

Council Approves DeLuca Tract Rezoning

Town Council approved rezoning the 44.44 acre DeLuca Tract from single-family detached homes (RS-12.5) to townhouses (RTH).

The original request by DeLuca Enterprises, Inc., of RM-2 was amended to RTH.

Owners of the tract are proposing a 150-unit townhouse development with a density of 3.4 units per acre as compared to 2.8 units per acre that was the maximum allowed with an RS-12.5 zone. Under the original zone 126 houses would have been permitted-

The proposed townhouses will be of the traditional mode with a two-car garage for each unit. Approximately 56 percent of the tract will be common green space.

Historic Moorefield Home will not be destroyed under the proposed plan. The Town will play a major part in restoring the structure and controlling its use.

In other developments involving the property, but not connected with the rezoning of the land; 10.11 acres of the northwest section of the tract will be conveyed to the Town for open green spaces.

Stickers or Tags for 75

Starting in March when new Town auto licenses are renewed, residents will be given the choice of displaying either the traditional metal tag or a sticker for the front windshield. The fee will remain the same for either form of registration--\$15 for automobiles and \$1 for military.

Option to pick a metal plate or windshield sticker, whatever the preference, is only for 1975. Town Council will gauge from this year's registrations what form of registration licensing should be offered in future years.

The option was offered after numerous complaints were received from residents wanting the discontinuation of metal tag registrations

Street Connection Proposals Dropped

Town Council approved dropping consideration to the connection of several streets southeast Vienna as indicated on the Traffic Circulation Plan.

In a resolution passed by Council, any planning or consideration to connect Locust Street to Hine Street across Wolftrap Creek; to connect Branch Road to Talahi Road; to connect Park Street with Electric Avenue via Dominion Road, and Glyndon Street connection across the Washington and Old Dominion Railway has been discontinued.

Several streets and parts of streets were also redesignated from collector to local streets. They include: the combination of Locust and Hine Streets from Branch Road to Niblick Drive; the combination of Branch and Talahi Roads from Valley Drive to Park Street; Dominion Road from Park Street to the intersection of Follin Land and Electric Avenue, and Glyndon Street from Locust Street to Moore Avenue.

Council Adopts Meeting Schedule For 1975

Town Council adopted its meeting schedule for 1975 in which public hearings will be given specific dates to be heard.

December 1975

A breakdown of regular Council meetings and special dates for public hearings are as follows:

In January regular Council meetings will be held on the 6th and 20th and public hearings will be on the 27th.

During February regular Council meetings will be on the 3rd and 24th. There will be no public hearings.

Council will meet on the 3rd and 17th for regular meetings in March and on the 24th for public hearings.

In April Council will have regular meetings on the 7th and 21st and public hearings will be on the 28th.

During May regular Council meetings will be on the 12th and 19th. No public hearings will be scheduled for May.

Council will meet on the 2nd and 16th for regular meetings in June and a public hearing on the proposed 1975-76 fiscal budget will be conducted on the 9th.

In July Council will have regular Council meetings on the 7th and 21st. No public hearings are scheduled in July.

During August regular Council meetings are scheduled for the 4th and 18th with public hearings scheduled for the 25th.

Council will meet on the 8th and 22nd for regular meetings in September. No public hearings will be scheduled for September.

In October regular Council meetings will be on the 6th and 20th. No public hearings will be scheduled in October.

During November Council will have regular meetings on the 3rd and 17th with public hearings on the 24th.

Council will have regular meetings on the 1st and 15th in December. There will be no public hearings in December.

Mini-Bikes May Be A Bad Gift To Give

While Christmas shopping, parents should remember, that mini-bikes are illegal for most applications.

Mini-bikes lack the equipment to pass the Virginia inspection requirements therefore making them illegal on public streets. They are also illegal on public lands, such as parks or the Washington and Old Dominion Railway which is park land.

The only place a mini-bike can be ridden legally is on private property with the permission of the property owner. Unless owners of a mini-bike have access to a fairly large private tract mini-bikes are useless.

36 feet from Orchard to the corporate limits. A sidewalk is planned along the northerly side of Malcolm Road for its entire length and sidewalks are slated for both sides of Lawyers Road from Upham Place to Holmes Court.

Additionally, Lawyers Road will be improved to 36 feet wide from Holmes Court to Lewis Street, 32 feet wide from Lewis Street to Colin Lane and 36 feet wide from Colin Lane to Upham Place.

Public Hearing on Street Merchants

Council will have a public hearing on an ordinance that would prohibit street merchants from operating in Town.

According to the proposed ordinance, "No peddler shall conduct business from a stationary location in the public streets nor shall any have an exclusive right to any location in the public streets, nor shall he be permitted to operate in any congested area where his operations might impede or inconvenience the public."

The public hearing is scheduled for December 16, starting at 8 p.m. at Town Hall.

Ordinance Proposed to Limit Auto Speed

Town Council will consider an ordinance that would make it illegal for a motor vehicle to travel in excess of 15 m.p.h. in a parking lot open to the public and designed to accommodate 50 or more vehicles.

Also in the ordinance the Police Chief may "designate lanes of travel for the movement of traffic and shall erect signs or paint appropriate markings on the lot surface in the lanes so designated and traffic thereon shall move only in the direction designated" in these parking lots.

Council will consider the ordinance at its regularly scheduled meeting on December 2, starting at 8 p.m., at Town Hall.

Christmas Program Slated for Dec. 1

The Town will have its Annual Christmas Program at the Community Center on December 1, starting at 4 p.m.

The Flint Hill School will present a music program while pre-schoolers will present the Nativity Scene. The children's ballet class will perform.

Mayor Joseph Spriggs will turn on the Christmas lights on the Town Christmas Tree and Santa Claus has promised that he will leave the North Pole to be present.

Bingo Ordinance Up for Consideration at Dec. 16 Meeting

An ordinance prohibiting bingo games and raffles for everyone except the voluntary fire department and rescue squad, and non-profit organizations will be considered by Town Council at its December 16 regular meeting at Town Hall.

The proposed ordinance refers to any bingo game or raffle for money or other thing of value.

Of those permitted to have bingo games or raffles a permit must be obtained from the Town Manager at least two weeks prior to the date of the bingo game or raffle. It will be unlawful for any sponsoring organization to conduct a bingo game or raffle without a temporary or annual permit.

Sponsoring organizations will not be permitted to advertise any bingo game or raffle with an outside sign. Activities will also be prohibited from midnight to 7 a.m.

Records of all receipts and disbursements shall be kept by the sponsoring organization and shall be filed with the Commissioner of Accounts for Fairfax County in the month of January of each year following the calendar year for which a permit has been issued. Such records shall be a matter of public record.

Any violation of the ordinance shall be considered a misdemeanor and subject to fine not to exceed \$1,000.

Bikes Without Lights Prohibited After Sundown

Bikes on Town streets after sundown without adequate lights are becoming an increasing problem in Town. Vienna Police will stop all bikes that are not properly lighted during the dark hours.

Poorly lighted bikes, or bikes not equipped with lights are extremely dangerous.

According to the Virginia Motor Vehicle Code, "Every bicycle when in use between sunset and sunrise shall be equipped with a lamp on the front which shall emit a white light visible in clear weather from a distance of at least 500 feet to the front and with a red reflector on the rear of a type approved by the Superintendent which shall be visible from all distances in clear weather from 50 feet to 300 feet to the rear when directly in front of lawful upper beams of head lamps on a motor vehicle. A lamp emitting a red light visible in clear weather from a distance of 500 feet to the rear may be used in lieu of or in addition to the red reflector."
