PUBLIC HEARINGS ON COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

Two public hearings have been scheduled by the Planning Commission on the new Comprehensive Plan for the Town. These will be followed by two public hearings before the Town Council. The first hearing, on March 8 at 8 p.m. in the Council Room at Town Hall will consider the Traffic Circulation Plan. Copies of the map showing proposed new streets are available at Town Hall during business hours.

A second hearing will be held on March 22 also at 8 p.m. on the Land Use Plan. A map showing present and alternative land uses will be on display at Town Hall prior to the meeting. One of the concepts to be considered is PUD or Planned Unit Development, which encourages creativity and innovation by permitting a wider range of options for land development. This would allow for a "plaza", a mingling of uses with small shops, walkways and outdoor restaurants. It would also provide for development of vacant tracts with motel and shopping facilities and such recreational opportunities as a bowling alley and ice-skating rink.

After studying public reaction to the Plans, the Commission will make recommendations to Council which has scheduled its hearing on the Traffic Circulation Plan for March 27 and the Land Use Plan for April 10. The third section of the Comprehensive plan which deals with Community Facilities such as parks, water and sewer, and other public and social services, will be prepared later this year.

All interested citizens are urged to take advantage of the opportunity to express their views on the Plan at the hearings, taking into account the welfare of the entire Town in making their recommendations and decisions.

The Comprehensive Plan takes into account not only physical, but also economic, social, aesthetic and environmental considerations -- reflecting total community needs and values. It must take into account Vienna's location in this rapidly growing County, with Tyson's Corner on one end of Town and a planned Metro station on the other.

Due to the high cost of vandalism in Vienna, which each year uses up about \$5,000 of the taxpayer's money, citizens are being asked to help curb this destruction of public property by turning in vandals. The TIV program has been established under which citizens can be rewarded for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone found guilty of an act of vandalism to Town owned property. Anonymity will also be granted to those who desire it. Rewards will be 1/2 the replacement cost of the object vandalized, not to exceed \$50.

HOW TO TURN IN A VANDAL

- 1. Call 938-4900 (the Vienna Police Department) and say, "I want to turn in a vandal".
- You will immediately be given a TIV identification number to be known only to you, so write it down and save it. (This number will be the case record number for the Police Department.)
- 3. Make your report, giving exact details of the act of vandalism to the police officer. He will ask you for your name, address and telephone number. If you wish to remain anonymous, so indicate.
- 4. Upon arrest and conviction based on your report, you will be eligible for a cash reward. If you have given your name, you will be notified to pick up your reward upon identification by your TIV number. In cases of anonymity you may call the Police Department on the first day of the month following your report between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. and inquire by your TIV number what is the status of your report. If the case is still pending, you will be advised to call again the first of each month until the case is closed. If you are due a reward, you will be instructed to claim it at the Vienna Post Office, General Delivery, upon asking for the envelope by giving the TIV identification number. No other identification will be required.



TOWN ELECTIONS

April l is the last day to register to vote in Town elections. The library will be open for registrations on Thursday evenings from 7 to 8:55 p.m. for everyone's convenience.

The deadline for Candidates to file is March 7. Information for filing may be obtained from the Town Clerk's office, 938-8000.

The Town election will be held on May 2 at the Town Hall. The office of Mayor and three Council seats will be voted on this year. Incumbent Mayor Joseph R. Spriggs and Councilmen Richard Dingman, Paul Lyons and Charles Robinson will be running for re-election.

DOGS

We are receiving our periodic complaints about dogs roaming at large, together with reports of barking dogs. These seem to come in waves, perhaps because of our large turnover of residents. New residents may not know that we have an ordinance forbidding dogs to run at large. They must be contained in the yard or walked on a leash. Fairfax County has the same law. Barking dogs come under the heading of "maintaining a nuisance" and owners may be fined up to \$100.
