Updated comprehensive plan envisions a greener, more vibrant, better connected Vienna

he 2016 Town of Vienna Comprehensive Plan offers a vision for a future Vienna that is a greener and more sustainable community with a vibrant and walkable downtown and multimodal connections that provide convenient access to destinations as well as stronger social connections and economic growth.

A draft of the comprehensive plan is available for public review at viennava. gov. Public hearings on the comprehensive plan are scheduled for the May 11 Planning Commission meeting and May 23 Town Council meeting.

Last updated in 2009, the comprehensive plan provides a vision for how the Town could grow and evolve into the future. It is an aspirational long-range guide.

"The comprehensive plan," says Planner Michael D'Orazio, "is committed to maintaining Vienna's small-town charm and single-family residential character, but it also encourages more diverse and compact housing options in the form of mixed-use projects along Maple Avenue. The plan also envisions a more vibrant downtown that creates a true sense of place as well as transportation and parking options that will enhance accessibility and minimize traffic issues."

Some of the big ideas put forward in the draft of the comprehensive plan include:

• creating a downtown along Maple Avenue that provides a strong sense of place



through encouragement of mixed-use redevelopment and potential implementation of design guidelines for signage, streetscape, and architecture as well as installation of public art

- building a public parking structure in the central business district that would address the issues of parking and walkability and provide for "park once" access to multiple businesses and destinations.
- creating master plans for each of the Town's parks to clearly delineate usage and services, better meet the needs of residents, and identify and fill gaps in availability
- encouraging environmentally conscious decisions and practices
- enhancing placemaking, economic development, and walkable streets through a transportation study of Maple Avenue that would consider a variety of options including roundabouts, street parking, bike lanes, and landscaped medians
- considering ways to encourage use

of the Town Green outside of events; possibilities include installing splash fountains, public art, or interactive art elements.

The comprehensive plan notes that while Vienna's central business corridor can't be expected to – nor be desired to – compete with retail experiences provided at Tysons and Merrifield, it can be enhanced in a way that would provide a viable shopping alternative. Another goal set by the plan is to manage the impact of nearby development on Vienna's transportation system.

"As we implement the comprehensive plan," says Planning Deputy Director Hyojung Garland, "we hope to encourage adoption of design guidelines that will help create a sense of place as you walk along Maple Avenue. We want to create active streets that are accessible, walkable, alive, and vibrant.

"While the goal is to sustain the special attributes that make Vienna a great place to live," adds Garland, "we also realize that continued positive growth will require directed redevelopment along Maple Avenue."

Planning Director Patrick Mulhern says: "Insisting on pedestrian-friendly redevelopment efforts that include quality architecture and streetscapes is our best hope for making the physical fabric of our Town match the high-quality community identity that is Vienna, Virginia."

Community Center Renovation and Expansion Update

Here's the most recent monthly progress report on the project as submitted to Town Council April 11:

- stormwater line on north side 75% complete
- sidewalk trail apron at Park Street incorrectly installed; will need to be demolished and re-installed
- French drains installed in parking area
- floors in old kitchen, restrooms, and administration area cut out
- masonry on north wall removed for opening to corridors and restrooms; masonry in administration area along east wall and on second floor also removed

- floor openings for future masonry piers cut
- tile wainscot in existing corridors removed
- metal stud walls on second floor and for control room in auditorium are underway
- layout of mechanical units on roof complete
- footings and foundation as well as masonry foundation walls in new gym are being installed.

Looking ahead, next steps include:

- installation of base and asphalt surface for W&OD trail
- proper installation of aprons for trail at Park Street

- pouring of footers for addition of restroom and new corridor
- begin moisture barrier and backfill walls as well as installation of sprinkler system and fire line inside mechanical room
- installation of electrical duct bank on south side of building.

A community center renovation update is presented each month at 6:30 p.m. prior to the Town Council work session. The public is encouraged to attend these updates in Council Chambers at Town Hall. The next update will be presented May 16.



Slow down to get around - it's the law

new state law requires that drivers passing any stationary vehicle that is collecting trash or recycling must reduce their speed to at least 10 miles per hour below the posted speed limit and pass at least two feet to the left. This "slow down to get around" legislation was signed into law last year and is designed to improve the safety of trash collection workers, who have the fifth most dangerous job in the country. Drivers who fail to slow down when passing trash or recycling trucks can face a penalty of up to \$250.

Dominion Power program seeks to restore native plant environments along W&OD

ven though spring is in full bloom, sections of the W&OD trail in the Vienna area, specifically near Mill Road and Talahi Road, are looking decidedly less lush – and that's a good thing. As part of ongoing routine activities to protect its transmission facilities along the 45-mile multipurpose trail, Dominion Power has over the past several years implemented a vegetation management program that targets incompatible invasive species and promotes re-emergence of native plants that better support indigenous wildlife.

The program has been implemented along the trail in other areas over the past couple of years to promote regeneration of meadow-like environments. Late this winter, early this spring, as the first step in this ongoing vegetation management program along sections of the trail in and around Vienna, Dominion Power mulched swaths of invasive plants, giving native plants that had been overpowered and suppressed in the soil an opportunity to regenerate.

"Within our objective of protecting the power infrastructure," says Andrew Cooney, transmission forestry coordinator with Dominion Power, "we're able to create a win-win for everybody using the trail. This program will improve plant and animal diversity, not to mention aesthetics.

"The invasive plants appear lush, but they don't bring much to the table," he adds. "They crowd out the native, viable plants, and they're not conducive to the native wildlife – the birds, amphibians, and small mammals. The invasives might look fuller, but they provide a sterile environment. We're unleashing a healthier habitat."

The cleared areas should green up by June or July, Cooney says, but will have a different, more meadow-like look and texture than the invasive plants that trail-users have become used to.

While no additional mulching in the Vienna area is anticipated for the immediate future, reestablishment of a native plant community is an ongoing process that will require targeted applications of custom-blended herbicides along the two Vienna sections this fall and probably the following spring.

Dominion's vegetation management program is being completed in sections along the W&OD, which is owned and managed by the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority, and it's possible that in the future other sections in the Vienna area will be restored.

W&OD improvements expected to be ready soon

s part of the Vienna Community Center renovation project, the Town is working with the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority to make improvements to the section of the W&OD trail there. The trail is being relocated and widened; these improvements are expected to be completed and the permanent trail reopened by the end of May.

The trail's new route aligns more closely to the old railroad line, moving it to the perimeter of the community center's parking area rather than between the parking area and community center, resulting in improved pedestrian flow and safety. Because of this relocation, the trail's intersection with Park Street has been shifted slightly north, and the new crosswalk will be wider, increasing its capacity for bicyclists and pedestrians and making the intersection more visible to motorists.

Also, the trail itself is being widened. As popularity of the W&OD has grown over the years, so has the trail's width. The standard width is now 10 feet with some busier locations up to 12-foot wide. NOVA Parks is using this opportunity to install an 18-foot-wide section as a prototype, designed to better accommodate busy weekend traffic and perhaps one day separated lanes for bikers and pedestrians. Signage and fencing also are being updated.

hese will be some of the themes discussed when Vienna's next Mayor @ Your Service forum takes on pedestrian and bicycle safety at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 10, at Town Hall, 127 Center Street S.

Vienna police officers will review essential equipment and rules, pro-



vide safety tips such as making eye contact with drivers, and discuss practices such as why it may not always be best to ride on the sidewalk, but it's always a good idea when on foot to use crosswalks.

Members of Vienna's Pedestrian Advisory Committee and Bicycle Advisory Committee will also be on hand to share information and answer questions.

Hop on the bus to get around Vienna – and to other nearby destinations

n the 2014 Town of Vienna citizen survey, 38% of Town residents reported that they use public transportation. Of that 38%, only 5% said they use public bus services.

Vienna resident Jim Nunno is part of that 5%, riding the bus to work in Rosslyn every day to bypass the stress of traffic and hassles and expense of parking. "If you really don't want to drive and are looking for public transportation, I would recommend the bus," says Nunno. "It is a practical and environmentally friendly option."

Both Metrobus and Fairfax Connector systems serve Vienna residents – as well as metro area residents who wish to travel to Vienna to shop, do business, or grab a bite to eat.

Switching back and forth between Metrobus and Fairfax Connector, Nunno sees advantages in



each. "I appreciate Metrobus because they have apps that let you track when the bus is coming," he says. "I know exactly when I need to leave the house in the morning and when to leave work in the afternoon, which is very convenient.

"Alternatively," he continues, "drivers on the Connector are very friendly, and the buses are kept in a very nice condition, which allows me to enjoy a comfortable ride."

Serving almost 12,000 bus stops in Virginia, the District, and Maryland, Metrobus offers thousands of trips each week. An alternative to and extension of Metrobus, the Fairfax Connector began offering public bus service in 1985. Today, with more than 295 buses and 85 routes, about 40,000 people utilize the Fairfax Connector each weekday.

The free Student Bus Pass Program is the newest service offered by Connector. This program permits all Fairfax County high and middle school students to ride Fairfax Connector from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday-Friday free of charge. To take advantage of this program, parental/guardian consent is required. Students can obtain consent forms by contacting their school's administration office.

As a regular rider, Nunno offers some advice to those thinking about trying bus service: "Riders should be aware that riding the bus is an art and not a science. Sometimes the bus is just not going to be on time – you have to have a bit of patience when dealing with public transportation."

Public transportation helps stimulate local economies, reduce road congestion, and diminish environmental damage. If you have that "bit of patience" Nunno referred to, there's really no reason not to consider hopping on Metrobus or Fairfax Connector for your next trip. **V**

Solarize Vienna ends May 15

Don't miss this opportunity to save energy and money – it's a sure bet

he mayors of Vienna, City of Fairfax, and City of Falls Church believe so strongly in the solar energy option and free home energy check-ups being offered through May 15 through the Solarize NOVA program that they've put dinner on the line. The mayor and Council of the winning community, to be determined

by number of home energy sign-ups in each community (with handicaps figured in for population size and number of years in program) will host a dinner and sustainability conversation with the mayors and councilmembers of the other two communities, who will pick up the tab.



Vienna came out on top in 2015 in a head-to-head friendly competition with City of Falls Church, with 289 sign-ups for home energy check-ups (and nine homes installing solar energy systems). As of April 15 this year, though, Vienna was in third place.

"We have a fairly new Energy Star home, but we still picked up some straightforward and simple tips that helped us improve the efficiency of our HVAC system," says Community Enhancement Commission member Tara Ruszkowski, who had a home check-up last year. "The contractor even climbed into our attic to measure our insulation against the Energy Star standard. Learning we had the right amount gave me peace of mind. I'd recommend this free opportunity to anyone, regardless of the age of their home. In addition to the solid advice from an energy expert, you get nice freebies including CFL bulbs, power strips, and pipe insulation. It's a no-brainer!"

Parks caretakers keep parks clean and green

s spring settles in and Vienna ramps up the outdoor lifestyle, the Town's parks maintenance crew is ready to shepherd community members into concerts, festivals, and other gatherings. The change of seasons, however, is not where this crew begins; year-round you may not always see them, but says Parks Maintenance Manager John King, Jr.: "If it's green, we take care of it."

This collective crew of 10 is caretaker of the Town's parks, keeping them clean, safe, and ready for play. Trees, creeks, playgrounds, trails, and irrigation all require the parks and rec department's upkeep, regardless of the weather. During the winter season, the crew is in charge of clearing sidewalks, Town parking lots, and assisting the Public Works Department with street plowing.

And in the spring when youth sports leagues are ready to play ball, the parks maintenance crew has already been at work months prior to opening day addressing landscaping needs as well as maintaining equipment, bases, posts, lights, and fences.

The crew also works each year with several scouts who are required to implement a project that benefits the environment in order to earn Eagle Scout status. Multiple other organizations rely on this hardworking, behind-thescenes crew to set up and breakdown for Town events.

"We do a lot of event coordinating with different organizations, which can scatter responsibilities" says Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman. "It's the maintenance crew's dedication and hard work that allows us to pull everything together and put on a good show."

You know that the parks maintenance crew has done its job well, she adds, when, the day after an event, "You look around and – there's no trash and traffic is flowing normally – you'd never know that an event even happened." \checkmark
