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Students create dreamy drains in downtown Vienna

hanks to the Vienna Public Art Commission, the artistic talent of four Madison High School students (with assistance from a few of their friends), and the generosity of Vienna Paint, we dare say that three of Vienna's storm drains are among the most beautiful in the state – hmmm, make that the country.

Over the second weekend in September, Madison students Katherine Helmicki, Lilly Jacobs, Kaitlyn Lotspeich, and Allie Mann spent some 14 hours over two days painting three storm drains on Church Street near the Freeman Store and Museum and Posh! building. The whimsical designs are intended to remind people that putting litter and other materials down storm drains endangers the idyllic environment depicted in the paintings, says Mann, who is the student representative on the Vienna Public Art Commission (VPAC).

Mann, 17 and a senior, takes art classes outside of school and spends a lot of her free time painting acrylics and watercolors. This was the first time, though, that she had painted storm drains. The final product, she says, turned out even better than she expected.

"It pops so much more than I thought it would," she says. The best part, she adds, is that she gets to pass the drains daily as she lives on Church Street. "I get to see my work every day. That's really cool because I'm proud of it."

Response to the Town's September 21 Facebook post about the paintings was very enthusiastic. "So beautiful!" commented Tanya Nave. "So wonderful to see high school students doing this amazing work in their community."

"What I love about them," says VPAC Chair Midge Biles, "is just how colorful and lively they are. It just makes you feel happy when you see one of these drains. It's kind of a fun surprise – you're walking down the street and suddenly there's this beautiful drawing on the ground."


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Church Street Holiday Stroll is December 2 Santa Claus is coming to Town

Options for disposing of/recycling glass

New global realities shatter glass recycling

our recycling bin remains a key sustainability tool even though recent global policy changes related to recycling have had rippling effects and have left a lot of residents - in the Town of Vienna and across the country - wondering just how best to dispose of empty jars and bottles.

While Fairfax County stopped accepting glass as part of its single-stream recycling collection October 1, the Town of Vienna, for a variety of reasons, encourages residents to continue to utilize recycling collection for glass – at least until further notice.

Alternatively, residents may wish to consider disposing of all colors of clean glass bottles and jars in one of Fairfax County's 21 purple glass recycling containers. The closest purple bin near Vienna is located at the Providence Community Center, 3001 Vaden Drive. The Town of Vienna currently is working with Fairfax County to see if it's possible to locate a glass recycling container within Town limits.

Whether disposed of in the trash or with other single-stream recycling materials, Town of Vienna residents' glass products are currently ending up in landfills. However, because of the way that the Town's current contract with its waste and recycling vendor is structured, it costs the Town thousands less a year to have glass collected with recyclable materials and sorted out than it does to haul it away with other waste. Secondarily, the Town believes that the situation related to glass recycling remains in flux and, at this time, doesn't want to encourage residents to break good recycling habits.

Glass collected in designated purple containers through Fairfax County is delivered to the only glass processing plant in the region, located in Lorton, where it's crushed for reuse as a substitute for stone in county projects. (As a reminder, lamps, light bulbs, ceramics, porcelain, mirrors, windows, and sheet glass are not accepted in recycling containers.)

So what's driving this conundrum about if and how to recycle glass? Two years ago, China, the world's largest consumer of recycled materials, imposed strict "contamination" standards on

recycled materials it will accept, setting the standard at 0.5%, when the previous industry standard for contamination typically ranged from 3-4%.

In a December 2018 online Public Radio International article, Susan Collins, president of the Container Recycling Institute in Southern California, says: "A quarter of what we put in those recycling bins doesn't get recycled, either because it was improperly placed in the bin in the first place or because it cross-contaminates other materials in the bin." Glass, especially broken glass, can be a primary source of contamination in recyclables.

To help improve the chances that your single-stream recyclable materials actually get recycled, consider these tips:

- Keep recyclables loose, clean, and dry. Rinse containers thoroughly.
- Never place non-recyclable materials, including plastic bags of any kind, diapers, shredded paper, broken glass, and clothing, in the recycle bin.
- DO include plastic bottles and jugs (with lids on), metal food and beverage cans, cartons, and mixed paper and cardboard in recycle bins. See a more extensive list of "do" and "don't" recycle items at viennava.gov/recyclableitems.
- Separate glass and dispose of it in one of Fairfax County's purple glass recycling bins.

The Town of Vienna does not pick up, as part of its curbside trash and recycling service, hazardous waste materials such as paint, used motor oil, insecticides, or fuel tanks. Some hard-to-recycle items, such as automobile waste products, scrap metal, and electronics are accepted during the Town's Quarterly Recycling Day events. Over the past couple of years, VPAC has coordinated two permanent art projects for the Town: the brass statue celebrating late Mayor Jane Seeman and all Town volunteers and the mural on the back of the Vienna Shopping Center. Temporary art projects, like these drains, Biles says, allow the committee to implement projects more quickly and with a little more whimsy.

Biles notes that the location of the painted drains was strategically determined as a means of capitalizing on the draw of the W&OD trail. VPAC hopes to paint a couple more drains near the community center this fall before the weather turns too cold and perhaps again in the spring.

VPAC expects that the drain paintings will last about six months. The committee has promised to power wash the drains when the paintings begin to show any signs of fading or chipping.

Leaf collection coming to your neighborhood

rab a rake. Leaf collection season has arrived. Town of Vienna workers already have begun the first of at least three passes through Town, starting this year in the northern quadrants. They're using a giant, mobile vacuum to suck up leaves that have been raked to the edge of the curb. They'll be swallowing leaves throughout the rest of 2019.

To view where the leaf collection crew was working most recently and in which direction they're headed next, go to viennava.gov/leafcollectionmap. Also look for small printed signs, announcing that collection is "coming soon," to pop up in your neighborhood.

Leaf piles should be free of limbs, large sticks, and

other debris that may clog the vacuum hose. The Town asks that residents refrain from raking leaves into the street as this can be dangerous. Cars parked atop of leaves may cause them to catch fire, and children playing in leaf piles could be struck by a passing vehicle. In addition, leaves may prevent rainwater from reaching storm drain inlets.

As an alternative to piling leaves for pickup, residents may opt to bag leaves for regular trash collection. Please place leaves in paper yard waste bags or in a loose can, both of which are available at garden and home supply stores.



Vienna zip code rises to top for solar installations in Northern Virginia

ince 2014 the 22180 zip code has accounted for more residential solar energy system installations through the Solarize NOVA program than any other zip code in the region. Twenty-nine homes in the 22180 zip code, comprised almost exclusively of Town of Vienna residents, have installed solar over the past five years. Throughout Northern Virginia, 305 solar contracts have been implemented, meaning that solar system installation in Vienna's zip code accounts for almost 10% of the region.

"We've put a lot of effort into this," says Conservation and Sustainability Commission (CSC) Chair Susan Stillman of the commission's efforts to promote the regional Solarize program in Vienna through community forums and marketing materials. "I'm really pleased to see that we've risen above."

Solarize NOVA, which is sponsored by the Northern Virginia Regional Commission (NVRC) and managed by the Local Energy Alliance Program (LEAP), is a community-based outreach initiative to bring solar power to homes and businesses throughout Northern Virginia. NVRC and LEAP partner with local governments and others to bring well negotiated contracts with vetted vendors to regional residents each spring.

"Local governments have long led the way in innovation in Virginia," says NVRC Executive Director Bob Lazaro. "This is just another shining example of how regionalism



and localities working together make a positive difference.

"Our thanks to the Town of Vienna team and a super group of citizen volunteers," he adds. "It does make a difference. It is something to proud of."

Stillman reports that interest in solar energy appears to be gaining momentum as prices continue to drop and a federal tax credit, while less than it once was, remains available. "There's more interest in solar all the time," she says, adding: "Solarize NOVA really simplifies the process of going solar as they do the hard work of vetting installers and negotiating prices, which effectively garners a group discount."

The next Solarize NOVA program will kick off in the spring.

Meet the new face of sustainability in Fairfax County

airfax County is increasing its commitment to sustainability. In July, the county created a new Office of Environmental and Energy Coordination (OEEC) and appointed Dr. Kambiz Agazi as the office's director. Agazi is leading OEEC's cross-organizational implementation of effective environmental and energy policies, goals, programs, and projects and is engaging county departments, authorities, businesses, and residents to advance environmental and energy priorities.

Vienna's Conservation and Sustainability Commission had a chance to chat with Agazi about the new sustainability initiatives his office will bring to Fairfax County and, by extension, the Town of Vienna.

What was your position prior to becoming director of the OEEC?

I was Fairfax County's energy and environmental coordinator for more than 20 years with a wide range of responsibilities across environmental and energy fields. Before appointing me as director, the Board of Supervisors had key decision points, which influenced the structure of the office.

What are OECC's sustainability priorities?

OEEC's top sustainability priorities are:

- developing a Communitywide Energy and Climate Action Plan (CECAP)
- setting a goal to offset county energy use through locally generated green energy sources, such as solar photovoltaics
- exploring new policies to encourage environmentally sustainable development, including in the areas of land use and green buildings.

What's next on the horizon for OEEC?

The Board of Supervisors' Environmental Committee endorsed a timeline and structure for a Communitywide Energy and Climate Action Plan (CECAP) at its June 18 meeting. Part of that endorsement included formation of



a focus group in each supervisor's district. Focus groups will be composed of subject matter experts, representatives from businesses and organizations, and other individuals who have a high degree of interest in and understanding of energy and climate issues. These members will ensure that district-level environmental concerns are reflected in the CECAP decision-making process. Focus groups will meet this fall and will hold introductory meetings for each district through December.


