"ViVa! pushes the pause button on the busyness of our lives," says Cristin Etheredge, festival public relations chair. "It says, 'Come out, let's laugh, be playful, and have fun. Let's let kids be kids.' Who doesn't like to go out and enjoy themselves?

"The festival is a great celebration and an extension of the community," she adds. Construction Inspector Rebecca Greenberg (Public Works)

I had a call to action from former Public Works Director Dennis Johnson, who has a reputation as a big-time biking advocate. He inspired me to take up the hobby, and it sort of changed my life.

It's relaxing to glide into work every morning on the W&OD trail surrounded by peaceful nature. It's almost therapeutic. By taking advantage of the trail, my 5.5-mile commute took no longer than if I were to drive. I even started tracking my mileage, and each time I accumulate a distance equivalent to that of a tank of gas, I dump the unspent cash into my savings account.

Rebecca's rules for the road:

- Be visible and make sure you can hear what's going on around you.
- Don't put full confidence in signs and crosswalks, especially on Maple Avenue.

Recreation Program Coordinator Brian Hanifin (Parks and Rec)

I actually don't bike to work, however, biking is a key component of my dayto-day activity coordination. Particularly during the summer when our camps basically run from dawn till dusk, I make sure to pack my bike. First thing in the morning after parking the car at the office, I bike to all the playgrounds to check on campers, staff, and conditions. Biking additionally makes it easier to traverse parts of Town surrounding the sports fields and parks.

Brian's rules for the road:

• You don't own the road: Maple Avenue is one of the busiest throughways in Northern Virginia, so if you must cross it, make sure to check absolutely everything, especially at night.

Customer Service Specialist Sharmaine Abaied (Finance)

I started the biking commute as a personal challenge, and it became the jumping-off point for other numerous goals in my life. I have a 6.7-mile maze of local streets to snake through each day, a few of which are high-volume routes for driving commuters.... It's funny to bike south on Maple Avenue at the end of the day and get honks of encouragement from other employees headed home in the same direction.

Sharmaine's rules for the road:

 Potential danger is everywhere: Vienna is fortunate to have big, nicely painted crosswalks with clear signage, but no matter what, there is always danger. Be careful not just on Maple Avenue, but also on adjacent traffic-heavy streets, such as Lawyers Road, Locust Street, and Center Street. In the street of th

hether your kid is furiously pedaling a plastic trike down the block or gearing up for some dirt donuts at the park, safety is still the high road. The Town's Parks and Recreation Department in conjunction with the Vienna Police Department will instruct, check, and certify your little roadsters as "street ready" from 9 a.m.-noon Saturday, May 6, at the Bike Rodeo at the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department.

Veteran cyclists and police officers will be on hand to share road-savvy skills, appropriate even for experienced riders. Kids in preschool through sixth grade will get an official helmet check and adjustment (if needed), practice various skills such as braking and balancing, and test their knowledge and aptitude on an obstacle course. Children must bring a helmet in order to participate.

Repaving, replacing, repurposing, and restoring

armer temps, spring blossoms, and improvement projects all seem to go hand in hand. Now that warmer weather is here, the Town's Public Works Department is shifting into high gear and tackling an array of road, sidewalk, and stream restoration projects.

Marshall Road sidewalks

In the southwest, the Town is working (or will be imminently) to rebuild Marshall Road and replace the existing asphalt trail with concrete sidewalk between Trowbridge and Rachel lanes. Additional spot improvements to the roadway and sidewalk will extend beyond that area, from Nutley Street to Hillcrest Drive.

This project, scheduled to begin about the time this newsletter is delivered to homes, will last up to four months and requires either full closure of Marshall Road or reduction to a one-way lane, depending on the section of roadway. Local traffic only will be permitted, and the detour will be marked.

The Town has contracted with A&M Concrete Corporation for approximately \$1.25 million to complete the project. Half of the project will be funded through revenue-sharing Virginia Department of Transportation funds and the other 50% from local transportation funds provided through the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority.

Maple Avenue repaving

The Town will work with Arthur Construction this summer to repave Maple Avenue and replace all sidewalk ramps (as well as some sidewalk sections). The work zone stretches from Beulah Road to James Madison High School. Work is anticipated to begin early in June and will require about 90 days to complete.

Concrete sidewalk, ramps, and curb work will be done during daytime hours with one lane of traffic along Maple Avenue to be closed as necessary. Milling, paving, and striping of the roadway will be done overnight, from 9 p.m.-5 a.m., and



traffic on Maple will be reduced to two lanes, one in each direction.

Access to businesses and pedestrian accessibility will be maintained throughout the project.

The approximately \$1.3 million project is fully funded through state road maintenance funds.

Wolftrap Creek stream restoration

In an extension of a stream restoration project previously completed by Fairfax County, the Town is undertaking restoration of Wolftrap Creek from above Follin Lane to the Town line. The project, which is scheduled to begin late this spring, will improve the aesthetics and flow of the stream, restoring a more natural and healthy wildlife habitat.

No road closures or disruption to vehicular traffic is anticipated, but the trail at Wildwood Park will be closed. Temporary pedestrian access through the park will be provided.

The Town has contracted with Environmental Quality Resources to complete the approximately \$968,000 project. Funds will be provided through the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality Stormwater Local Assistance Fund and Fairfax County stormwater tax funds.

Park your bike on Church Street

As recommended by the Transportation Safety Commission and approved by Town Council last fall, the Town has created a public bicycle parking space on Church Street. Completed in April, the bike corral, which includes a bike rack and planter boxes at 108 Church Street, can park up to six bicycles.

The bicycle parking was carved out of a space that was too small to provide parking for a vehicle. \checkmark

Community organizations will set up tables at the Town Green, offering information about their services and how you can get involved in supporting their missions.

Attendees can "earn" free hand-churned ice cream, provided by Historic Vienna Inc., by visiting various community organization tables and getting their Mayor @ Your Service "passports," to be provided that evening, stamped.

In the spirit of the evening, community members are asked to bring unopened containers of laundry detergent or cooking oil as donations for the Committee for Helping Others.

Mayor @ Your Service is a free event that provides information about Town of Vienna programs and other topics of interest to the community.

Growing opportunities at Vienna Community Learning Garden

ou don't need a green thumb, you need a brown thumb because healthy, living soil is the secret to a great garden." So says Debby Ward, who recently took the reins as new coordinator of the Vienna Community Learning Garden, located between Vienna Elementary and the Community Center.

The chemical-free garden relies on a crew of dedicated volunteers. Ward hopes to seed additional interest by offering practical, hands-on programming that encourages seasoned and aspiring gardeners to work side-by-side.

The spring schedule features weekly meet-ups from 10 a.m.noon Wednesday mornings and garden strolls from 6-7:30 p.m. the third Thursday of each month.

Even if you don't feel like putting your hands in the dirt, the seating area in the center of the garden is a delightful stopping off spot as you're passing by on the W&OD. Just remember to shut the garden gate behind you.

Summer plantings will include Asian and butterfly gardens as well as loads of vegetables, herbs, and edible flowers.

Infiltration trenches help protect streams

any of the new homes constructed throughout Town feature best management practices to help control the quantity and quality of runoff water. One of the most common best management practices is installation of infiltration trenches.

These infiltration trenches, which can easily be disguised with grass and landscaping, serve an important role in protecting our streams. Infiltration trenches are strategically constructed with layers of underground stone for storage, filter fabric, and a shallow sand layer – all of which encourage runoff to infiltrate into the underlying soil while the chemical and physical absorption processes remove pollutants.

Surface depressions with small, capped plastic observation well pipes that hold runoff for a brief period after a rainstorm are a good indicator that there is a designed infiltration trench present.

The standard design features of infiltration trenches and basins can be seen in the accompanying graphic provided by the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality.

Currently more than 30 infiltration trenches have been installed throughout Town, and more are being constructed each year.

It is important for homeowners to recognize and properly maintain stormwater best practices on their property in order to help protect downstream waterways. Stormwater infiltration trenches and other best practices are typically shown on property records and deeds.
