Vienna tax rate remains the same (again) as Council adopts \$38.6 million FY19 budget


he Town of Vienna's \$38.65 million fiscal year 2018-19 budget, approved by Town Council in May, becomes effective July 1. Council also maintained the Town's real estate tax rate at \$0.225/\$100 assessed value for the fourth consecutive year. The budget includes the Town's general, water and sewer, debt service, and stormwater funds. The adopted budget represents a 4.7% increase over last year.

The new budget provides for:

- a 3.5% performance-based salary increase for most employees as well as a twotiered, one-time, performance-based bonus program for employees who, at a minimum, exceed expectations
- regrading of 27 police officer positions and increasing salaries by 5% in order to remain competitive with surrounding jurisdictions
- addressing, along with increases in employee contributions, an 18% increase in health insurance costs

• a 3.5% increase in water rates and 10% increase in sewer rates as well as a 10-15% increase in service charges in order to

Muralists selected for new public art project

he Town of Vienna's Public Art Commission has selected a Seattle illustrator with roots in Vienna and a Richmond muralist and painter to create a mural on the back of the Vienna Shopping Center. Eleanor Doughty and Emily Herr's concept, "Vienna's W&OD Trail: Highway of Community," depicts landmarks along the trail throughout Town as well as in greater Northern Virginia and Washington, DC.

Rappaport Properties, owner of the Vienna Shopping Center at 180 Maple Avenue W, is funding this public art project.

The artists, Doughty and Herr, first met at Virginia Commonwealth University in 2009, where they were both fine arts students, and have collaborated on other mural projects.

"Having spent the first 18 years of my life in Vienna," Doughty wrote in her proposal, "... I grew up watching the Town change and stay the same.... The W&OD bike trail is central to my growing up here. My earliest memories involve sitting behind my dad in a bike seat as he cycled us around Northern Virginia on that path."

Of the mural concept, she wrote: "The W&OD trail will serve as the visual anchor representing Vienna. Overall the mural will be a map of Vienna, illustrating several of its major landmarks as well as outlying points of interest.... The general theme is to illustrate joyful, casual recreation of individuals in downtown Vienna (small town) against the greater surroundings of Northern Virginia and Washington, DC (big community)."

Work on the mural is scheduled to begin sometime around midsummer/early August and is expected to take about three weeks to complete.

James Madison High School art students will help create the design outline on the building and other students will assist with color blocking.

Incumbents re-elected


rates cover the full cost of operations and debt service, take into account increasing sewer treatment costs, and provide funding for water and sewer infrastructure needs

- three new full-time and one part-time public works
 positions, including a transportation planner/engineer, two
 maintenance workers, and a part-time water and sewer
 administrative assistant
- comprehensive update of the Town's zoning code, which has remained largely unchanged since 1969
- · a biennial citizen survey
- \$20,000 in parks improvements.

"Citizens will notice an increase in water and sewer rates," notes Town Manager Mercury Payton. "We hope that our citizens will recognize that these increases are absolutely necessary in order to address critical infrastructure needs, an issue that communities around the country are facing. The increased revenue – the average Town residential water customer will see a \$13.61 increase per quarter – will allow the Town to address infrastructure issues. Town Council felt it was imperative to address this community need."

The new water and sewer rates are the result of recommendations following a Municipal & Financial Services

General Fund Expenditures



Group study. Moving forward, the Town will review water and sewer rates annually and adjust as needed.

The Town's tax rate will remain unchanged at \$0.225/\$100. Residents will see increased property tax bills, however, due to increasing property values. Vienna's residential property values went up an average of 4.5% in the past year.

"This year's budget focuses on our people," says Payton. "We're pleased to be able to provide our hard-working

employees with a fair salary increase while addressing some of the issues that are most important to our residents, including water and sewer infrastructure, traffic-related needs, the Town's outdated zoning code, and parks improvements."

The Town's FY19 overall budget is separated into four funds:

Town to purchase Beulah Road property

he Town of Vienna has reached an agreement to purchase a home and lot at 440 Beulah Road NE, which borders the Town-owned Beulah Road mulch yard. The purchase price for the 0.43-acre site, which includes a one-story, single-family home constructed in 1955, is \$712,000. The Town will utilize 2018 bond premium funds for this purchase.

"This strategic purchase makes a lot of sense for the Town," says Planning & Zoning Deputy Director Michael D'Orazio, "as it complements a contiguous parcel, the mulch yard. Generally, the property will be held for a future public use yet to be identified."

The property may be utilized as a temporary space for police department personnel as the Town undertakes renovation of the police station on Center Street in the next couple of years.

Training provides foundation, ongoing skills development for new and seasoned police officers

f you were in need of computer repairs, would you hire someone who had excellent training in the late 1990s but no additional training since then or someone who's current on the latest technology? How about trusting your heart surgery to a doctor who hasn't received any additional on-the-job training over the past 10-20 years?

Whether it's computers, your health, or policing, it's important that practitioners stay current with new knowledge, technologies, and methods.

"Training is critically important," says Master Police Officer Jarod Evans, "because police work is ever changing there are new technologies and methods, and the law is always changing. We've got to stay on top of it so that when an officer is exposed to a situation for the first time, the reaction isn't 'Oh my God, I've never dealt with this,' but rather 'OK, this is new, but I know how to handle this thanks to training."

Evans has been assigned as the Vienna Police Department's liaison at the Fairfax County Criminal Justice Academy in Chantilly, where over the past three years he's taught classes to recruits as well as current law enforcement officers from the Vienna, Fairfax County, and Herndon police departments as well as deputies from the Fairfax County Sheriff's Office. New Vienna officers train at the academy for six months, practicing driving, firearms, and control tactics skills as well as learning about conflict resolution, mental health awareness, de-escalation strategies, investigative techniques, traffic code, handling evidence, legal training, first aid and CPR, and more.

The Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Service requires a minimum of 480 hours of training for new officers. At the Fairfax County academy, new officers undertake 900 hours of training, nearly

double the state requirement. And once they hit the road for the first time. Vienna officers are shadowed/instructed by a field training officer for another 500 hours. (The state requirement for field training is 100 hours.)

"We're building a foundation with new recruits," Evans says. "If we can help them get it right in the beginning, hopefully we'll have a great officer or deputy."

After a Vienna officer is certified, he or she is required to take a minimum of 40 hours of in-service training every two years. Again, Vienna officers overachieve. Last year alone, Vienna's police officers (who number 41 when at full staff) undertook 1,500 hours of career development, legal, and cultural diversity training.

"The most important thing we can provide officers throughout their entire career," says Vienna Police Chief Jim Morris, "is timely, relevant training. Even someone like me, with almost 30 years of law enforcement experience, attends many hours of in-service training every year - and each time I walk away with new, valuable information."

Incumbent training often takes place

Northern Virginia Criminal Justice Training Academy in Ashburn. Sometimes, the training comes to Vienna.

On several occasions, Evans has brought a sophisticated training simulator, borrowed from the Fairfax County academy, to the Vienna station. About the size of a full home theatre, the interactive simulator has about 400 scenes pre-programmed and can "react" to the officers' actions. One scenario, for example, dispatches officers to a park where a suspicious person is sitting at a table with a knife; upon contact, the person appears to have a mental illness.

"It's one thing for me to teach a class on how to handle this type of call for service," says Evans. "It's additionally helpful to actually see it and act it out as if it were real."

One thing that has changed significantly about policing over the past decade, notes Evans, is that "being a cop isn't just about going around enforcing laws. We need to perform that role still for sure, but officers also have become community caretakers. They need to have a strong desire to help people. That's part of our responsibility to the community and the public."

The value of Town boards and commissions

hy does the Town of Vienna have boards and commissions? I am occasionally asked about their role in our local government. Many of the boards make recommendations to Council on specific subjects while others make final decisions on certain aspects of Town business. Board and commission members are appointed by Council, and each board is supported by Town staff.

Town Council relies on these boards to review detailed materials, adhere to Town code and Virginia law, and provide recommendations. Many of the citizens serving have experience in the subject matter of their particular board. Commission members typically become experts in certain aspects of the Town, make thoughtful and objective decisions, and provide valuable feedback on policy and planning. Vienna is fortunate to have citizens who volunteer their time and energy to serve on boards and commissions.

Consider a few projects some of our boards and commissions have recently undertaken:

- The Vienna Public Arts Commission (VPAC) has reviewed and selected submissions for a mural at the back of the Vienna Shopping Center. James Madison High School students are working with VPAC on this project, which will likely begin around August.
- The Community Enhancement Commission is in the midst of its fourth Solarize NOVA campaign. This program allows residents and businesses to invest in solar at group rates.

- The Town Business Liaison
 Committee recently surveyed
 local businesses in an effort to
 improve communications with
 and processes in the Town.
- The Pedestrian Advisory
 Committee created a Pedestrian
 Master Plan, which will help
 support walkability in Town,
 prioritize sidewalks, and
 improve pedestrian access. The
 Bicycle Advisory Committee is
 sponsoring local bike rides.

Town and Spapperi Foundation: A partnership sealed in green

olor this friendship green: The Town's Parks and Recreation Department and The Morton and Spapperi Foundation are continuing their beautiful, environment-focused friendship, this time with water quality, ecological enhancement, and education in mind.

Last fall, the foundation worked with students from Thoreau Middle School and other Town volunteers to install a native plant garden in front of the community center. Students from Madison High School, as part of their geometry class curriculum, helped design the native garden walkway and sitting areas, providing real-world application of the students' studies.

For their new project, the Town and foundation partnered with the Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District to design and install a buffer of native plants along the headwaters of the Piney Branch tributary (adjacent to the softball batting cage and W&OD trail, just beyond the community center parking lot). The goal of this project was to create wildlife and pollinator

habitats and improve water quality reaching the tributary, thereby making the surrounding environment healthier.

Approximately 350 native plants, representing 22 different species, were strategically placed in and around the tributary in May to effectively clean the water and reduce contaminants that otherwise would flow through Piney Branch to the Potomac River and eventually into the Chesapeake Bay. Native plants are hardy, require less maintenance, and support local wildlife and their ecosystems. The area will be appropriately labeled with signage to educate the curious on plants selected, what the buffer does, and what its effects are.

Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman welcomed the new nesting opportunity with open arms. "Everything turned out great our first time around with the garden planting," she says, "so we were excited to have the foundation work on another project with us. Not only is it a chance to make environmental improvements on both local and state levels, but once again it provides an opportunity for residents to help keep their own community environmentally friendly and learn something in the process."

Morton and Spapperi Family Foundation President Julie Spapperi highlighted the many opportunities within the Town: "As a cornerstone of our foundation, our mission is to initiate and participate in projects designed to preserve, enhance, and restore land to greater ecological value and provide support through education in the sciences and engineering. We've enjoyed working with the Town and look forward to seeing these projects mature. We'll hopefully have additional ecological projects to come next year."
