Town of Vienna adopts new logo

ienna Town Council capped off a communityintensive, five-month brand development process by adopting a new Town logo at its September 25 meeting. The logo was officially launched at the Town's annual Halloween Parade October 25.

The Town's new logo was created by Ashton Design of Baltimore, following an open logo design competition announced in July. Seventeen statements



since 1890

of interest were received from graphic design firms and professionals from around the country; six graphic design firms, two of which are based in Vienna, were invited to each present three logo concepts for the Town's consideration.

"We're excited to have a new official Town logo," says Communications and Marketing Manager Lynne DeWilde, "and we're looking forward to finding consistent and fun ways to use the logo to help us better promote Vienna's brand as an authentic small town with an independent streak and very strong sense of community. The new logo, we hope, will be a rallying symbol of Vienna's strong community pride, active lifestyle, and nurturing nature."

Ashton's final logo design presents three iconic Town facilities – Town Hall, the Freeman Store and Museum, and the Town Green stage – in a customized drawing that provides a unique composite of the buildings, reflecting on the connectivity of the Vienna community.

"Our team enjoyed the challenge of creating an authentic and recognizable logo for the Town of Vienna," says Jenny Romei Hoffman, creative director with Ashton Design. "The Town's strong sense of pride and community felt best expressed through

Where to vote in Vienna this month

own of Vienna residents who typically vote at the Vienna Community Center (precinct 214 Vienna #2) will vote at the temporary precinct location at Vienna Elementary School for the November 7 Virginia gubernatorial and House of Delegate races. According to the Fairfax County Office of Elections, state law requires that no precinct changes be enacted within 60 days of a general election; the community center did not reopen in time to move the precinct for the November 2017 elections.

Here's a list of Town of Vienna precincts and their polling locations for the upcoming election:

- 213 Vienna #1: Cunningham Elementary
- 214 Vienna #2: Vienna Elementary (will return to the Vienna Community Center for May Town and subsequent elections)
- 216 Vienna #4: Cedar Lane School
- 218 Vienna #6: James Madison High School

Polling locations will be open 6 a.m.-7 p.m. November 7; valid photo identification is required to vote.

the iconic places where people gather. The simple illustration of the landmarks is friendly and inviting—just like the Town and its people."

In the logo design, the stage represents Vienna's sense of fun and activity and represents one of



the primary places where the community gathers. The Freeman Store, of course, represents the Town's history and its fondness for traditions. And Town Hall was selected because it is the Town's logo and Town Hall represents Vienna as an independent, small-town community in the midst of urbanized Northern Virginia. "Since 1890," which is included in the main logo, represents the year that the Town was incorporated. The colors featured in the new logo are red and gray.

Several variations of the logo, incorporating shaded, circle-shaped backgrounds or "Virginia" or Town department names, also will be utilized.

When the Town shared the newly adopted logo on social media last month, it received more than 160 likes on Facebook and Twitter. However, the majority of comments posted to Facebook were negative.

"We want to acknowledge that some people don't like the new logo," says DeWilde. "And that's not surprising with something as subjective as a logo or piece of art or iconic structure. We were interested to learn that when it opened in 1889 the Eiffel Tower generated a lot of harsh criticism and was labeled 'monstrous.' We're not saying that the Town's new logo will ever be as beloved as the Eiffel Tower is now, just that change can be hard, sometimes things need to grow on you, and everyone has differing opinions."

Robert Pace, creative director with Allen Wayne, who designs the *Vienna Voice*, was asked to provide feedback on the two final logo concepts that were considered by Town Council. Here's why he says he really likes Vienna's new logo: "First and foremost, it is artistically on trend for modern design. I love the idea of the modern mono line style used to draw significant Vienna buildings. For me that is an instant artistic blend of 'then' and 'now.' I see elegance in its simplicity.... [T]he new logo is clean, which equals excellent versatility. Applying that logo to anything will be a snap."

The new logo was the capstone of a process that began in May with brand research and development, led by Trialogue Studio of Washington, D.C. Through that process, the Town received feedback from more than 100 residents and business owners who participated in face-to-face individual and small-group interviews, 340 people who responded to an online survey,

and live polling from individuals who provided more than 800 responses to questions posed at Town events.

The brand positioning construct developed by Trialogue identified the Town of Vienna's essence as independence; its personality as exuberant, nurturing, and unexpected; and its promise, in part, as committed to nurturing and celebrating its history, being true to its small-town nature, and embracing traditions.

"We found in our research," says Trialogue partner Ruth Wieder, "that Vienna is an authentic small town, different from everything else around it."

The Town paid Trialogue \$38,100 for development of the brand construct and the research it conducted, which also will inform the Town's long-term and strategic planning efforts. Each graphic design firm invited to submit three concepts received a \$1,000 stipend. Ashton Design received an additional \$6,000 to further develop the logo, provide variations and create a logo suite, and craft a style guide.

The entire process was guided by a 10-member communitybased Brand Advisory Board, which included three Town



staff members and seven residents, including two Town Councilmembers. Board members provided input and feedback on the brand research and development process and rated the submitted logo concepts, ultimately recommending two concepts for Town Council's consideration.

Pick up Vienna-branded, reusable bags at Town Hall

Beginning with the December issue, the *Vienna Voice* will look a little different moving forward. While the overall style of the newsletter will remain the same, the masthead will be redesigned to incorporate the Town's new logo and the newsletter's main colors will change as well.

Plan outlines future capital projects

es, journalist and cartoonist Allen Saunders was right when he noted that "Life is what happens to us while we are making other plans." But so were Benjamin Franklin and baseball great Yogi Berra, who said, respectively: "By failing to prepare, you are preparing to fail" and "If you don't know where you are going, you'll end up someplace else."

In the spirit of making a roadmap for the future, the Town of Vienna regularly plans out significant projects as well as strategies for paying for these improvements through the Town's Capital Improvement Plan. At its September 25 meeting, Town Council adopted the most recent Capital Improvement Plan for fiscal years 2018-34.

"It's really important for citizens to know that this is a planning tool for the Town," says Finance Director Marion Serfass, "which means that the farther out plans are, the more likely they are to change over time. The whole Capital Improvement Plan is subject to change, but by having a plan in place, the Town ensures that important community needs are addressed and funded."

The Town issues general obligation bonds every two years to help fund capital improvement projects. The Town expects to issue bonds around the end of February to support identified 2018 projects. Bond debt is generally paid back using meals tax revenue, except for water and sewer system projects, for which funds from water and sewer fees are used.

The Capital Improvement Plan (or CIP as it's known around Town Hall) identifies approximately \$9.9 million in projects for 2018, about \$2 million of which will be provided through grants and other resources, leaving the Town

with almost \$8 million in anticipated, bond-funded expenses.

Nearly \$7 million in anticipated 2018 capital improvement expenses relate to public works projects, including repairing and installing sidewalks, drainage improvements, Northside Piney Branch stream restoration, improvements to the Northside Property Yard, and water and sewer projects and capital improvements.

Project management and architectural and engineering services for renovating the Town's police station are allocated at about \$1.85 million.

Police Chief Jim Morris has said of the Town's plans to renovate the police station: "When the current police station was constructed in 1994, it was known at that time that it was being built too small to meet the department's needs. Since then, we've made do with the space by moving storage and having some staff work off site. The new station will provide sufficient space to bring property and evidence storage as well as space for officers and technology all on the same site."

The 2018 CIP also calls for \$650,000 for parks and recreation improvement projects and \$75,000 for conceptual design of a downtown parking structure. If a parking structure is undertaken as proposed in the CIP for 2020. Council would consider a one-cent increase in the meals tax rate for seven years to cover the anticipated \$5.7 million cost.

The 2018-34 CIP lays out anticipated capital projects and funding on a two-year cycle through 2034. To view the CIP, visit viennava.gov/cip. Just be aware that because "Life is what happens to us when we're making other plans," projects, priorities, and estimated costs are all subject to change. **V**

ver the years, the Town of Vienna has received a lot of love – and recognition – as a great place to live. Just last month Vienna was named **THE** #1 small town in the whole country by Movoto Real Estate Blog. See Movoto's article at **movoto.com/blog/top-ten/best-small-towns/.**There's a lot to love about Vienna, from its parks and newly opened community center to its restaurants and proximity to two

opened community center to its restaurants and proximity to two Metro stations. We truly are a thriving small town – and the fact that we're an authentic small town in the heart of a massive urban area just makes Vienna all that more special.

All of this love for Vienna has made me reflect on some of my favorite places in Town:

day or to watch the leaves change in the fall or new buds and flowers in the spring.

• Vienna Inn Vienna would not be, well, Vienna without the Vienna Inn. Pile 'em up: Leaf collection pickup begins

eaf collection in the Town of Vienna isn't a one-and-done deal. The leaves keep falling, and public works crews keep collecting the piles that residents have raked to the curb.

Leaf collection is already underway and will continue through December. Crews will make at least three passes, beginning in the north each time and working their way south through Town.

No set pickup schedule is available as crews are assigned based on leaf volume and other priorities. To see where crews have been and where they're headed next, check the daily-updated leaf collection map at viennava.gov/leafcollectionmap. Signs alerting that leaf collection is coming soon to your neighborhood will be placed at key roads and intersections.

Leaf piles should be free of limbs, sticks, acorns, and other debris that can damage collection equipment. Check the Town of Vienna Community Network (channel 27 on Cox and 38 on Verizon FIOS) and the Town's Facebook page to view a brief leaf collection video detailing the process.

Modest organization makes big community difference

On the surface, the Committee for Helping Others (CHO) may appear a modest, ordinary volunteer organization - even its name is unassuming. Dig a little deeper, though, and the reality is that CHO is a key reason why Vienna sparkles as a proactive, caring community. Each year, CHO provides more than \$100,000 in assistance and a lifeline to hundreds of Vienna-area residents who have fallen on hard times.

Through its 30 volunteers and impactleveraging partnerships with other community organizations, CHO provides emergency financial aid, food, furniture (along with delivery), and clothing.

The brilliance of CHO is its dedicated. hard-working members, none of whom receives a penny for their efforts. Peg Boag, CHO's most tenured volunteer, has donated her time for more than 40 years and still finds ways to contribute.

"CHO is based on the will to simply help," says CHO Chair Ollie Fowler. "We've been able to accomplish so much based on the generosity of the community."

CHO originated in 1969 out of necessity. Fairfax County Human Services divided the county into sections to which assistance groups and nonprofits were assigned in order to alleviate the overwhelming number of people asking for help from churches. Several Vienna-area churches banded together to create CHO to assist the county, yielding a partnership and system of referrals that is still used today.

CHO recently began working with one family whose original need was for food.

Later, the mother and children needed assistance to leave an abusive home situation and relocate. CHO provided food, furniture for the new home, and financial assistance for rent. The parent is now experiencing medical issues, but CHO will make sure that the children have a Christmas this year.

Each month, CHO donates approximately \$9,000 in small amounts to those in need of assistance with rent, utilities, and medical bills. All recipients are referred and screened by Fairfax County to ensure that they are eligible for financial aid, and churches may refer someone from time to time. Each recipient is limited to one or two donations per year.

Why compost?

Research from SaveOnEnergy.com indicates that: "the average American tosses 4.4 pounds of trash every single day (about the size of an average pumpkin). [That figure] may not seem all that astonishing on the surface, but with **323.7 million people** living in the United States that is roughly 728,000 tons of daily garbage – enough to fill 63,000 garbage trucks."

The Town's FY 2017-18 budget projects that 4,500 tons of solid waste will be disposed of by Vienna residents this year, which is an increase from prior years. Additionally, solid waste disposal cost per ton has increased each year. One way to help reduce this rising cost is to reduce your trash – perhaps by composting your food and yard waste. It's estimated that 20-30% of what we throw away is food scraps.

Many types of food scraps, along with leaves and yard trimmings, can be combined in a backyard compost bin. Composting food and yard waste is beneficial to Town citizens for the following reasons:

- Composting prevents waste and saves valuable tax dollars used to haul trash to be incinerated.
- Composting prevents yard waste from clogging storm drains and street gutters.
- Using composted materials in your garden or yard avoids the trouble and expense of purchasing mulch.
- Composting supplements the soil's capacity to hold nutrients and moisture, reducing the need for fertilizers and excess watering.
- When plants are naturally healthier, soil erosion and water run-off are decreased as plant roots penetrate compost-rich soil easier and hold the soil in place.
