# Vienna mayor's leadership extends across NOVA region

hen Vienna Mayor Laurie
DiRocco became vice chair
of the Northern Virginia
Regional Commission's (NVRC)
executive board in September 2016, she
assumed the role would allow her to learn
about regional issues and connect with
leaders from other jurisdictions. She was
right about that – she just hadn't realized
that it would be a total immersion in the
deep end of the pool type of experience.

Just one month later in October 2016, DiRocco had become chair of the commission's executive board, following the sudden resignation of the previous chair. It also had become clear that NVRC was operating significantly in the red. And, a short time later, NVRC's executive director of 28 years retired.

"I wanted to walk out of that first executive board meeting," DiRocco says. "I had gotten myself into more than I realized at the time. The first six months were really challenging."

Now two years later and as it approaches its 50th anniversary next year, NVRC, one of 21 regional planning districts within the Commonwealth, is on surer fiscal footing, has a new executive director and a staff with strong expertise in their fields, and anticipates that all financial issues will be completely resolved by next spring.

The commission serves as a convener of local government leaders who come together to address regional issues.



elected representatives, at least one from each of the jurisdictions represented, serves on the commission.

"There's a lot of common interests among Northern Virginia jurisdictions," says DiRocco. "Where we have common interests and common goals, NVRC can get more done as a regional body than any single local jurisdiction can on its own. NVRC is a collaborative body that puts aside boundaries for the common good of the region."

"The power of the NVRC," adds Executive Director Robert Lazaro, "is in its collective voice." An organization representing a region of nearly 2.5 million people is able to leverage more clout than a Town of 16,000 people can alone, he notes.

As an example of a recent NVRC success, Lazaro points out that the commission worked to encourage Dominion Energy to provide Northern Virginia localities with more efficient LED lighting in a wider variety of bulb styles and at a lower cost than the utility had previously offered.

The NVRC also administers funding and services for regional residents living with AIDS and HIV through the Ryan White AIDS Service and the Virginia Department of Health. "Localities don't have to set up their own bureaucracies to serve this population, which means that there's more money to help people," Lazaro says.

Through NVRC, smaller localities like Vienna, working hand in hand with representatives from the larger counties, can focus on regional issues that may be too big for single jurisdictions. DiRocco notes that at its February retreat, the NVRC board determined to focus its efforts in the areas of energy, work force development, governance and the region's and localities' relationship with the state, and affordable housing.

The mayor notes that one of the most significant benefits of Vienna's participation in NVRC has been the sharing of best practices. "It's good to know our neighbors and share best practices," she says. "Not only do we learn how other jurisdictions are addressing issues, members also gain a better understanding of what's happening in the region and in the state – and how that can benefit us as a community."

DiRocco says that she has enhanced her leadership skills through her experience with the NVRC, particularly in the areas of patience, collaboration, public speaking, and diplomacy.

Lazaro says that, in many ways, DiRocco, whose term ends next June, was exactly who the NVRC needed at the time she came on board. "She has a strong business background, and she's very focused on making sure that we stick to our plan. Laurie's not adverse to making difficult decisions, and she's collaborative, ensuring that everyone has a voice at the table. Her job has been to knit those conversations and reach a decision."

"Laurie DiRocco is a great colleague in local government and has been an outstanding chair of the Northern Virginia Regional Commission," says Sharon Bulova, chairman of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors. "Mayor DiRocco assumed this post at a time when turbulence and financial difficulties rocked the commission. She slid right into the position with grace, confidence, and character."

NVRC meets at 7:30 pm on the fourth Thursday of the month, except in August and December, at 3040 Williams Drive in Fairfax; the executive committee meets beforehand at 6.

# A gem in each quadrant

here's *so much* to love about Vienna – not the least of which are the Town's fabulous parks. Parks populate each quadrant of Town – and no matter where you live, you can walk or bike (or drive) to see a little green.

#### Northeast

Two of my favorite parks are in northeast Vienna: Glyndon Park and Northside Park.

Glyndon Park is a gem for citizens of all ages. It boasts a fabulous, tree-covered playground, picnic tables, turf Little League field, basketball court, and two tennis courts as well as a paved path. It plays host to several parks and recreation programs throughout the year.

Northside Park is located next to the W&OD trail, just north of the Northside Property Yard. This 28-acre nature park is perfect for hiking, jogging, and dog-walking. When walking along the bucolic stream in the park, it's hard to believe that you are right next to a vibrant small town and not in the middle of nowhere. Stop to listen to the birds and squirrels and to enjoy the dappled sunshine coming through the trees.

#### **Northwest**

Peterson Park on Malcolm Road is jointly owned and operated with the Fairfax County Park Authority. It has playgrounds, a

basketball court, and lots of open area for unstructured play.

#### Southeast

Newly renovated Wildwood Park stretches from the W&OD trail to the edge of Town. Multiple trails connect the park with neighbors, and placards along the pathway inform about local flora and fauna. Park benches allow for quiet moments of reflection along the stream.



#### **Southwest**

Even if you aren't a dog owner, the Vienna Dog Park, adjacent to the county's Nottoway Park, is a fabulous place to visit. At Vienna's only off-leash dog area, dogs can run and play under the supervision of their owners. The dog park is shaded, has a "doggie playground," and a water supply to make sure those doggies remain well hydrated.

# Five tips for small-businesses success: What do the pundits recommend?

unning a small business successfully is no small task. Each year, a plethora of consulting firms and business journals provide tips to entrepreneurs to help them make their small businesses successful. - **4.** Track and review business costs periodically: The age-old good practice of monitoring and utilizing technology, such as iCloud-based solutions, to reduce costs remains a top five tip.
- **5.** Hire and maintain high-quality staff: Investing in an excellent staff force be it temporary or permanent is still relevant for most businesses.

Each of these tips may seem obvious; the challenge often is in the time commitments they require. As you think about what's important for your business over the next year, perhaps one of these ideas will resonate.

# Fall is the perfect time to plant

s you walk or drive through Vienna, it's easy to see why the Town recently was re-certified as a National Wildlife Federation Wildlife Habitat community. We have wildlife habitat, including pollinator gardens, throughout Town. Would you like to be part of the action? You can help by planting wildlife-friendly habitats in your yard.

A pollinator garden is a great way to start. These gardens are easy to plant and maintain, and they help support pollinator populations (like butterflies, bees, and flies) in our local area. You can design your pollinator garden to surround your home or lawn, thus removing grass that you'd otherwise have to mow – it's a win-win! Even if you don't have much space, many pollinator nectar and larval plants can be grown in containers – there's nothing holding you back.

When you plant a pollinator garden, remember that you'll need to plant two different types of plants:

- nectar plants like bee balm, liatris, and joe pye weed that supply adult pollinators with nectar for energy
- larval plants, which pollinators eat when they're larvae (many pollinators rely on specific larval plants and can only eat these particular plants when they are in the caterpillar stage think monarch butterflies and milkweed).

If you'd like to learn from the experts, you're in luck. Fall is the perfect time to plant perennials, and the Town of Vienna will host a native plant sale from 8 a.m.-1 p.m. Saturday, September 22, in the Vienna Community Center parking lot. Come on out, pick up a few plants, and learn from our team of nurseries, who are experts on native and pollinator-friendly plants.
