1972-73 BUDGET HEARING SET JUNE 5

The public hearing on the proposed 1972-73 budget for the Town of Vienna will be held at the regular meeting of the Town Council on Monday, June 5 at 8 p.m. in the Council Room at the Town Hall.

The total budget is \$3,132,609, as compared to the budget approved for the current fiscal year of \$2,668,789. Increased expenditures are chiefly set for three categories; the Police Department, Street Maintenance and Sewage Treatment.

Consideration will be given to increasing the authorized personnel for the Police Department by three men. An additional \$35,000 is slated for Street Maintenance to permit an accelerated street repair program. Due to increased sewage treatment costs to reduce pollution in the Potomac, the Sewage Treatment Section shows an approximate increase of \$125,000.

The Town Manager pointed out that with the exception of an increase in the automobile license fee, Vienna will be able to operate during the coming fiscal year without any increase in taxes or fees. This is due to the general reassessment of property by Fairfax County, and developments in the commercial area on both ends of town, and the addition of new properties in the Technology Park.

Copies of the budget are available at the Town Hall prior to the hearing.

TOWN TO SELL DOG LICENSES



For the convenience of residents, after June 1, dog licenses may be obtained at the Finance counter at the Town Hall during regular working hours. Tags purchased now are good until Dec. 31. Tags for 1973 go on sale in Nov. To be licensed a dog must be 6 mo. old and have a rabies certificate. The fee is now \$2 for all dogs through June. On July 1 the fee has been raised by the County to \$5. Those who have received warning tickets for not having a license should present them when applying for tags, so it may be attached to the license and checked out by County police.





EVERYONE IS URGED TO PARTICIPATE IN GALA FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION

Vienna's Bi-Centennial Commission, under the chairmanship of Councilman Paul Lyons, is calling upon all organized groups as well as individuals, to join in an all-day old fashioned, American Fourth of July.

Plans have been completed for turning the area along Center St., from Maple to Locust, and from Center to Park Street into a public square. This will include the Vienna Elementary School grounds, the Community Center fields, Town property and the firehouse. People will be encouraged to walk to the site as parking will be limited.

A "something for everyone" program will include ball games all over town. Within the holiday enclave will be a flea market where dealers will display and sell their antiques and "junk". Booths will be available for the display or sale of crafts. Old-time games for children and parents will include three-legged races for fathers and sons, or mothers and daughters, sack races, potato races and climbing a greased pole.

Entertainment will be provided by those singing groups, rock bands, or folk groups willing to volunteer their services. Response is hoped for from barbershop quartets, German bands, etc. Picnic tables will be set under the trees throughout the area and concession stands for food and beverages will be maintained by the baseball leagues and the Jaycees. In addition picnickers may purchase barbecued chicken at the dinner hour.

The Mayor's Office will coordinate activities at the Town Hall. Groups and organizations as well as individuals who are willing to assist should select an activity, or volunteer for an assignment by June 12th, Chairman Lyons said. Booths will be assigned on a "first come, first served" basis.

Individuals will be asked to put out their flags and decorate their homes and businesses beginning on Sunday. The Commission will offer buntings and flags for sale at cost in the lobby of the Town Hall. Volunteers will be needed to sell this material for 10 days prior to the Fourth.

"Everyone may play a part. Call the Mayor's office for information and to arrange for an assignment. We need nurses to man a First Aid station, men to set up booths, people to organize the games, and a hundred other things", Chairman Lyons said. The day will end with fireworks at the Community Center.

24TH YEAR FOR FOREIGN GUEST PROGRAM

For the 24th consecutive year, Vienna families will entertain foreign guests in their homes on the Fourth of July. In cooperation with International House in Washington, adult students training under the auspices of the State Department are bussed to the Town Hall at 12:30 p.m. where they are greeted by their host family. They are taken home and entertained for the afternoon and brought back to Town Hall at 10 p.m. after the fireworks. This year, entertaining guests should be particularly easy with everything that will be going on in Town. To volunteer, host families should call Mrs. Butler or Mrs. Schaule at Town Hall 938-8000. This will be the only opportunity for many of these foreign students to see the inside of an American home. It is an education for them and for the families, particularly the children, who would otherwise never have the opportunity of getting to know someone from an entirely different culture.



Vienna will continue with the same Mayor and Council for the next year, as the result of last month's Town election. Joseph Spriggs, who ran unopposed, will continue as Mayor for the next two years. Councilmen Charles Robinson, Paul Lyons and Richard Dingman were also re-elected for two year terms.

The Council is gratified at the expression of confidence in the present governing body, by the people of the Town. Mayor Spriggs and the members of Council pledge to continue to serve with the same sense of responsibility and responsiveness to the needs of the citizens.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES

Recreation Department schedules for summer classes will be out June 1. Registration for classes will begin immediately and classes start on June 26.

TENNIS LEAGUE

Tennis players are encouraged to form a team of 5 to 8 players and register with the Community Center for inclusion in a tennis league by June 16. Four teams will be required to start the league which will open play near the end of June and finish near the end of July.

THERAPEUTIC RECREATION

Therapeutic Recreation classes for children with learning disabilities, ages pre-school through junior high will run for 6 weeks. Classes will be held at the Community Center Monday thru Thursday beginning on Wed., July 5, 9 a.m. to noon. The motor development clinic is designed to help children with mild problems caused by lack of physical fitness or coordination, obesity, emotional disturbances, social difficulties or speech, auditory or perceptual difficulties. Fee is \$35.

BICYCLE SAFETY PROGRAM

The Optimists, Jaycees and Officer Friendly will sponsor a bicycle safety program to be held at the Community Center on Saturday, June 3, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. All bike riders are invited. The Jaycees will engrave each bike with a number to be kept in Officer Friendly's file for speedy recovery in case of theft. Optimists will give a free inspection and a safety booklet. A movie on bicycle safety will be available for those who wish to see it.

Bike owners unable to attend on June 3 may register bikes at the Center with Officer Friendly on Saturday, June 10, or call for an appointment at the police station. It is hoped that all bikes will be registered eventually.
