VOTE MAY 2

Town elections will be held on Tuesday, May 2. All voting will take place at the Town Hall from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voters should use the entrance to the rear of the building.

Vienna elections are held each year when citizens vote for 3 Council seats. The office of Mayor is voted on every two years. This year Mayor Joseph Spriggs is seeking re-election, and is unopposed.

All three incumbent Councilmen are running for re-election and there are two contenders.

MAY COUNCIL DATES CHANGE

Because of election day, May Council meetings have been changed to the 8th and the 22nd, so mark your calendars. Normally Council Meetings are held on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of the month, at 8 p.m. in the Council Room at the Town Hall.

Of special interest at the May 22 meeting will be the briefing of Council by METRO representatives on plans for the Vienna station. This is presently planned for the junction of Route 66 and Nutley Road, although Council has asked that the location be shifted to Blair Road.

LAND USE PLAN IS ADOPTED



May, 1972

The Town Council adopted as its Land Use Plan for the next 5 years, what is essentially the 1965 Zoning Map. Due to the strong opposition of those citizens who attended the Public Hearings on the Plan, such controversial items as PUD and proposed zoning changes on vacant tracts of land were dropped.

Council did approve the Planning Commission's Stream Valley Park concept which will protect all major streams in the Town, including particularly Wolftrap Creek, Piney Branch and Hunter Branch. Easements will be acquired along these streams for hiking and biking trails. The town will also seek additional HUD funding for the beautification of Wolftrap Creek as it passes under Maple Avenue. Plans include a more attractive treatment of the bridge as well as bricked walls and walkways along the creek.



MEET OFFICER FRIENDLY



Under a Federal Grant, the Vienna Police Department has been enriched by a Community Services Program designed to give the community a contact with the Department and to make it aware of what our police are doing to keep the town a safer and better place to raise our families.

Officer Joe Tavares, known as "Officer Friendly" under the program, is available for talks to schools. PTA groups, civic organizations and clubs in the area. He will speak on narcotics, vandalism, safety and the problems of youth, and will discuss any special problems where citizens feel the police can be of assistance.

RESULTS OF HEARINGS ON TRAFFIC CIRCULATION PLAN



Most controversial street proposals in the new Traffic Circulation section of the Comprehensive plan were dropped from consideration after the Public Hearings, including Abbottsford Road as a circumferential highway around Vienna.

Council authorized the formation of a Northwest Citizens' Committee to advise the Planning Commission on a study of traffic circulation in this quadrant of town.

The Committee will be made up of presidents of Civic Associations and one home owner from each of the following streets: Lawyers, Upham, John Marshall, Lewis, Roberts, Blair, Knoll, Pleasant, Windover, Valeview Court, West, Orchard and either Lincoln or Highland.

It will consider such questions as the extension of Center Street into the County, and the through connection of Nutley Road.
