

Council adopts trimmed down 2020-21 budget

t its June 15 meeting, Town Council adopted a \$41 million Town of Vienna budget for fiscal year 2020-21, which began July 1. The adopted budget encompasses four funds, including the general, or daily operations, fund, which totals \$24.8 million for the coming year, a \$2.5 million decrease from the originally proposed general fund budget and about 7% less than the FY2019-20 general fund. Overall, the Town's new budget represents about a 0.4% decrease over last year; the decrease is minimized because budgeted funds for debt service and water and sewer are up.

Cuts to the general fund are necessary in response to anticipated losses in revenue due to impacts from the coronavirus pandemic.

"Revenue is coming in much lower in some cases," says Finance Director Marion Serfass, "and the Town has to cut expenses in order to balance the budget."



Revenue shortfalls are expected in a variety of areas that impact the general fund, particularly in parks and recreation fees, business licenses, state revenues, and sales tax.

To address these shortfalls, the Town has adopted several strategies related to personnel expenses, including deferring salary increases, decreasing overtime allocations, freezing some positions, and cutting parks and recreation contractor/staff costs. In addition, no new priorities are included in the 2020-21 budget. Staff travel has been suspended, snow equipment replacement deferred, and an additional \$200,000 in departmental expenses, unrelated to service delivery, has been cut.

Council also adopted the real estate tax rate for 2020-21 at 22.5 cents per \$100 assessed value. This marks the eighth year that the Town's real estate tax rate has remained the same or been decreased. Due to increased values in assessment, the average

Town provides multifaceted support to businesses

n a recent survey of Town of Vienna businesses, 59% of respondents reported that they were worried or very worried about the health crisis and staying in business and a majority said that their business had experienced a revenue loss of 71% or more in the pandemic's early days. The survey conducted April 22-May 15 by the Town's economic development office, in partnership with the Town Business Liaison Committee and Vienna Business Association, garnered responses from 94 businesses.


Since then, the Town has been working on multiple fronts to provide critical assistance to Town businesses.

The Town has committed \$1 million in CARES Act funding to the \$26 million Fairfax County RISE (Relief Initiative to Support Employers) grant program specifically to support Town businesses. As this newsletter went to press, at least 306 Town of Vienna businesses had applied for a \$10,000-\$20,000 grant, comprising about 5% of the total application pool. Businesses began receiving notification of awards around the end of June.

The Town opted to work with Fairfax County, which already had a partnership with the Community Business Partnership through which it could allocate grants to small businesses and nonprofits, to get needed capital to businesses in an expeditious manner.

"We understand that access to capital is a huge part of the difficulty that businesses are facing during this time," says Economic Development Manager Natalie Monkou. "That's why we moved quickly to work with the county on the RISE grant."

As Phase One of the Forward Virginia business reopening plan was implemented in Northern Virginia at the end of May, restaurants and other businesses were permitted to provide limited dining and other commercial activities outdoors. Town Council approved at its June 1 meeting an emergency temporary ordinance that waives permits and processes for providing commercial activity in outdoors spaces. At its June 15 meeting, Town Council



readopted the emergency ordinance to extend temporary outdoor commercial activity through the end of September.

Restaurants and businesses interested in conducting outdoor commercial activity must submit a temporary outdoor activity permit application at **vienna.idtplans.com**. Additional information is available at **viennava.gov/outdoor.dining**.

Another finding of the spring survey was that 75% of respondents indicated an interest in educational programming to help improve business operations.

"We're looking forward to creating programming that addresses areas that businesses said they wish to learn more about, including communications and marketing," says Monkou. "Businesses should be on the lookout for additional webinars."

Town facilities and programs begin re-opening under 'new normal'

s Virginia continues to move forward in reopening businesses and expanding the size of permitted social gatherings, the Town of Vienna too is edging toward a new normal.

- Town Hall is scheduled to reopen to the public July 6.
 Citizens are still encouraged to utilize online services when possible and to wear face coverings and practice social distancing when coming to Town Hall.
- The Community Center also will open July 6 with strict social distancing, reduced occupancy and hours, and enhanced cleanings.
- Community Center rentals will be limited to room occupancy calculations, taking into consideration social distancing requirements.
- For now, the Town continues to operate under the
 continuity of governance ordinance that was passed
 March 31, which means that virtual attendance at
 meetings by Council and board members is permitted,
 and citizens are encouraged to attend and participate
 virtually. Only items that are necessary for continuity
 of governance are included on agendas, and thus some
 boards and commissions are not meeting.
- Vienna General District Court is in session at Town Hall Monday mornings, with social distancing and regular cleanings.
- In-person community events through August have been canceled.
- No- and low-touch summer camps and classes will be offered beginning July 6 with reduced class occupancy.
- Playgrounds and parks, the Community Garden, tennis courts, outdoor basketball courts, and Vienna Dog Park are open. Field permits and picnic pavilion rentals are now allowed.
- The Teen Center, Bowman House, Freeman Store & Museum, and Town Green rentals remain closed.

A personal introduction to Vienna's new mayor: Linda Colbert may surprise you

inda Colbert is no stranger to serving the Town of Vienna. She served on Town Council the past six years and before that she was on the Transportation Safety Commission. And then there is her family's legacy of service to the Vienna community: Both of Colbert's late parents served on Town Council, and her mother, Jane Seeman, was mayor for 14 years.

Still, though Colbert is a familiar face around the community and has lived in Vienna most of her life, Vienna Voice wondered what might surprise residents about their new mayor. (Colbert officially assumed office July 1.) So we asked the new mayor herself as well as those who know her best. Family members and close friends unanimously agree that Colbert has a bevy of unexpected and goodhumored personality traits that, they believe, will make for a strong, spirited, and savvy Town mayor.

When Colbert decided to run for mayor, after Laurie DiRocco announced that she would not seek reelection, she wanted to "give it her all."

"I wanted Vienna to really know me, and I wanted to try to reach every resident," Colbert says. "It took a lot of

parents volunteered in the community before and during their service on Town Council. My



particular really looked to the future and

understood that decisions had to be made for generations to come. I hope to continue that mentality, and I thank both of them."

The mayor's husband of 32 years, Mike Colbert, has long supported his wife's will and effort to accomplish her goals. The two began dating as freshmen at Madison High School in 1980. "She has been my best friend since I was 14," he says, and he was at her side, encouraging and coaching her, when as a Virginia Tech student she won the 1990 Collegiate Women's National Championship in her weight class in powerlifting.

"I was on the powerlifting team at Virginia Tech." Mike Colbert says. "I still had a year of eligibility and was training for the Nationals. Linda was a good athlete and always liked to work out. When she decided to pursue a graduate degree at Tech as well, I suggested that she join the women's team, and I would coach her. She took the challenge and ultimately won the national championship. She is a coach's dream. She learns fast, always gives 100%, and is incredibly cool under pressure. Linda is a great teammate and makes everyone around her better."

While Colbert has a sense of determination and strong work ethic,

Town manager takes on police use of force, racism in upcoming On Deck with Mercury events

he July 14 On Deck with Mercury event will be the first in a series of conversations about the Black experience, law enforcement and use of force, and finding a path forward in Vienna. The July 14 conversation will feature a panel of Town of Vienna employees and residents who will share personal experiences about being Black in America and Vienna.

Because space is limited in the Vienna Community Center gymnasium to about 70 people due to social distancing requirements, registration for this event is required and open to Town of Vienna residents only. A link to registration is available at viennava. gov/ondeck. Should space remain available, the Town will open the event to those who live outside of Town; if more than 70 people register, a lottery will be held and additional overflow space opened in another location. This On Deck with Mercury event also will be streamed live on YouTube.

The August 11 On Deck event will focus on law enforcement and use of force.



New traffic-calming 'cushions' to be installed on Tapawingo and Kingsley roads

ith financial assistance from the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), the Town of Vienna plans to install traffic-calming measures along Tapawingo and Kingsley roads. The five speed cushions, expected to be installed this summer, will be permanent, but they're being utilized specifically in response to the temporary traffic increase being experienced along those roads as a result of traffic impacts from the I-66/Cedar Lane bridge project.

Speed cushions, explains Town Transportation Engineer Andrew Jinks, are modified speed humps with cuts in them so that emergency vehicles can pass through without hitting the bump aspect and thus not lose any response time. He notes that both roads where the traffic-calming devices are to be installed are emergency routes.

Two speed cushions will be installed along Tapawingo Road and three along Kingsley between Nutley and Cottage streets.

Total cost for installing the five speed cushions is approximately \$27,000. VDOT will reimburse the Town for this project as the measures are intended to mitigate the increase in unofficial detour traffic along those roads due to closure of the Cedar Lane bridge while it's being reconstructed as part of the Transform 66 project.

Vienna employs sidewalk 'buttlers' to address #1 litter problem

o help address locally the nation's #1 litter problem, the Town of Vienna has installed about a dozen cigarette recycling bins, or sidewalk "buttlers," at covered bus stops and other locations throughout Town. This new initiative is being funded through the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality's litter control and recycling program


and is part of Keep America Beautiful's movement to reduce cigarette butt

litter from streets.

Cigarette waste from participating programs is shipped to TerraCycle, a global leader in collecting and repurposing hardto-recycle waste. First, TerraCycle separates out and composts residual tobacco and paper. The filter, which is made of a white synthetic fiber, or cellulose acetate, is thoroughly cleaned, melted, and pelletized using a method called extrusion. The cellulose acetate pellets are then combined

with other plastics and used for new products such as ashtrays, shipping pallets, or plastic lumber.

For every pound of cigarette waste collected, \$1 is donated to

Town enters development agreement with county for public parking spaces at redeveloped library

own Council approved at its June 15 meeting a development agreement with Fairfax County to construct approximately 84 public parking spaces dedicated for Town use as part of the Patrick Henry Library redevelopment project, which is anticipated to be completed in 2025.

The county Board of Supervisors is expected to approve the agreement this month. Fairfax County's funding will come from its Capital Improvement Program, which will need to be approved by voters this fall as part of a bond referendum.

Through this agreement, the Town will address its long-term goal to provide additional parking availability in the central commercial

district. Town funding would come through a combination of grants and bond funding.

The agreement covers design and construction costs – and provides several points at which either party may exit the agreement prior to March 2022, when award of the design development contract is anticipated. The Town's portion of design costs is \$850,000 or 30% of the cost, whichever is less. For construction, the Town will contribute \$4.2 million or 19% of construction costs, whichever is less.

Design for the library project, which is expected to include a three-level garage, will begin next year and require about two years. Construction also will take about two years and will begin in 2023.

Update on Vienna's Eco-Efficient Homes initiative

esidential eco-efficiency has many enduring benefits to our community, including:

- consuming fewer fossil fuels
- helping stop climate change
- reducing acidification of the Earth's oceans
- avoiding water pollution.

Also, eco-efficient homes are cheaper to operate (lower utility bills), more comfortable (less drafty), and usually lead to stronger resale values. Vienna's Eco-Efficient Homes initiative recognizes Town residents and businesses for their commitment to eco-efficiency.

Both new and existing homes are eligible for recognition for measures such as installing solar panels or shingles, participating in Solarize Vienna, and integrating advanced energy efficiency technologies such as geothermal heating/cooling or solar heat collectors. In addition to integrating technologies, obtaining certification through a qualified program warrants eco-efficiency recognition. Examples of qualified certification programs include: Energy Star for Homes, Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED), National Association of Home Builders (NAHB)

National Green Building Standard, Earth Craft House, Passive House, and a qualifying Home Energy Rating Scale (HERS). For more information about qualifying actions and certifications, consult the 2020 update to the Vienna Eco-Efficient Homes brochure at viennava.gov/DocumentCenter/View/3235.

Town of Vienna real estate tax bill this coming year will be about \$79 more.

The health crisis also has had a significant impact on the Town's debt service fund, which is used to pay back bonds issued to fund the Town's capital improvement projects. In February, the Town issued \$34.5 million in general obligation bonds at 1.86% interest rate to fund construction of the long-planned police station and several road, sidewalk, and drainage projects.

The Town funds its debt service account using meals taxes collected from restaurants. Those revenues were down 10% for the most recent fiscal year; the Town used cash reserves to make up the \$300,000 shortfall in the 2019-20 budget. This year, the Town expects to use reserves in the debt service fund and/or part of the \$3.1 million bond premium it received in February to cover shortfalls in the \$5.5 million fund.

"We can't cut the debt service budget," says Serfass. "This is money that the Town owes on its bonds. We do, however, thanks to the Town's strong financial policies and practices, have options to address this need."

The other funds that comprise the Town's budget include stormwater at \$437,720 and water and sewer at \$10.2 million.

Council adopted in May water and sewer rates for the 2020-21 year that represent a 10.4% increase. This year represents the third consecutive rate increase, as outlined in a five-year rate plan study that calls for increased funding to address critical infrastructure needs. The average customer's annual water and sewer bill is expected to increase by \$74.

Serfass notes that jurisdictions across the country are facing unanticipated revenue shortfalls and increased expenses due to the pandemic. "This was an unanticipated economic downturn," she says. "The biggest concern is the uncertainty. We don't know how long this is going to go on."

Staff and Council will continue to monitor the Town's budget on a monthly basis and make further adjustments to expenses if necessary.

40 years ago...

The Town planned to celebrate inauguration of the Vienna-Oakton-Tysons Corner jitneybus system with festivities and ceremonies as well as free rides on August 2, 1980, according to the July newsletter from that year. Two 17-passenger jitney buses were to provide service along Route 123 from Tysons to Oakton with stops in Town at the community center, library, post office, Town Hall, and commercial areas on Maple Avenue and Church Street.



Town Council Actions

The following items represent recent Town Council actions, but do not constitute official meeting minutes. The most recent approved Town Council minutes, agendas, and meeting videos are available online at viennava.gov.

June 1

- Held a public hearing regarding repealing or extending temporary suspension of the Maple Avenue Commercial (MAC) Zone. Following the public hearing, Council repealed MAC Maple Avenue Commercial Zone regulations in chapter 18 of the Town Code. Council also directed that all MAC documents, including reports, studies, surveys, resident and public hearing comments, Planning Commission and BAR comments, and Council comments be included in consultant's review and recommendations related to a Town zoning code update. Council further directed the town clerk to advertise a Notice of Intent to Adopt.
- Approved an emergency ordinance to expand use of outdoor business operations for outdoor dining and other commercial activities subject to conditions outlined in the emergency ordinance. Council further directed the town clerk to advertise re-adoption of and Notice of Intent to Adopt the emergency ordinance at its June 15 meeting.
- Approved a \$2,886,552 CARES Act spending plan as presented by staff.
