

Maple Avenue Corridor Multimodal Transportation and Land Use Study

Study recommendations to be presented September 4 range from those 'right in front of us' to big and bold

hen planning and design engineering firm Kimley-Horn began the Maple Avenue Corridor Multimodal Transportation and Land Use Study on behalf of the Town of Vienna this spring, the transportation consultant knew, says Project Manager David Samba, that its task was to "identify some of those existing challenges, but also to recognize that there are great opportunities here as well. We are trying to address the fact that transportation and mobility are happening in many different forms today."


Fast forward six months to today and Kimley-Horn is prepared to present its recommendations to the Vienna community at a public meeting at 7 p.m. Wednesday, September 4, at Town Hall. Samba says that some of Kimley-Horn's recommendations will be big and bold while others will be more grounded, but still impactful.

"We wanted to come to the community and say, if traffic is an issue for you, here are some ideas that are going to push up against what maybe you think is possible, but really might address the issue in a way that's most impactful," says Samba. "At the same time, we also wanted to step back...there are some solutions that are right in front of us, that won't take that much time to design and implement and will have meaningful impact on the daily lives and travel of the community."

The study, which looks at transportation along Maple Avenue, from James Madison Drive to Follin Lane, and includes Church Street from Lawyers Road to East Street as well as Courthouse Road and Locust Street, examined existing transportation conditions in the corridor as well as the impact of potential development, both within Vienna and beyond, on future transportation conditions.

One of the challenges identified in the study, Samba notes, is Maple Avenue's dual functionality as a local street and a regional road that serves those traveling between Oakton and Tysons and points beyond.

If only these signals could 'talk' to one another. Oh, they can!

he Town of Vienna has the green light on a project to upgrade all traffic signal controllers and cabinets along Maple Avenue and Nutley Street. Work has already begun on the \$2.1 million project, which is funded through a VDOT SmartScale grant and expected to be completed in 2022.

The technological upgrades and signal interconnectivity will allow the Town to monitor and manage traffic signal timing remotely from a single location, ultimately resulting in smoother flowing traffic along Maple and Nutley.

The project has been divided into three parts:

- 1) perform a needs assessment to determine recommended improvements - this has been completed
- 2) upgrade signal cabinet hardware, interconnect the signals to communicate with monitoring and control software - underway
- 3) make physical upgrades to signals at several locations - also underway

"We have an experienced employee assigned to overseeing this project to help ensure it moves along quickly and efficiently," says Deputy Public Works Director David Donahue. "Preliminary design for the hardware and interconnection phase



of vehicles and turning movements, which will allow the Town to adapt signal patterns in real-time, to nip and tuck traffic flow where appropriate.

In the second phase of the project, the Town is working with consultants at Whitman, Requardt & Associates to explore the benefits of using adaptive signal software that has the ability to give priority to emergency vehicles and transit buses,

we disting the formation of the server of th then each signal cabinet must be adjusted.

When the new system is fully functional, though, the Town can respond more quickly and efficiently to issues that may arise. Instead of having to physically go out to the signal box location, Town staff will have the capability to make adjustments not just to one light but to any and all lights along Maple and Nutley remotely from a centralized location.

While interconnectivity is being established among the signals, the Town will address additional signalized transportation issues. For example, currently not all Town crosswalks have countdown pedestrian signals nor Accessible Pedestrian Signal (APS) push buttons that emit an audio or vibratory signal for visually impaired pedestrians. Once this project is complete, all crosswalks on Maple and Nutley will have both features.

"When you look at Maple Avenue, the first thing people tell you is that there's too much traffic," he says. "So some of our recommendations are geared toward finding ways to alleviate that traffic congestion and bottlenecks."

One of the strategies employed by Kimley-Horn is to look at specific intersections to see how capacity can be improved and delays reduced. Other recommended strategies will address how to make the corridor more viable for transportation modes other than vehicles.

"We recognize that Maple Avenue has to function in a way that still supports majority auto use," adds Samba, "but also allows for and enhances that pedestrian travel, that bicycle travel, that transit use that the community is ready to embrace."

Kimley-Horn's recommendations will be informed by study findings as well as input and feedback from the Vienna community. The firm received more than 150 responses to a community survey and obtained feedback and insights at two previously held community meetings.

Samba says that the Kimley-Horn team has enjoyed the opportunity to work with such an engaged community. "They've asked really good questions," he says. "They've challenged us where they needed to challenge us, and they've asked for the data to back up what we're saying." He hopes that the September 4 community meeting will offer another opportunity for Vienna residents to provide feedback. "Let us know if we've hit the mark or we're just slightly off, and if there are some more recommendations that we can bring to the table."

Following the September 4 community meeting, Kimley-Horn will draft its study report, which will include final recommendations as well suggestions for how projects might be funded. "I think that the way that the Town of Vienna can really move forward with this is to identify which of those recommendations, which of those improvements, are the highest priority to the community...and implement those."

While most of the recommendations will address the mid-term or 10-year timeframe that match the parameters of this study, Samba admits that some of the big, bold ideas have a longer horizon.


"Let's think about Maple Avenue and Vienna 20 years out," he says, "and figure out what is that long-term vision for Maple Avenue, for Church Street, for parking in the Town, for connectivity – and let's start addressing some of those ideas that are on the forefront of transportation and mobility. Let's start thinking about shared mobility or autonomous vehicles and what that potential future means for Vienna. I think there's a lot we can do today to start preparing and setting the stage for that."

The Town of Vienna's \$80,000 multimodal transportation and land use study is funded through capital improvement bond funds. \boldsymbol{V}

he Town of Vienna's Department of Planning and Zoning has created a new website tool that enables the public to view the status of applications for rezonings, conditional use permits, site plan modifications, subdivisions, etc. The map may be accessed from the "Development Activity" link in the center of the Town's homepage or at **viennava.gov/developmentactivity**.

Applications are grouped on the map by status: under review, approved, and under construction/complete. Applications are searchable by clicking geographic markers on the map or by



selecting a project image icon on the left. After selecting an application to view, the project image icon expands to list the address, proposal, application status, date of next board/commission meeting for applications under review, and a link to documents. Public art = healthier, smarter community?

S tudies show that creating or viewing art can alleviate stress, improve memory, and increase empathy. In one study, participants' levels of cortisol, the stress hormone, tested lower after viewing art. In another, participants experienced an immediate release of dopamine, the chemical related to falling in love. Children demonstrated an increase in critical thinking skills and a greater capacity for tolerance. Other studies show that art relieves mental exhaustion.

Vienna is fortunate to have three organizations that celebrate, promote, and support art. The Vienna Public Art Commission advises and assists Town Council on matters related to advancement of public art. Past projects include the temporary display of student artwork on construction fences around the community center when it was undergoing renovation as well as creation of the colorful mural on the back wall of the Vienna Shopping Center. These public art initiatives have made areas in Town, which might otherwise be dull and unattractive, lovely and interesting.

This fall, in conjunction with the 50th anniversary of the "Virginia is for Lovers" slogan, L-O-V-E letters will be installed at the entrance to Northside Park. The commission also is working with owners of an upcoming mixed-use development to include public art.

Another group, Movers and Shakers for Vienna Art, promotes and supports public, visual, literary, and performing arts through awareness, participation, education, and fundraising. Together with the Vienna Public Art Commission, Movers and Shakers made possible the sculpture at the Vienna Community Center in memory of Mayor M. Jane Seeman and in honor of all Vienna volunteers. The group raised money to help fund the project, hosting a concert at Jammin' Java. Currently Movers and Shakers is raising funds for Maple Avenue banners.



"Promoting art in the Town of Vienna is an important

element to keeping our Town fresh and culturally exciting," says Movers and Shakers Chair James Cudney.

Formed in 1969, the Vienna Arts Society (VAS) brings together area artists, from novices to professionals. VAS's "Take a Seat" project has engendered a lot of buzz as residents discover beautiful benches, painted by VAS artists, throughout Town. Town and county exploring potential parking partnership

feasibility study presented to Town Council during its August 19 meeting offers options for redeveloping and updating one of the county's busiest community library branches while simultaneously meeting the Town's goal of providing additional public parking spaces in the commercial corridor. The study, undertaken by Grimm + Parker Architects and funded by both the Town and Fairfax County, outlines three site design options.

One option envisions the county redeveloping the site by right with a new 21,000 square foot library and 90 surface parking spaces for library use only. Two public-public partnership options also were presented. The first includes a library with structured parking on top, providing 125 spaces for the library and 84 spaces for Town/public use. The other option provides for a library with an additional level of parking, offering a total of 188 Town/public parking spaces and 125 for the library.

The Town's potential partnership in the project could provide parking spaces in the commercial corridor that offer a park-once experience as envisioned in the Town's comprehensive plan. "It's been a long-term goal of the Town to make the park-once concept espoused in the comp plan a reality," says Deputy Planning and Zoning Director Mike D'Orazio. "In this case, residents and visitors could park and then shop-dine-read-meet all in one stop."

If both Fairfax County's Board of Supervisors and Town Council agree to pursue a library-parking partnership, then a formal agreement will be put together to further outline the project as well as each party's financial responsibilities.

Renovation of the Patrick Henry Library is slated to be included in the county's 2020 library bond referendum, which will be on ballots in November 2020. Design of the library is expected to begin in 2021, and construction, anticipated to take about two years, will likely start in 2023.

The Town would fund its portion of costs, all of which are very preliminary at this point, from bond issuances. Grant funding may be available as well. The Town covered 50% of expenses, or \$55,500, for the six-month feasibility study.

"These options provide an economical way to address the Town's need for additional public parking," says Finance Director Marion

Serfass. "And with Fairfax County, we'd be certain to have a reliable partner."

Patrick Henry Library, which currently has 62 parking spaces, was constructed in 1971 and renovated in 1995.

either summer heat nor the threat of severe storms has deterred community volunteers from their mission to mark storm drain inlets with *Only Rain Down the Drain* and *NO DUMPING* messaging that alerts residents to the connection between their yards and local waterways.

The messaging reminds residents not to dump waste or any other materials into storm drains. Report illegal dumping of materials to the Town of Vienna by calling 703-255-6380 or emailing **dpw@viennava.gov.**

Pollutants also may flow into storm inlets and drains – and thus local and eventually regional waterways – via rainwater runoff, particularly that from heavy summer downpours. This runoff picks up pollutants, such as fertilizers and trash, posing threats to water quality and harming plants and local wildlife.

Some ways to keep such unwanted materials out of waterways include:

- repairing car and lawnmower leaks
- · properly cleaning up fuel spills
- keeping grass clippings away from driveways, sidewalks, and inlets
- picking up trash on or near your property
- picking up and disposing of pet waste right away.

There's more work to be done in the Town's ongoing efforts to reduce water pollution and spread the message about protecting local waterways. Don't get shocked by electrical surge damage - protect your home

n July an extreme electrical surge – triggered, according to Dominion Energy, when a crossarm broke and a high voltage line dipped into a low voltage line – impacted more than 100 homes in southwest Vienna. In many cases, electrical equipment and appliances were impaired or destroyed. Dominion Energy accepted liability for the incident, and impacted residents could file a claim by calling 1-866-DOM-HELP.

To protect from such surges in the future as well as those caused by lightning strikes and mini surges of excess energy from appliances in your home (which can account for up to 80% of surges), a whole-house surge protector may be a wise investment.

The relatively inexpensive device provides protection when installed in the electrical service panel. These whole-house protectors are advertised as "easy to install," but unless you're highly skilled in electrical



work, it's recommended that a professional electrician install the device.

Councilmember Howard Springsteen had a whole-home surge protector installed shortly following the July incident and says, "Proper surge protection in the electrical panel can prevent a lot of damage to electronics and appliances. It offers real peace of mind."

Point-of-use surge protectors may still be a good idea and offer an additional layer of protection.

While the Town is offering information related to home protection, this seems like a good time to remind residents to consider special coverage through their homeowners or renters insurance policies for sewer backups. This additional protection is available typically at very reasonable rates, but it is not part of standard coverage. Please contact your insurance provider for more information.

- Since 2017, the Town has planted only **native trees** as it replaces trees in public areas. Further, the Town requires that trees planted by builders are native species. Join the Town in planting a native tree this fall and enjoy the benefits for many years to come!
- **Pollinator gardens** abound in both back and front yards around Vienna. Visit the Town's pollinator garden at Meadow Lane Park for ideas.
- Vienna is now certified as a Bee City USA, based on the Town's support of native plants and pollinators. Mayor Laurie DiRocco and Town Council took the NWF's Mayors' Monarch Pledge this spring, joining hundreds of mayors across the country who support habitats for monarch butterflies.
- Native gardens at the Vienna Community Center include more than 300 native plants. This project was awarded a 2018 Community Award from the Virginia Conservation Assistance Program. Take a stroll to decide which native plants you like best!
