Get to know Vienna's team captain

Steadfast leader champions Town residents and staff



ust as he imagined when he was a child, Mercury Payton is a leader on a team that has a strong batting average and winning record.

"Growing up," says Payton, "I just knew I was going to be a major league baseball player."

Well...not quite. Instead, Payton found his calling on a different kind of team. Except for a brief stint in the family airport passenger business, Payton has proven to be a utility player and steadfast team leader within local government organizations. For the past six years, he has led Team Vienna as town manager.

Despite his flashy first name, selected by his father in homage to Miami Dolphins running back Mercury Morris, Payton's leadership style reflects his quiet, almostshy, people-pleasing, steady personality.

"Mercury doesn't sit at the head of the table, he's part of the team," says Vienna's Human Resources Director Maggie Kain, who also worked with Payton previously on Team Manassas Park. "Mercury really values people and gives them every opportunity to succeed.

"He almost represents what Vienna is all about," she adds. "He's steady, has strong family values, and steers according to a sextant." "I admire Mercury's open door policy, strong communication skills, commitment to training and staff development, and caring for the citizens of Vienna," says Mayor Laurie DiRocco. "Mercury believes in a safe community with a highly trained staff that are committed to serving the citizens of Vienna."

After receiving a bachelor's degree from Hampton University in 1995 and a master's in public administration from the University of Delaware in 1997, Payton fell into a local government career when he went to work for the City of Suffolk, where he was a senior administrative analyst in the city manager's office. Three years later, he moved on to Emporia, where he was assistant city manager, later becoming Emporia's acting city manager.

"If Suffolk is where I learned about the impact of and what local government does," says Payton, "Emporia taught me how to do it. That was where I learned how to work and lead in local government.

"I had known that I wanted to do something that could make a difference in the world, but I didn't know exactly what that was," reflects Payton. "I learned that local government has far more contact with and impact on people's lives than state or federal government. Being immersed in local government right out of school was an eye-opener for me in terms of seeing how it can impact people's lives through issues like improving roads, water supply, emergency service response times, drainage issues, recreational opportunities, and zoning concerns."

In 2003, Payton moved his growing family to Manassas Park, just 15 minutes from where he grew up in Dale City. About 18 months into his career at Team Manassas Park, the city manager left, and

Survey results offer snapshot of Vienna businesses and challenges



esults from a spring survey of Town businesses provide a snapshot of the state of Vienna businesses and the issues they find most challenging. The SurveyMonkey poll had a response rate of about 25%, with 321 of the Town's approximately 1,300 businesses answering questions posed by the Town Business Liaison Committee (TBLC).

Among the most challenging issues facing Vienna businesses, responders identified:

- rental cost and other expenses
- general economic conditions
- changing market conditions
- traffic
- · competition
- · parking and accessibility

In a presentation to Town Council at its June 5 meeting, TBLC Chair Friderike Butler noted that while only 30% of responding businesses rated parking as "poor" or "very poor," those who did so tended to be in commercial and industrial zones, but not necessarily on Maple Avenue, where traffic flow was identified as the larger challenge.

The vast majority of surveyed businesses, 90%, support mixed-use, pedestrian-friendly redevelopment along Maple Avenue. And while a majority of businesses, a little over two-thirds, felt connected to the Town and knowledgeable about Town happenings, they want more information about street closings and Town events.

"TBLC members are committed to keeping our ear to the ground and providing additional support to our Town businesses," says Butler. "We'll work with Town Council and staff as well as the Vienna Business Association to help make our businesses more successful."

The businesses that responded to the survey fit into the following categories:

- services 43%
- home-based 28%
- office in commercial/industrial zones 19%

- individually owned storefront retail 16%
- restaurant/food service 9%

Seventy-five percent of responding businesses have five or fewer employees while 2% have 51 or more.

Payton was once again named acting city manager.

Realizing that local government careers, like his beloved Baltimore Orioles' current season, can sometimes be a rollercoaster ride, Payton accepted his new position on a permanent basis on a condition he thought city leaders would never agree to: He asked for a seven-year contract; they agreed to six years.

At the end of his contract, Payton left Manassas Park to try his hand at the family business, but after six months, he says, "It became pretty clear that I'm supposed to be doing this, and [my parents] are supposed to be doing that."

The still-growing Payton family moved to Vienna in 2011. "Vienna is a great place to raise a family," he says. "It's a community where I feel respected as a professional and valued as an individual. It's a place where ethics and integrity matter."

And ethics and integrity matter mightily to Payton as do professionalism, excellence, compassion, and respect – traits he encourages the Town's staff to exemplify. In a world known increasingly for its vitriol, Vienna's town manager has a reputation for extreme politeness. Consider this: A staff member reports that Payton was leaving Town Hall one day as she was entering the building. The town manager walked back from the parking lot to the building to open the door for her. Nothing else on his mind, he just held the door and then went on his way.

"I most admire the fact that he treats people well and gives people the benefit of the doubt," says Andrea Payton, his wife of nearly 21 years and mother of their seven children, ages 2-17. "He will put others first. In his work, Mercury has always wanted to serve the community well. He's a people person. He likes to be around people and find solutions to problems. He has a servant-leader heart."

She also reports that Payton is "a very fun dad," adding that he's very active with the children. "He'll take them to the park, hang out, shoot hoops, take bikes and scooters to the playground. He's very hands on with them."

For his part, Payton says of his wife, with a smile: "She's very beautiful. She's



gorgeous. We still have fun together. What I appreciate about her and our relationship is that we talk a lot. We're very candid with each other and very respectful of each other, even when we disagree.... I like that she's really smart, which makes arguing with her hard. She's really sharp."

Despite a hectic work schedule, which frequently includes evening meetings and events, Payton makes a point to spend one-on-one time with each of his children, share date nights with his wife, and play basketball on Tuesday evenings.

As important as his family is to him, says his friend and pastor Garrett Kell, Payton is "first and foremost a follower of Jesus. He orients his life around the Lord and around his family."

Payton is an elder at Del Ray Baptist Church in Alexandria where, says Kell, he has helped the congregation think well about how to love one another and encouraged parents to think about how to spend more quality time with their children in order to help them reach their full potential.

"He's a man of extraordinary integrity," says Kell. "When Merc says something, you don't need to take out an insurance policy.... He also doesn't assume that he has it all together and is willing to be corrected and apologize. He's courageous – he's not afraid to have hard conversa-

tions and take a strong stand. That's a rare combination."

Payton says that while his mother shared the Gospel with him when he was a child, it was in his 23rd year and at the beginning of his marriage that both he and Andrea truly started on "a journey...that radically changed our lives."

"We had a desire to have authentic faith that was daily and real, not just a means of crisis management," Payton says.

Kell adds: "Mercury is a man whose life has not always been easy. Some very deep wounds have happened. [As examples, Payton notes being cut from the otherwise all-white high school baseball team, the murder of his cousin in 2003, and a miscarriage.] Mercury would not be happy to say he just learned to overcome. His relationship with Jesus has enabled him to find a peace that is supernatural."

Because Payton is a good team leader, Kell says, "He loves to help other people who come from broken, wounded backgrounds to find that inner peace. That's what makes him a good town manager and pastor – he's aware of the brokenness that we all share."

From a young age, Payton has wanted to help people. "I see local government," he says, "as a place where we can help people every day."

Meet Town's new-ish construction inspector

he Town's new construction inspector is not actually "new," per se. If you've either applied for a building permit or submitted site plans to the Planning and Zoning Department, then you've probably come across Emily Goodman. After 15 years with the Town in various roles. Goodman has traded in her office flats in favor of steeltoed boots as the Public Works Department's new construction inspector.

"I'm excited for the opportunity to take everything I've learned in zoning and apply it as best I can in my new role," says Goodman. "I think I will bring a unique per-



spective, having been on multiple sides of the conversation."

Raise a glass (of water) to toast Vienna

nofilter. That's how clean Vienna's water is. The Town's water supply goes through the most rigorous screening processes available and meets, and often exceeds, federal and state guidelines established by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Virginia Department of Health. Regulations for water systems, such as Vienna's, are even stricter than those for bottled water, which only must meet standards set by the Food and Drug Administration.

TOWN OF VIENNA The Town of Vienna 2017 Annual Water Quality 2017 ANNUAL WATER QUALITY REPORT Report outlines testing and analyses, primarily completed in 2016, for drinking water provided by the Town. Each year, the Town is required to share this report with water system customers. To view the 2017 report, go to viennava.gov/waterreport2017. Printed reports may be requested by calling 703-255-6380.

"Due to our routine monitoring, there are rarely any surprises in the report," says Water Quality Engineer Christine Horner. "It's a great peace of mind knowing that we provide the best quality water possible to our customers. The Town's water has consistently been observed to have low levels of contaminants and therefore has been placed on a reduced EPA monitoring schedule for certain substances. Its high quality also cuts down on cost."

Horner works closely with Fairfax Water and the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments to keep up with industry trends and make improvements each year, ranging from upgrades in monitoring technology to new equipment for motorized water valve operation.

Drink up, Vienna.

Fight the bite



he nation's swampy capital is no stranger to mosquitos in summer, so before you get down to gardenpartying this season make sure you're ready for those suckers.

Adopting strategies to reduce the mosquito population and potential for getting bitten can not only decrease your level of itchiness, but also your chances of contracting mosquito-borne illnesses, such as Zika and West Nile Virus.

Consider these tips.

- Eliminate standing water Pools of water in fountains, tires, pots, cans, etc. are mosquito breeding grounds. Empty standing water at least weekly.
- Avoid peak times Stay indoors at dawn and early evening. (Be aware, though, that mosquitoes that spread Zika are generally aggressive daytime biters.)
- Dress to protect Wear long-sleeved tops, long pants, socks, and EPAapproved insect repellents, which are generally considered safe for everyone, including children and those who are pregnant. Light colors and loose clothing are best.
- Treat clothing with permethrin This insecticide, when used on clothing, remains protective after multiple wash-
- Windows and doors Generally keep them closed and be sure screens are in good repair.

VBA, Town turn out lights on First Night Vienna

he Vienna Business Association (VBA) and Town of Vienna have decided to cancel the First Night New Year's Eve event – permanently.

While the event fits well with Vienna's family-oriented focus, says VBA Executive Director Peggy James, it could be difficult and expensive logistically due both to cold weather and the holiday season. The VBA funded the event from proceeds from its Oktoberfest event, for which attendance had been impacted the past two years by rainy weather.

The Town, says Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman, decided not to take up sponsorship of the event due, in part, to its high cost as well as to allow staff members, who work many holiday events already, to enjoy the winter holiday season with their families.

The Town can offer four Chillin' on Church events for a little more than half of what it costs to stage a single First Night event, adds Herman.

"We appreciate the VBA's sponsorship of First Night and several other of the Town's signature events," says Herman, "and we know that several people may be disappointed by this decision, but we hope that they also will appreciate the funding and staffing realities that the VBA and Town faced."

What does public art look like in Vienna?

he Vienna Public Art Commission (VPAC) asked this question of students from various Vienna schools with a mission in mind: Show us.

VPAC Chair Midge Biles came up with the idea while strolling through the up-and-coming Mosaic District. Within a sea of construction and unfinished sections of the mixed-use area, artists have turned many temporary eyesores into a showcase of color. Murals, signs, collages, and other artwork line construction areas and bring vibrancy and identity amidst the temporary pain of construction.

The area around the Vienna Community Center renovation and expansion project has the same problem, thought



Biles, and could benefit from a similar solution. Biles and VPAC invited students from Vienna Elementary. Louise Archer, Flint Hill, Cedar

Lane, and James Madison to showcase Vienna through their artistic talents and help put some art around the community center's construction zone.

"VPAC's goal is to deploy both permanent and temporary art in Vienna to show its character," says Biles. "We are already underway with a permanent 'Taking Flight' statue at the community center in memory of former Mayor Jane Seeman and in honor of all volunteers, but in the meantime we can temporarily use art to alleviate the current situation until the center's opening."

The project also gives a unique voice to the Town's youth. The more than 15 painted wood panels currently displayed



on the fence around the community center construction zone shed light on what's beautiful to younger residents, what hurts them, how the Town looks to them, and what they want themselves and Vienna to be now and in the future.

"Vienna has almost everything: great people, restaurants, shops, musical acts, and events," says Biles. "But for a certain stretch of age between the early and late teens, there's a lack of something. Projects like this can help fill the gap with something visibly engaging to a sometimes overlooked group."

VPAC is full steam ahead in adding additional artworks to other locations in Town. The board has negotiated with owners of the Vienna Shopping Center to put a large mural across the back of the building. VPAC also is nailing down final steps with the Board of Architectural Review to get a donated LOVE sign installed at the entrance to Northside Park.

"We hope to have our sign put up this fall," says Biles. "Placing it just beyond the Welcome to Vienna sign off the bike path, we think it's going to send the right message."

Bright ideas for light bulb disposal

few years back, traditional incandescent light bulbs became scarce at the local hardware store, and we began to see more compact fluorescent (CFL) and light-emitting diode (LED) light bulbs. This switch was in response to the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007, which required roughly 25% greater energy efficiency by 2014 for many common household lights. (The efficiency bar gets set even higher in 2020.)

Unlike incandescent bulbs, which often give off as much as 90% of their energy as heat rather than light, CFLs and LEDs provide light much more efficiently. Many of us now have a house full of CFL and LED light bulbs, and the question is: How do we appropriately dispose of them?

LED light bulbs are a great lighting option because they last a long time, work well where you need directional light, and do not contain dangerous chemicals. You can dispose of them in the same way that you previously disposed of the old incandescent lights by placing them in your regular trash.

CFL light bulbs also are very energy efficient, last longer than standard incandescent bulbs, and many people prefer these lights for table lamps.

These bulbs contain trace amounts of mercury, so they must be disposed of differently than LEDs.

According to Fairfax County's website, unbroken CFLs should be recycled. To learn how to recycle unbroken CFL lights in Fairfax County, visit fairfaxcounty.

gov/dpwes/recycling/mat-light.htm. If a CFL bulb is broken, you need to carefully clean up the bulb to avoid spreading the powder, which contains mercury. For instructions on proper cleanup and disposal of broken CFL light bulbs, go to the Environmental Protection Agency's website at epa.gov/cfl/cleaning-broken-cfl.

CFLs and LEDs are environmentally friendly lighting options – be sure to dispose of them properly to enhance sustainability!

The following has been achieved according to the most recent construction progress reports:

- Sidewalk installation and landscaping continue around the site.
- Sprinkler and light fixture installation as well as rough-in of electrical, mechanical, and plumbing are ongoing.

- Beginning metal coping and fascia on the roof.
- Installing the rooftop screen wall.

In the July 2012 Town newsletter, then-Councilmember Edythe Kelleher wrote an article that celebrated Historic Vienna Inc.'s efforts to get the Freeman Store and Museum included on the National Register of Historic Places.

HVI members spent three years working through an "extremely complex, tedious, and demanding" process to successfully get the store, which was constructed in 1879 and purchased by the Town in 1969, accepted on the National Register.
