Six new patrolmen have joined Vienna's Police Force within the last three months, bringing the Department's complement to 24. The new men, presented to the Mayor and members of the Town Council at its last meeting are: Thomas P. Sherwood, James E. Decker, James N. Kieticus, Johnny T. Price, Clarence A. Keith, and Robert W. Spuner.

For the first time, Vienna patrols will be augmented by a motorcycle. The new vehicle will be used for park patrol as well as patrolling parking lots and businesses. It will allow the police access to areas unreachable by car, and greater mobility in confined areas.

Vienna's Police Department has been active in several new programs this year. It is a participant in the Alcohol Safety Action Program, funded by the Virginia Department of Highways. This pilot program, which attempts to get the alcoholic driver off the road, is being tried out in several test areas, including Fairfax County. For its participation, Vienna received a patrol car, used in the apprehension of drinking drivers. The "Officer Friendly" program, is a federally funded program, designed to acquaint the public with the work of the Police, and to bring about a better understanding of community problems and their solutions. Much of Officer Friendly's work is done with the Town's youth, through presentations at the schools. A white station wagon, labelled "Community Services" was added to the fleet of police vehicles through this program.

Two projects involving the identification of personal property were also included in the Department's activities. An attempt is being made to register all bicycles at police headquarters. Bicycles brought into the department are engraved with a number and this, together with the maker's number and a description of the bike are put on file. Engravers may be borrowed by individuals to mark personal possessions for identification in case of theft and subsequent recovery.

A second radar set has drastically increased the number of speeders apprehended in town. Since speeding is our No. 1 complaint from residents, a special effort is being made to reduce it.

#### **DESCRIPTION OF CLASSES**

CHILDREN'S ART - For beginning and experienced students ages 6 through 11. The course will include charcoal, pastel, watercolors and ink. All materials are provided with the exception of watercolors.

Students primarily learn to properly chord a guitar as opposed to reading music by note. All students must own a guitar and it is helpful if they have a music stand when class begins.

**SEWING** - At todays prices and with the new fabrics on the market, sewing is again becoming a pleasure. Youngsters thoroughly enjoy learning how to sew and parents will be proud to exhibit the first product of this class. Sewing machines, irons and ironing boards are provided for this activity.

#### **HISTORY AND PURPOSE**

The Vienna Recreation and Parks Department was authorized by Council action in 1965. The department officially began in February of 1966 with the employment of Judson Hockman who is still the Director of the department.

The purpose of the department, as defined by the Vienna Town Council, is to supplement the recreation program provided by Fairfax County rather than to duplicate that program. Therefore, the vast majority of fee classes are offered during the standard working hours and are aimed primarily at women and children.

This leaves the Community Center open during the evening hours to provide meeting space for a wide variety of town groups and organizations. Weekends during the Fall months are used by these same organizations for shows and exhibits, all of which are community interest affairs. A complete schedule of dates is available elsewhere in this brochure.

The department maintains a close relationship with civic clubs, garden clubs, the Vienna Women's Club and all youth oriented agencies. In addition the department is a co-worker with Vienna Youth Incorporated which provides youth football, soccer, wrestling, basketball and a majorette corps. Soccer and basketball are open to boys and girls through Vienna Youth Incorporated. Schedules of activities and meeting time for all the aforementioned groups are available at the department office which is located in the Vienna Community Center.

The administration of the Recreation and Parks Department is always seeking new and better ways to improve the program. Vienna is an autonomous unit in the midst of suburbia and is a compact area where residents know their neighbors and visit throughout the town.

The department shares the desire for this way of living and is always available to residents who wish to offer changes or new ideas.

The department is also responsible for maintaining some 90 acres of parkland which include the median strips dividing the entrance ways to town and the right-of-way on all town owned property. The department maintains four picnic areas which may be scheduled and reserved in advance by large groups desiring such facilities. There are six public tennis courts, four of which are lighted, available on a no reservation basis. The department also maintains a lighted baseball facility at Waters Field, a lighted men's softball field at Southside Park and will soon assume maintenance of a multi-use lighted facility at Cunningham Park School for Little League baseball, girl's softball and youth football. Several other smaller areas for community use are also maintained by this department, many of which can be reserved in advance by town residents.

Hiking and biking trails have been constructed through out the stream beds in the town and weather permitting, are maintained by the department. Maps of the town's park and trail system may be obtained at the Vienna Community Center.
