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Vienna's Holiday Stroll celebrates two decades...and the holiday season

# Once upon a time... actually about 20 years ago

t was December 1996 and Church Street merchants were desperate. After having endured months of sidewalk construction, they felt that the shopping and spirit of the holiday season were in peril. Determined to bring the holiday spirit to small-town America, the Church Street Merchants Association, along with Historic Vienna, Inc. and the Vienna Regional Chamber of Commerce (now the Vienna Business Association), hosted the first Church Street Holiday Stroll on December 8, 1996.

Businesses stayed open late, carolers provided a soundtrack to the evening, and Santa made a grand appearance to hear Christmas wishes from children in attendance. The day after the event, then-Posh! Inc. owner Mary Ann Antonides, remarked of the stroll: "It's a beginning. I think if we combine our efforts and talents next year, it will be even better. It should be a wonderful holiday tradition." Looks like she was on to something.

Over the past two decades, the event has evolved into a communitywide celebration and seasonal staple for small businesses, which is now hosted by HVI, Church Street merchants, and the Town of Vienna's Parks and Recreation Department.





# Your vote, your voice

airfax County polling precincts will be open 6 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday, November 8. In Vienna, voters will not only be able to cast their ballot for president, but also for the 11th District House of Representatives, on a referendum to implement a 4% county meals tax (which would not apply within Town), and several proposed bond issues and constitutional amendments. A sample ballot is available at **fairfaxcounty.gov/elections**.

Town of Vienna voters cast ballots at one of four schools: Cunningham Park, Cedar Lane, Madison High School, or Vienna Elementary. To determine your polling location, visit https://vote. elections.virginia.gov/VoterInformation/ PollingPlaceLookup. Photo identification is required in order to vote.



# Did you know?

Among the items that Fairfax County voters will consider on the November 8 ballot is a countywide referendum to impose a meals tax of up to 4%. If approved by voters, the county's meal tax would not apply in the Town of Vienna.



# Vienna's new public works director not really all that new

ichael Gallagher is the Town of Vienna's new public works director, but he is not a new face to the Town or its residents. Gallagher has worked in Vienna's public works department for six years, most recently as acting director. He was named public works director September 21.

Following graduation from Virginia Tech with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, Gallagher began his career in the private sector before joining the Town of Vienna in 2010 as a civil engineer. In 2012 he was promoted to deputy director of public works.

"Working in a small team teaches you to wear a lot of different hats," says Gallagher, "and seeing the department from different roles has prepared me as director to better serve and engage with the community."

As public works acting director since May, Gallagher made a positive impact on the Town's infrastructure with a number of projects. The mini roundabout at Park and Locust streets addressed a congested intersection, and its construction was completed ahead of schedule. The Town Hall roof renovation also was promptly completed this summer under his supervision.

Town Manager Mercury Payton has been particularly impressed with Gallagher's focus on communication. "Watching him engage with citizens, interdepartmental staff, and other community stakeholders throughout key projects," says Payton, "has made me confident that he is the leader and spokesperson the public deserves. # Getting 'round the roundabout

he Town of Vienna has received several positive comments about the new mini roundabout at Park and Locust streets. Consider this September 3 email from

Georgia Weindling, who lives near the intersection: "Thanks so much for all your hard work in determining an appropriate solution to the traffic problems at Park and Locust Streets.... I am really pleased with the outcome. My drive home from work is greatly improved, and I no longer fear for my life when crossing the street!"

The Town also has received feedback that some drivers still may not be "getting" how to use the roundabout. Area residents report a good deal of horn-honking and examples of misuse. You can find tips on negotiating roundabouts, provided by the Federal Highway Administration, at viennava.gov/miniroundabout.

Here are a few quick tips to keep in mind:

- Vehicles in the circle/roundabout have the right of way.
- Traffic in the roundabout travels in a counterclockwise direction.
- Vehicles preparing to enter the roundabout need to yield to any oncoming traffic in the circle.
- Do not stop once you're in the roundabout.
- Use your signal to indicate where you plan to exit the roundabout.
- Vienna's mini roundabout is designed for 18-wheelers and other large vehicles to drive over the center median; do not follow their lead!
- As you approach or exit the roundabout, be sure to yield to pedestrians in the crosswalk.



# Town Council adopts FY17 Capital Improvement Plan

n September, Town Council adopted the Fiscal Year 2016-17 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), a planning document that outlines potential capital projects the Town may undertake across nearly three decades. Over the next five years, the plan calls for undertaking renovation and construction of a new police department facility and building a public structured parking facility in the commercial center of Town in addition to several sewer, storm drainage, sidewalk, curb and gutter, and other improvement projects.

Funds for paying off the majority of the Town's capital improvements are provided through bond issuances, which the Town typically issues every two years. Revenue to pay off the bonds is provided through the Town's 3% meals tax. In fiscal year 2016, Vienna's meals tax generated \$2.5 million. The Town also leverages grants and other funding sources to help cover capital expenses.

Funding for capital projects to be undertaken in the next several years, including the proposed police station and structured parking, are to be largely paid for through 2018 and 2020 bond issuances.

A new police station, says Chief Jim Morris, will provide a right-sized, more professional, and secure facility and may provide opportunities to share the space with other Town functions.

"When the current police station was constructed in 1994," says Morris, "it was known at that time that it was being built too small to meet the department's needs. Since then, we've made do with the space by moving storage and having some staff work off site. The new station will provide sufficient space to bring property and evidence storage as well as space for officers and technology all on the same site."

A structured parking facility may provide an effective way to address the shortage of parking spaces in Vienna's commercial center and help draw more area residents to Vienna businesses. The Town has begun conversations with potential public and private partners in creating structured parking spaces and is considering a short list of potential sites.

"One of the best ways that the Town can support downtown businesses as well as the vision for Church Street and Maple Avenue would be to build a structured parking facility," says Mayor Laurie DiRocco. "In addition, structured parking would provide a much needed service to our residents and visitors and support the many fabulous events that our community hosts."

The CIP recommends that funds for paying off parking structure expenses be tied directly to a one-cent increase in the meals tax (from 3% to 4%) over a 15-year period.

All improvement projects in the CIP, bond issuances, and any increase in the meals tax will require Council approval.

Bonds issuances in 2018 and 2020 also are expected to cover \$5 million in sewer infrastructure improvements to be undertaken by Fairfax County. An intergovernmental agreement stipulates that the Town provide 1.87% of the county's total capital sewer improvement costs. Funds to cover these expenses would be generated through water and sewer rates. Vienna serves approximately 9,500 customers, about 3,500 of whom live outside of the Town limits.

The 2016 Church Street Holiday Stroll, like that first one, will feature shopping opportunities, Santa, and music, but also marshmallow-roasting stations, lighting of the Town Christmas tree, and a variety of fun activities. This year's stroll will take place from 6-9 p.m. Monday, November 28.

Santa arrives at 6:15 p.m. on a 1946 fire engine, and at 6:20 he and Mayor Laurie DiRocco will light the tree. Later that evening, Santa will patiently listen to the wishes of good girls and boys – as well as allow parents to snap a free photo.

The Vienna-Falls Chorus of Sweet Adelines and Fairfax Jubil-Aires will offer strolling serenades while young singers from several area schools and the Vienna Community Band will perform on the Showmobile Stage. Historic properties, including the train depot, Freeman Store, Little Library, and caboose, will be open. Church Street will be closed to vehicular traffic beginning at 5 p.m.

# **CONVERSATIONS WITH COUNCIL** W&OD trail is a community treasure

he W&OD trail, officially known as the Washington & Old Dominion Railroad Regional Park and managed by NOVA Parks, is one of Vienna's great treasures. The trail is well-used, but if you haven't discovered it yet, what are you waiting for?!

The W&OD snakes through the center of Vienna from the southeast to the northwest for approximately two miles and includes the newly widened section near the Vienna Community Center. On any given day, you can see a wide variety of people (and animals) using the trail: cyclists, walkers, runners, commuters, children on the way to school.

Trail access points are available in several Vienna neighborhoods, including from Wildwood Park, Adahi Road SE, Tapawingo Road SE, Fellini Court SE, Talahi Road SE, Branch Road SE, Mill Street NE, and Northside Park. These connections allow users to cross from one side of Town to the other without having to access major roads such as Maple Avenue. I frequently ride my bike to work by heading to the end of Tapawingo SE, entering the W&OD Trail, and exiting at Wildwood Park a few yards up from the trail. This




allows me to stay on quieter secondary roads for the majority of my journey. The Vienna section is one of the most heavily used seg-

ments of the trail. Here are some reminders and "rules of the road":

- The park is open 5 a.m.-9 p.m. in Arlington and Fairfax County (including the Town of Vienna); beyond the western edge of Fairfax County, the park closes at dusk.
- Always travel to the right of the center line.
- Always yield to slower users.
- Give an audible signal a few seconds before passing.
- Horses, then pedestrians, have the right-of-way; cyclists must yield to both.
- Obey all posted trail and stop signs.

# Drama, absurdity, insight in one act

wo actors and a runtime of seven minutes. On the surface, that's what *DMV Tyrant* is. I attended a September rehearsal of this one-act play, written by Christopher Durang and directed for the Vienna Theatre Company's current *Eclectic Essentials II* production by Jessie Roberts.

"It's not the subject matter, it's how it's presented," says

Roberts, explaining how such a seemingly mundane event like going to the DMV can be dramatized. Working off the script as a blueprint, she adds, "You have to find the reality, and then exploit it into something different."

Perhaps several of us have had excruciating moments at the DMV, but *DMV Tyrant* takes the experience to a whole other comedic level, in case that wasn't obvious from the short play's title.

*DMV Tyrant* is one of four one-act plays being presented in the Vienna Theatre Company's sequel production of *Eclectic Essentials*. Performances are at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, October 28 and 29 and November 4 and 5. General admission tickets are \$14 and may be purchased in person from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday at the Parks and Recreation Offices at 262M Cedar Lane or online via WebTrac at **viennava.gov**.

*Vienna Voice* conducted a brief question-and-answer session with *DMV Tyrant* director Jessie Roberts about her take on the one-act play and the community theater scene in and around Vienna:

VV: Tell us a little more about DMV Tyrant.

**JR**: Going to the DMV isn't always a bad experience. They have trained people working in customer service, but every once in a while there's that moment everyone talks about. The play takes that tiny slice of life and expands on it into almost a farce. But that's what we do, we push that small bit of reality.

**W**: You have directed many plays for many different community theatre companies. How has your experience with the Vienna Theatre Company been?

JR: The Vienna Theatre Company is a welcoming company. It is very conscious of its members across the entire spectrum. Board members participate at every show, whether it is helping with concessions, taking tickets, or even just greeting members of the audience when they come in. It becomes a family.

W: How do the community and theatre company benefit from one another?

JR: The theatre scene sort of perpetuates itself. We were most recently at Vienna's Oktoberfest, and we were looking for people who wanted to sign up. We always ask for feedback about what people think of the shows, what they would like to see in the future, etc. There is a sort of mutual promotion between the Town and the company.

VV: How do you cater to your audience?

JR: We have a loyal demographic, but we also like to receive input from others. We have a mailing list exclusively for audience members and we encourage feedback. When board members greet people at the shows, after the performance they will follow up and ask: "What did you think?" or "What kinds of shows would you like to see in the future?" so we can adapt to what people want.

he November 18 Bountiful Harvest luncheon for mature adults is a Vienna event steeped in tradition, camaraderie, and cooperation.

For 48 years, the Vienna 50/90 Club banded together and represented many in Vienna's senior community. It was the first senior club to meet at the Vienna Community Center after it opened in 1966. Parks and Recreation provided a home for club members so that they could gather for a nice evening, have a home-cooked meal, play some cards, rejoin old friends, and make new ones.

Each November, club members and parks and recreation staff would share a pre-Thanksgiving meal, with assistance from several community volunteer groups. # Get comfy cozy for winter!

he heating season is upon us. To save money on heating and be more comfortable, November is a great month to give your home an energy efficiency tune-up. The Department of Energy provides this list of fall and winter energysaving tips: energy.gov/energysaver/fall-and-winter-energysaving-tips.

The Virginia State Corporation Commission has directed Dominion Virginia Power to help its ratepayers achieve greater energy efficiency. To that end, a rebate program is available through December 24 to help you get a heat pump tune-up (save \$90), upgrade your heat pump (\$250), and seal leaky ducts in your heating system (\$125) to help direct hot air to where it warms you not to building cavities. To get details on this rebate program go to **dom. com/savenowVA**. To take advantage of these rebates, work must be completed by December 24 and the rebate application must be submitted by February 7, 2017.

If you are ready to deeply understand opportunities for energy efficiency and greater comfort in your home, a blower door test and energy analysis of your home is in order. I've had a blower door test done on my home and had the home tightened up. My home is more comfortable, and my energy bills are lower. Do a Google search for "home energy auditors 22180" and interview about three different auditors – see what they include in their services and for what price. Do they rank the most cost effective actions that can be taken? Have the audit done and then start to knock off the most wasteful problems. You'll be glad you did!

# **Community Center Renovation and Expansion Update**

- installing masonry piers on the east wall of the administrative area to support the wall
- starting north wall foundation
- installing steel framing, joists, and decking along north side of building after north wall is complete



- beginning installation of support steel for roof top units (RTUs) above Corridor 166 and new gym corridor
- installing mechanical ductwork in new gym
- continuing installation of new gym west exterior wall
- installing conduit and wiring for new gym light fixtures as well as lighting bases
- beginning sprinkler installation in new gym.

A community center renovation update is presented each month at 6:30 p.m. prior to the Town Council work session. The public is encouraged to attend these updates in Council Chambers at Town Hall. The next update will be presented November 14.



The November 2001 newsletter reported that Town Council was set to vote at its November 19 meeting on raising the meals tax from 3% to 4%. The proposed increase (which was approved 6-1) would provide funds to acquire property at the corner of Maple Avenue and Mill Street, where the Town Green stands today, for "development and preservation of green space in the center of Town and to fund the next phase of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project along Vienna's main business corridor." The meals tax increase was to be effective from January 2002-June 30, 2008, when it would revert back to 3%.
