Public art piece to honor late mayor, community volunteers



f late Mayor M. Jane Seeman were still here, she'd be excited about the public art piece for which Town Council approved a down payment at its December 5 meeting. The former mayor, who passed away in February 2014, would be thrilled that something that will enhance and bring together the Vienna community is one step closer to becoming reality, says her daughter, Councilmember Linda Colbert. But had she learned that the bronze sculpture was to be installed, in part, in her honor, her daughter says that Seeman would have said something like: "What? For me? What?! Oh gosh, they shouldn't do that for me."

"Taking Flight," a bronze sculpture of two children reading and playing atop a stack of five books, is to be installed, hopefully over the coming year, as the Vienna Public Art Commission's inaugural project. The statue, created by Texas artists Seth and Missy Vandable, was selected to honor the late mayor and all Vienna community volunteers. "By recognizing Jane Seeman," says Public Arts Commission member Tara Ruszkowski, "we're recognizing the importance of all of those who live, work, and give to the community. We're really excited to have this first piece underway because public art energizes a community by humanizing and invigorating its public spaces."

When people see the "Taking Flight" statue, Colbert says she has no doubt that it will remind those who knew her of her

mother, who not only served as Town mayor for 14 years (and on Council four years before that), but also taught preschool, volunteered more than 3,000 hours with the Patrick Henry Library (always on Tuesday evenings), served her community through several schools and other organizations, and was known to her grandchildren's friends as "Grammy Mayor."

"Just the other day," Colbert says, "someone was telling me how great [my mother] was with kids.... And reading

Vienna puts (bike) pedal to the metal – and comes up bronze

he Town of Vienna closed out 2016 with some news worth ringing a (bicycle) bell about: The League of American Bicyclists recognized the Town as a bronze-level Bicycle Friendly Community. This difficult-toachieve recognition is shared by 11 other communities in Virginia and a total of 404 communities nationwide.

The Bicycle Friendly Community designation recognizes Vienna's commitment to improving conditions for bicycling through investment in bicycling promotion, education programs, infrastructure, and pro-bicycling policies.

Mayor Laurie DiRocco says: "We recognize that by supporting bicycling we can improve the environment as well as the health and well-being of residents, reduce congestion and automobile parking demands, increase opportunities for residents of all ages to participate socially and economically in the community, and encourage additional choices in travel modes, particularly among seniors and children."

"We applaud these communities for making bicycling a safe and convenient option for transportation and recreation," says Bill Nesper, vice president of programs at the League of American Bicyclists. "We are encouraged by the growing number of leaders who see bicycling as a way to build more vibrant, healthy, sustainable, and connected communities."

The Town's Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) took the lead in seeking the Bicycle Friendly Community award, submitting an application in August and receiving notification in November. Among Vienna's bicycle-friendly achievements and characteristics, notes BAC Chair Beth Eachus, are programs such as its bike rodeo, participation in bike-to-school and bike-to-work events, wayfinding signage, the W&OD trail, and the fact that, with the exception of Maple Avenue and Nutley Street, the speed limit throughout Town is 25 miles per hour.

"This award reflects the commitment that the Town has made to making our

community bike friendly," says Eachus.

Charlie Strunk, the BAC member who drafted the Bicycle Friendly Community application, notes that the number of Vienna children riding bicycles to school – on a daily basis not just on designated bike-to-school days – has quadrupled in the past two years.

The BAC members point out that 40%

of all motorized vehicle trips are to destinations less than 2 miles away. "You can pretty much go anywhere in Vienna in less than 2 miles," says Eachus.

Strunk adds: "One of our committee goals is to install more bike racks throughout Town to encourage people to use bikes for transportation purposes as well as recreation."

Moving forward, Vienna's BAC will continue to encourage biking as a realistic alternative transportation option and work to implement some of the recommendations from the League of American Bicyclists to achieve silver certification, including additional bicycle safety education programs and networks to better utilize low-speed streets.

was something that was very important to her. She thought people should always be learning and reading."

Colbert adds that her mother would be delighted to be honored by a piece of public art. "Anything that will make people in Vienna happy.... She loved seeing people out and about and gathering. She loved to see the community gathering, and a piece of art does that – it attracts people to it."

At its December 5 meeting, Town Council voted to approve a 10% down payment of \$3,900 for the approximately 7-foot sculpture, as recommended by the Vienna Public Art Commission in order to lock into the current \$39,000 price. The total cost of the artwork, along with an approximately 3-foot stained concrete base, is \$47,000.

The public art commission, which was formed about 18 months ago, grew out of the Mayor M. Jane Seeman Memorial Committee, which was established in March 2014. Currently the commission has about \$17,000 for the sculpture, donated by individuals, businesses, and civic organizations who, shortly following her death, wished to honor Seeman. The art commission and other groups anticipate raising the additional \$30,000 over the next several months.

Donations are being accepted online at **viennava.gov.** In addition, a group of interested citizens is organizing a February 9 "Become a mover and shaker" fundraiser at Jammin' Java.

"We feel that this statue not only represents Mayor Seeman's values," says Public Arts Commission Chair Midge Biles, "it also reflects the identity of our Town, its education, imagination, and community – along with a splash of playfulness."

The artwork will not be installed until all funds have been raised. While the public art commission has recommended that the statue be installed at the Town Green, Council has requested that the Board of Architectural Review work with the commission to consider this and other possible public locations.

2017 Legislative Agenda: Vienna's wish list

ach year Del. Mark Keam (D-35th) and Sen. Chap Petersen (D-34th) meet with Vienna Town Council to discuss legislative items the Town would like to see addressed at the General Assembly in January. Legislative cornerstones related to the Town's infrastructure, such as transportation, water quality, and community development, remain on this year's Legislative Agenda. Council also requested that its state representatives address a couple of new items:

- Wireless telecommunication providers The Town wants to maintain its legal authority to review public right-of-way applications for land on which companies may wish to place telecommunication structures.
- Airbnbs The Town wants to keep its authority to review and regulate short-term rental activity. Specifically, the Town wants to maintain its current zoning and tax authority over Airbnbs.

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Let it snow! Not really - but if it does, the Town is ready

ast year, old man winter packed a wallop of a snowstorm. The Town utilized 600 tons of salt, 200 tons of sand, 2,000 gallons of salt brine, and 1,000 gallons of magnesium chloride to battle the January 2016 blizzard. That's a lot of chemistry.

As always, whatever will be – will be – but the Town's public works department has a couple of new tools in the toolbox to battle the elements this year, should the need arise: improved plows, larger chemical tanks, and two brand new snow-blowing Bobcats.

The 2,000 gallons of salt brine used last year were distributed utilizing a 200-gallon tank. Brine is placed on streets in anticipation of a snow and helps prevent ice from forming on the roadway, so speedy application is of the essence. This year, public works will utilize a 975-gallon tank, slicing transportation and prep time for a quicker preemptive strike against icy roads.

The new plows are slightly bigger and more curved so snow does not flow over the top of the plow and go right back on the street. The major benefit of the new plows, says Fleet Maintenance Coordinator Mary-Beth Palmer, is the ease of access to the pistons that drive the main mechanism. On previous versions the entire plow would have to be disassembled in order to reach the pistons and, in the event of a breakdown, repairs could take north of two hours. Now, with the pistons right on top, repairs take about 30 minutes.

The Bobcats serve a dual purpose. Not only do they suck up the snow from streets and sidewalks, but one of them can also throw the collected snow into an accompanying truck that hauls



it to an off-site location. The new machines gather more snow more quickly and are expected to be particularly helpful in clearing sidewalks in heavy snows.

With any luck there will not be another snowmageddon this year, but just in case there is, the Town is ready. Stay warm, Vienna.



Staying green when it's white outside

ere are a few tips for surviving winter weather in an eco-friendly way.

Lower your thermostat,

especially at night. This simple strategy conserves energy, saving you money and reducing emissions of greenhouse gases that cause global climate change. Set your thermostat to no higher than 68°F when you are home and awake, and even lower when you are asleep or away. You can save about 2% on your heating bill for every degree that you lower your thermostat, according to the American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy.

Stay warm by putting on a sweater or extra blanket, keeping drapes and doors

closed, and caulking around windows and doors to insulate your house. If you have a furnace or boiler, install a programmable thermostat that automatically adjusts temperature settings each day.

Burn dry wood only. Wet wood burns incompletely, releasing particulate matter and other pollutants into the air. Never burn household garbage, colored paper, or plastic or foam materials, which can release harmful chemicals.

Use non-toxic household cleaners. Windows and doors stay closed in winter months, so fumes from chemical products concentrate in the air you breathe.

Use non-toxic deicers. Salt and chemical deicers contain hazardous compounds that leach into soil and run off into water, damaging trees, vegetation, and aquatic life. These

compounds burn paws and skin, harm children who ingest them, and corrode roads and vehicles. Safer alternatives include alfalfa meal (found at local nurseries) and deicers made from calcium magnesium acetate (CMA). Try Bare Ground, Melt, SafePaw, or NaturalAlternative IceMelt, available at Home Depot and Amazon. Make sure to physically remove as much snow as possible before applying a deicer.

Keep generators outside and away from doors, windows, and vents. Generators release carbon monoxide, an odorless and deadly gas.

ienna Voice asked the Town's department directors and town manager what might be on the horizon for 2017 and what they're excited about working on in the coming year. Here's a department-by-department glimpse at their responses.

Town Manager

"I'm excited about re-opening the community center," says Town Manger Mercury Payton.

While the renovation and construction project has presented many challenges since construction got underway in September 2015, including unexpected water damage to and instability of existing foundation walls, additional costs, and scheduling issues, Payton says that the finished facility will be something that "everyone will be able to celebrate."

The re-created community center, now anticipated to be substantially complete sometime in the second half of 2017, is designed to better serve the needs of a 21st century community with gathering and recreational spaces for sports, classes, activities, and events. The Vienna Community Center serves as a hub of community-building activity, Payton says, and the completed center will enhance not only the variety and quality of programming offered, but also residents' experience of the facility itself.

More details about what the completed facility will offer and an update on construction progress will be in a near-future edition of *Vienna Voice*.

Communications & Marketing

Marketing experts say, notes Communications and Marketing Manager Lynne DeWilde, that your community brand is what people say about you when you're not around. In 2017, the Town will undertake a branding campaign that will utilize qualitative research with stakeholders throughout the community to obtain an understanding of the Town's personality and brand position. And, using that information, the Town will hold a juried design competition to create a logo that graphically represents Vienna's brand.

Finance

Maintaining the Town's AAA bond rating will always be newly appointed Finance Director Marion Serfass's top priority. However, she is not satisfied with the currently limited information available to staff members and residents, so she aims to change the conversation to better illuminate how the Town manages its funds and priorities.

"We want to better tell the story internally and externally of what each department does," says Serfass, "and the new Munis software will help everyone read along. In 2017 Munis will house all information regarding real estate, utilities, and business licenses so everything can be accessed through a simple inquiry."

After reporting becomes fully streamlined, through the system upgrade to Munis, for in-house purposes, Serfass plans to work with colleagues to create online, dashboard reporting that is accessible to residents.

Human Resources

The Town's human resources department constantly reexamines efficiency and looks for opportunities for improvement, and 2017 is different only because it will be even better. Human Resources Director Maggie Kain says that 2017 will bring a strong emphasis on leadership and team coaching as well as performance monitoring.

"When employees trust their supervisors and their commitments, then everyone feeds off of it and provides the very best service," says Kain, reflecting on a bevy of recent management training programs provided to supervisors as well as teambuilding and leadership opportunities for the Town's department directors.

Information Technology

"Once the Town's Munis software implementation is complete, it will be a one-stop shop for many Town services," says Information Technology Director Tony Mull.

IT is looking to streamline all business interactions residents may have with the Town, including paying bills, zoning inquiries, and even making service requests, all through the ease of the Munis system.

With the addition of a Munis-based application, if someone sees a pothole or

an obstruction or a code violation, they can request that the situation be addressed through almost any portable device or computer. And while they are at it, they can make sure that their water bills are up to date and that their fees for any zoning permits are paid.

IT also will update police recordkeeping in 2017 via Tyler New World.

Parks & Recreation

Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman will continue, of course, to focus on the community center in 2017.

A full-sized basketball court in the new gym is one of the most anticipated features of the improved community center. The regulation-sized gym creates opportunities for additional community engagement and new recreational activities.

"As the parks and rec department prepares to get back up to full steam – and then some," says Herman, "it's important to develop community networking and make sure that staff is properly trained in the industry's best practices."

Planning & Zoning

Planning and Zoning Director Patrick Mulhern says that his department's focus on updating the Town's zoning ordinance, which was last significantly modified in 1969, will bring the ordinance more in line with state code and how development actually works. The update also will reduce the need for variances and modifications.

The department also plans to develop design standards and guidelines for the Maple Avenue Commercial zone and to undertake a transportation study of Maple Avenue that will focus on transportation alternatives. Community engagement will be key components of each of these efforts.

Looking more long term, likely beyond 2017, Mulhern says, the department will re-master plan all of the Town's parks to ensure that they are meeting current community needs and take a look at enhancing the Town's gateway and wayfinding signage.

Police

With the lowest turnover rate the Vienna Police Department has seen in years, the department, says Chief Jim Morris, is in a great position to maximize community involvement.

"We loved putting on the Cops & Kids Fun Run," says Morris. "With a steady staff and freshly focused effort on our community outreach, we want to push to host more events like it."

The chief sees the police department's public information officer taking a more proactive role. Working to prevent scams of elderly residents and having the public information officer attend community meetings and events around Town are priorities for the new year.

In addition, the department will flush out details this year for a new police station, which is one of the upcoming projects anticipated in the Town's capital improvement plan.

Public Works

One of the most significant changes that all residents need to be aware of, says Public Works Director Mike Gallagher, is that beginning July 1 yard waste will no longer be accepted in plastic bags. The Town will no longer pick up yard waste in plastic bags after that date because Fairfax County will no longer accept them. The plastic bags, the county notes, get consistently caught in machinery used to process yard waste resulting in equipment failure and maintenance requirements.

Several improvement projects are scheduled for the coming year, including:

- new sidewalk along one side of Marshall Road SW from Rachel Lane to Trowbridge Lane as well as traffic-calming and pedestrian circulation improvements from Delilah Drive SW to Hillcrest Drive SW; this project will require road redesign and closures
- Mill Street NE Road reconstruction, which will include minor improvements to existing stormwater drainage inlets
- Wolftrap Creek stream restoration, from where the creek crosses Follin Lane SE upstream to the Town limit. ♥

Community Center Renovation and Expansion Update

The following has been achieved according to most recent construction progress reports:

- Installed curbs around pervious pavement parking areas and sidewalks along north parking areas. Finished grading drive for future paving. Installed base material for pavement areas and asphaltic base pavement in north parking area.
- Sprinkler piping installation 96% complete. Routed mains through ceilings and second floor storage area.
- Installed brick around openings to first and second floor rooms. Set beam plates for mechanical unit support beams.
- Installed CMU walls in family restroom, staff locker room, and east wall of administrative area.
- Masonry foundation and exterior wall on north wall completed. Installed foundation drain along north wall to remove water.
- Set beams in administrative area for support of mechanical rooftop units. Set steel angles for support of Tectum roof panels at north wall.
- Completed demolition of auxiliary gym floor slab and exterior walls. Evaluating soil

condition in vicinity of foundation to confirm ability to carry new loads.

- Poured concrete slab infill in various rooms.Continued laying brick around new lobby.
- Installed masonry shafts around ductwork in new gym as well as entry ceiling hollow core planks.
- Final footings and piers poured for lobby.
- Air barrier install completed and some repairs made. Project manager reviewed surfaces and found additional repairs are required.
- Installed rough-in in new family restrooms.
- Installed feeder conduit in north wall and new feeder cable to electrical panels in admin area.
- New roof on gym 40% complete; awaiting approval of components. Received letter from manufacturer on use of underlayment as air barrier–approved by architect. Roofing installation may now proceed with approved products.
- Installed and tested sprinklers in new gym.
 Set steel columns and beams for corridor 162
- and lobby.
- Set doors and installed hardware in new gym and storage areas.

Looking ahead, next steps include:

- Starting concrete sidewalks and barriers.
- Beginning grading at north parking areas.
 Removing and reinstalling mineral wool on new gym walls.
- Installing masonry on auxiliary gym walls one week after footings installed.

They're not just train hobbyists. They're regional historians.

hen you walk into the old train depot along the W&OD trail between Mill Street and Dominion Road, now home to the Northern Virginia Model Railroaders Club (NOVA Model Railroaders), you won't just find a box within a box – i.e. a model railroad inside an old station of a real-life railroad. Instead, the massive replica of the Western North Carolina Railroad physically manifests American history and culture, and NOVA Model Railroader members' sociological knowledge of the many towns, peoples, and places re-creates an era in your imagination. Welcome to the early mid-20th century.

NOVA Model Railroaders President Sandy Robeck takes pride not just in replicating the railroad that ran between Salisbury and Asheville in western North Carolina, which he said was built by "electrical geniuses," but also in scripting everyday scenes from the era, circa 1957.

Club members create events from their imaginations that might have taken place at the time and actions people likely performed every day. One scene involves workers in a lumberyard, which is adjacent to a scene of a mother holding her child and waiting for the train while a man nearby reads the paper. Other scenes include a crew of mountain climbers, a highway accident attended to by fire and rescue, and even a hobo camp.

During the Church Street Holiday Stroll in November, when the depot was open to the public, club members "put the Polar Express on the tracks so Santa could go around the town and see who's been naughty and who's been nice," says Robeck.

One of the points the railroad reflects about the era is its industry. Throughout the line's snaking path, various mountains and towns house woodwork areas and factories, tobacco plants, and even a majestic theater (currently showing Abbot and Costello's *Meet the Mummy*).

The railroaders also show some love for local Vienna industry; miniatures of a Rexall and one of Jud Tile can be seen with people shopping, eating, and carrying on various activities while art deco automobiles pass by.

Looking down at a civilization's mosaic creates a little theater in the mind as models of Oldsmobile 88s honk in traffic, gentlemen tip their fedoras in polite fashion, and a child in a sailor outfit begs his mother for a treat from an ice cream stand. The silent picture allows viewers to create their own unique stories and dialogue for the pieces.

NOVA Model Railroaders typically hold an open house once each month. (Check the printed Town calendar for dates.) You'll find it's definitely worth stopping in. It's like cutting out a hole directly into the past and seeing – up close and in a miniature – a world from not so long ago. For more information, visit **nvmr.org.**)
