Diverse groups put 'community' in Vienna's rec center

• he Vienna Community Center caters to individuals and groups that represent a variety of ages, abilities, and interests. On any given day, the recently reopened, renovated and expanded center may serve a mature group of diehard board gamers as well as a gaggle of pool-playing preteens and a precious class of tumbling preschoolers as well as teams of testosterone-fueled basketball competitors.

"Each activity, class, or open gym consistently draws a group of people who make coming here part of their daily routine," says Community Center Assistant Manager Nick Jones. "From early in the morning until 10:30, sometimes 11 at night, we actually expect to see our regulars doing their thing."

A group of retirees with a passion for mahjongg, a tile-based board game that originated in China in the 17th century, converges on the center from all over Northern Virginia each Wednesday afternoon to play for up to four hours.

The center, says Elaine Varner, a mahjongg devotee of many years, is "kind of a diamond in the rough. Plenty of places host

mahjongg, but what's unique about our game at the Vienna Community Center is the kinds of people who come to play and how we want to play. Sometimes people have to come late or leave early, and we have to play shorthanded. A lot of places aren't cool with that. It's nice to have a niche place to play."

The community center functions as a haven of convenience and easy

Vienna welcomes new planning director

indy Petkac, a planning professional with more than 20 years of community development and long-range planning experience, has joined the Town of Vienna as planning and zoning director. Petkac took over January 29 from Patrick Mulhern, who retired from the Town in January.

A certified planner with the American Planning Association (APA), Petkac most recently served, since March 2015, as planning division chief with the City of Fairfax. She also has worked as principal planner with the Union Station Redevelopment Corporation, planning manager for the City of Duluth (Minnesota), neighborhood planning coordinator for the District of Columbia, and transportation planner with the Chatham County-Savannah Metropolitan Planning Commission.

Currently a Herndon resident, Petkac grew up in a Cleveland suburb. "I walked to school, the corner store. I biked to the pool," Petkac recalls. "Everyone should have an opportunity to grow up and live in a place that is walkable, feels safe, and has great places to go and shop.

"Vienna is a great town," she adds. "It has a small-town atmosphere and yet all the benefits of being in a larger region with access to good jobs, shopping, schools. It's the best of both worlds. Vienna has a lot of great places, and I'm excited to work with Town Council and residents to make it be just a little bit...

friendships for other groups as well. After school most days, the Club Phoenix Teen Center hosts 11 sixth- and seventh-graders.

"They have Cup of Noodles and a microwave," says Zoe Bennik, a sixthgrader at Cunningham Park Elementary in explanation of her affinity for the center.

Anna Heller, a sixth-grader at Vienna Elementary, came to the teen center on her brother's coat tails. "My brother came here when he was my age, and my mom encouraged me to come," she says. "It's kind of expected living here, and it's so convenient that it's right across from my school. You also get to meet kids from other schools and make friends in a place for people your age."

When asked what the most popular activity at the teen center is, almost all 11 youth resoundingly replied: "Pool!"

"It's such a great game that everyone can play," says Vienna Elementary sixthgrader Tatem Kline. "It fits in with having a nice place designed for us."

Other activities include just hanging out, doing homework, and sometimes enjoying the casual Hot Pocket.

On Wednesday nights, grown men from all over the area come to the community center to quench their thirst for competitive basketball battles in the new auditorium. The games aren't always necessarily family-friendly.

"When we opened our doors in September and had our first basketball open gym night in the new auditorium, we told the guys that they could play two games at once and share the court," says Jones. "But they take it so seriously that they want full-court play and are willing to wait through one game at a time to get their fix."

Vienna resident Darius Smith has to convince his girlfriend every week why Wednesday ball night is such a big deal. "I always have to tell my lady why I need to get here. She doesn't understand what Wednesday night is all about!" Smith



points to another young man anxiously watching the current game and adds: "My friend here, he has a rare day off from his job and look where he is."

Many of the players already are familiar with one another through different rec centers, parks, leagues, and high schools so it's easy for a game to feature both quality play and also a little intensity and drama.

"You want to win," says Smith, "and since the winning team stays on the court to play the next team, you want to get on that run. It gets a little rowdy, grown men bumping up against each other, all that testosterone. But there's never been any fights, everyone appreciates this place so much that they don't want to start something and [mess] it up here."

Mozone "Mo" Kelly, who is on the parks and recreation staff and runs Wednesday nights, has played and coached in the area for many years.

"I've been around the game for a long time," he says, "and it's so interesting to see all these different ages here. The older guys want to stick their tongues out while going up for a dunk, just like Michael Jordan did. The slightly younger guys want to do the flashy crossover dribble like Allen Iverson used to do, and these new kids want to shoot the ball practically



from half court like Steph Curry."

Whether it's basketball or pool, tumbling or mahjongg, there's activity and community happening at the center practically around the clock. On this particular day, Jones was high-fiving a toddler early in the afternoon and speaking with his mother about arranging for his birthday party at the center. Eight hours later, he was fetching an icepack for an ankle after there was a hard collision on a layup.



Town considering parking opportunity in commercial/industrial zone

Providing additional parking opportunities to promote park-once, walk-more accessibility to Vienna's commercial area has been a long-term Town goal, at least since adoption of the Church Street Vision in 1997. A 2008 study, prepared by the Planning Commission, indicated a shortfall of approximately 250 parking spaces in the Town's Church Street commercial area.

Recently, the Town has been in discussions with a Mill Street developer to purchase a floor of a proposed four-story building (with one additional floor below ground) that would provide about 127 public parking spaces. Tenacity Group has proposed constructing a 45-foot tall, by-right building at 223-241 Mill Street. The developer plans commercial uses on the first floor with self-storage units on the third and fourth floors; the second floor has been offered to the Town for public parking. The developer also has proposed a sidewalk and streetscape that are compatible with the Church Street Vision.

Town Council will consider this potential purchase early this spring. A Council work session was held last month to discuss funding for the proposed property acquisition, and a public hearing is scheduled for the Town Council meeting that will begin at 8 p.m. Monday, February 26. The general public may voice feedback (either concerns and opposition or support or questions) at the public hearing.

In addition, a series of informal informational meetings about the project were held last month. One more informational meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 7, in Council Chambers at Town Hall. Additional meetings may be scheduled if deemed necessary.

more. What could we do to make Vienna a little more walkable, to improve on the community slightly?"

From Cleveland, Petkac headed to Bowling Green State University, which she attended with the intention of being a social studies teacher. When job market realities were pointed out, though, she opted instead to major in geography. "I like geography, maps, and places," she says. "That's how I ended up in planning. Planning is all about placemaking and what makes a community great."

Petkac followed up her bachelor's degree with a master's degree in urban planning, design, and development from Cleveland State University.

Accomplishments across her 20-year planning career include:

• implementing a community engagement process for the City of Fairfax's current comprehensive plan update that included

> a survey, events, scavenger hunt, and presentation by an expert panel on community development and economic vitality

- completely rewriting the City of Duluth's zoning regulations and streamlining its permitting processes and reviews
- penning a newsletter article for the American Institute of Certified Planners entitled "10 Things to Remember When Preparing a Plan," based on an unsuccessful planning initiative in the District of Columbia.

"My planning philosophy," she says, "is that communities are about people. If people don't live in a city, then it's just a bunch of empty buildings. One of the challenges in doing good planning is involving the community and getting them excited about planning for the future."

In one of her previous jobs, Petkac was the neighborhood planner for the area surrounding what is now Nationals Ballpark. Today, she's a Nationals season ticketholder, though she also still roots for her Cleveland teams, the Indians and Browns. In addition, Petkac writes women's fiction in her spare time. Though she has not yet been published, she's currently working on her third novel, which will be set in the Northern Virginia suburbs. **V**

Town offers thermal cameras to assess home energy efficiency

hat was some cold spell we endured just after the new year, eh? Now that temperatures have (hopefully) normalized a bit, you may be curious about just how well your home is protecting you from outdoor elements.

The Community Enhancement Commission is pleased to announce that Town of Vienna residents may now borrow thermal cameras to evaluate how well your home is insulated from the heat and cold. These cameras attach to smartphones and take thermal photos of walls and around doors and windows.

When you use a thermal camera, you can identify hot and cold spots in your house that cannot be detected by the naked eye.

Air leaks are among some of the easiest fixes in a home that can have a direct financial benefit related to energy costs. According to the U.S. Department of Energy, addressing these leaks can save homeowners \$200-400 a year on energy bills.

Most repairs of air leaks involve materials that are available at the local hardware store and can be done either by yourself or a handyman. When done correctly, these repairs may save more than energy costs because they also may reduce outside noise and improve indoor air quality. How do the cameras work? You attach the camera to your iPhone or Android device. It acts as a regular camera, but the resulting photos assign colors based on objects' temperatures, typically with hot objects appearing as white, yellow, red, and orange and cool areas as blue or violet. These images can

help homeowners determine where (heated or cooled) air is escaping from their homes.

Two Androidand two iPhonecompatible cameras are available for checkout through the Town's Parks and Recreation Department. To sign out a camera, call 703-255-6360.
