Free admission, priceless memories at annual community festival



he cost of an all-day ride wristband at the annual ViVa! Vienna! festival: \$35. The cost of admission to the three-day, Memorial Day weekend event: Free. The memories made at the community festival, which features live entertainment, more than 125 food vendors and crafters, and, of course, tummy-tickling rides: Priceless.

Each year dozens of Rotary Club of Vienna volunteers stage the community festival, which bears the Town's name and offers fond memories for generations of Vienna citizens. The Rotary Club works hard to ensure that the festival remains affordable and accessible.

"Compared to other festivals in the area, ViVa! is designed to be accessible for families," says Rotary Club President A.J.

Oskuie. "It's not designed to cost attendees an arm and a leg, unlike a lot of similar experiences. Part of our mission is to keep that in mind. As a charity organization, yes, we want to generate funds to distribute to community organizations, but we don't want to punish the guests who are helping us reach that goal by charging them a fortune."



Sorry, the more than three dozen rides are not free. The number of tickets needed varies from ride to ride; tickets are \$1 each, \$20 for a sheet of 24, or \$35 for an all-day wristband. But remember, it's all for a good cause.

Vienna Community Center is golden

he recently renovated Vienna Community Center isn't only bigger and better – it's also golden. The community center has received gold-level LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification through the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC).

The most widely used green building rating system in the world, according to the USGBC website, the LEED program provides a framework to create healthy, highly efficient, and cost-saving green buildings.

The Vienna Community Center attained gold-level certification through its new construction/major renovation project, which was completed in 2017.

"We knew going into the renovation project that our goal was to have a silver-

level LEED-certified building," says Mayor Laurie DiRocco. "We're very excited to have exceeded our goal and proud to have this recognition

of Vienna's commitment to enhancing sustainability."

The Vienna Community Center received 62 of 110 possible LEED points, qualifying the building and construction project for the second-highest rating available through the USGBC program. RRMM Lukmire Architects managed the LEED certification process for this project.

Among the categories for which the community center attained LEED points were alternative transportation – public transportation access and parking capacity, stormwater design quality control, water efficient landscaping, optimizing energy performance, use of recycled and lowemitting materials, having a green housekeeping management plan, construction waste management, and building reuse - maintaining existing walls, floors, and roof. **U**

"Many people appreciate the opportunity to have all-day entertainment for their children in their own community at a price that's dwarfed by the fees, tickets, and other costs at major theme parks," says Oskuie.

> As ViVa! intends to be inclusive in its experience, so is distribution of the festival's proceeds.

The Rotary Club splits 100% of the event's earnings among as many local organizations as possible. "We write checks from a couple of hundred dollars to \$5,000 dollars to help as many people we can," says Rotarian Jodi Scholes. "We don't just want to write one big check; we want to write hundreds of little checks to maximize the impact we can have in the community."

In addition, this year, proceeds from purchases of festival t-shirts, which are being created using a winning design selected from among high school art student entries, will support Fisher House Foundation, which helps keep veteran and military families together during times when medical care is needed.

ViVa! Vienna! is open from 10 a.m.-10 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, May 25 and 26, and from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Monday, May 27. Find more information at

First phase of study looks at existing multimodal conditions along Maple

rapping up the first phase of the Maple Avenue Multimodal
Transportation and Land Use Study, traffic consultants KimleyHorn presented data related to existing multimodal conditions in the
commercial corridor, which also includes Church Street, at the April 1 Town
Council work session and an April 4 community meeting. The April community
meeting was the first of three that will be part of the community engagement
process related to the study.

In their presentations, Kimley-Horn representatives noted that overall transportation challenges in the corridor include:

- a dual identity as a "Main Street" and arterial roadway
- · narrow sidewalks
- interactions between pedestrians and autos
- · numerous full access commercial entrances
- lack of on-street bicycle facilities
- relatively low transit service frequency serving direct mobility needs to and from the corridor
- numerous unconnected surface parking lots
- discontinuous parallel street network south of Maple Avenue.

Strengths in the corridor include:

- · well-connected sidewalk network
- · trail access
- several accessible bus stops
- · most intersections operate at an acceptable level
- median lanes increase capacity by removing turning traffic from through lanes
- pedestrian signals are integrated into the signal network.

Kimley-Horn reported that about 37% of the daily trips along Maple Avenue, which number more than 33,000, occur during the morning and evening rush hours. Translation: Maple Avenue is congested most of the day.

Kimley-Horn's presentation can be found on the Town's website, **viennava.gov**, on the Public Works/Administration page.

In the next phase of the study, Kimley-Horn will look at future corridor conditions up to 2030 and suggest how reasonably anticipated future development, through the Maple Avenue Commercial zone and by-right, may impact levels of activity for each travel mode and how the various modes may interact with one another. These findings will be presented at a community meeting at 7 p.m. Wednesday, June 12, at Town Hall. Study recommendations will be presented later this summer.



Top 10 reasons to visit the Vienna Farmers Market

he Vienna Farmers Market opens for the season Saturday, May 4. Sponsored and operated by the Optimist Club of Greater Vienna, the market is 100% volunteer-run and nonprofit. The farmers market will be open 8 a.m.-noon Saturdays through October 26 in the parking lot of the Vienna Community Center. Here are the top 10 reasons you really need to stop by the Vienna Farmers Market at least a few times this season.

- **#10** Admission is free. It's a great idea to bring your own bag!
 - **#9** There's always something new. Four new vendors to the market this year will offer spiced bacon, organic fruit, candles, and kombucha.
 - **#8** Location, location, location. This is the second year that the market will be outside the community center. This new location, at the heart of Town, provides the market with visibility and convenient accessibility. W&OD trail-users often stop in for a sampling of fresh sausage, barbecue, crepes, and coffee as they ride or walk by.
 - **#7** The variety. The market includes 28 vendors offering apple cider doughnuts, bacon, barbecue, breads, candles, coffee, crepes, dog treats, eggs, Ethiopian food, free range meats, granola, honey, jams, kombucha, lavender products, olive oil, pastries, peanut brittle, pies, plants, produce, sausage, and spices. There are sugar-free and gluten-free options as well.
 - **#6 Hope you dance.** The farmers market offers a party atmosphere. Each week the market features live entertainment and local musicians. When the weather is perfect and the band is really jammin', folks have been known to break into spontaneous dance.
 - **#5 Proceeds help kids.** All of the money raised by the Optimists through the farmers market is used to support programs for students in Vienna and Oakton schools.
 - **#4** You can eat your way around the market. Of course you can find lots of fresh, good-for-you items to help you concoct delicious meals at home, but there also are lots of yummy prepared eats ready to be consumed on the spot.
 - **#3 Kids are welcome.** Children are welcome at the Farmers Market. In fact, there's free face-painting. (Dogs, however, except for service dogs, are not permitted in order to comply with Virginia health regulations.)
 - **#2** Eat local. All of the produce is certified as locally grown within a 125- to 200-mile radius. Produce at the market generally is picked the night before. One of the seven produce vendors at the Vienna market is organic.
 - #1 The sensory experience and sense of community are amazing. The Vienna Farmers Market is a weekly social event and a gathering place. It's a sensory experience with delicious food samplings, colorful offerings, meats cooking, kids running around, music playing. The market is a great place to visit with neighbors and to meet new friends.

Policing by the numbers

n March, the Vienna Police Department issued its 2018 annual report, which shows that Vienna police officers responded to 10,740 calls for service last year.

The annual report provides data related to criminal incidents, enforcement activities, and crash statistics. Destruction/damage to property and vandalism incidents were up 59% while drug/narcotic offenses were down 38%. Ten cars were stolen in Vienna last year, and theft of valuables from vehicles continued to be a significant issue. The police department reminds residents to remove all valuables and lock unattended vehicles.

A bevy of bicycling events

orthern Virginia has a well-earned reputation for being a bike-friendly region. The Town of Vienna is proud to be part of the region's momentum as a bronze-level bicycle-friendly community, as certified by the League of American Bicyclists.

This month several national and local events embrace and celebrate the area's biking identity.

On the national level, **Bike to Work Day is May 17.** Commuter Connections and the Washington Area Bicyclist Association invite all to try bicycling to work, even if just for one day, as a clean, fun, and healthy way to commute. Registering for this free event at **biketoworkmetrodc.org** gives participants access to 115 pit stops in D.C., Maryland, and Virginia, including the Vienna pit stop on the Town Green, sponsored by Spokes, Etc. The first 20,000 registered participants get a free t-shirt.

For students, **National Bike to School Day is May 8.** Local schools as well as thousands of schools around the country will participate in this 8th annual celebration of walking and biking to school. Vienna elementary schools will be participating in a bike/walk challenge.

Mayor Laurie DiRocco is getting in on the bicycling action as well. She'll trade in her sneakers for pedals and swap her **May 17** and **June 7** Friday morning walks in favor of **community bike rides.** Those who wish to participate should be ready to roll from the community center at 9:30 a.m.

The **Vienna Bike Rodeo** fosters safety, cycling etiquette, and knowledge of road rules. This year's Bike Rodeo will take place from 9 a.m.-noon Saturday, **May 4**, in the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department parking lot. Police officers and veteran cyclists will instruct children on breaking, balancing, and handling surprises as they guide them through a custom-designed obstacle course. Note: Children must have a helmet to participate.

CSC Native Plant Sale

Sale of the future

pring is here, and it's time to plant the "seeds" for future seasons – and generations.

The Conservation and Sustainability Commission will offer a large selection of native plants for sale from 8 a.m.-1 p.m. Saturday, May 18, in the parking lot of the Vienna Community Center. All plants are raised and sold by Hill House Garden Nursery, which specializes in high-quality native plants.

Plants include flowering perennials, native shrubs, and small trees. These plants attract birds, bees, and butterflies, all of which are beneficial to the home landscape. Cash, checks, and credit cards will be accepted.

In addition, Kristina Clarin of the Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District, and beekeeper Steven Youssef will be on hand to share information and answer questions.



Partners in pedagogy

or a second year, the Town of Vienna has partnered with Madison pyramid schools to present students with authentic, project-based learning opportunities. Schools in the Madison pyramid have embraced project-based learning (PBL) as a means to provide "real world" opportunities that deliver powerful learning experiences.

Every grade level at Wolftrap Elementary, located just outside the Town of Vienna limits, is encouraged to take on three PBL projects, and one of each grade's projects this year was undertaken in conjunction with the Town of Vienna.

Wolftrap fifth-graders designed a colorful, multipurpose sign to welcome people to and provide history about Salsbury Spring Park. The sign also doubles as a habitat for birds. (Not all PBL projects, like this one, are necessarily implemented.)

Wolftrap third-graders are working with the school's art teacher, the Vienna Public Art Commission, and stormwater quality professionals with the Town to create a design for some of the Town's more than 1,800 curbside storm drain inlets.

Water Quality Engineer Christine Horner and Engineering Technician Tyler Weepie met with students to help them make the connection between the Town's stormwater infrastructure and streams. "We emphasized," says Horner, "that whatever you put in or flows into the inlet ends up in streams and eventually in the [Chesapeake] Bay. We conveyed information to students not only about what they were doing, but why they're doing it."

The approximately 90 second-graders in four classes at Wolftrap cross-pollinated a language arts unit on persuasive writing with a science unit on the Monarch butterfly in their PBL

project with the Town. The second-graders wrote persuasive letters to fellow residents, some of which may be published in local newspapers, to convince them to do more to protect the Mexico-migrating Monarch.

Second-grader Sahana Gowrishankar wrote:

"Dear people of Vienna, I think we should take action to help save the Monarchs....Here's a list of things we can do to save Monarch Butterflies:

- · plant milkweed all over Vienna
- plant gardens
- plant pollinater [sic] flowers
- · avoid pesticides
- limit moing [sic]
- rasing [sic] Monarch Butterflies
- and last but not lest [sic] planting a giant place in Vienna for a butterfly garden with lots of milkweed and pollinater [sic] flowers...."

The Wolftrap second-graders kicked off their PBL on Monarch butterflies with a visit from Mayor Laurie DiRocco and members of the Town's Conservation and Sustainability Commission. That same evening, March 11, several of the students came to Town Hall for a Council meeting at which the Town adopted the Mayor's Monarch pledge "to demonstrate Vienna's continuing commitment to Monarch butterflies and other pollinator species."

"The students love the authenticity and knowing that they can make changes to the community," says second grade lead teacher Stephanie Burdett. "It gives them a feeling of importance, that they're being heard by part of the community. It's never too early to make an impact on the community you live in."

Student shines in IT job with the Town

am Erickson leads a double life as both a junior at Cedar Lane School and the Swiss army knife employed by the Town's IT department. Through the school's Work Awareness in Transition (WAT) program, Erickson is obtaining real-world work experience to supplement his schoolwork.

Erickson, who began his stint with the Town's IT Department in October 2017, starts his day like any other high school student, taking the bus and hustling to be on time for homeroom. In the afternoon, he puts on his business casual garb, packs up lunch, and buses himself over to Town Hall to get to work on tasks such as responding to IT help tickets, replacing computer parts, and editing the Town's intranet.

"The program is designed for students to learn both independent job skills and soft skills needed for employment, even down to how to dress, transport yourself, and be on time," says Cedar Lane Employment and Transition Representative Anna Zukowski. "It teaches students the importance of social skills in a real-world working environment. Sam has excelled in it all. He is always excited to go to work and never misses a day."


The program heavily relies on a strong connection between the student and

workplace. The business or, in this case, Town Hall must be within five miles of the school and assign an onsite job coach - in this case, Computer Technician Edgar Marmolejos.

"It really feels rewarding to help someone like Sam fulfill their aspirations," Marmolejos says. "The program and school don't get enough attention for their efforts in teaching students to rely on themselves to grow. Sam two Septembers ago versus who he is today – he has learned to figure things out for himself, become independent, and now he's carved out of wood."

Erickson is fully committed to the IT path and values the program's unique opportunities. "My dad is very tech savvy," he says. "Ever since I was a kid I wanted to learn as much as I could alongside him. Eventually I want to create more websites and venture into creating 3D objects and designs. Now, thanks to those who have helped me at school and Town Hall, I am on my way."

Cedar Lane staff members recognize Erickson as a strong representative of the program and encourage other students to note his success.

"He's a superstar," Zukowski says. "He was so thrilled with his experience in his first year with the Town of Vienna's IT Department that he jumped at the opportunity to do it again this schoolyear. People here at school have taken notice of how well he has done."

TBLC initiates community dialogue about parking

he Town Business Liaison Committee, along with Mayor Laurie DiRocco, hosted a community brainstorming session about public parking in the commercial corridor March 14. About 35 business owners and others attended the meeting, which generated practical as well as creative suggestions for addressing the ongoing challenge of parking in the commercial district. A follow-up meeting to further discuss ideas and perhaps begin determining implementation possibilities will be held at 6 p.m. Thursday, May 9, in Town Hall Council Chambers. This meeting is open to the public.

Ideas generated at the March 14 meeting included short-, mid- and long-term potential solutions and ranged from the practical to the creative. Some suggestions included creating an offsite parking area for employees, creating a parking map, sharing parking among businesses, running a trolley, and investigating bike and scooter share stations.
