StoryWalk project installed at Glyndon Park

On the path to early literacy and an active lifestyle

ith financial support from Rotary, the Town of Vienna has partnered with the Patrick Henry Library and a local Eagle Scout candidate to create a StoryWalk at Glyndon Park, an initiative that combines an appreciation for the outdoors with a fun way to promote exercise and early literacy skills.

The StoryWalk Project, originally created in 2007 by Anne Ferguson of Montpelier, Vermont, in collaboration with the Kellogg-Hubbard Library, sets pages of a picture book along a path.

Six-year-old Isabella Harrington, whose mom and dad work in the Town's parks and recreation department, "loved" Vienna's StoryBook Project "so much." Her favorite part, she says, was when she read a page, and then it told her to do an activity to the next post. "I can't wait to go back and do it again," she says.

Alicia Rocconi, youth services manager at the Patrick Henry Library, first encountered StoryWalk a few summers ago while Pokemon Go hunting around a North Carolina pond. Last year, as library branches were developing their strategic plans, the Patrick Henry Library made creating a StoryWalk a goal as a way to bring the library into the community.

Early this year, Rocconi reached out to the Town, which selected Glyndon Park with its existing trail as an ideal location for the StoryWalk. The Town also connected with David Nichols, a 16-year-old Eagle Scout candidate with Troop 1539, who was interested in taking on a project that would improve a local park.

For his Eagle Scout project, Nichols, a rising junior at James Madison High School, built the 20 frames and platforms used in Vienna's StoryWalk. He used a 3D computermodeling program to design the prototype.

a choreographer under Dyer for several years so she naturally fits in the environment in which she now directs. "I did theatre for a long time with Babs for VYP, and she was the bees's

knees," Pradas says.

"It was a huge honor when we talked, around the time of her retirement, about me even attempting to fill her shoes." The new director would call replacing Dyer a tall order, almost a Sisyphean task, but her presence, physical commitment, and familiarity with the program have not gone unnoticed.

"Babs had directing down to a science," says ensemble cast member Lia Davila, who is in her second year

with the company. "Like Babs, Nicole is a part of the community as she worked under Babs here for years, but Nicole is taking her role in a different direction by literally and metaphorically rolling up her sleeves with us. She's out on the floor doing exactly as we do with dance warmups, and she will sit shoulder-toshoulder with us acting out a scene. It makes her very approachable."

The 2006 musical The Wedding Singer, based on the 1998 Adam Sandler film of the same name, marks Pradas' freshman go at directing. The play also symbolizes what VYP is all about: fun, jokes, and music.

"It's really fun goofing off with everyone on the production," says Pavot. "The environment kind of mixes the jokes and fun we have while in character, and it translates while we are between scenes. I think that's a really nice benefit of choosing this play. And everyone loves the songs."

Pradas also is a full-time dance instructor at Kemore Middle School and has her own dance company, WonderGo. **V**

While the project experience was harrowing at times, Nichols pushed through successfully with a little help from his friends and family.

A favorite middle school teacher who had experience as a lumberjack helped cut the wood and put the frames together, his mom re-stained all the frames, a neighbor allowed him to use the wood shop in his garage to assemble the platforms, his dad worked throughout installation weekend with him in mid-June, and fellow Scouts and friends showed up to pitch in as well. The Town assisted, too, by digging holes for the posts. All told, Nichols put in 52.5 hours on the project, and others contributed another 178.5 hours of their time.

"I have a new outlook on how things end up getting done," says Nichols. "There's so much that goes on behind the scenes. It's really a lot of work. I never thought about these Eagle Scout projects as part social event or the behind-the-scenes work that takes 231 hours to complete. I never realized how connections with other people can help you with these things. I wouldn't have been able to do it without the people who helped me."

Vienna's initial StoryWalk book and the one that currently zig zags along the asphalt trail at Glyndon Park, from the baseball field toward Beulah Road, is Tap the Magic Tree by Christie Matheson.



long time," says Rocconi. "It has simple text and is interactive, already promoting activity."

Signage at the bottom of each platform provides directions and additional interactive prompts, such as fluttering like falling leaves and stomping your feet like apples falling from a tree.

The library plans to change out the StoryWalk books on a quarterly basis. Next up for September is *Bark, George* by Jules Feiffer. **U**

New, temporary traffic pattern at I-66/Route 123 interchange

he exit ramp from I-66 West to Route 123 North was closed in late July, and drivers began using a temporary ramp with two right-turn lanes and a traffic signal to access Chain Bridge Road toward Oakton and Vienna. Part of the Transform 66 Outside the Beltway project, the temporary exit ramp is expected to be utilized for three months while a new ramp is constructed slightly to the east of the old ramp.

Maple Avenue: Let's move forward

et's make MAC (Maple Avenue Commercial zoning) controversies unnecessary. For years, Vienna has been subjected to an all-or-nothing MAC process, wherein a developer can achieve zoning rights worth millions of dollars or fail and be stuck with a constricting, regular commercial code written in the 1950s. Neighbors have repeatedly petitioned the Town government to turn down MAC applications because they have concerns that the buildings are too big, green/open space disappeared, and long-term solutions for traffic and transportation remain unaddressed.

It doesn't have to be this way. Over the past few years of MAC controversies, Vienna citizens have been clear about what we want. We want development on Maple Avenue, but we want smaller buildings and more green space. Mixed-use is good, strip malls are passé, and wide sidewalks, street trees, and café seating are all desirable.

The Town can allow this type of development through its regular commercial zoning (Maple Avenue but non-MAC) by requiring these design features and reducing parking requirements to provide economic incentive. This would provide the same benefits as the MAC – a walkable streetscape and buildings fronting Maple with parking lots in the back – but without the height, building volume, and residential density. The 35-foot height limit would remain. This would give developers and

landowners two options: MAC or regular zoning, but both options have the MAC streetscape. Also, having multiple options mercifully ends the high stakes, all-ornothing MAC hearings.

When MAC zoning (or something like it) is reinstated, higher density housing should be allowed in exchange for public benefits. Those public benefits should include monetary



contributions (known as "proffers") to transportation projects, sidewalks, crosswalks, school programs, historic preservation, and public art. Both the Town's regular commercial code and MAC must fit a comprehensive, long-term plan for transportation, which currently is being designed and under review.

The MAC Steering Committee recommended changing the regular commercial code along with establishing the MAC in 2014. We've waited long enough. Let's get this done and move forward with economic development on Maple Avenue.

Building bridges, connections, and a more natural environment

he Town of Vienna is partnering with several organizations to "bundle" related projects that will help improve the W&OD Trail and areas around it.

In 2017, the Urban Land Institute (ULI), whose mission is to provide leadership in responsible use of land as well as to create and sustain thriving communities, undertook a technical assistance panel report that analyzed challenges and opportunities for improving the W&OD Trail in Vienna and its surrounding areas. One of ULI's recommendations suggested that Vienna could "create more connections between land while having sustainable plantings and educational opportunities."

As the Town and Historic Vienna, Inc. have worked over the past couple of years to rebuild the bridge by the Freeman Store and Museum, they saw an opportunity to implement ULI's advice and have begun to remove harmful and invasive plants

from the area between the trail and Freeman House. Work on the area began July 1 with 10 full-time and 11 seasonal parks and recreation staffers removing non-native plants from the area along the creek and trail. Next, Ayr Hill Garden Club members will work with the Town's arborists to select native plants that will stabilize and enhance the slopes of the creek bed.

The Town has recently received a grant to reconstruct the bridge, and design for this project is underway. Also, the Town will a apply for a Recreational Trails Program grant, requesting funding to remove additional invasives along the W&OD, from the Vienna Community Center to Whole Foods; install lighting



along the trail from the community center to the power substation near Northside Park; and improve safety crossings where the trail intersects Vienna roads.

Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman lauded the group effort. "It's the Town's intention to go native with its plantings wherever it can," she says. "With insight from ULI, we saw a great opportunity to work with community partners to increase visual access to the area surrounding the Freeman House while working toward our goal of having more native vegetation. Eventually, we hope to have an improved W&OD Trail surrounded by more natural plantings, lights along Vienna's portion of the trail, and safer road crossings."

Clark is a master clerk

own Clerk Melanie Clark has received certification as a Master Municipal Clerk through the International Institute of Municipal Clerks (IIMC). The Master Municipal Clerk designation is the more advanced of two professional designations granted by IIMC and requires attaining 60 points in advanced education and 40 points in professional contributions. The designation, says IIMC President Lana McPherson in a letter to Clark is granted "only to those municipal clerks who complete demanding education requirements and who have a record of significant contributions to their local government, their community, and state."

Everyday decisions impact health of regional waterways

s a service hour-hungry eighth grader, I searched for volunteer opportunities that would fulfill both my love for the outdoors and the five-hours-per-quarter requirement for my civics class. I found the perfect opportunity collecting data at biological stream monitoring workshops, where I soon discovered an unfortunate pattern: Northern Virginia streams commonly score 6 or 7 out of 12, meaning that our waterways are in unacceptable condition.

Now a rising senior at James Madison High School, I have since become a certified stream monitor and take small groups of community members to Wolftrap Creek. This presents an opportunity to educate community members about factors that contribute to Northern Virginia's distressing scores. I encourage volunteers to think about how our actions affect the organisms that live in our waterways.

There is a notable connection between the health of a stream and surrounding urban development. Urban areas are covered with impervious surfaces like blacktops and roads. The problem with impervious surfaces is that, instead of being filtered through soil, water runs off them immediately upon contact, gathering pollutants. These pollutants (litter, fertilizer, sediment, heat) have negative effects on Vienna's local streams and the larger Chesapeake Bay ecosystem into which they drain.

You can do your part to mitigate this problem by making efforts to minimize runoff and pollution. Apply only small amounts of fertilizer near plant roots. Decrease the amount of concrete and grass on your property and increase the number of trees and shrubs. Install rain gardens and place barrels at the end of gutters to put rainwater to good use. Ensure that less pollution ends up in streams by by picking up trash as you take daily walks and participating in the Town's Clean-Up Days (one is coming up August 3; you can find the schedule on the Town calendar at viennava.gov/calendar.aspx).

Water health is critical to the future of our society and our world. Our everyday decisions have significant impacts on the health of our water ecosystems, and it is our responsibility to take care of our waterways for ourselves and future generations.

Three-plus decades of excellence

or the 32nd consecutive year, the Town of Vienna has been awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada. This certificate of achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting.

Certification is based on review of the Town's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (for fiscal year 2018) by an impartial panel, which found that the report meets high standards, including demonstrating a constructive "spirit of full disclosure" to communicate the Town's financial story.

Town Council Actions

- Awarded a contract for \$118,888 to Whitman, Requardt, and Associates for routes 123 and 243 traffic signal replacements.
- Approved purchase of a bobcat all-wheel steer loader for \$64,948.76.
- Approved spending \$58,255, to be reimbursed (minus a \$500 deductible) through Virginia Municipal League insurance, to repair the Town Hall HVAC system.
- Awarded an engineering design contract for \$377,654 to Wood Environment and Infrastructure Solutions for the Hunters Branch Phase II stream restoration project.
- Approved vacation of a sanitary sewer easement at 102 Sharon Lane NW.

 Approved fiscal year 2020 expenditures not to exceed \$50,000 with Ross Tree Expert Company for tree maintenance and removal.

July 1

- Adopted amendments to the Town Code related to state code updates regarding traffic offenses and directed the Town clerk to advertise a notice of adoption.
- Set a joint public hearing of Town Council and the Planning Commission for July 15 regarding a motion to rescind and repeal the June 17 rezoning of 374-380 Maple Avenue W from C-1 local commercial and RS-16 single-family detached residential zoning districts to Maple Avenue Commercial (MAC) zoning district.
- Granted a 10-year license to Cox Wireless Access for use of public right-of-way.
- Approved \$260,000 in fiscal year 2020 spending with Arthur Construction for on-call roadway maintenance.
- Approved \$56,000 in fiscal year 2020 spending with Commonwealth Paving for as-needed asphalt repair.
- Approved expenditure of \$581,833.25 with EE Lyons Construction to perform Old Courthouse Road NE waterline relocation.
- Approved a resolution authorizing the Town to obtain financing for fiscal year 2020 vehicle and equipment purchases in an amount not to exceed \$860,000.
- Approved the final plat for re-subdivision of one lot into two lots on property located at 309 Glyndon Street SE as part of the Katrina Hine Echols subdivision. Also approved the requested waiver for required frontage improvements along Glyndon Street SE, and in lieu of these improvements, approved installation of a 24-inch storm sewer pipe by the subdivider as well as a 15-foot easement.
- Approved a resolution supporting the Town's Recreational Trails Program grant application to support funding of improvements to the Washington and Old Dominion Railroad Regional Park from Park Street intersection to the area adjacent to the Dominion substation.
- Directed the Transportation Safety Commission (TSC), with support from the Department of Public Works (DPW), to initiate a transportation safety improvement study for the area bounded by Courthouse Road SW, Nutley Street, and Maple Avenue. The TSC will act as a convening body to

receive information from the public on the nature of existing issues, impact of future development on those issues, review with DPW study scoping in response to the defined set of issues, review analysis and recommendations from DPW, and convene meetings with the public to review recommendations and reach a consensus-based set of agreed-upon projects for implementation. Those projects will be recommended to Town Council for final decisions and funding.

July 15

• Held a public hearing on a motion to rescind and repeal action taken by Town Council on June 17 regarding a rezoning application for 374-380 Maple Avenue W.
