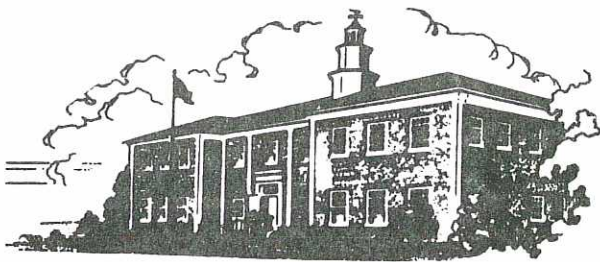

SPRING CLEANUP BEGINS MARCH 15

The Town of Vienna will begin its Spring Cleanup Program March 15. The program enables residents to put anything they want carted away at the curb line.

All debris must be at the curb prior to April 10.

Special precautions are necessary to enable speedy and safe pickup of all debris. Grass cuttings, branches and other foliage must be separated from other materials.

Anything left at the curb side will be picked up and carried away. Residents must not put debris over water meter coverings or utility hardware.

OFFICE BUILDING ZONE HEARING SET

Town Council will have a public hearing March 22 on a proposed Office Building Zone that would replace the present Transitional Zone.

The hearing will begin at 8 p.m. at Town Hall.

SERIOUS CRIME DOWN IN TOWN

Serious crime dropped in Vienna last year. Some 675 incidents were reported in 1975 compared to 774 in 1974.

A breakdown of serious crime includes: one criminal homicide, 10 robberies, 21 assaults, 111 burglaries, 499 larcenies and 33 auto-thefts.

PRE-SCHOOL SLATED FOR LATE MARCH

The Vienna Parks and Recreation Department will offer another session of pre-school for children three-to five-years-old beginning this month.

Three and four-year-olds will meet on Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., beginning March 23 and continue for eight weeks. Four and five-year-olds will meet Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., beginning March 22 and continue for eight weeks.

Mrs. Mary Tee Butler, instructor of the program for the past eight years, has a variety of activities planned, including arts and crafts, games, story-time, free-play, discussion groups, color and number identifications, and fine and gross motor development practice.
