Renovated community center to be bigger – and brighter

When the Town of Vienna's newly renovated community center opens in the spring of 2017, it not only will be a lot bigger (about 15,000 square feet larger), it's also going to be a lot brighter. In fact, the new facility is designed to be LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certified at the silver level, and as such, much of the new construction features a



lot of glass, which will provide natural light.

"There's going to be a lot more sunlight coming into the rooms and natural light in the building," says Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman. "We're already excited about being able to serve the community in what will seem like a brand new facility."

Work on this expansion, arguably the first extensive renovation in the center's nearly 50-year existence, will require all of 2016 to complete. Keller Brothers, Inc. of Mount Airy, Maryland, is the general contractor, and The Lukmire Partnership of Arlington is the architect.

A re-opening celebration is expected to be scheduled sometime in the spring of 2017. Vienna's parks and recreation staff will offer monthly renovation updates at 6:30 p.m. at Town Hall prior to Council work sessions, which are held the second Monday of each month; photos and updates also will be posted on the "Community Center Renovation" page on the Town website, **viennava.gov**.

Turn over a new leaf with free mulch

The Public Works Department will take orders December 1 through February 29 for leaf mulch to be delivered free of charge to residents who live within the corporate limits of the Town. Delivery will likely begin mid-January. To place your order, call the "Mulch Line" recording at 703-255-6388 and leave your name, address, daytime phone number, and the number of loads to be delivered. You also may order leaf mulch online by visiting **viennava.gov/index. aspx?NID=164**. One load is approximately 2.5 cubic yards, which roughly equals 30 bags of mulch. Half loads are available upon request.

Please note the following important conditions:

- Deliveries are based on availability of mulch.
- Deliveries will be placed only in the driveway at the end closest to the house.
- Once mulch is delivered, it becomes the property of the homeowner, and the Town will not remove any excess mulch ordered.

Residents may pick up leaf mulch themselves in any amount from 9:30 a.m.-3 p.m. Monday through Friday (except holidays) from January 2 through March 31, while supplies last. Please call 703-255-6380 to arrange a pick-up time and to ensure a staff member will be on site. The mulch is stored on Town-owned property at 442 Beulah Road NE, near Glyndon Park.

'Tis the season to collect leaves

The Town of Vienna will continue leaf collection through the end of the year. The first pass through Town was expected to be completed by the time this newsletter arrives in mailboxes. A second and third sweep are planned. The Town added a third leaf truck to the rotation this year, which has resulted in a faster, more efficient collection process.

In order to help residents plan for collections, the Town regularly updates a colored map online that indicates where crews have been recently and in what direction they are headed. A link to the map can be found at **viennava.gov/index.aspx?NID=163**. A link to a list of streets that recently have been vacuumed is also provided online.

Information about leaf collection routes also is being broadcast on the Town's public access channel, available on channel 27 for Cox subscribers and channel 38 for Verizon FIOS customers.

In addition, the Public Works Department will put out general street signs with a message like: "Rake Now! Leaf Collection Coming to Your Neighborhood" on main neighborhood streets as crews approach. The signs are expected to be placed at the end of the week in specific areas that are anticipated to be serviced in the coming week.

Residents are welcome to call public works at 703-255-6380 to check on the collection schedule. For safety reasons, please rake leaves just to the curb, and not in the street.

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COMMENT FROM THE COUNCIL TABLE

Four-way stops: Who's turn is it to go?

I'm sure that you have noticed that the Town of Vienna has a number of three- and four-way (all-way) stop-sign intersections. All-way stop signs are used throughout the Town of Vienna at intersections where there is a combination of excessive speed, restricted view, and/or serious accident record involving turning traffic. All-way stops also allow traffic flow from busy minor streets (from *The Citizen's Guide to Traffic Calming in Vienna*).

Have you noticed that drivers often are confused as to whose turn it is when coming to an all-way intersection? The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has a handy pdf that illustrates who has the right-of-way in intersections. It can be found at nhtsa.gov/DOT/NHTSA/NTI/Article/RightOfWay/RightOfWayRules.pdf

Here's a brief overview of who has the right-of-way. Remember to please kindly come to a complete stop at all intersections with a stop sign:

- **First to Stop=First to Go.** If you arrive at the intersection first, it is your right to go through the intersection first.
- Farthest Right Goes First. If two vehicles arrive at the

intersection at the same time, the vehicle on the right goes first.

• Straight Traffic Goes First. When two vehicles are directly across from one another, and one is turning left across the intersection, the one going straight goes first. A perfect reason to use your turn signal.



• When in Doubt, Bail Out. Even if you have the right-ofway, if you feel uncomfortable (or your safety is threatened), let the other traffic go ahead of you.

The above rules also apply to cyclists and pedestrians on the roadway or sidewalks as well. Cyclists riding on the road are considered vehicles. When coming to an all-way stop intersection as a cyclist or pedestrian, make eye contact with the drivers of each car to ensure your safety when crossing the roadway. Spread the word to your friends, neighbors, and even your children. Everyone should know who has the right-of-way at an intersection.

I-66: 'No perfect solution'

The upcoming expansion of I-66, recently named the worst freeway in America by the website Thrillist, was the topic of conversation at the November 10 Mayor @ Your Service presentation. Mayor Laurie DiRocco welcomed Susan Shaw, regional transportation program director with the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), to present an update and to answer citizen questions.

The expansion project, on which construction is expected to begin in 2017, will provide three regular lanes and two high-occupancy toll lanes in each direction as well as high-frequency bus service with predictable travel times along a 25-mile stretch from Haymarket to the Capital Beltway. The project, Shaw said, is designed to reduce congestion on the interstate by increasing capacity, provide new and predictable multimodal travel choices, and enhance safety and travel predictability. Construction is expected to take four years.

"There is no perfect solution," Shaw acknowledged. "It's an effective solution, but we're not building ourselves out of the congestion entirely. Some congestion will remain at peak times."

VDOT's preferred plan, she said, makes use of existing structure and makes travel along the I-66 corridor "better – not perfect" by reducing congestion, bottlenecks, and cut-throughs on local roads as well as improving speeds and safety. Once construction is complete, she said, the roadway should be able to move more than 4,000 more people per hour than it currently does.

At the November 16 Town Council meeting, Mayor DiRocco noted that the Town remains concerned about the impact the project may have on Marshall Road Elementary School and Yeonas Park and will continue to monitor the project as plans are finalized.

Single-stream recycling – What goes in the bin?

The holidays are a time of family, food, gifts, and an ever-growing mountain of trash. Americans produce 25% more waste between Thanksgiving and New Year's than at other times of the year, according to the Environmental Protection Agency.

That makes December a great time to brush up on the Town's single-stream recycling guidelines. Think you know the rules? Careful, they've recently changed. Plastic bags, for example, are no longer permitted in your single-stream recycling bin. While highly recyclable, the bags snarl up the sorting equipment at the processing center. The same is true of coat hangers, whether plastic or metal. Many grocery stores have a receptacle for recycled plastic bags. And, drycleaners generally will accept your hangers.

These items *should* be tossed in your single-stream bin:

- aluminum cans, bottles, foil, and pie pans
- steel and bimetal tin or steel cans (including cans with a white lining) and bottle caps made of metal
- plastic containers with numbers 1-7 including food, beverages, and non-hazardous household cleaners (remove lids and caps)
- rigid plastics crates, buckets with metal handles,

- lawn furniture, plastic yard equipment, flower pots, etc.
- paper brown bags, flattened cardboard, newspaper, magazines, books, dairy and juice cartons (exclude wet or soiled paper items such as pizza boxes, plates, napkins, tissues, or wipes)
- glass unbroken jars and bottles only (drinking glasses, mirrors, window or auto glass, ceramics, crystal, and light bulbs are not compatible with container glass and will contaminate your recyclables)
- empty aerosol cans includes hair products, shaving creams, disinfectants and spray paint (ozone-depleting chemicals were banned from U.S. consumer aerosols in 1978).

Remember to rinse food containers. Not only does the county require 5% or less residue in the container but, if your recycled item is clean, there will be fewer scavengers visiting your bin. Motor oil, antifreeze, car batteries and electronics (anything with a plug) may be disposed of at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill St. NE on December 5. Check the Town calendar for other recycling dates. For additional recycling questions, check the Town website or call 703-255-6380.

Waters Field replacement nearly complete

Work to replace the turf at Waters Field is expected to be completed by December 11.

The artificial turf being replaced was installed about 10 years ago, says Vienna Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman. The field is used by a variety of community athletic leagues for recreational

activities, including football, lacrosse, and baseball.

Installation of the new turf will cost approximately \$580,000 with funding provided by Fairfax County, Town of Vienna, Vienna Youth Inc., and Greater Vienna Babe Ruth.



Builders Summit addresses construction etiquette

In response to citizen feedback related to concerns about redevelopment/construction and builder practices in established neighborhoods, the Town of Vienna hosted a Builders Summit at Town Hall September 14. The summit allowed citizens to express their concerns and builders to respond in an open forum. The summit was attended by about 40 people, including most of the builders currently working in the Town of Vienna.

The meeting, says Planning and Zoning Director Patrick Mulhern, was designed to promote a "frank, but cordial and considerate conversation" about neighbors' concerns as well as to generate ideas for how builders can be better neighbors in the community and reduce those complaints moving forward.

Concerns that were violations of the Town's codes were addressed by zoning enforcement staff. However, Mulhern says, "Many of the complaints were not technically violations, but rather inconsiderate behaviors by builders, subcontractors, and delivery personnel."

Citizen concerns raised during the meeting included:

- construction vehicles parking too close to street corners and impeding the vision of area drivers
- vehicles blocking driveways
- trucks blocking roadways without providing a flag person to redirect traffic
- failure to clean trash from work sites, which can often blow onto neighbors' lawns
- dirt and especially nails in the street, making a mess and causing flat tires
- working before or after hours that are permitted by code.

Residents requested that builders place a sign at the entrance of construction sites that would note allowable working hours and provide the owner's and builder's contact information.

"We hope," Mulhern says, "that by hearing residents' concerns, builders will hold one another accountable and help raise the bar of awareness on how we do business differently in the Town of Vienna."

Since the September Builders Summit, the Town's zoning office has noted a drop in citizen complaints. The Town of Vienna has committed to offering a forum for builders and residents to meet each year or as needed.

The renovated community center will have a new lobby and entrance as well as a new 9,000-square foot high school regulation-sized gym/court at the back of the building. A new patio seating area will be available outside. Lighting, tile, carpet, and ceilings (which are being raised) are being replaced.

The project got underway in early October and work to date includes removal of old ductwork, flooring and ceilings, lights, the moveable partition in the auditorium, and asbestos. Next up are installation of drainage and stormwater pipes.

Several trees on both the north and south sides of the building will be removed to accommodate underground utilities and an enlarged parking area. New tree plantings will be installed near completion of the project.

The gym addition to the community center will require that the W&OD trail be "bumped over"; however, the trail will remain open throughout the renovation process.

Vienna Youth Inc. and the Northern Virginia Park Authority are partnering with the Town to renovate the center. The Town's budget for the project is about \$10.4 million, and funds will come from the 2014 and 2016 bond issuances as well as donations.

Vienna Business Association to suspend hosting First Night Event 2015, Cites insufficient funds from Oktoberfest

The Vienna Business Association, along with the Town of Vienna, announces that they will not be hosting First Night Vienna 2015.

First Night Vienna, first launched in 2013, is primarily funded by proceeds raised by Oktoberfest. This year's event fell short of securing adequate funds due to the inclement weather.

"The VBA reviewed all the options available to us. It basically

boiled down to whether the event as we all know, love, are so proud of, and which has garnered such positive community support, could be scaled back in any way while maintaining its level of excellence," states Kathy Georgen, chairperson of the Vienna Business Association Board of Directors. She continued, "We, as a board, needed to make the difficult decision to suspend this year's event. We have to uphold our fiduciary responsibility to our members and recognize that hosting the event would not be a wise financial decision."

"The Town of Vienna is very appreciative of all the VBA does for the community, and we support them in this decision," states Mayor Laurie DiRocco.

The Board of Directors will restructure how it funds First Night and has high expectations the event will be re-introduced to the Vienna community in 2016.

Is your old fridge running? Dominion Power offers to 'catch it'

by Ross Shearer, Community Enhancement Commission Looking for a greener option to dispose of an older but still running/working refrigerator or freezer or perhaps a second working unit that you no longer need? Dominion Power and JACO Environmental have teamed up to help out – and to provide a little incentive for upgrading to newer, more efficient models. Through JACO's recycling program, old (but still working) units are removed at no cost, and a rebate of \$50 is offered.

JACO describes its approach to recycling as "deconstruction" of the unit into its basic components. Metals and other materials are recycled, and refrigerant is disposed of properly. JACO emphasizes that it properly disposes of Styrofoam insulation, used until 1995, which also utilized refrigerant CFC-

11, a potent greenhouse gas and ozone-depleting compound. This recycling option is much greener and less expensive than the typical disposal at Fairfax County's I-66 transfer station.

Today's Energy Star top-freezer refrigerators typically save more than 400-kilowatt hours per year compared to pre-2001 units. The older and larger the replaced unit, the greater the savings.

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THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

December 2005: Sgt. Thomas T. Burtt III has been named Police Officer of the Year by the Vienna Woman's Club. The award was established in 1967 to recognize outstanding service to the community. Additionally, Amy-Jo Hendrix, Vienna Parks and Recreation coordinator, received the Best New Special Event Award of 2004 from the Virginia Recreation and Parks Society.

December 1995: Vienna has lost one of its leading citizens with the death of Town Councilwoman Martha H. Pruett, who was first elected to Town Council in 1988 after serving on the Vienna Planning Commission for 17 years. She was involved in a wide variety of community service activities as a member of the Vienna Woman's Club, Vienna Presbyterian Church, Southwest Vienna Citizens Association, Marshall Elementary School PTA, Girl Scouts, and many other groups.

December 1985: Construction is underway to provide access to the Vienna Metro Station parking lots from the west via Route I-66. As part of the project, Nutley Street will be widened outside the Town limits from four lanes to six and will be relocated westward to line up with Nutley on the southside of Lee Highway.

December 1975: Curbside newspaper pickup was a new service recently implemented by the Town of Vienna to supplement the series of other reuse services already available. The new service was not implemented to preserve the Town's present refuse service and provide relief to the environment.

Department (DPW) provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products.
