Qualified voters who live within Town of Vienna limits may cast their ballots from 6 am-7 pm at the Vienna Community Center. Photo identification will be required.

Voters may cast one vote for mayor and three for Councilmembers. See page 4 for information about the candidates.


For additional information about voting and elections, visit **fairfaxcounty.gov/elections**. Here are some important dates related to this election:

- April 13: Voter registration deadline to participate in this election
- April 28: Deadline (by 5 pm) to request an absentee ballot by mail
- May 2: Final day to vote absentee in person at the Fairfax County Government Center

Despite concerns related to the coronavirus, the Fairfax County Office of Elections is mandated, at this time, to hold the election as scheduled – and will adopt social distancing strategies as appropriate. If you're concerned about your health related to the coronavirus, you can vote by **absentee ballot** via mail in the May 5 Town elections using reason code 2A. Coronavirus concerns bring cancellations and closings

APRIL 2020

s this newsletter went to press at the end of March, impacts from efforts to mitigate the spread of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) were changing the rhythm of daily life in Vienna – and around the globe. To help protect the community and its employees, the Town of Vienna has canceled all board and commission meetings as well as parks and recreation programs and classes and closed Town Hall and other facilities to the public, except by appointment only, through at least April 12. Additional changes may have been implemented since this newsletter went to press; be sure to check viennava.gov/coronavirus for up-to-date information.

Regarding upcoming scheduled events (after April 12) that are highlighted throughout this newsletter, please be sure to check the calendar on the Town's homepage, viennava.gov, as well as Town social media channels to ensure that these events are indeed occurring as scheduled; further cancellations may be necessary.

Vienna Alerts is a great way to receive up-to-the-minute texts and emails about cancellations and other times when things

aren't working out as planned (e.g., there's a water main break or a road has been closed). If you don't already receive these alerts, sign up at viennava.gov/alerts.

The impact of social distancing and other mitigating strategies is costly, especially for small businesses. The Town has created a resource page at viennava. gov/covidbizresources that includes information about financing, webinars, and technical assistance. Be sure to continue to support Town of Vienna businesses by shopping local, ordering pick-up or delivery from Vienna restaurants, and visiting local retailers online to purchase goods and services.

During this unprecedented time, the Town of Vienna remains committed to maintaining continuous operations and providing high-quality essential services, such as water and sewer, police, waste disposal, and permitting. The Town's top priority – other than the safety of the community and employees - is to ensure that these services remain uninterrupted. \heartsuit

Cedar Lane bridge expected to close six months beginning in May for I-66 construction

ometimes it's better to rip the Band-Aid off - to deal with sharp, short-term pain rather than prolonged irritation. That's the thinking behind the Transform 66 – Outside the Beltway project team's recommendation to completely close the Cedar Lane bridge over the highway for six months beginning around May 15. The rebuilt bridge is expected to reopen around Thanksgiving.

The proposal to demolish and rebuild the bridge over a six-month period, which takes advantage of the planned shutdown of Metro orange line platforms this summer, had not officially been adopted at the time this newsletter went to print. However, the six-month option – as opposed to a 28-month, three-phase option that would leave two narrowed lanes on the bridge open during peak periods only - was being strongly recommended to the Virginia Department of Transportation, which is working with partners to mitigate impact on local jurisdictions and adjacent traffic flow.

In order to reconstruct the bridge to span the expanded highway lanes that will result from the Transform 66 project, Cedar Lane will be closed from Cottage Street to Hilltop Road.

Reaffirmed AAA bond rating helps Town score low interest rate, premium in bond issuance

he Town of Vienna issued \$34.5 million in general obligation public improvement bonds last month, accepting a bid from J.P. Morgan Securities that included an interest rate of 1.86% and a \$3.1 million premium. The Town typically issues bonds every two years to fund capital improvement projects and repays the bond funds using only meals tax revenue and water and sewer fees.

"We're really excited to have received such an excellent interest rate," says Finance Director Marion Serfass. "That exceptional rate of 1.86% is a testament to the Town's AAA bond rating and sound fiscal policies as well as current market conditions. Obviously, investors find the Town of Vienna a safe, conservative investment."

Premiums are provided by investment firms in order to make their offers more attractive, and Vienna's premium does not require repayment.

Noting the Town's strong economy and strong management and good financial policies and practices, S&P Global Ratings and Moody's reaffirmed the Town's AAA/ Aaa bond rating and stable outlook in February. These ratings are the highest available and have been maintained by the Town of Vienna since 2010.

S&P noted the Town's very strong budgetary flexibility and liquidity, modest deficits, adherence to fund balance policy, and conservative budgeting practices.

In its press release, Moody's stated: "The Aaa rating reflects the Town's sizeable and growing tax base that benefits from its proximity to the District of Columbia..., above average resident wealth levels, a strong reserve and liquidity



position supported by conservative fiscal management, and manageable debt and pension burdens."

These 2020 bonds will fund construction of a new police station, anticipated property acquisitions, potential public parking facility, and parks master plan as well as stormwater improvements and water and sewer infrastructure improvements. The Town anticipates breaking ground on the new police facility late this year.

Town counting on Vienna residents to respond to 2020 Census

he Town of Vienna has a tendency to overachieve – and that's one of the things we love about the community. Consider this recent tweet from the Northern Virginia Regional Commission in reference to responses to the U.S. Census:

*"...@*TownofViennaVA had the best self-response rate in region in 2010. Who will be the best in 2020?"

Another decade, another Census. Households should have received invitations along with instructions to respond to the 2020 U.S. Census March 12-20. Residents may respond to the Census online, by phone, or by mail. The Town encourages residents to take a few minutes to respond to the Census invitation, if you haven't done so already. We'd love to boast that once again in 2020 the Town of Vienna had the best response rate!

If a household does not respond to the 2020 Census, a census-taker will follow up in person to collect responses; this is scheduled to occur between May and July. For more information, visit **2020census.gov.**



Town takes on tree inventory

he Town of Vienna requests residents' assistance in keeping Vienna's tree species and ecosystem as balanced and healthy as possible – and that will require knowing what's rooted in the ground.

Pushing the bounds of etiquette, the Town would like to invite itself – or rather encourage residents to invite the Town – to conduct tree inspections on their lots in order to build a crosssection inventory of the Town's trees, including the variety of species and tree age.

"We don't have a lot of data concerning the range of different tree species throughout Town on residential lots," says Urban Arborist Alex Shy. "We have to take a guess based solely on those trees on Town property. So we'd really appreciate residents' assistance in ensuring that Vienna has exemplary biodiversity and good-standing tree health."

As a bonus to collecting tree data, the Town will then be able to more accurately identify which tree takes the crown as Vienna's oldest.

Pasha Majdi Candidate for Mayor

Vienna is my hometown. I grew up playing VYS and VYI as a kid at Louise Archer, and now I'm raising my family here.

- 2. Build parks and green spaces throughout Town Create an 8-acre park on Beulah Road and maintain leaf pick-up and mulch delivery services. Add parks throughout Town. Establish tree conservation policy for the Town.
- **3. Protect residential neighborhoods from rezoning risks** Keep our distinctive residential zoning. Do not allow or incentivize larger houses. No more high-density, luxury housing projects. Support affordable housing that is actually affordable (not \$900,000 townhouses).
- 4. Thoughtful planning for Maple Avenue Plan ahead for traffic, don't dump cars on residential neighborhoods. Plan ahead for schools, don't add hundreds of students and let Fairfax County Public Schools put our kids in trailers. Attract new businesses, not 150-unit apartment buildings. The Town of Vienna is cooperating with the North East Vienna Citizens Association (NEVCA) and Vienna Business Association (VBA) to broadcast a Candidates Forum so that Vienna voters have an opportunity to hear from the 10 mayoral and Town Council candidates in this era of social distancing.

Broadcast of the question-and-answer forum with candidates, which is likely to be conducted electronically, is expected to begin airing April 4 and will be scheduled to run on TVCN (the Town's cable access channels – 27 on Cox and 38 on Verizon Fios) through May 5 at the following times:

- 10 am Monday
- 7 pm Wednesday
- 2 pm Saturday

At this time, the Town's election is likely to occur on May 5 as scheduled. The Fairfax County Office of Elections is required to move forward; to delay the election would require action from the governor or an order from the state Supreme Court.

Vienna spreads the LOVE

OVE has sprouted at Northside Park thanks to the Vienna Public Art Commission's most recent public art project and the generosity and resourcefulness of a Vienna area couple. LOVE - in the form of public art and spelled out in 6-foot letters fashioned from metal tubing - was installed last month at the park where it meets the W&OD Trail.

The seed for the idea and the homemade letters came from a local couple who prefers to remain unidentified publicly.

"It's not about us, it's about the greater picture," says the donor. "It's more about bringing the community together, not about us making a donation. We're incredibly grateful for the team of people who helped the seed become a reality."

The idea for the LOVE sign sprouted about four years ago when the donor was running regularly with a mom's group along the W&OD. She recalls that at that time there was negative energy and polarization surrounding the upcoming 2016 presidential election.

"When I was running on the trail with girlfriends, I'd share that I wanted to put a LOVE sign up in Town to announce proudly that we are a community that leads from the heart with love."

After a year of dreaming of this vision, the donor took a stroll around Town with Mayor Laurie DiRocco on one of her Friday morning walks and shared her idea about installing the sign at the Town Green. Joyfully, the mayor recommended that she work with the Public Art Commission to help bring her idea to fruition.

Over the course of the process, the recommended location for the LOVE sign became Northside Park. "I think it's a perfect location," says the donor. "It creates a new space to enjoy in Vienna."

Installation of the sign, says the donor, "makes my heart happy" and reminds her that: "Love always prevails even in all its imperfections as it stands the test of time.

"For me," says the donor, "it's about the greater sense of community." Though Vienna is located in a large metropolitan

Four years after the donor first envisioned this public art project, another presidential election is on its way and, in addition with the coronavirus pandemic, a sense that we're facing something unprecedented and uncertain looms. "We're facing uncertainty as a community," she says. "and I have a feeling that the Town of Vienna will continue to find ways to be loving and caring neighbors.

"Thank you," she adds, "to the Town of Vienna, Vienna Public Art Commission, the artists, and the community for supporting the idea of growing and sharing in this collective love."

A sign adjacent to the LOVE letters at Northside invites folks to share the love using the hashtag #LOVEVienna with their public art selfies and photos. A ribbon-cutting ceremony for Vienna's newest public art piece is scheduled for 10 am Saturday, April 18, at Northside Park. 🔍

Many voices heard at March Community Conversation

bout 100 people attended the Town's March 2 Community Conversation meeting. More than two dozen speakers shared feedback on:

- Councilmember Nisha Patel's proposal to increase outdoor living space
- recommended near and mid-term priorities from the Maple Avenue Corridor Multimodal Transportation and Land Use Study.

In addition, several individuals spoke during the open discussion segment of the evening.

Nearly 20 speakers raised their voices both in support and opposition to the outdoor living space proposal, which would provide some level of coverage expansion for uses such as expanded driveways, screened porches, and patios in exchange for implementation of stormwater management systems that meet current standards. Others raised issues and suggested modifications to the proposal.

Among concerns raised by those who are not in favor of expanding outdoor living spaces were:

- · exacerbation of existing drainage problems
- loss of trees and green space
- increase in house sizes.

Those speaking in favor of the initiative talked about:

- challenges for properties with detached garages and smaller lots
- · the difficulty of the existing variance process
- the Town's outdated zoning regulations.

As the outdoor living space conversation came to a close, Patel suggested that feedback and suggestions provided through the evening and via feedback surveys that were available during the week following the Community Conversation would be shared with the consultant that will be hired to help the Town revise and update its zoning code, which has not been significantly updated since 1969. That consultant is expected to be hired this spring; the update process, which could take 18-24 months, will include additional opportunities for community engagement.

Another 10 speakers asked questions and provided feedback on projects recommended through the Maple Avenue Multimodal Transportation Study. The final report of the study, along with information about staff's and the community's most highly recommended priorities as well as results from the outdoor living space questionnaire, were scheduled to be presented to Council at its April 13 meeting.

In closing out the Community Conversation, about a half dozen individuals spoke during the open conversation period, asking questions or adding feedback on the previous topics or sharing other questions and concerns, including about clean up after automobile crashes and drainage concerns related to the new police station.

Signed detours will reroute traffic via Cottage Street, Gallows Road, and Lee Highway.

The goal, notes Nancy Smith, public relations manager with FAM Construction, "is to demolish and rebuild the bridge as quickly as possible to minimize impact to the surrounding community and to those traveling on I-66."

Project representatives acknowledge that some of the impacts from the bridge closure in this most congested part of the Outside the Beltway corridor will be, well, temporarily painful – and Vienna drivers and neighbors are likely to see more vehicles – and police presence – on some Town roads.

- Traffic engineers have collected traffic data and analyzed travel patterns and found that about two-thirds of travelers using the Cedar Lane bridge are regional travelers. Traffic models show that these drivers will disperse to other regional routes.
- The signed detour will divert local traffic to Gallows Road.
- In order to ease the transition to the new travel patterns, the project team is planning a robust public outreach program that will include a variety of communication methods.
- Traffic may take a few days to adjust to the new travel patterns and this timeframe may be challenging as everyone adjusts to new patterns and routes.

- Patience is requested, and mitigation strategies, including adjusting signal timing, will be employed as needed.
- The bridge demolition also will be a noisy process that takes place mostly overnight. The project team notes, though, that it will be noisy for less time with the six-month option.
- Rerouting of Fairfax Connector routes 462 and 467 will be necessary, and expanded hours will be implemented to include additional mid-day and weekend hours. Details were still being ironed out as this newsletter went to press.

Other efforts related to the Transform 66 project in the Vienna area include:

- construction of a new Gallows Road bridge, which is currently underway
- construction of a new Vaden Drive bridge, which is anticipated to be completed in September
- temporary ramps and signals to be installed this summer on Nutley Street; these changes won't affect continuity on Nutley Street, but will result in different traffic patterns.

S olarize Vienna is back for 2020 and better than ever. Did you know that Vienna's zip code, 22180, has the greatest number of solar installations in the SolarizeNoVA program? Let's keep growing solar in our community!

In 2020, in addition to solar systems with pre-negotiated prices and terms, the Solarize program will offer electric vehicle chargers and energy efficiency check-ups.

This year the federal investment tax credit is 26% of the cost of your solar system; the federal credit drops to 22% in 2021. For electric vehicle charging systems, the tax credit is 30% up to \$1,000 in 2020. There's never been a better time to go solar! For additional details, check out SolarizeNoVA.org.

To make your home as comfortable and energy efficient as possible, free home energy assessments are being offered to Solarize participants. New this year, and included with the assessment, is a blower door test and discovery of air leaks using an infrared camera.

You can learn more about SolarizeNoVA and discuss solar systems with selected installers at the community forum to be held from 7-9 pm April 21 in Council Chambers at Town Hall.
