Make more favorite memories at ViVa! Vienna! May 26-28

hat's your favorite ViVa! Vienna! memory? Get ready to make some new favorite memories with family and friends when Vienna celebrates its annual three-day festival Saturday, May 26, through Monday, May 28, in the heart of historic Vienna along Church Street.

The festival, hosted for 33 years by the Rotary Club of Vienna, features carnival rides, yummy food, live entertainment across three stages, and more

than 300 arts and craft and other vendors. The event, says Rotarian Cristin Etheredge "celebrates a spirit of community in our small town in the big city."

"I like seeing people so happy and enjoying themselves," adds Etheredge, who handles publicity for the festival and volunteers about 24 hours onsite over the three-day weekend. "I love watching the joy of the people at the festival, seeing their laughter and smiles and the joy they're sharing with their family and friends - and knowing that I played a small part in that is amazing."

The festival begins at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 26, with a focus that day on the 30 carnival rides and approximately 30 food vendors as well as entertainment on the Town Green. Sunday and Monday, the vendors join the festival, representing a variety of artisans, community and historic organizations, and

Vienna garners top billing on several 'best of...' lists

he Town of Vienna finds itself near the top of several of this spring's "best of" lists.

- LendEDU ranks Vienna as one of the top 50 places in the United States to start a small business. Vienna holds the #42 spot in the ranking based on cost of general expenses, disposable income available to residents, and population during standard business hours.
- SmartAsset says that Vienna is one of the 10 best places to retire in Virginia. The Town came in at #7 based on taxes (income and sales), number of doctors' offices, and opportunities for recreation and social life
- WalletHub.com ranks Vienna among the top 1% of cities with the highest credit scores. The median credit score in Vienna is 763, putting the Town in the 99th percentile relative to all other cities. \mathbf{V}

Mayor @ Your Service to be served Vienna, Austria style

asmin Al-Kattib and Richard Kromp are two video documentarians from Vienna – Vienna, Austria, that is. Their experience of visiting nine "Viennas" littered throughout the United States – including yours truly - are featured in their documentary *American Vienna*, which will be screened at the community center at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 8, as part of the Mayor @ Your Service forum.

The filmmakers visited Viennas around the country in 2014, starting in Maine

and then working their way to New York, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Illinois, Missouri, Alabama, and Georgia. Their 94-minute project explores these small, often drastically different, towns.

Vienna (Virginia) resident Jana Johnston caught the documentary at a film festival in Ocean City, Maryland, a couple of months ago and thought it would be great to show the film locally. She reached out to Al-Kattib as one Vienna-ite to another to secure permission to screen the film here.



In Johnston's review of the documentary, she praises Kromp's cinematography and applauds the film's storytelling as "charming and captivating." She adds: "They meet the sometimes-eccentric town folk who are humbly surprised to be in front of a camera and happily provide enlightenment into the heart of their town."

"I'm really excited to share this documentary with our community," says Mayor Laurie DiRocco. "It will be fun to see a visual dialogue between a bunch of Viennas, especially since they are located in different areas of the country. I hope that everyone comes out to the show and engages in the Q & A - it's always fun to go to the movies and chat about what you just saw afterward."

The Town of Vienna's *American Vienna* vignette includes an interview with local historian Mike Berger inside the Freeman Store where he shares a brief history of the Town and some of its character. It also includes scenes from the Town's July 4 celebration.

Fresh spot to get your produce

sponsors. A highlight of the festival on Monday is the Memorial Day Tribute on the Town Green main stage at 1 p.m.; Vienna resident and retired Marine Damien Marsh will be the guest speaker this year.

Admission to ViVa! Vienna! is free. Rides require a specific number of tickets, which varies from ride to ride; tickets are \$1 each or \$20 for a sheet of 24, or \$35 for an all-day wristband.

Parking in the historic area is very limited; ViVa! Vienna! parking signs will be posted where businesses have agreed to allow festival parking. Please don't park in residents' yards or block driveways. Consider avoiding the hassle of looking for a coveted parking space and take advantage of the ample parking and free shuttle available at the Vienna Metro station and Madison High School.

Over the course of the three-day festival, approximately 1,100 volunteer hours will be logged. According to Independent Sector, the estimated value of an hour of volunteer time is \$24.14, making the value of volunteer time at ViVa! Vienna! worth \$26,554. In addition, all funds raised by the festival are donated by the Rotary Club of Vienna to local community organizations and global nonprofits.

"I love the fact that 100% of proceeds from ViVa Vienna go out to 70-plus local charities and make an impact for these organizations," says 2018 festival chair AJ Oskuie. "So, we're having a great time and doing some good at the same time."

Helping community members make memories all while supporting charitable organizations definitely makes ViVa! Vienna! a win-win and a must-do over Memorial Day weekend.

Recycle smarter: Think before you throw

If unclean or non-recyclable items get tossed out along with good recyclables, it can defeat sustainability efforts and the purpose of the re-usable industry. As an organization that collects more than 1,100 tons of recycling each year, the Town of Vienna asks residents to think before they throw.

Across the nation, indeed around the globe, localities are working to accommodate new, stricter standards in recycling. This includes working within other nations' new directives. For example, in an effort aimed at eliminating "dirty recycling," China has implemented stricter standards for importing recyclables and banned some products.

To help keep your recycling clean, consider these tips:

- all recyclable items should be rinsed and free of any food residue before being placed in the bin
- Styrofoam, diapers, syringes, and light bulbs belong in the trash can, not the recycle bin
- plastic bags can be recycled at local grocery stores

• never put rechargeable batteries in the trash or recycling bin.

Save money & H₂O with rain barrel workshops

s homeowners begin to prepare their gardens for the spring season, it's a great time to take advantage of Fairfax County's rain barrel workshops. Rain barrels can be placed under downspouts to capture runoff from roofs. These workshops teach participants how to assemble, install, and maintain rain barrels. Workshops are offered throughout the spring and early summer to Fairfax County citizens (including Town of Vienna residents). A limited number of pre-made rain barrels are available for purchase as well.

Rain barrels are a great way to save money and water. Use the collected rain, rather than municipal tap H_2O , to water plants. Your plants will love the untreated, naturally soft water, and homeowners will enjoy the reduced water bill. By decreasing the volume of runoff, rain barrels also help prevent erosion and pollution from entering local streams and, ultimately, the Chesapeake Bay.

Spring build-your-own workshops will be held Saturday, May 12 and 19. The workshop cost per barrel is \$55. Please consider that most vehicles can fit only two rain barrels. To sign up and for additional information, visit fairfaxcounty.gov/soil-water-conservation/ rain-barrel.



Know the rules, keep your signs

ach year Vienna's Planning and Zoning Department, which is responsible for enforcing the Town's zoning code, removes nearly 2,000 illegal signs from Town rights-of-way. The highest number of illegally placed signs are found along Maple Avenue and Nutley Street.

Town code establishes signage standards that regulate how big signs can be and where they may be placed, which is essentially on private property. In addition, flashing neon signs and large fin flags are not permitted in Vienna.

Businesses who intend to install signage should consult with planning and zoning staff members to make sure that their signs, even temporary ones, are in line with code. A community case study for going native with landscaping

ew landscape plantings were installed at the Vienna Community Center last fall. This spring and summer, visitors to the site will really notice these colorful new plantings as they begin to flourish. The Morton and Spapperi Family Foundation funded the plantings and coordinated volunteers for the effort. I recently spoke with Julie Spapperi in order to learn more about the new plantings.

MA: How did your foundation become involved in the community center plantings?

JS: The Morton and Spapperi Foundation became interested in contributing to the community center plantings because we had learned that funding for the landscape portion of the renovation project had been severely reduced.... We saw this as an opportunity to make an impact with habitat restoration and native plantings in our own community.

MA: Why native plantings?

JS: Because they are hardy, long-lived, and require less water, fertilizer, and maintenance to thrive. Most importantly, native plantings support beneficial habitat including pollinators, such as butterflies, birds, and insects, all of which are necessary for plant pollination.

MA: What should we expect the new plantings to look like?

JS: As plantings continue to establish and flourish, community center visitors will observe flowering for more than eight months of the year. The extended bloom time is essential to provide a pollen source for wildlife for as many months as possible. It's important to understand that native plants provide the "right" pollen source for our local pollinators; this is why including natives in the landscape is so important.

MA: Should visitors look to the community center plantings to seek inspiration for their own gardens?

JS: Sure, native plants are easily grown; they are well adapted to our local climate in that they tolerate the high heat and humidity of summer and periods of drought. Native plants are well adapted to local soil, which is typically heavy clay; expensive soil amendments are not needed when planting with natives. There are native plants for sun and shade as well as plants that do well in wet soils and rain gardens. Visitors can access a QR code on new signage at the community center that provides a list of the new plantings; the signage is scheduled for installation in May.

MA: What tips do you have for homeowners wanting to make positive impacts for pollinators in their home gardens? JS:

- Stop using chemicals of all kinds in your lawn and garden. This includes weed killer in fertilizers as well as sprays to kill mosquitos. Chemicals kill beneficial insects.
- Start small if needed, make a commitment to plant one to three new native plants per year in your garden.
- When replacing trees in your yard, be sure to plant natives such as oak, maple, tulip poplar, black gum, hickory, redbud, and dogwood, to name a few. Plant native shrubs as well to support pollinators there are many to choose from.

Airbnb: What's its place in Vienna?

irbnb can be a fantastic option for quick stays, vacations, a night out, events, etc. – but not usually in the Town of Vienna.

By definition, Airbnb falls under the category of "transient lodging," which acts like a business such as a hotel or bed and breakfast operation – rather than as a permanent residence. And, Town code decrees that transient lodging is not allowed in single-family residential zones, unless occupants stay a minimum of 30 days.

When conforming with that 30-day minimum stay requirement, homeowners may rent their house to a single family, it doesn't matter how many people are in that family, as long as the owners themselves are not present. Owners also may rent to up to four unrelated individuals, when the owner is not present. If owners are present and rent individual rooms, they may rent to up to two unrelated individuals.

The collection of Town code language related to lodging restrictions, note planning staff members, is designed to maintain safety as well as the ambiance of a small-town neighborhood. Residents report that it can be somewhat off-putting, says Zoning Enforcement Officer Clarence Goodson, if a house on the block has a different car in the driveway or different faces coming in and out on a regular basis.

If homeowners wish to rent their house, Town code says go for it – just so long as it is for 30 days or more. For more information, call the Planning and Zoning Department at 703-255-6341.



Town of Vienna officials considered changing the Town's name during World War I, according to the *Home Front – The Great War and Vienna* exhibit currently on display at the Freeman Store and Museum.

According to the May 2, 1917 issue of the *Alexandria Gazette:* "So surely did the matter weigh on the mind of Charles E. Babcock, member of Vienna's Town Council, that he asked the Governor if he couldn't change the name of the town by executive order. Attorney-General Pollard, however, has advised Governor Stuart that he has no such authority. The Legislature chartered the town as Vienna, at the request of its citizens, and only the Legislature can rebaptize it.

"Fairfax County's cup of bitterness, however, is shared by fifteen other American towns which are listed in the Postal Guide as Vienna. Perhaps the disgrace is not so overt as in the case of the twenty-five towns and cities that go by the name of Berlin, nor so deep as that of the twenty towns that struggle along under the name of Hamburg."
