

Vienna's top-of-the-line bond ratings affirmed; Town issues \$7.9M in bonds for capital projects

n preparation for the Town of Vienna's issuance of bonds in order to fund capital improvement projects, the nation's two top-regarded rating agencies affirmed in February the Town's AAA bond ratings, the highest rating that is available. Those high ratings helped the Town's \$7.9 million general obligation bond issuance, executed on February 13, appeal to investors; they also helped ensure that the Town would obtain a favorable interest rate.



Investors, notes Finance Director Marion Serfass, looked favorably on Vienna's offering because of the Town's strong bond ratings and also because changes to the nation's tax laws at the end of last year meant that relatively few bond offerings were available in February.

The Town issues bonds every other year to fund capital improvement projects and repays the 15-year bonds using meals tax revenue and water and sewer fees. More than half of the funds raised through the 2018 bond issuance will be used for water and sewer improvement projects; the remainder will fund architectural and engineering services

Private-public pARTnership seeks mural artists

he Vienna Public Arts Commission (VPAC), Vienna Shopping Center Limited Partnership, and Rappaport have partnered to bring an approximately 2,500-square-foot mural to the rear of the Rappaport-managed Vienna Shopping Center at Maple Avenue and Center Street. The mural will be created along approximately 200 linear feet of the rear of the shopping center and will be visible from Cottage Street. Rappaport is generously providing financial support of up to \$20,000 for this project.

VPAC has issued a call for artists to create the mural embracing a "Small Town, Big Community" theme; artist qualifications and concept submissions are due March 31. For additional information about artist qualifications, selection criteria, and how to submit applications, visit viennava.gov/mural.

Consideration of artists is open to those who have previously installed exterior murals of a similar size for public view (photos/details should be provided) and are fully licensed and insured. A unique requirement of this project will be that the artist outline how James Madison High School students can be actively engaged in the mural installment process.

Interested artists should submit a portfolio or previous work as well as a rendering or sketch and a detailed description (no more than 400 words) of their proposed concept embodying the "Small Town, Big Community" theme and conveying an understanding of the Town of Vienna community. Submissions also should indicate how the artist will integrate the building's rear façade in the concept, including active rear doors. Proposals and questions may be submitted to viennapac@gmail.com.

Scope of work will include cleaning and preparation of façade, provision of materials, application of the mural, appropriate safety precautions, and recommendations for proper maintenance of the mural. Any additional costs outside the scope of work must be identified.

Application of the mural is expected to begin in late spring or early summer with completion in September. A project timeline should be included in the artist's submission as well.

Artist selection will be determined by a panel of VPAC members, Rappaport representatives, and Town officials. Criteria includes creativity and appeal of concept presented and how well it connects with the community and theme, artist experience and portfolio, timeliness of installation, and proposed cost.

"We're so excited and grateful that Rappaport was willing to underwrite this public art effort," says VPAC member Lu Cousins. "We can't wait to see how Vienna's 'Small Town, Big Community' way of life plays out in the mural. This and other public art efforts will, we know, add just a little more color and depth and richness to our community."

for renovation of the police station, several smaller public works and parks projects, and issuance costs.

The Town's bond ratings were reaffirmed by Moody's and Standard & Poor's Global Ratings. S&P's AAA rating reflects its view of the Town's very strong economy, strong management, adequate budgetary performance, very strong budgetary flexibility, very strong liquidity, and strong debt and contingent liability position.

"We consider Vienna's economy [to be] very strong," the ratings agency said in its report. "...[W]e believe the [T]own's strong financial policies and procedures as well as adherence to conservative budgeting practices provide additional rating stability."

Moody's assigned its most favorable Aaa rating based on Vienna's sound financial operations and conservative budget management; stable, favorably located tax base with aboveaverage wealth levels; and manageable debt burden.

"Vienna's financial position will remain stable given adherence to formal fiscal policies and conservative management practices, as evidenced by the [T]own's ability to maintain strong reserve levels over the last five years," Moody's states in its analysis.

Marshall Road sidewalk project set to get underway

capital improvement project to replace an asphalt path along Marshall Road with concrete sidewalk, elevate the roadway, replace curb and gutter, and make additional safety enhancements is set to get underway at the end of the month. The primary objective of the project is to enhance safety for children walking and biking to school.

This project was originally scheduled for last summer, but was delayed when it was determined that utilities needed to be relocated first. Gas pipeline and water lines have now been relocated, and the three-month project is scheduled to begin March 26.

The project area extends from Marshall Road Elementary School to Trowbridge Place SW. Lane closures will be in effect, and westbound traffic will need to utilize the detour along Ware Street and Tapawingo Road.

The \$1.6 million project will be completed by A&M Concrete Corporation of Sterling and funded through a VDOT revenuesharing grant and the Town's capital improvement funds. Depending on weather conditions, the project is expected to be finished by the end of June.

Freeman exhibits focus on women's rights and the Great War

s the Freeman Store and Museum prepares to open its doors March 1 for the 2018 season, it also is opening two new exhibits with a focus on war and women's rights. In commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the end of World

War I, Historic Vienna, Inc.'s 2018 main exhibit, located on the second floor, is entitled *Home Front – The Great War and Vienna*. The exhibit features information, images, models, and artifacts, including uniforms, equipment, and documents, from "the war to end all wars." The exhibit also will include a diorama of the fearsome trenches that were ubiquitous on World War I battlefields as well as a graphic display of awards and decorations.


Leigh Kitcher, one of the HVI curators, is most excited about inclusion in the exhibit of her grandfather's passport, which identifies him as an ambulance driver. Artifacts from period ambulances as well as a stirring photo of ambulances unloading wounded soldiers in Paris underscore the costs of war.


"It's really neat that we were able gather and can share with the community real 100-year-old stuff that was actually there on the battlefields and in the ambulances of World War I," says HVI President Anne Stuntz.

"Vienna didn't have an awful lot to do with the war," notes another HVI curator, Mike Berger. "Seventy-three men with a Vienna address fought in the war," which the United States did not enter until 1917.

However, the names of two Vienna soldiers who lost their lives in World War I will ring familiar to those living in the community today. The exhibit tells how George Dyer and Clarence Gunnell, for whom the local American Legion Post is named, lost their lives.

The hallway exhibit downstairs in the Freeman House will focus this year on The Women's Rights Movement through Cartoons. The exhibit features more than 50 political cartoons and other images collected from newspapers, postcards, and other publications from



"We tried to include cartoons that made a statement about what people were really thinking about at the time," says Kitcher.

Annual exhibits related to the women's rights movement will continue at the Freeman House through 2020, which will mark the 100th anniversary of adoption of the Constitutional

Vienna has an updated appetite for restaurants

etail businesses have experienced a lot of changes over the past 50 years, not the least of which are e-commerce and America's increased appetite for dining out. So how does the Town of Vienna adapt to the market and revitalize its retail space? One option is enticing more restaurants to set up shop in Town.

Late last year Town Council approved changes to the Town Code that likely will make Vienna even more palatable to restaurants. For example, the seating requirement of a 1971 code that mandated that restaurants in freestanding buildings have at least 125 seats was dropped. Also, restaurants can now set up, by right, in any area zoned for commercial use.

"Ultimately," says Deputy Planning Director Hyojung Garland, "these changes make it easier for restaurants to locate in the Town of Vienna. Now that we've updated our code, we're excited to see what new restaurants may be interested in coming to Town."

Master plan encourages Town, residents to put one foot in front of the other

he Town of Vienna's newly adopted Pedestrian Master Plan encourages residents and Town officials to continually put one foot in front of the other in efforts to create an integrated network of pedestrian routes and earn national recognition as a walk-friendly community. The master plan, a vision document that provides recommendations to Town officials, was crafted by the Pedestrian Advisory Committee and adopted by Town Council at its January 8 meeting.

The Pedestrian Master Plan puts forward five goals and offers 13 action recommendations related to facilities, governing and operations, and education, enforcement, and encouragement.

A top priority on the wish list is to have sidewalks on both sides of as many Town streets as possible. Consensus goals include refurbishing existing sidewalks when new home construction occurs in an area, improving streetlight synchronization and

Phone scam spoofs Town's numbers

ast month, the Town of Vienna became aware that its phone numbers and caller ID were being spoofed by telemarketers attempting to sell products and services (often health insurance) under false pretenses. The Town received several calls from residents about this phone scam. The Town of Vienna DOES NOT contact residents in order to sell any kind of goods or services.

If you receive one of these calls, where the Town of Vienna's name and a Town number display on your caller ID, please let the Town know by calling 703-255-5725 or emailing **ITHelp@viennava.gov.** This information is being submitted, along with formal complaints, to the FCC as it is illegal to falsely use an individual's/organization's ID in order to sell products or services under false pretenses. Here's the information needed by the Town:

- · name of resident contacted
- phone number of resident
- spoofed number that appears on caller ID as well as name shown by caller ID
- date and time of the call
- details about what the telemarketer was trying to sell or asked resident to do.



Clean sweep of Town streets indicates spring is on the way

fter a chilly winter on planet Hoth – and Northern Virginia, too – the Public Works Department will put the cold weather in the rearview mirror by sweeping clean Vienna's wind-blown streets.

Street sweeping gets rid of salt, silt, sand, and other forms of debris that have accumulated on Vienna's streets over the winter. Think of street sweeping as an early bit of spring cleaning that adds a sparkle to Vienna neighborhoods, but also reduces runoff and helps prevent waste from entering the Chesapeake Bay.

Street sweeping will begin March 19. To help ensure that streets can be cleaned as well as possible, the Town asks residents to refrain from parking on streets during a section's first scheduled sweeping time. Residents also are asked to place any debris, trash, sticks, yard waste, and receptacles on top of the curb leaving the street open. Check the map at viennava.gov/sweeping to see approximately when your area will be cleaned.

"No Parking" signs will be placed in sections of Town about a week prior to the scheduled sweeping. Sweeping will continue periodically throughout the spring and summer, but residents may park their vehicles as usual after the first pass through Town is complete.

Protecting local vegetation helps preserve **Chesapeake Bay watershed**

hroughout the Town of Vienna there are more than five miles of streams and wetlands protected under the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act. The Bay Act requires that the Town institute land-use regulations in order to protect the quality of the Chesapeake Bay watershed. This requirement is achieved using resource management areas (RMAs) and resource protection areas (RPAs) to limit land use in these environmentally sensitive areas.

RPAs are delineated around designated wetlands as well as a 100-foot buffer area adjacent to and along both sides of a perennial stream. It's important to know that these protected areas may include private, residential properties. These areas are to remain free of any construction and landscape maintenance activities, including mowing or clearing.

This restriction allows trees and shrubs to create a natural protective buffer for a stream. Natural vegetative buffers protect water quality by reducing the amount of pollution and sediment that enters a stream. Vegetation also slows and filters runoff water, holds soil in place, and provides an improved stream ecosystem. Due to the sensitive nature of RPAs, homeowners must contact the Town prior to removing any trees or vegetation in a buffer area.

RMAs have been designated in areas that may contribute to significant water quality degradation through polluted runoff. These areas include flood plains and intermittent streams as well as lands with sensitive soil conditions, such as hydric or highly erodible soils and soils with high water tables.

No fly zone: Travel tips for reducing your carbon footprint

t's about that time of year when spring break or summer vacation plans are being made. You may have seen commercials lately suggesting jetting off to exotic and beautiful locations.

Air travel can sometimes seem like a perfect option for a weekend getaway or a summer vacation with the family. Despite its allure, though, air travel has one unwelcomed consequence: Air travel is, by far, the most environmentally harmful mode of transportation because of its large carbon footprint.

According to the David Suzuki Foundation, when burned, jet fuel releases a variety of harmful substances such as soot and nitrous oxides. In addition, planes leave long trails of water vapor called contrails in the sky while flying at high altitudes. These contrails trap heat on Earth's surface causing increased temperatures in many areas throughout the United States.

What can you do? Simply decreasing your air travel can have a large impact. While stopping air travel altogether is not an option for many, flying even a little less can have a positive effect on the environment.

As you plan your vacation, consider that the East Coast boasts a treasure trove of vacation spots. From the pristine beaches of South Carolina to the lush forests of the Adirondacks, there are plenty of options for you and your family within driving distance. In addition, there are many options for staycations near Vienna.

Next time you plan a trip, instead of heading to the airport, hop in your car, or better yet, a bus or train, to enjoy a fun trip that leaves a smaller carbon footprint! There's no business like home business

id you know that there are more than 400 home-based businesses registered in the Town of Vienna? In 2017, 44 of 127 newly registered businesses were homebased. Following is a short primer for operating a home-based business in the Town of Vienna.

A home-based business is any commercial enterprise that is run out of a private residence. (In addition, independent contractors, anyone who receives a 1099 tax form or files a Schedule C with the IRS, is considered a home-based business.) Home-based businesses in Vienna must obtain a one-time Home Occupation Permit (\$75 fee) and an annual business license. The business license fee is based on the business's gross revenue with a minimum fee of \$30.

Home-based businesses must not occupy more than 25% of the residence and cannot employ any person other than immediate family members living in the home. In Vienna, homebased businesses make lip balm, offer handyman services, and provide a range of professional consulting services, including bookkeeping, leadership training, and website development, to

name a few. Some types of businesses are not allowed to operate from a residence, including boarding houses, tourist homes, and massage therapists. The principal office of a real estate business also cannot be located in a home.

Home-based businesses are not allowed to have signage. Clients may visit the business by appointment only. In addition to Town of Vienna regulations, some businesses, such as homebased daycare centers or businesses selling goods at a farmers market, are subject to additional Fairfax County regulations.

revamping road crossings, and connecting all Town parks within an integrated pedestrian system to greatly limit the need for vehicular travel.

"It took more than two years of research, edits, teamwork, and collaboration," says PAC member Catherine Hardman, "but we finally developed the foundation for pedestrian safety. We're looking forward to implementation of Pedestrian Master Plan elements and creating an even more walkable Vienna community."

The plan's vision extends beyond Vienna's corporate limits. The Pedestrian Master Plan calls on all parties involved in the infrastructure process to consider establishing pedestrian connections to nearby areas, such as Tysons or the Mosaic/Merrifield area.
