# Flowers, gardens, music & more blossom at annual Walk on the Hill

or the 44th year, residents of the Windover Heights Historic District will open their yards and gardens in a welcome to spring for the public to enjoy. The annual Walk on the Hill, perhaps Vienna's loveliest event, will take place from 2-5 p.m. Sunday, April 29. This event is rain or shine; no rain date will be scheduled.

"This is an opportunity to share the ambience of this unique part of Town," says Councilmember Carey Sienicki, who helps organize the event. "The long-time success of this event is truly a community effort and a wonderful start to the spring." She notes that the event is an annual favorite of Town residents as well as out-of-town visitors.

In addition to strolling through lovely gardens, participants can enjoy musical performances throughout the afternoon, take in the Ayr Hill Garden Club's *Bringing Nature to Your Home* small standard flower show (at 307 Windover Aveune), view native plant areas (at Salisbury Springs and Green

Hedges School), take an architectural and historical tour, and nibble on cookies and other refreshments (at 277

Windover Avenue).

In addition, the Community Enhancement Commission's Green Expo will offer displays and information about achieving a greener lifestyle, including details about the 2018 Solarize NOVA program. And Vienna Arts Society artists will set up easels throughout the area as okies

they work to capture the district's natural beauty on canvas.

# Council incumbents on May 1 ballot

ayor Laurie DiRocco and three incumbent Councilmembers are seeking re-election in the Town's May 1 elections. In addition to the mayor, the candidates running for re-election to two-year terms on Town Council are Linda Colbert, Pasha Majdi, and Douglas Noble. No other candidates submitted qualifications for this election. Information provided by the candidates begins on page 4.

Voting in Town elections has moved back to the Vienna Community Center, 120 Cherry Street SE. Town of Vienna residents who are registered to vote may cast their ballots in the community center auditorium from 6 a.m.-7 p.m. Voters will cast four ballots, one for mayor and three for each open Council position.

Photo identification is required to vote in Virginia. To register to vote and for more information about acceptable identification and other election-related information, visit **elections.virginia.gov.** The deadline to register to vote or to update an existing registration for this election is April 9.

The deadline to request that an absentee ballot be mailed to you is 5 p.m. Tuesday, April 24. The deadline to request an absentee ballot in person is 5 p.m. Saturday, April 28. Election information also is available at

### Vienna is home to world pasty champ

ince early March, a foodie frenzy has consumed a small 1,330-square foot Church Street shop. Ever since bringing home the grand prize from the World Pasty Championships in Cornwall, England, Vienna's Pure Pasty has been overwhelmed by customers who are "tearing their hair out" to sample the winning nontraditional pasty, made with barbecue chicken, sweet potato, zucchini, red pepper, sweet corn, and pineapple.

Pure Pasty owner Mike Burgess, who hails from a small English town south of Manchester and immigrated to the United States in 2009, explains that a traditional pasty is a foldover meat pie, "something halfway between an empanada and a calzone." Traditionally, a pasty is made with beef, potato, rutabaga, and onion, though Pure Pasty substitutes carrots for the rutabaga because it can't access enough fresh rutabaga in the States year round.

Leaving behind a career as an IT manager for a UK bank, Burgess has built Pure Pasty's reputation around providing nontraditional fusion flavors. "We do all kinds of weird and wonderful varieties," he says, including chicken curry, Moroccan lamb, chicken cordon bleu, and a monthly veggie variety.

Pure Pasty's winning entry in the 2018 world championships caused quite a backlash in the British press. According to a March 6 *Washington Post* article, Britain's *Daily Telegraph* called pineapple "among the most controversial and divisive ingredients chefs can add."

"I love the pineapple, and I love the controversy," says Burgess. "I love challenging people's conceptions about food. We do all kinds of wonderful things with our pasties. I'm not ashamed of that at all."

Burgess goes on to say that he tried to explain to the British press that there's "hardly any pineapple at all" in the world champion pasty. The acidic fruit, he says, is used only "to excite the explosion of spicy barbeque sauce."



awaited announcement of

the winning pasties in Cornwall the first weekend of March, he says that he was pretty sure that they hadn't won since they had not received a notification phone call. Standing in wet shoes in a cold rain, Burgess says he was ready to leave, get a beer, and regroup for next year, when it was announced that Pure Pasty had won the top prize. He remembers thinking initially "that company name sounds a lot like ours."

Burgess credits the victory to his Pure Pasty team. "Everything we do is a team effort," he says. "and it's great to see the team getting recognized for that."

If you're anxious to try the 2018 world champion pasty, there's no need to travel nearly 3,500 miles to Cornwall. You just need to stop in at Pure Pasty on Church Street – and perhaps be prepared to be patient as other area foodies gather to chomp on the champ and other fusion and traditional pasties.

# Meet the candidates asking for your vote - again

#### Mayor Laurie DiRocco

Thank you for the privilege of serving as Mayor of the Town of Vienna for the last four years. Citizens regularly ask me:

"How is everything in the Town?" The simple answer is that the Town is doing very well.

Vienna recently had its AAA bond rating reapproved and strives to provide high-quality services at the lowest possible cost. We continue to repave roads, install sidewalks, upgrade water and sewer lines, and improve facilities. These investments in infrastructure will provide long-term benefits for residents.

With the community center renovation, the Town certified its first LEED silver building, added native plants, and commissioned its first piece of public art. Council continues to focus on improving the Town's transportation network by adding bike routes and improving signalization along Maple Avenue. #### Councilmember Linda Colbert

Thank you for electing me to Town Council these past four years. I have enjoyed working with citizens, fellow

Councilmembers, commissioners, and Town staff. In the past two years, we have accomplished a considerable amount.

The community center renovations made the building more functional, attractive, efficient, and environmetally friendly. The new field house is used by youth and adults. The auditorium has been updated including a new sound system. The entire building was utilized when Madison High School's Ethics Day returned to the community center last spring. Greeting people at the entrance is Vienna's first piece of public art honoring our late Mayor Jane Seeman and all Vienna volunteers. I support our new Vienna Public Art Commission and look forward to having more public art around Town

#### Councilmember Pasha Majdi

Vienna is my hometown. I played VYS and VYI as a kid at Louise Archer Elementary, and now I'm raising my kids here. I grew

The next two years will be the most important period in Town history since the I-66 expansion in 1980. # **Explore Vienna via community bicycle rides**

pring is here, the weather is warming up, and it's a perfect time to get out on your bicycle. Beginning this month, the mayor and Town of Vienna Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) will host a series of community rides, exploring different areas of Town while demonstrating that getting around Vienna by bike is easy, safe, healthy, and fun.

These casual rides will be approximately three to four miles in length and should take no more than an hour. Most of the ride will be on low-volume streets, but will also explore several off-road park trails within Town.

Rides are currently scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Friday mornings:

- April 13 when Mayor Laurie DiRocco will turn in her walking shoes in favor of bike pedals (the usual Mayor's Walk for that Friday will be the Mayor's Bicycle Ride instead)
- April 27
- May 18 which also is National "Bike to Work Day."

All rides will begin and end at the community center. Riders will meet at the community center at 9:15 a.m. to prepare for the 9:30 departure. Bring your bike, a water bottle, and your bike helmet. No registration is necessary, but helmets are absolutely required. Children under the age of 16 must be accompanied by an adult.

"If there's enough interest, the Bicycle Advisory Committee will explore adding weekend and evening rides," says Beth Eachus, chair of the Bicycle Advisory Committee. "We wanted to start with easy rides suitable for all levels of bicyclists."

BAC Vice Chair Charlie Strunk adds: "In 2016, the Town of Vienna was recognized by the League of American Bicyclists as a Bicycle Friendly Community. We want our residents to experience firsthand how bike-friendly Vienna is. Community rides are a fun way to do this."

# 'Blithe Spirit' summoned for community center performances

hen *Blithe Spirit* opens April 20, it will have been 1,092 days since the Vienna Theatre Company (VTC) staged a full-scale production at the Vienna Community Center. After almost three years and completion of the community center renovation and expansion project, the wait is now over as VTC produces Noel Coward's 1941 comedy with Director Rosemary Hartman, a VTC veteran, at the helm.

Ironically, Hartman was also director for the last performance to take place at the community center pre-construction, which was a 2015 rendition of the 2011 drama *Other Desert Cities*. "It's kind of funny coming back full circle," says Hartman. "Everything is where it's supposed to be, being back home, except with a few neat upgrades."

One of those new "neat upgrades," which will be used in every full-scale production going forward, is the light/sound booth installed in the back of the auditorium.

"It's nice not having to have a table with our crew right in the middle of the floor," says Hartman. "Now, we can put our stage manager, light operator, and sound operator in the booth. They can coordinate via ear piece with our assistant stage manager, who runs the show backstage, to make for an even smoother show."

Indeed, the company is thrilled to be back in its regular space and to have that space truly designated as "theirs." Organizations and groups utilizing the expanded community center find that they have a little more elbow room.

"Yes, we did always have our shows in the auditorium," recalls Hartman, "but on occasion we would have to rehearse in one of



the rooms upstairs. We couldn't always get as much out of it as we would have had we consistently rehearsed in our performance space. We are grateful for the new design and room that allows us to flourish in our little dedicated world."

As for the production of *Blithe Spirit*, Hartman hints at its supernatural appeal. "The show is an enjoyable farce comedy for all ages," she says, "with a dose of ghostly things, a bit of fun, and supernatural elements. Oh, and the audience can look forward to some neat special effects!"

Blithe Spirit performances are at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, April 20, 21, 27, 28, May 4, and 5, as well as at 2 p.m. Sunday, April 29, and May 6. Tickets are \$14 and may be purchased online at viennava.gov/webtrac or in person at the community center. Any remaining tickets will be available for purchase at the door.

# Vienna tops Fairfax's best neighborhoods list

eople want to live in Northern Virginia – and with good reason.

In its March 2018 issue, *Northern Virginia Magazine* listed 24 NOVA neighborhoods that realtors say are the most sought-after places to live. Vienna took top honors among East Fairfax locations.

Like many of the localities that made the list, schools play a paramount factor in why people flock to Vienna. But it's Vienna's walkability and access to retail in a pedestrian-friendly infrastructure that separate it from the rest.

In the article, Weichert Realtors, located in the center of Town on Maple Avenue, noted a paradigm shift in what people prioritize when looking for a home – it used to be bigger lots and bigger houses, favoring neighborhoods in McLean or Oakton, but now people are willing to sacrifice a little room for a more walkable community.

Although safety is not explicitly mentioned in the Northern Virginia Magazine article,

it is a priority for residents and goes hand-in-hand with a school-focused atmosphere. In another ranking, the National Council for Home Safety and Security, recently ranked Vienna #2, just behind Blacksburg, on its 2018 Safest Cities in Virginia list.

# Solar continues to be a bright choice

olar pricing has dropped precipitously over recent years, making 2018 a bright time to harness the sun to generate your own household or business power and save money.

The 2018 Solarize program, a partnership between the Northern Virginia Regional Commission, Local Energy Alliance Program, and the Town of Vienna as well as other localities, makes it easy to purchase solar by providing vetted contractors and prenegotiated contract terms and prices for photovoltaic panels. Offered April 2-May 30, the 2018 Solarize program provides great prices for solar systems through the power of group purchasing.

The Community Enhancement Commission will host a Solarize informational meeting at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, May 3, in Town Council Chambers. At the meeting, interested homeowners and business owners can discuss solar installation with this year's selected Solarize vendors.

Don't forget, the federal government currently offers a 30% solar investment tax credit, which will sunset in a couple



of years. Also, Virginia residents can "net meter" excess energy generated by their solar systems, receiving a credit at the full retail rate; homeowners and businesses can then use that credit during times when the sun isn't shining.

To get a peek at how your home or business would fare with solar installation, check out the award-winning **novasolarmap.com.** When you type in your address, this tool analyzes your roof, its orientation, and shading and calculates how much solar power could be generated. Generating your own energy is a hedge against future increases in the cost of electricity provided by utility companies.

A Windover Heights family who has taken the solar plunge will be available to speak with those considering solar at the Green Expo, which will be held 2-5 p.m. Sunday, April 29, in conjunction with Walk on the Hill. Councilmember Carey Sienicki and her husband, David, purchased a 9-kilowatt system for their all-electric home in 2015. For the Sienickis, it was essential that the system pay for itself in 10 years or less. At Green Expo, they'll share their experience and data and answer your questions.

In the meantime, if you're ready to sign up for a free solar assessment or just want more details, visit solarizenova.org.

# Water taste a little funny? Spring flush on tap

very spring the Department of Public Works opens the floodgates on Town fire hydrants in order to clean out chloramines, which previously acted as disinfectant in the county's water supply. This process began in late March and will continue through mid-June. While this annual flush is occurring, chloramines are replaced with a different type of free chlorine. As a result, you may notice a chlorine taste and odor in your drinking water during the switch. If you are especially sensitive to the taste and odor of chlorine, try keeping an open container of drinking water in your refrigerator. This will allow the chlorine to dissipate, thus reducing the chlorine taste. Remember – drinking water has a shelf life! Change out the water in your refrigerated container weekly.

### Pledge to be a more attentive driver

The National Safety Council has designated April as Distracted Driver Awareness Month. Motor vehicle fatalities have crept up 6% since 2015, largely, it is believed, due to distractions such as cell phones and in-vehicle infotainment systems.
