Town receives bequest to fund sidewalks

ormer Councilmember Maud Robinson, who passed away last year just shy of her 97th birthday, left the bulk of her estate to the Town of Vienna for the specific purpose of building sidewalks, over a fiveyear period, in areas where they aren't already planned or likely to be funded through grants or new construction.

The majority of Robinson's estate, which has not yet been settled but will total more than \$7 million, will endow the Maud Ferris Robinson Charitable Trust, which will fund the sidewalk projects.

"She gave the bulk of her estate to the Town," says Laurie Genevro Cole, executor of the estate and trustee of the trust, "because she and [husband and former mayor] Charlie were absolutely devoted to the Town of Vienna. They spent so much of their time and talents in making Vienna a well-governed community where people would want to live. They lived very simply, and they had no children. Vienna is their legacy.

"One thing that she and Charlie [who served as Vienna's mayor from 1976 until his death in 2000] did through his campaigns and otherwise was to walk Vienna," Cole adds. "They probably walked every single street multiple times. They realized how much sidewalks mean to making a place a community and a good place to live."

The Town of Vienna is identifying streets, where curb and gutter already exists, on which sidewalks may be installed. Before Town Council makes a decision as to which projects to move forward with, residents on selected streets will be contacted by the Town and given an opportunity to provide feedback. Overall community buy-in will be a determining factor in Council's approval of sidewalk projects. The first potential streets to have sidewalk added are expected to be considered by Town Council at its February 24 meeting.

The Town of Vienna currently has roughly 85 miles of sidewalk. The Robinson bequest is expected to provide up to 3.3 miles in additional sidewalks throughout Town. Public Works Director Michael Gallagher notes that it could take up to two years from identification of a street to walking on sidewalks. The Town will use contractors for this work.

Share your feedback at March 2 meeting

Community conversation about outdoor living space, multimodal transportation project priorities

he Town of Vienna will host a "community conversation" March 2 to allow residents to provide feedback on two initiatives:

- a proposal to increase outdoor living space
- recommended short- and mid-term project priorities from the recent Maple Avenue Corridor Multimodal Transportation and Land Use Study.

This "community conversation" will take place from 7-9 pm Monday, March 2, at Town Hall. Residents will have an opportunity to ask questions related to these topics, provide feedback, and engage in interactive exercises that will indicate preferences.

Over the past year, Councilmember Nisha Patel has heard from numerous residents who have expressed a desire for modification of the Town code to allow for additional outdoor living space. She and other Councilmembers want to



know what the community thinks: Is it a good idea to allow for outdoor living space and other amenities in exchange for implementation of a current stormwater management system on their property?

The current code states that not more than 25% of a lot shall be covered by buildings, accessory buildings, automobile parking spaces and access, sport courts, tennis courts, patios, and terraces. Decks are regulated separately

and may not cover more than 5% of the total area.

The proposal put forward by Patel would allow for driveway expansion, decks, patios, outdoor sports courts, terraces, screened porches not enclosed by four walls, lead walks, and pools. These amenities, classified as outdoor living space and improvements, would be permitted as long as stormwater management systems are implemented, functional, and in compliance with current required standards and approved by the public works director.

"What we'd like hear on March 2 are residents' thoughts about the pros and cons of this idea," Patel says. "We're looking for feedback on ways this concept could be modified. Help us figure out the right thing to do."

Mayor, Council candidates must qualify by March 3

n order to be included on the May 5
Town of Vienna ballot, individuals
interested in running for mayor or Town
Council must file a certificate of candidate
qualification and petition of qualified voters
with the Fairfax County Office of Elections
by 7 pm March 3. For complete candidate
instructions, click on the "local offices" link
under the May 5 general election listing at
elections.virginia.gov/candidatepac-info/
candidate-bulletins/.

This year, the Town mayor and three seats on Town Council – those currently filled by Linda Colbert, Pasha Majdi, and Douglas Noble – are up for election. Mayor Laurie DiRocco, who served on Council from 2009-14 before becoming mayor, announced at the end of last year that she was not seeking reelection.

In order to run for election in the Town of Vienna, candidates must:

- have been a Virginia resident for one year immediately preceding the election
- be a resident of the Town of Vienna, living within the Town's corporate limits
- be registered to vote in Vienna.

Candidate-provided statements will be published in the April issue of *Vienna Voice*. Often, local organizations host candidate forums that are open to the public.

The deadline to register to vote in the upcoming Town election is Monday, April 13. The deadline to request that an absentee ballot be mailed to you is April 28.

The Town of Vienna has a councilmanager system of government with six councilmembers and a mayor, who are elected in alternating years to two-year terms. Town Council establishes policies, passes ordinances and resolutions, approves the Town budget, sets tax rates, approves land-use plans, and makes appointments to Town boards and commissions. The mayor is the ranking elected official and ceremonial head of the Town government.





Deputy chief graduates from FBI National Academy

ast October Vienna's Deputy Police Chief Daniel Janickey began a 10-week journey at the FBI National Academy in Quantico that would add depth and richness to his 30+

years of experience in law enforcement. He returned to the classroom, lived in a dorm, made new friends, and conquered the famed Yellow Brick Road.

Janickey, along with nearly 260 other leaders and managers of state, local, county, tribal, military, federal, and international law enforcement agencies, graduated from the prestigious program in December. Across the United States, less than 1 percent of police officials have graduated from the FBI National Academy, the nation's premier law enforcement leadership training institution.

Vienna Voice was eager to hear some of the details of Janickey's experience.

VV: What was your daily routine like?

DJ: All students at the National Academy stay on campus at Quantico and sleep in dorms. The program is set up like a typical college day with classes, including a physical training class, being held Monday through Friday.

Each class was one hour and forty-five minutes. A typical day consisted of two classes in the morning, an hour lunch break, and then two classes in the afternoon.... I went to the library in the evening two-three times per week to work on papers,

presentations, etc.... My roommate was a captain from New Jersey, and we became close friends through the experience.

VV: What did you take away from the courses?

DJ: I had two favorite courses [out of six]. One... was about utilizing media, especially social media, to tell the department's story. Law enforcement is very different now than it was 20, or even 10, years ago. Social media has changed the game on how we message and manage our image to the community. My media class had 30 students in it, and we were able to share experiences and learn best strategies when dealing with traditional media, news conferences, crisis management, and social

media. We were able to review high-profile events from around the country and critique how law enforcement agencies handled their public image and communications strategy.

VV: And the other course?

DJ: That one was Advanced Concepts in Wellness and Vitality in Law Enforcement. It was aimed at keeping officers healthy physically, emotionally, and mentally – throughout their entire career. Police work can be demanding. As a profession, we haven't done a great job preparing our officers and their families. This class

VV: Were you able to connect with other National Academy students?

DJ: I was actually one of the lucky few that was allowed to go home every weekend and see my wife and kids, but that was not the case for most everyone else there. I made good friends, many of whom sacrificed a lot to be there. Of the 257 students with me at the National Academy, 35 were international students. It was excellent to learn from them and share experiences.

I met many great people and became close friends with three students -from the Czech Republic, Latvia, and Moldova. I brought them home to my house on Thanksgiving break. Before that, I brought them to the Vienna Inn. They loved it and sent pictures back home to their families.





Town digs into feasibility study on undergrounding Maple Avenue power lines

hat would it take to underground utility lines along Maple Avenue? For that answer, the Town of Vienna is turning to Rinker Design Associates, which has been hired to undertake a feasibility study that will provide funding and implementation strategies as well as a conceptual plan for achieving that long-term goal.

Using a federal grant, utility lines on the north side of Maple Avenue, from Lawyers Road to East Street, were undergrounded in the early 2000s as a part of a Maple Avenue streetscape improvements initiative. Now the Town is interested

in creating a road map to how best to underground utility lines along other sections of Vienna's main corridor.

Rinker Design's four-phase study will be conducted over 11 months, resulting in a presentation to Town Council that will provide a concept plan and present funding estimates and strategies as well as recommendations for how to phase the undergrounding over time.

"With the community's vision for a more walkable, multimodal Maple Avenue," says Public Works Director Michael Gallagher, "we felt now was the right time to develop a plan for moving forward on undergrounding utilities along Maple Avenue."

Go easy on the salt - on roadways, too

The Weather Channel is streaming, students are excited, and roadways are being striped with white road salts or brine in anticipation of a snowstorm. These salts and salt mixtures make it more difficult for water to freeze into ice, which is critical to enhancing safety on roads, sidewalks, and steps.

However, as rain flows or snow melts, this salt is carried, with the water, off of roadways. The salt may rest for awhile in the soil along the road or be swept immediately into local streams. Once it makes it to streams, salinity levels spike. For weeks after a snowstorm, the salt persists in the soil and leeches into the runoff headed for streams. High salt concentrations in bodies of water are toxic to aquatic plants and animals.

This year the Izaak Walton League of America is hosting its second annual Winter Salt Watch. Volunteers may request a test kit at iwla.org/water/winter-salt-watch to measure sodium chloride levels in a local stream. A baseline reading should be obtained before a winter storm, after salt has been



applied to roads, after the first warm day following a snowstorm, and after the next rain event.

Last year, salt levels above 230 parts per million, the maximum level considered tolerable for freshwater organisms, were found in 25% of tests submitted nationwide. Readings from the DC metro area were especially high.

Road salts are not inherently bad;

they are necessary to ensure driver and pedestrian safety. The real issue is unnecessary over-application of road salts. Winter maintenance professionals as well as homeowners and business owners should use the least amount of salt necessary to get the job done. Guidelines are available at wisaltwise.com/Tools/Application-Guidelines-Calculator.

A Vienna Centennial Gala Ball, an elegant evening of dining on a four-course meal and dancing to the music of the 13-piece Sidney's Orchestra at the McLean Hilton, was scheduled for March of that year. The draft final report of the Maple Avenue Multimodal Transportation Study outlines recommended projects, including an initiative currently underway to upgrade signal timing infrastructure and technology. Councilmembers want to know how the community would prioritize other recommended projects. Short- and mid-term recommendations in the study's report include:

- · redesign of the Church and Mill streets intersection
- redesign of W&OD trail crossings
- implementation of leading pedestrian intervals in signal timing
- development of a local circulator/ micro-transit service
- filling vital sidewalk gaps

- implementation of additional transportation studies and strategies
- installation of Capital Bikeshare locations
- improvements to Locust Street and W&OD trail connections
- improvements to roadway operation and safety
- expansion of the bicycle network
- improvements to bus stops along Maple Avenue
- · reconfiguration of Church Street and Lawyers Road intersection
- improvements at Pleasant Street and Courthouse Road



"This is a wonderful gift to the Town of Vienna," says Mayor Laurie DiRocco. "These sidewalks – and others – help connect places, but, more importantly, they connect the community. Maud and Charlie were all in for the Town of Vienna. We're grateful that this is how Maud, out of her deep sense of public service and commitment to the Town, chose to pass on her legacy to the Vienna community."

In addition to the trust established to fund sidewalks, Robinson left \$50,000 to the Town for beautification purposes. Cole says that these funds will be used to plant trees and other similar projects.

Charlie and Maud Robinson married in 1947 and moved to Vienna in 1951. Charlie Robinson, who was an attorney with the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, served as the Town of Vienna's mayor for 24 years before his death on January 3, 2000. Maud Robinson served on numerous community and Town boards and commissions. She was on Town Council from 2000-2009. She died March 11 last year.
