Strategic plan to provide road map to Town's future

hen he talks with local government organizations about strategic planning, former Prince William County Executive Craig Gerhart likes to share a story about a 1960s NASA janitor, who responded to a question about what he does with: "I'm helping put a man on the moon."

Top-to-bottom clarity of purpose, along with necessary competencies, Gerhart notes, are key attributes possessed by high-performing organizations. And to be

effective, he adds, organizations have to have a plan. "You have to be able to say here's where we're going, here's how we'll get there, here's what staff needs to do, and here's how staff will be evaluated."

> To help the Town of Vienna figure out where it's going and how it's going to get there, Gerhart, now a local government consultant and adjunct faculty member at the University of Virginia's Senior Executive Institute, will lead Town Council and staff through a strategic planning process.

The process kicks off January 16 with a facilitated workshop for Councilmembers. Council will begin to consider the future by articulating what success would look like assuming that all of the Town's efforts succeeded beyond reasonable expectations. Council will identify the major attributes of Vienna

For Vienna Theatre Company, it's all about relationships, essentially

hen its artistic home base, the Vienna Community Center, was being renovated over a two-year period, the Vienna Theatre Company (VTC) underwent an adaptive metamorphosis. As it launches the 2018 production season, VTC plans to hold onto some of those changes it was obliged to embrace while also welcoming fresh opportunities associated with being back home in a new and improved space.

"It's been indescribable to be back home," says VTC Artistic Director Jessie Roberts. "Having new sound and light boards along with the dedicated tech booth will make everything so much easier and better."

Still, VTC isn't turning its back on hard-earned expanded horizons in terms of what kinds of shows it performs, who to cast as directors and actors, and newly formed artistic relationships.

Prepping for its third production of *Eclectic Essentials*, the company's series of one-act plays, Roberts comments: "Eclectic Essentials was a new type of production for us, created specifically to adapt to community center construction. Even though we didn't have our stage at the center, we still wanted to provide patrons with an evening of theatre, so we engineered our script selection

Town prepared for if/when the weather outside gets frightful

he Town of Vienna's public works and parks and recreation departments are well equipped to take on Old Man Winter. Each year, the Town adds to its winter arsenal in order to more effectively fight the snow, ice, and slush that occasionally dump on the Northern Virginia region.

Operations Superintendent Jonathan Wooden is sanguine about dealing with the snow and ice. In a typical Virginia winter storm, which is less than about six inches, the Town strives to have all roads cleared about 12-18 hours after the storm ends.



He asks that residents be patient, especially in a big storm like the 30-plus inches that fell in January 2016. "We work as safely and quickly as we can," he says.

The most difficult part of the process, Wooden notes, is the uncertainty of Mother Nature. No matter what is predicted, he says, she always seems to pack a little of the unexpected.

New to the Town's weatherfighting arsenal this year is a

1,000-gallon salt brine applicator. The Town's homemade brew of salt brine is an anti-icing agent that is applied to roadways pre-storm. Wooden hopes that the larger capacity (last year, the Town had a 250-gallon load capacity) will allow the Town to treat all Vienna roadways, ideally 24-48 hours in advance of predicted winter weather. He anticipates that it will require 3,000-4,000 gallons of brine to treat the entire Town one time.

In addition, plows, spreaders, backhoes, bobcats, snowblowers, salt, and, to a lesser degree, sand as well as a response team of anywhere from 8-60 Town staffers working around the clock in two 12-hour shifts comprise the Town's winter weather response toolbox.

So whatever Mother Nature may have in store this winter, the Town of Vienna is ready. $\boldsymbol{\vee}$

and the Town government when Vienna is recognized as a "best in class" community and will determine goal areas, suggested actions, and how progress will be measured.

"I'm looking forward to undertaking the strategic planning process and to working with Council to more clearly define realistic goals and objectives for the Town of Vienna," says Mayor Laurie DiRocco. "I really believe that the process of strategic planning, which is the identification of issues and possible solutions, is going to be as valuable as the plan itself."

Among the data that Council will consider as it begins strategic planning are 2016 Citizen Survey results as well as input gathered via interviews, surveys, and polling through the recent branding initiative.

With Council's draft vision, goal statements, and community measures in hand, Town staff, through facilitated workshops and independent research, will throughout the spring conduct analysis of the identified goal areas and ascertain strategies, objectives, and action steps, which ultimately will spell out a multiyear plan of action for the Town. Vienna last engaged in a strategic planning process in 2012-13. "After Town Council identifies priorities," says Town Manager Mercury Payton, "staff will incorporate those priorities into planning for future initiatives and will align budget requests moving forward to address those goals as well. It's important for all Town employees to have an understanding of Council's vision."

Gerhart anticipates that the strategic planning process will require about nine months. The Town's contract with Gerhart Enterprises, Inc. is for \$14,220.

Another quote that Gerhart likes to use when talking about strategic planning is one by David Allen, a productivity consultant and author of *Getting Things Done:* "You can do anything, but not everything." Vienna's strategic planning process will be about determining the "anythings" at which it truly wants to be a high-performing, best-in-class community. 
New signal at Maple and Lawyers/Courthouse Road means more left turns, better traffic flow

ast month the Town of Vienna installed a new left-turn traffic signal on Maple Avenue at the intersection with Lawyers Road/Courthouse Road. This change was made with expectations that traffic flow will be enhanced and congestion on Maple Avenue mitigated.

Drivers traveling in both directions on Maple Avenue who wish to make a left turn at that intersection still receive an advanced protective permission left turn, that is, a solid green arrow signal. As it cycles through, the green arrow turns solid yellow and then solid red, which indicates that no left turns are allowed. After Maple Avenue drivers receive a solid green light to allow them to travel straight, a flashing yellow arrow signals those wishing to turn left that they may do so with caution and after yielding to oncoming traffic.

The change means that Maple Avenue drivers wishing to turn left onto Lawyers or Courthouse no longer are required to wait through the full light cycle. Traffic engineers have found that flashing yellow arrow signals are more intuitive than solid green lights to communicate a permissive left turn and that, after a short learning period, the yellow signals are more easily understood, better obeyed, and safer.

A National Cooperative Highway Research Program study finds that: "The flashing yellow arrow clearly communicates a message of caution and reduces the risk of left turn-related crashes." Drivers need to continue to be mindful of pedestrians crossing Lawyers and Courthouse roads when making left turns from Maple Avenue.



Town scales financial systems technological summit

hink about a time you've upgraded your phone or bought a new computer or replaced a software system at work. You know, then, that there's a sense of anxiety, a time commitment, and inevitable technological hiccups that accompany those kinds of experiences. Next, consider the anxiety, time, and hiccups that would be required to replace (and add) about 15 financial software systems, and you'll have a sense of what the Town of Vienna has experienced - and achieved.

After three years of module installations, the Town of Vienna has completely transferred all of its financial, or enterprise resource planning, systems to one software system operated by Tyler Munis. Several other modules - for permitting in the planning department, human resources functions, and a customer service request portal - have been implemented as well.

"Thank goodness we all still have our hair," says Information Technology Director Tony Mull, who has managed the software system implementation in cooperation with the finance department. "It feels great to be able to see the light at

^{ream}work the end of the tunnel. We've accomplished the majority of the work and now are massaging a few residual Directo issues, exploring the system's full capabilities, and training staff to achieve mastery of the new system."

"The Town's whole financial backbone has been changed," says Finance Director Marion Serfass. "It's transformed the way we do business."

All financial functions, including general ledger, accounts payable, purchasing, payroll, and revenue systems (real estate taxes, meals taxes, dog and vehicle licenses, cashiering, and, most recently, utility billing) have been converted from two older systems or integrated from manual input. The planning department has computerized the permitting process, which previously had been done manually. Police systems also are in the process of transitioning to Munis, which recently purchased the firm that the police department had used for several years.

Employee's DIY attitude and skills save Town \$\$ while guarding residents' safety

public works staff member's ingenuity and do-ityourself work ethic recently saved the Town of Vienna more than \$10,000.

When a deteriorating 10-foot long guide rail, which protects pedestrians from a sizeable drop from the sidewalk at 120 Moore Avenue SE, needed replacement last June, the Town's general maintenance division turned to colleagues in vehicle maintenance for assistance. Vehicle Maintenance Supervisor David Stephens and Mechanic Christopher Tanks visited the site, and with a spark of innovation, determined that they could craft a new and improved guardrail themselves without hiring a contractor.

After ordering the raw steel materials, Tanks performed a bit of wizardry at the Town's Northside Property Yard.

"It was tricky when I was laying out the sheet metal to get it flat for welding," he says. "Our shop floor acted as a makeshift work bench and it's uneven. Also, I had to use our regular tools, which wouldn't be the usual choice for this job, but I was able to bend it into shape while keeping it smooth."

Based on the success of this initial project, Tanks would deliver on two additional requests to use his steelworking magic - creating new guardrails for two sidewalk construction projects. The rails now at 241 Old Courthouse Road NE and on Park

d dahop as a repair genius. Street SE near the W&OD trail are 39 and 30 feet, respectively, and would have cost the Town a pretty penny to outsource.

The Town's cost to a Northside F design and create the rails in house totaled \$965. Had the Town hired a the contractor, the project would have cost \$8,960 to design and create, along with an installation fee of \$2,470.

"Christopher is a genius," says Vehicle Maintenance Superintendent Craig Schlemmer. "He can look at something he's never seen before,

Problem-solver Mechanic Christophe see if it's broken, and repair it. He's a problemsolver. He's just a whiz."

For his ingenuity and adaptive skills, Tanks has been nominated for a Service Recognition Award.

Resolutions that benefit families and the environment

t turns out that the things you do to help the environment almost inevitably benefit you and your family either in terms of health or your pocketbook. With these benefits in mind, members of the Community Enhancement Commission have listed their resolutions for 2018. Happy New Year! Use in good health!

- · Walk to any daytime event that is within one mile. Bike to any daytime event that is within three miles. Bonus: A great start toward achieving 10,000 daily steps.
- · Purchase and install rain barrels to capture rainwater in the spring and summer. Bonus: Reduces the water bill as well as pollution in the Chesapeake Bay.
- Contract for conservation landscaping to address erosion and runoff issues at home. Bonus: Subsidies are available for this work from the Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District.
- Shut off computers each night. Bonus: Reduces the electric bill.
- While walking, take a plastic bag to pick up trash and recycling along the way. Bonus: Helps keep storm sewers clean and keeps trash out of the Chesapeake Bay.

- If you like using a straw, purchase reusable drinking straws and take them with you to restaurants. Bonus: Straws are not recyclable and often wind up in waterways.
- Bring lunch from home at least three days a week, packed in reusable glass containers. Bonus: Saves money, and you eat healthier.

around plays that had minimal costumes, could be flexibly rehearsed in different locations, and were shorter in length."

The 2018 *Eclectic Essentials* production features four plays that focus on relationships:

- *For Whom the Southern Belle Tolls* by Christopher Durang (directed by Haley Murphy)
- *Death Be Not Loud* by Thierry Sagnier (directed by Stuart Fischer)
- *Capsmittment* by Jean Koppen (directed by Juli Blacker)
- One Click Away by Dean Fiala (directed by Sue Bevine)

Eclectic, Essential . . . Relationships will be performed at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, January 19-20 and 26-27, as well as at 2 p.m. Sunday, January 28. VTC's new production style shook up how the company gets its band of players together, starting with finding directors. "The one-acts are an incubator for talent," says Roberts. "Instead of starting traditionally with the script, we identify directors we want first and then see what scripts they bring. It really helps the production because they have a passion for what they want to direct as opposed to assigning them the script. If we like how it goes, then we may ask them to bring along some actors to play their parts. Maybe we even ask both directors and actors to come back and do another show. Not all companies work in reverse in that way."

In addition to working on its current production of one acts, VTC is exercising

its muscle memory for what it's like to put on full-blown productions again – with a new space and bag of toys. The company has become accustomed to flexing schedules and spaces, but now they can use the strengths of being tethered to one location – and restarting with an essentially blank canvas.

As they work on the 2018 season, Roberts and other VTC board members are aiming bold and maximizing being back home. "We lost the set inventory at the start of renovation, but now we are free to create from scratch," she says. "We want to expand on what we had, perhaps build walkways and more dynamic set pieces and have environments that show and make the audience really feel the scale of the scripts."

VTC's first full-scale production since returning to the community center will be *Blithe Spirit* by Noel Coward, to be presented in the spring. **V**

The Town selected the Tyler Munis system, Serfass says, because its online capabilities are so robust and have allowed the Town's financial services to essentially go paperless. "We have all of our records at our fingertips."

For some staff members, the switch to a totally software-based system was a technological leap, and Munis and IT staff worked jointly to train

finance staff members.

"Overall, we are really pleased with Munis's increased functionality," Serfass says. "We're looking forward to learning more efficiencies and really digging in to the system's capabilities."

An added bonus of the new system, notes Mull, is that it has encouraged staff "to think of new ways of doing things. It's invigorated us to think beyond the way that we've always done something. Using the Munis system, staff members are continually working to think of better ways to improve our processes."
