Town of Vienna wins two national awards based on 'Voice of the People'

he Town of Vienna is among 22 communities nationwide who will be recognized October 21 at the 105th International City/County Management Association (ICMA) conference in Nashville for excellence in delivering quality-of-life services to residents. Vienna is a winner of Voice of the People Awards for both Excellence in Recreation and Wellness and Excellence in Education and Enrichment.

Based on citizen responses to the National Citizen Survey (to be called the National Community Survey moving forward), Voice of the People awards are presented jointly by the National Research Center, Inc. (NRC), Polco, and ICMA.

According to a press release issued by NRC: "These awards are only given to top-performing jurisdictions that best listen and act for the benefit of their communities."

In a National Citizen Survey conducted last fall, Town residents reported higher ratings in recreation and wellness and education and enrichment compared to all other participating jurisdictions. Vienna was rated more highly by its residents than other jurisdictions for its recreational opportunities, parks, recreation center, and recreation programs. The Town was scored much higher than comparison communities for its special events and citizen attendance at Town-sponsored events.

"We love the Vienna community and what we do to serve residents," says Parks and Recreation Director Leslie Herman. "We like to think that parks and recreation programming and community events function as the connective tissue that brings our community together and makes it stronger. We're so gratified that our programs, facilities, and events are appreciated by citizens."

Kimley-Horn offers a variety of concepts to address Maple Avenue transportation experience conundrum

fter spending five months talking with residents and studying multimodal transportation challenges along the Maple Avenue corridor, Kimley-Horn unveiled during a community meeting September 4 more than 30 concepts that may improve the travel experience for those walking, biking, driving, and using transit along Vienna's main corridor.

About 35 residents attended the public presentation that concludes the Town's Maple Avenue Corridor Multimodal Transportation and Land Use Study. Kimley-Horn will wrap up its final report, providing additional documentation and guidance to assist the Town in determining how to prioritize and implement study recommendations.

Kimley-Horn Project Manager David Samba opened the September 4 presentation by recapping identified challenges along the corridor and sharing residents' priorities as determined through survey input and feedback.

Among the challenges of traveling along the Maple Avenue corridor are:

- its dual identity as a Main Street and regional arterial
- · signal timing priorities
- · narrow sidewalks
- · relatively low transit service frequency

- · lack of on-street bicycle facilities
- · numerous full-access commercial entrances
- · interactions between pedestrians and automobiles
- · discontinuous parallel street network south of Maple.

Transportation priorities identified by residents include congestion relief, improving the pedestrian and bicycle experience, more ways to get to Metro via transit, and additional public parking.

The concept recommendations presented by Kimley-Horn were divided into five categories, those that:

- · require low investment and have a high impact
- provide more travel options
- complete the network
- · address existing challenges
- establish transportation management strategies through additional studies.

More information about all of the concepts presented – including descriptions, challenges, opportunities, and general timelines – are available at viennava.gov/transsstudyconcepts.

Among the low-investment, high-impact concepts are:

- redesign W&OD trail crossings
- · redesign the Church and Mill intersection
- adjust signal timing to allow for Leading Pedestrian Intervals (LPI), which provide pedestrians with a 3-7 second head start
- install four-way stop signs at Church and Dominion and Center and Locust.

More travel concepts include:

- install buffered (or standard) bike lanes along Church, bike/shared lanes on Pleasant Street, and shared lanes on Locust and Hine
 - convert the existing shoulder on Courthouse to bike lanes
 - install an urban, multilane roundabout at Maple and Nutley
 - offer a local circulator that provides allday service between Maple and Church destinations and possibly Metro stations
 - relocate the HAWK pedestrian signal between Pleasant Street and Library Lane and install a new traffic signal to allow left turns at Maple and Pleasant.

Among concepts that would **complete the network** are:

- · install perpendicular curb ramps, replacing existing diagonal ones
- construct a new road to serve vehicular demand between Branch and Beulah roads
- install raised medians along Maple Avenue in several key locations
- address bottlenecks through a combination of signal timing, geometry modifications, and phasing changes.

Concepts that would address existing challenges include:

- fill sidewalk gaps
- enhance facilities at transit stops
- · redesign the Church and Lawyers intersection
- extend the turn bay on Nutley to Maple
- convert the existing center lane on Maple to a peak-period flexible lane.

The National Citizen Survey, which the Town of Vienna typically conducts biennially, comprehensively and accurately reports resident opinion and satisfaction with local government and services with a scientific, representative sample approach and allows participating jurisdictions to benchmark their ratings with other communities across the country. Survey results are used to inform budgeting, performance measurement, and program planning.

Across 126 categories measured by Vienna's National Citizen Survey, the Town was rated higher by its residents than national comparison communities in 65 categories, similar in 57, and lower in four. Responding residents rated Vienna as excellent or good as a place to raise children (98%), a place to live (96%), and for quality of life (94%).

Of Vienna and other Voice of the People award winners, Damema Mann, director of national engagement for NRC/ Polco says: "These local governments are doing great things for their communities and improving everyday life for their residents. We are honored to recognize the award winners...on a national stage." **V**

Additional studies and strategies that are recommended include:

- · identify solutions for neighborhood traffic-calming
- develop a Town-wide streetscape master plan and design guidelines
- · evaluate existing supply and demand for public parking
- create a strategy for reducing the number of commercial driveways and curb cuts.

As part of its final report – and building upon public feedback received – Kimley-Horn will refine its list of potential concepts into a recommendations package of concepts that work well together. Collectively, Kimley-Horn's recommendation package will address some of the current, near-term, and mid-term transportation challenges along the Maple Avenue corridor. Town Council is scheduled to further discuss priorities at a special work session October 9.

'Guvnors' offers scale of theatre, music, and laughs

ienna Theatre Company's fall production, *One Man, Two Guvnors,* is the kind of large-scale, musical production that VTC used to perform regularly and represents the troupe's rededication to this art form.

"With *One Man, Two Guvnors* we are trying to slowly bring back the slapstick, music-filled, rip-roaring productions that we used to do all the time," says VTC president Eric Storck, who is doubling as director for the fall performances. "A key component to our success then was getting as many people from Vienna as possible to be involved. Even if you've never acted before, we welcome you here."

Richard Bean's British comedy opened at the National Theatre's Lyttleton Theatre in 2011 and starred James Corden. Set in 1963 Brighton *Guvnors* is the story an of out-of-work skiffle (a type of music with jazz, blues, and American folk influences) musician, Francis Henshall, who is separately and simultaneously employed by a gangster and an upper-class twit. Several complications add to the confusion and hilarity.

Vienna's production of *One Man, Two Guvnors* premieres at 8 p.m. Friday, October 18, at the Vienna Community Center. Other performances will take place at 8 p.m. October 19, 25, 26, and November 1 and 2. Matinee performances will be staged at 2 p.m. October 27 and November 3. Tickets are \$15 and can be purchased online at **viennava.gov/webtrac** or in person at the community center.

One Man, Two Guvnors is an adapted version of a famous comedia del arte play A Servant of Two Masters. "I saw the play at the Kennedy Center years ago performed by the Royal English Shakespeare Company production," says Storck. "One Man, Two Guvnors follows that script scene-for-scene and includes a band that provides live music as a part of the show and has a lot of people involved in the production, which is what we are trying to do here. More people means more community, and we want more community."

As a 13-cast-member production accompanied by a 10-person band, Vienna's *Guvnors* production seems right on track in helping VTC regain its community of scale and rejuvenate its audience.

"We used to sell out the house at every show," says Storck. "That's where we're headed. If you live in Vienna, we want you to be in or come see the show."

Oktoberfest flavors are larger than all of Europe

Survey, 30,000 people annually flock to the all-day soiree that is Oktoberfest, and, of course, guests can expect German cuisine, drink, and cosplay, but the Vienna Business Association's 12th annual Oktoberfest celebration is a festival that celebrates food, drink, and entertainment not just from Deutschland but from all around the world.

This year's celebration from 11 a.m.- 7 p.m. Saturday, October 5, offers all kinds of different strokes for different folks. Those with a taste for tradition can enjoy a bratwurst and pretzels, but also available at multiple food court locations will be flavors from around the globe, including Thai, Indian, Mexican, Italian, BBQ, and one particular skewered fried potato that is allegedly more than a foot long.

Special to this year's entertainment line-up is '70s tribute band Superfly Disco, performing at the main red caboose stage from 4-7 p.m. The Town Green stage will be dedicated to the youngins, with The Great Zucchini kicking things off at 1 p.m. Kids also can enjoy tie-dye shirt making, inflatables, carnival games, and arts projects.

Guests are encouraged to wear traditional Bavarian outfits or retro 1970s clothing. Oktoberfest is co-sponsored by the Vienna Business Association and Town of Vienna. This year's title sponsor is Vienna Hometown Builders. All festival proceeds are utilized by the VBA Foundation for greater Vienna charities.

I-66 construction impacts Vienna area

t the September 10 Mayor @ Your Service event, representatives from VDOT and FAM Construction shared updates about the redesigned Nutley Street interchange, a permanent ramp closure and long-term bridge closure, detours, noise walls, and upcoming traffic pattern changes around the Route 123 interchange – all related to the I-66 Outside the Beltway reconstruction project.

Significant changes are taking place around the Vienna Metro area. The Saintsbury Drive ramp to I-66 East was permanently closed September 5. (The ramp will reopen temporarily weekdays this month through September 2020 for buses only.) Access to the I-66 East collectordistributor road/Nutley Street will shift to just east of the Vaden Drive overpass.

In mid to late October, the Vaden Drive bridge over I-66 will close for about a year. Closing the bridge rather than leaving it partially open allows it to be demolished and rebuilt in a 12-month, rather than a two-year, period. The closure, says Nancy Smith, public relations manager with FAM Construction, avoids overlap of major construction impacts at the Nutley Street interchange and maintains access to Metro parking garages. Detours for vehicles, bicycles, and pedestrians will be marked.

Beginning in November, a series of temporary traffic pattern changes will



be implemented around the Route 123 interchange as bridge work continues and new ramps are installed.

Smith encourages drivers to slow down and pay attention to signage in order to safely negotiate detours and new traffic patterns. She also reminds drivers that a new state law prohibits use of handheld phones in construction zones; doing so can result in a \$250 fine.

The I-66 project team will coordinate construction activities with Metro's plans to close several stations, including the Vienna one, for rehabilitation next summer. Also, in the future, the Cedar Lane bridge over the interstate will be rebuilt; planning for that project currently is in early stages.

The ultimate interchange design at Nutley Street combines a double roundabout with a partial cloverleaf. This innovative design better fits the character of Nutley Street than the initially proposed diverging diamond design and maintains traditional traffic patterns on the right side of the road, separate on-ramps from Nutley Street in each direction, and ramps to I-66 on the right side of Nutley. No major traffic impacts to the Nutley Street interchange will occur while the Vaden Drive bridge is closed.

Final noise analysis for I-66 east- and westbound between Vaden Drive and Cedar Lane is undergoing final review, but it is anticipated that most of Vienna's noise walls, those being relocated to accommodate highway expansion as well as old metal walls that have deteriorated over the years, will be replaced with concrete walls coated with sound absorption material.

New HAWK signal at Maple Avenue & James Madison Drive

How hybrid pedestrian beacons work for those walking - and driving

Iso known as HAWK (High-Intensity, Activated Crosswalk) signals, pedestrian hybrid beacons are traffic devices that stop oncoming traffic to assist pedestrians in crossing busy streets. The Town of Vienna currently has one active HAWK signal on Maple Avenue mid-block between Pleasant Street and Library Lane.

A second HAWK signal has been installed on Maple at James Madison Drive and is expected to be activated sometime in October.

The graphic to the right, from the Colorado Department of Transportation, provides instructions for how both drivers and pedestrians should respond to various HAWK signals.



Time to rethink leaves and raking

s it's October and the gardening year is largely over, our attention now turns to getting those fallen leaves off the yard – and reusing them. More and more homes have smaller grassy areas and can use leaves as mulch for areas around shrubs and trees. Believe it or not, there is still life in those leaves!

In the woods, leaves provide several inches of natural mulch. This creates a habitat for a variety of wildlife species that are beneficial, including earthworms, toads, and many insect species.

Not all butterflies migrate, and many overwinter as pupae in leaf litter. When we move leaf litter out to the curb to be taken away, we lose beneficial insects and habitat for other animals. Butterfly and moth caterpillars are important food sources that mother birds feed to their baby birds in the spring. If the pupae are removed with the leaves, there will be fewer caterpillars next spring.

Consider not blowing leaves or chopping them with a lawnmower. Rake leaves, instead, to best preserve the wildlife within. Use leaves as mulch to help retain moisture in the soil, inhibit weeds next spring, and over time enrich the soil. Fallen leaves help trees and shrubs thrive while preventing weed seeds from getting the sunlight they need to germinate. Along with an increase in beneficial animals, fewer weeds in the spring will make you smile!

Pick up pet waste

Pet waste is a significant source of bacteria. When pet waste is left on lawns and other outdoor locations, it can be carried by runoff into storm drains, which lead directly to local streams and ultimately the Chesapeake Bay.

If you're thinking about leaving Fido's waste where it is or chucking it down the storm drain, just think about how you wouldn't want it in your morning coffee the following week. Here are three amazingly simple steps to help prevent the nose-wrinkling imagery of the previous sentence:

- 1. Bring a bag.
- 2. Use the bag to pick up pet waste.
- 3. Dispose of bag in your trash can, NOT in a storm drain (the most important step).

Remember: Only rain down the storm drain.

Town Council Actions

The following items represent recent Town Council actions, but do not constitute official meeting minutes. The most recent approved Town Council minutes, agendas, and meeting videos are available online at viennava.gov.

August 19

- Accepted amended proffers as submitted for 380 Maple Avenue rezoning application.
- Directed Town staff to draft amendments to the MAC as its top priority and simultaneously to consider amendments to regular commercial codes C-1, C-1A, and C-2 in Chapter 18 of the Town Code that affect the MAC. Further directed staff to draft amendments to the regular commercial code that require MAC streetscape and landscaping of parking lots and to consider changes to parking requirements or other incentives to encourage economic growth on Maple Avenue when drafting amendments.
- Approved payment not to exceed \$84,620.37 to Tyler Technologies for second-year payment of a standard maintenance agreement for the police department's computer-aided dispatch, law enforcement records management, and mobile data systems.
- Set a public hearing for September 16, 2019 to allow public comment on proposed changes to Chapter 1, Section 1-9.1 of the Town Code and directed the Town clerk to advertise the public hearing.
- Renewed a contract with Tyler Technologies for \$94,075 for maintenance, support, and training services related to its Tyler Munis software.
- Approved publication in a newspaper of general circulation and on the Town's website the list of FY2019 delinquent real estate property taxes

as presented June 30. Council also approved transmittal of the list to Fairfax County with a request that it be posted and entered into county records. Council further approved recording the delinquent real estate property taxes as tax liens against subject properties.

- Approved an agreement with Fairfax County for Bear Branch Stream Restoration. Funding for the \$2,040,000 project will come from Fairfax County stormwater funds and the Stormwater Local Assistance Fund.
- Awarded a contract for relocation of sanitary sewer at the Northside Property Yard to Anchor Construction Corporation for a cost of \$246,933.50.
- Approved expenditures of \$54,000 with U.S. Concrete and Paving for drainage improvements at Center and Battle streets.

September 16

- Held a public hearing on proposed amendments to Chapter 1, Section 1-9.1 of the Town Code regarding the fee charged for passing bad checks to the Town. Council then approved the changes as presented, which raise the allowable fee up to \$50; the Town intends to charge \$25 for all returned checks or drafts.
- Awarded a capital lease contract for financing the Town's FY19-20 vehicle and equipment replacement program to Sandy Spring Bank at an interest rate of 1.904%.
- Referred to the Planning Commission a proposed extension to June 30, 2020 of the temporary suspension of Article 13.1 – MAC Maple Avenue Commercial Zone Regulations of Chapter 18 of the Town Code. Also set a public hearing for November 4 to receive the Planning

Commission's recommendation and public input on the proposed extension, which currently is set to expire November 15. Council further directed the Town Clerk to advertise the public hearing and a Notice of Intent to Adopt at the November 4 Town Council meeting.

- Approved a resolution to include members of Town Council and boards and commissions as "employees" of the Town for the purpose of workers' compensation insurance coverage.
- Approved a resolution to adopt, with amendments, the 2020 Town Council meeting and work session schedule.
- Authorized the mayor to execute a memorandum of understanding between the Town and Vienna Business Association for the 2019 Halloween Parade.
- Authorized the mayor to execute a photography license and use permit for Historic Vienna, Inc.
- Authorized the mayor to execute a lease renewal agreement with Historic Vienna, Inc. for the Freeman Store and Museum and Little Library.
- Approved placement of property located at 131 Wade Hampton Drive SW on the Register of Vienna Historic Structures, Sites, and Places.
- Approved expenditure of \$1,484.39 in additional funds to Ashburn Contracting Corporation for the Church Street NE sidewalk project.
- Approved and authorized the Town Manager to execute the Town's applications for a VDOT Revenue Sharing grant for an East and Church streets mini-roundabout and for Transportation Alternatives grants for sidewalks on Glyndon Street NE, Glyndon Street SE, Pleasant Street SW, and Ayr Hill Avenue/Center Street as well as a Kenyon Road NE trail and BikeShare stations.
