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### Survey says: Vienna a great place to live

# Vienna residents rate safety, events, services, and engagement highly

esults from the Town of Vienna's participation in the National Citizen Survey, conducted in October, are in. The conclusion? Overall, Town of Vienna residents really dig where they live.

Responding residents rated Vienna as excellent or good as a place to raise children (98%), as a place to live (96%), and for quality of life (94%). All of these rankings put Vienna above national benchmark comparisons. Nine in 10 Vienna residents would recommend living in the community to someone who asked.

The National Citizen Survey, which is conducted by the National Research Center (NRC) in partnership with the International City/ County Management Association, captures residents' opinions within three pillars of community (community characteristics, governance, and participation) across eight facets of community (safety, mobility, natural environment,

built environment, economy, recreation and wellness, education and enrichment, and community engagement).

The survey was randomly mailed to 1,600 Town of Vienna addresses in October; with about 3% of mailings returned by the post office, surveys were received at 1,559 Vienna households. With 695 completed surveys returned, Vienna's response rate was 45%, which, according to the NRC, is one of the highest response rates generated by a community taking the National Citizen Survey over the past decade. Typical response rates for this survey are in the 20th percentile. The margin of error for Vienna's survey is about 4%.

## Trends and comparisons to the national benchmark

Across 126 categories measured by Vienna's version of the National Citizen Survey, the Town was rated higher by its residents than national comparison communities in 65 categories, similar in 57, and lower in four. Lower ratings, *see Survey page 2*

compared to the benchmark, were for traffic flow, ease of travel by car, affordable quality housing, and number of residents who work in Vienna. The Town scored in the top 20 among benchmark communities in 30 areas; in 10 of those instances, Vienna broke into the top 10. *(See page 4.)* 

National benchmarks provide context for Vienna's ratings. "Taking the pulse of the community has little meaning without knowing what pulse rate is too high and what is too low," says the NRC. The National Citizen Survey benchmark includes 605 communities across the nation and represents more than 30 million Americans. The benchmark for each category depends on the number of communities that include that particular question on their surveys.

Compared to earlier Vienna citizen surveys, conducted in 2014 and 2016 by ETC Institute, ratings remained generally stable. In 42 comparison areas, 35 had similar ratings in 2018; four showed a decrease (travel by public transportation, traffic flow, overall direction, and street repair); and three demonstrated an increase (paths and walking trails, opportunities to participate in community matters, and traffic signal timing).

#### Vienna's story

The NRC drew four conclusions about the Town of Vienna based on survey results:

- Vienna is a great place to live, and residents enjoy a strong sense of safety.
- Vienna's economy is both a valued asset and a challenge.
- Alternative transportation is a highlight of the community.
- Residents appreciate recreation, wellness, and enrichment offerings in the community.

Resident ratings for safety-related services were exceptional, exceeding all national benchmarks. Residents reported feeling safe overall as well as in their neighborhoods and in the downtown/ commercial area.

Residents characterized the economy as an important measure of quality of life and identified it, as well as mobility and built environment, as a focus area for the next two years. Survey participants awarded top marks to the overall economic health of Vienna and evaluated vibrancy of the downtown/commercial area, economic development, employment, and shopping opportunities at levels higher than comparison communities. When asked about Town priorities over the next 3-5 years, approximately 8 in 10 felt that employing economic development strategies to bring additional visitors and revenue to Vienna and improving Town policies and practices to be more business-friendly should be high or medium priorities.

Vienna residents indicated that they use public transit or walk or bike instead of driving at rates higher than in other communities. Residents appreciate street cleaning, snow removal, and leaf pickup services, with these ratings outshining comparison communities. However, public parking, ease of travel by car, and traffic flow were rated less positively, with the latter two areas falling below national benchmarks.

Vienna residents exhibit above-average rates of participation within their community, especially

in the areas of education and enrichment, recreation and wellness, and community engagement. They also appreciate social events, opportunities to participate in community matters, and the openness and accepting nature of the community. In addition, residents praised public information services, indicating that they find the Vienna Voice newsletter. Town website, and email/text alerts valuable.

#### **Community priorities**

When asked which of the provided topics should be Town priorities over the next 3-5 years, residents rated increasing and improving public green spaces as the top priority, with 46% saying it should be a high priority and 45% identifying it as a medium priority. Here's how residents rated other areas as high and medium priorities:

Provide public parking opportunities in commercial districts	88%
Improve Town policies, practices to be more business-friendly	83%
Employ economic development strategies to enhance commercial areas and increase visitors and revenue	81%
Enhance public art throughout the community	57%
Build a community swimming pool	46%
Add a splash pad at Town Green or other location	43%

When asked to agree or disagree with several statements related to Maple Avenue, 9 in 10 agreed that power lines should be buried underground. Eight in 10 agreed that buildings should be designed to create a sense of place and not be taller than four stories and that sidewalks should be widened to accommodate landscaping and outdoor seating. Almost two-thirds of respondents agreed that Maple Avenue should have more retail stores and restaurants and that new development should include both commercial and residential uses; about 2 in 10 strongly disagreed with these statements.

## Residents rate Vienna among 20 best communities in 30 categories

Residents' ratings put Vienna among the top 20 communities in the National Citizen Survey (NCS) benchmark in 30 categories, 10 of those times Vienna broke into the top 10. The NCS benchmark represents 605 communities of varying population sizes across the country and more than 30 million Americans. For each question/category, Vienna was compared to other participating communities who asked a similar question.

## Maple Avenue survey results reveal citizens' preferences

esults from the Maple Avenue Commercial (MAC) visual preference survey that was available this past fall indicate that citizens prefer wider pedestrian corridors and buildings that appear to be individually constructed over time.

"While there were a number of take-aways from the survey, two really stand out," says Planning and Zoning Director Cindy Petkac. "It's clear that residents desire wider, less encumbered sidewalks, though they still appreciate street trees and landscaping and want to be buffered from traffic on Maple Avenue. They also prefer that buildings at least appear to be individual structures built over a period of time and with varying rooflines, that they not be one monolithic structure."

Planning staff will now take the survey results and, working with the Board of Architectural Review, develop visual design guidelines for builders wishing to redevelop Maple Avenue properties under the voluntary MAC zoning ordinance, which provides for mixed-use, pedestrian-friendly projects. The Town's MAC zoning ordinance is temporarily suspended until at least June as the Town develops visual design guidelines and works through the Planning Commission and Town Council to amend aspects of the zoning ordinance.

While the Town is prohibited by its charter from prescribing any one style of architecture, the guidelines can visually articulate the styles and standards preferred by the community, including preferences related to materials, massing, setbacks, building form, site design, and streetscape.

The Town will invite additional community input this spring after guidelines are drafted and Town Council, the Planning Commission, and Board of Architectural Review members have an opportunity to weigh in at work sessions that are anticipated to be held in February.

"The goal," says Petkac, "is to give developers an idea of what the community prefers via the guidelines and then provide clear minimal expectations through amendments to existing standards."

Once the visual guidelines are complete and citizens have had an opportunity to provide input, planning and zoning staff will work with the Planning Commission and Town Council to make amendments to the MAC zoning ordinance, which applies to a 1.5-mile stretch of Vienna's main commercial corridor from East Street to the western Town limit.

The Town received 1,400 survey responses, with 1,064 verified as from Town residents or business/property owners.

"That's a phenomenal response rate," Petkac notes. "We're really grateful to those who took the time to rate their favorability of a collection of photos representing communities around the country."

Survey results are available at viennava.gov/macsurveyresults. In addition to rating 41 images, survey-takers had the option of providing additional comments at the end of the survey. Of the 1,064 verified responses, 397 included comments.

"Many of the comments were very thoughtful and helpful," says Planning and Zoning Deputy Director Mike D'Orazio. "They went directly to the purpose of the survey and were very specific about concerns and things to think about as we craft design guidelines."

Some respondents expressed a desire that the survey had included photos of buildings less than three or four stories. However, the Town's current zoning ordinance allows for three-story construction on Maple Avenue "by right" and a key component of the MAC is the provision for four-story, mixeduse development. 🕚

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## **Record rain impacts Town projects**

he Washington D.C. metropolitan area's record-setting 67 inches of rain in 2018 not only caused picnics to be cancelled and commutes to be grim, the record rainfall also impacted Town of Vienna operational and construction projects. Several Town construction projects took longer than expected, the mural installation at the back of the Vienna Shopping Center was put off for several months, and some Town maintenance projects, such as lane restriping and pavement sealing, were deferred because of wet weather conditions.

"Weather affects every kind of construction," says Town Civil Engineer Luis Blandon, who has supervised many of the Town's roadway and other construction projects. "We check the weather report every week and do our best to plot out on which days we are going to be excavating for road, curb and gutter, and sidewalk because if we start to dig and pour concrete while it rains, it ruins everything. It can be a tricky back and forth."

Of course, the rain also impacted the more than 100 private construction projects undertaken throughout Town last year. Inspector Emily Goodman noted an extreme uptick in calls and emails related to erosion and sediment control issues. Fairfax County reported that it received more than twice as many complaints about erosion and sediment control problems at construction sites in the first 10 months of 2018 than were received in all of 2017.

Goodman inspects all construction sites in Town to ensure that they are complying with Virginia Department of Environmental Control regulations. If you have concerns about sediment issues, contact Goodman at emily.goodman@viennava.gov or 703-255-6384.

Also, due to last year's plethora of plants' drink of choice, the Town's tree leaves did not fall on their normal schedule. The wellnourished leaves clung to their host trees longer than usual and, as a result, citizens were raking and the Town was collecting leaves right to the very end of the year.

Last year's area rainfall total broke a record that had weathered 129 years. The previous record for the D.C. metro area was set in 1889, one year before the Town of Vienna was incorporated. Hopefully, we can all put our umbrellas away for a little while, and 2019 doesn't bring any such new records.

## Two Town programs assist furloughed federal workers

s the federal government shutdown became the longest in U.S. history, the Town of Vienna undertook two programs to assist furloughed federal employees. Using funds available through attrition, the Town hired 10 furloughed workers, most of whom are Town residents, on a part-time, temporary basis in mid-January. The temporary employees were hired for up to four weeks and assigned to tasks in communications, information technology, parks and recreation, police, and public works.

In addition, the Town will extend the payment due date and waive fees for water bills due January 31 for furloughed federal employees. Town of Vienna water customers who wish to apply for the payment extension must show proof of federal employment (via a badge or pay stub) at the finance counter at Town Hall from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday.

"News outlets report that approximately 78% of federal employees live paycheck to paycheck, and many of those are hourly workers," Human Resources Director Maggie Kain says. "If the Town can contribute just a bit to the cause of helping our neighbors, why not do it?" **V**

## **Recycling reminders**

R esults from the 2018 National Citizen Survey indicate that 96% of Town residents recycle at home. Keep it up, Vienna! In addition, 87% of survey respondents rated the Town's curbside recycling services positively, placing Vienna among the top 20 communities in the National Citizen Survey benchmark of comparison communities across the country.

Here's a reminder of what can and cannot be included in residential recycling, per Fairfax County guidelines:

#### Do include:

- mixed paper, magazines, junk mail, newspapers
- · flattened cardboard
- glass bottles and jars (changes in the recycling industry related to glass are underway, but Vienna continues to accept glass with recyclable materials)
- metal food and beverage cans
- cartons (for milk or juice, for example) remove caps and straws
- plastic food and beverage bottles, jugs, and tubs

#### Do not include:

- · household hazardous waste
- used electronics
- · takeout containers
- plastic bags
- diapers
- pizza boxes
- Styrofoam, clamshell, or clear plastic containers
- packaging peanuts

#### **Quarterly Recycling Day is March 2**

In addition to providing curbside recycling services, the Town hosts a Quarterly Recycling Day at which used motor oil, antifreeze, batteries, and electronics are accepted. The Town's next Quarterly Recycling Day is from 8 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, March 2, at the Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill Street NE. Paint, other hazardous materials, and CRT-type computers or TVs (those with large backsides) will not be accepted.

## Town hires Downey & Scott as police facility project manager

t its January 7 meeting, Town Council approved a contract with Warrenton-based Downey & Scott, LLC to provide project management services for design, construction, and post-construction of a new police facility. The contract price for project management services is not to exceed \$318,950.

The Town currently is working with Dewberry to design the new police facility, on which construction is expected to begin in 2020. Over the past five years, Downey & Scott, which has 34 years' experience in construction management, has provided services for more than 500 projects in Virginia, including police and public safety facilities and schools.

"I'm pleased to work with an experienced firm like Downey & Scott," says Vienna Police Chief Jim Morris, "to help ensure that each phase of our construction project, as much as possible, runs smoothly and meets established deadlines."

## Be a good (snow) neighbor

he Town's first 2019 snowfall ushered in about 8 inches of the fluffy white stuff in mid-January and offered an opportunity to remind residents of some shoveling etiquette that can help out the Town as well as your neighbors.

Town snowplows make multiple passes throughout Vienna during a snow event. The initial focus is on primary roads, then secondary roads, followed by neighborhood streets. Just because a plow has been down your road once, doesn't necessarily mean that the job is done. In the same way, the Town suggests that you plan to **shovel your driveway and sidewalk more than once.** This will allow you smoother access to your driveway (if necessary) during a snow event and it's easier on your body to shovel a couple of inches at a time rather than 6-8 inches of snow all at once.

Please **pile snow onto grassy areas to the side of your driveway, not back in the street.** If snow is thrown back in the street after plowing is completed, it can cause some of those hazardous icy conditions that the plowing is trying to negate.

Town plow drivers try to be careful, but inevitably a few driveways, especially on cul de sacs, will get plowed back in after shoveling. If this happens to you, please accept the Town's apologies and **reshovel your driveway entrance**.

The Town requests that corner-property owners **shovel sidewalks both to the front and side of the property** to allow schoolchildren, dog walkers, and other pedestrians safer travel. And consider being "neighbor of the year" and **check with elderly or disabled neighbors** who may need some shoveling assistance.

## Money may not grow on trees, but your donation can help plant a tree

ne of the defining characteristics of Vienna is the presence of so many stately trees located throughout Town. Achieving Tree City USA certification, through the National Arbor Day Foundation, for the past 17 years is a testament to our Town's devotion to its trees. Yes, Viennans love their trees. In fact, few events generate more consternation among Town residents than the sight of mature native trees coming down as part of the new home construction process. The Town and its arborists work very hard to protect our treescape during this process, but Virginia law imposes very real limits on what can be done in this regard.

However, there are steps that we all can take to add new trees to our community. In addition to planting native trees, like oaks, maples, river birches, and dogwoods, on our own properties, residents and businesses can help the Town plant more native trees in public spaces through donations to the Heritage Dedication Program.

To fully fund a tree installation, residents and businesses can make a \$200 donation; for an additional \$250, a plaque identifying the donor will be installed at the tree-planting site. However, all donations to the program, regardless of the amount, are added to the fund until the amount needed to add a tree is reached.

Since 2014, donations to the fund have resulted in tree installations in Northside, Glyndon, and Sara Mercer parks as well as at the Little Library near the Freeman Store and Museum, Town Green, Vienna Community Center, and several street rights-of-way.
