage. The estimated cost of the project is approximately \$1 million.
