Vienna's 'green' Walk on the Hill is here to stay

his year's 43rd stroll through gardens throughout the Windover Heights Historic District on Sunday, April 30, will include, for the second time and by popular demand, the Green Expo. The yards and gardens of approximately 50 homes in the Town's northwest historic district will be open to visitors as part of the annual Walk on the Hill from 2-5 p.m.

"As long as we have weather as perfect as last year, the event pretty much happens on its own," says Councilmember Carey Sienicki, a Windover Heights resident who is again organizing the event with Historic Vienna, Inc. "Residents get to enjoy – and share – the beautiful scenes of their gardens as a backdrop to the homes and neighborhood, which pairs so well with the Green Expo."

Last year, the Community Enhancement Commission's Green Expo found itself homeless due to the Community Center renovation and expansion project, but pairing the event with Walk on the Hill turned out to have a bright silver lining.

"The Walk makes a perfect atmosphere for the Expo, it's almost seamless," says Community Enhancement Commission Chair Susan Stillman. "Now the Expo has a living

Vote, vote, vote May 2

own of Vienna residents will cast votes for three Vienna Town Council seats at the May 2 Town elections. Voting will take place from 6 a.m.-7 p.m. at Vienna Presbyterian Church, 124 Park Street NE.

Three seats are available and three candidates, all incumbents, are on the ballot. Carey Sienicki, Howard Springsteen, and Tara Voigt are running for re-election. Information provided by candidates is available on page 6 of this newsletter.

Residents who are registered to vote will cast three ballots, one for each of the available seats. Only registered voters (as of April 10) who live within the Town of Vienna limits may cast ballots in this election. To vote in the state of Virginia, acceptable photo identification is required. Valid identification includes a Virginia driver's license or DMV-issued photo ID, U.S. passport, employer- or school-issued photo ID, among others; visit **elections. virginia.gov** for more information about photo identification and other electionrelated information.

The deadline to request that an absentee ballot be mailed to you is April 25. For more information, visit **fairfaxcounty.gov/** elections.





Spring brings road improvement projects

h, spring...blooms, warmer temperatures, and roadwork! The Town of Vienna will undertake repairs and repaving along Mill Street beginning late April or early May. (As this newsletter was going to print, the Town anticipated firming up the start date by the first of April.) The Town has been awaiting consistently warmer temperatures before undertaking the road construction, as recommended by manufacturers of some of the materials to be used.

The road construction project will extend from Ayr Hill Avenue to 430 Mill Street. The Town is contracting with Ardent Company of McLean to undertake the four- to five-week project, which will be completed in five phases:

- Phases 1 and 3, combined, extend along the north side of Mill Street within the project area.
- Phase 2 extends along the entire south side of the roadway.
- Phase 4 repairs the Ayr Hill intersection.
- Phase 5 resurfaces the entire project area.

In order to minimize duration of the project and its overall impact on the corridor, much of the work will continue overnight. Access to businesses and parking areas will be available at all times, but traffic will be restricted to one lane with traffic control provided 24 hours/ day. Those not traveling to Mill Street businesses are encouraged to find other routes. No utility disruptions are anticipated.

"This is going to be a big project," says Project Engineer Luis Blandon, "and we know it will be somewhat disruptive to the Mill Street businesses and their customers. We really appreciate their patience and cooperation. This repair project is badly needed, and the Town is committed to completing it as effectively and efficiently as possible."

There's never been a better time to go solar

ith solar pricing having dropped precipitously over recent years, there has never been a better time to harness the sun to generate your power locally and save money. And the 2017 Solarize program offers additional financial incentive by providing vetted contractors and pre-negotiated terms and prices for photovoltaic panels.

Offered April 18-June 30, the 2017 Solarize program, a partnership between the Northern Virginia Regional Commission, Local Energy Alliance Program, and the Town of Vienna and other localities, can provide great prices for solar through the power of group purchasing. On top of reduced prices due to increased adoption of solar energy and improved technology, the negotiated Solarize pricing makes this spring the time for residents – and businesses, too – to take the solar plunge.

As an additional financial incentive, don't forget that there is a 30% solar investment tax credit currently available from the federal government. This tax credit will sunset in a couple of years. Also, Virginia residents can "net meter" excess energy generated by their solar systems, receiving a credit at the full retail rate; homeowners and businesses can then use that credit during times when the sun isn't shining.

To get a peek at how your home or business would fare with solar installation, check out the award-winning tool **novasolarmap.com**. When you type in your address, this tool analyzes your roof, its orientation, and shading and calculates how much solar power could be generated. Generating your own energy is a hedge against future increases in the cost of electricity provided by utility companies.

Those thinking about going solar can speak with a Windover Heights family who has taken the plunge at the Green Expo, which will be held 2-5 p.m. April 30 in conjunction with Walk on the Hill. Councilmember Carey Sienicki and her husband, David, purchased a 9-kilowatt system 18 months ago for their all-electric home. For the Sienickis, it was essential that the system pay for itself in 10 years or less. At Green Expo, they'll share their experience and data and answer your questions.

The Community Enhancement Commission will host a Solarize informational meeting next month at which interested homeowners and business owners can discuss solar installation with this year's selected Solarize vendors. More details will be available in next month's *Vienna Voice* and on the Town's Facebook page. In the meantime, if you're ready to sign up for a free solar assessment or just want more details, visit **solarizenova.org.** We know that questions and concerns don't come up only when Town Hall is open, 8 am-4:30 pm Monday-Friday, so the Town has created an "after hours" phone menu to help you leave a message for the appropriate department.

A ceremonial salute to five of Vienna's finest

ive of Vienna's finest were among fire, rescue, and police representatives from throughout Northern Virginia who were recognized at the 39th Annual Valor Awards presented March 17. Vienna police officers Gregory Hylinski, Matthew Lyons, Mike Reeves, Patrick Shaw, and Andrew Slebonick, each received Valor awards, presented by the Northern Virginia Chamber of Commerce, for their heroic actions in the field.

Officers Shaw and Slebonick received the Bronze Medal of Valor, awarded for unusual personal risk beyond the call of duty or displaying unusual judgment, zeal, or ingenuity beyond what is normally expected.

In the wee hours of January 31, 2016, Shaw and Slebonick diffused a situation in which a disturbed woman had taken a large amount of prescription medication and was threatening suicide while holding a knife and lighter. The subject had self-inflicted lacerations on her arm and grew more agitated when the officers approached to calm her down. After the subject was briefly distracted, the officers were able to disarm and secure her and immediately transported her for medical and mental health treatment.

Reeves, Hylinski, and Lyons received the Lifesaving Award for an incident that occurred on July 20. All three officers responded to a dispatched call from a woman concerned that her daughter planned to commit suicide.

Upon the officers' arrival at an apartment, the daughter barricaded herself behind a door, which she blocked with a bookcase and other debris. After forcing entry through the door, officers found multiple pill vials and alcohol containers in disarray around the room. Upon hearing running water from the bathroom, the officers breached through that door and found the subject completely submerged, face down and unresponsive in the tub.

The officers pulled the woman out of the tub only to find a gunlock cable tied around her neck and large amounts of ingested water in her airway. Officers took turns administering and facilitating CPR

until rescue personnel arrived. The officers were able to cut the gunlock cable off with bolt cutters while rescue personnel administered medical assistance.

The woman was transported to the hospital, where it was determined that she had ingested large amounts of multiple prescription drugs and alcohol. She eventually made a full recovery.

"These two events involving our officers clearly demonstrate tremendous bravery and clear decisiveness on their part," says Deputy Chief Daniel Janickey. "We are proud of these five officers and how they performed and their level of teamwork during these life-threatening events. It's a pleasure to see them being recognized with distinguished Valor Awards."

Vienna, meet your brand

hile the Town of Vienna has utilized a variety of symbols and graphic elements over the course of its long history, the Town has never had an official logo. The Town's marketing and communications office is working to change that. A two-pronged process for developing a visual symbol, or the Town's official logo, is currently getting underway. Ultimately, the logo will identify Town programs, events, publications, and initiatives as well as enhance and reinforce residents' strong sense of connection to their community.

"Strong brands – think the 'Just Do It' swoosh or the apple with a bite out of it – help organizations stand out in the crowded marketplace," says Communications and Marketing Manager Lynne DeWilde. "A community's brand, which runs much deeper than the graphic symbol it adopts, is an important element in creating a strong sense of place and an enduring connection to that community."

The first step in the Town's image-building process is to work with a consultant agency to conduct research with Vienna stakeholders in order to unveil the Town's brand – or its attributes, personality, and values. As this newsletter goes to press, the Town is working to select a firm from among 16 who responded to Vienna's request for proposals.

That firm will reach out to stakeholders – residents, elected officials, staff, businesspeople – through focus groups, interviews, and surveys throughout the spring. Be on the lookout for information about how you can participate in this process through the Town's website and social media pages as well as this newsletter.

"Town Council has expressed a strong interest in engaging a wide variety of stakeholders in this process," says DeWilde. "We plan to work with a company that can creatively and effectively engage our stakeholders."

A brand positioning statement, defining Vienna's essence, mission, and values, is expected to be presented early this summer. From there, the Town anticipates hosting a logo design competition to create the graphic symbol of Vienna's brand. \checkmark

Public art hitting its stride

ith three current projects underway, a successful fundraising event completed, and plans to investigate the feasibility of establishing a 501c3, public art efforts in Vienna appear to be hitting their stride.

More than 150 people attended the Movers & Shakers fundraising event at Jammin' Java February 11. Vienna Public Art Commission (VPAC) Chair Midge Biles says the event was "a huge success," raising just over \$18,000. That's part of the nearly \$42,000 that's been raised in total, by various groups, toward the \$47,000 needed to purchase Vienna's first official public art piece, Taking Flight, a bronze statue to be installed at the Vienna Community Center in memory of late Mayor Jane Seeman and in honor of Vienna volunteers. In addition to the statue, created by Texas artists Seth and Missy Vandable, VPAC is working with art teachers at Vienna schools to engage students this spring in creating temporary paintings on sections of plywood that will be installed on the construction fences at the community center, facing the ball fields and Cherry Street.

VPAC also is working with Melanie and Nathan Rothstein who are interested in donating a customized LOVE sign for public display.

"We've been a little slow in taking off," Biles says of the VPAC, "because we've been working to lay a strong foundation that we hope will be around for decades. But now I feel like we're hitting our stride and gaining momentum. We're excited to work with the community to express itself through public art – not just through one piece, but over a body of public art." \checkmark

Walk over to Town Hall to learn about Town's Pedestrian Master Plan

t the request of Town Council, the Town's Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC), a subcommittee of the Transportation Safety Commission, has been working to update Vienna's current Pedestrian Master Plan. This is a comprehensive effort that includes a pedestrian vision, goals, and action recommendations for the Town to consider as it builds its pedestrian network.

The updated plan includes five goals:

- provide high-quality, safe, and convenient pedestrian access and facilities
- · complete a walkway network with sidewalks on both sides of all Vienna streets
- · create opportunities for increased walking, bicycling, and public transit
- · promote walkable neighborhoods and a vibrant pedestrian-driven local economy
- work toward a *Walk Friendly* community designation.

Now the PAC wants to hear from you. The PAC will discuss the Pedestrian Master Plan at its next meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 25, at Town Hall. At that meeting, residents are encouraged to share input on what elements they want to see in the updated plan.

Town Council has invited the PAC to present a draft updated plan at its May 15 work session, which begins at 7:30 p.m. Residents will have another opportunity to provide feedback when the final draft of the plan is released for public comment, probably over the summer.

Town's budget presentation deemed 'distinguished' – again

or the 23rd consecutive year, the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) has awarded the Town of Vienna its Distinguished Budget Presentation Award, meaning that the Town has satisfied

nationally recognized guidelines for effective



budget presentation. This recognition is for the Town's fiscal year 2016-17 budget. Vienna was one of 1,565 entities to receive the award from GFOA this year. This recognition indicates that the Town of Vienna's budget proficiently serves as a policy document, financial plan, operations guide, and communications device and meets 14 additional mandatory criteria within these categories.

"Award recipients have pioneered efforts to improve the quality of budgeting and provide an excellent example for other governments throughout North America," GFOA notes in its press release.

Message behind the marker

torm drains throughout the Town of Vienna display an ONLY RAIN marker to help remind citizens that all inlets directly connect to our local streams and the Chesapeake Bay.

These markers are part of the Town's larger efforts to protect our environment through the Environmental Protection Agency's Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE) program. An illicit discharge is disposal or spillage of a substance other than stormwater, including oil, fertilizers, lawn clippings, paints, or gasoline, into the municipal storm sewer system, which incorporates streets, ditches, inlets, and streams.

The IDDE program focuses on identifying, reporting, and remediating illicit discharges. Citizens are a vital component to the success of the Town's IDDE program. Here are a couple of recommendations that may further these efforts:

- Report any potential illicit discharges, including leaking dumpsters, to the Department of Public Works at 703-255-6380 or **DPW@viennava.gov.**
- Volunteer to help mark storm drains. The Town provides the tools and supplies—you provide the time and manpower.
- Take advantage of the Fairfax County Household Waste Program to dispose of hazardous waste such as gasoline, cooking oil, paint, and insecticides. More information is available at **fairfaxcounty**. **gov/dpwes/trash/disphhw.htm**.

Yard waste disposal: Consider greener alternatives

airfax County has changed its mind, and the Town of Vienna will follow suit. The bottom line? Plastic bags will remain an acceptable way to dispose of yard waste.

The county had planned to put a moratorium on plastic bags for yard waste beginning July 1. But, as sometimes happens, those plans have changed, and the county has determined to continue to accept yard waste in plastic bags. And, thus, so will the Town of Vienna.

Each year, Fairfax County and private haulers manage more than 200,000 tons of yard waste – grass clippings, leaves, and brush – and regularly evaluate alternative methods to plastic bags to encourage recycling. Although plastic bags are still permitted, the Town encourages residents to consider renewable methods of disposal, such as paper lawn bags or reusable containers.


