New Meter Rate in Effect

Effective January 1, a \$50 refundable meter deposit will be required of all new residential water and sewer service customers. The deposit is refundable, without interest, after three years.

The Town Council approved the new rate in order to approximate more closely the average quarterly water and sewer bill.

Water and sewer bills are issued quarterly based on the nearest 1,000 gallons consumed. Here is a breakdown of the charges:

on the average winter quarter
water consumption for all
single-family homes

Fairfax County - - Rate set by the county at \$1.41

The service charge is levied to cover the cost of reading the meter, service repairs on the meter, billing, postage, collection and other customer account services. Revenue from the water service charge is used to maintain the water supply system and to finance outstanding water and sewer bonds for construction of our major facilities, such as pipelines, pumping stations and storage structures. Revenue from the sewer charge is used to maintain and operate the sewage collection system and provide for sewage disposal and treatment.

Police Get Composite Machine

The Vienna Police Department has recently acquired, through a grant, a composite drawing machine known as MIMIC (Multiple Image Maker & Identification Compositor). With this equipment, police can create a facial picture from a verbal description of a criminal suspect, thus eliminating the need for an artis: trained for identification work.

MIMIC is basically a special projector with facial features stored on six 35 mm film strips, one each for hairlines, eyes, nose, mouth, chin and ears, and accessories such as eyeglasses and beards. The film strips are superimposed and projected on a life-size screen at the front of the machine. Thousands of combinations are possible.

When the desired composite image has been constructed, photographic prints can be made in 10 seconds from a camera contained in the machine. A coding system permits re-creation of the exact image at any future time.



FY 1979-80 Budget Hearing

At the hearing citizens will have an opportunity to comment on possible uses of town funds (including general revenue sharing entitlements) for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1979.

Operation Alert Will Help Reduce Criminal Opportunity

On January 1, the Vienna Police Department will implement two new programs designed to reduce the incidents of burglary, larceny and vandalism. The first program, Operation Alert, has a goal to reduce these crimes by at least 20 percent through increased citizen awareness and cooperation in removing criminal opportunity. It will help in the identification of problem areas and aid the department in taking measures such as increased patrols and surveillance. The program will also promote communications between citizens and police and will increase reporting of suspicious activities.

Police officers assigned to Operation Alert will patrol the town looking for conditions that invite criminal activity. When the officers observe a garage door left open, a bicycle lying in a yard or other invitations to criminals they will inform the owner of the best way to secure his property. Many crimes are crimes of opportunity, which could be avoided by taking the necessary precautions.

The second program, Operation Stakeout, will provide the Police Department with two portable intrusion alarm systems that will be placed at critical locations identified daily for better protection against the target crimes of burglary, larceny and vandalism.

Results of Town Council's November 20, 1978, Meeting

- * Referred the matter of a cost of living addition to the police pension fund to the Police Pension Fund Advisory Board for additional study and recommendation to Council.
- * Took no action on the proposed sidewalk on the west side of Cottage Street.
- * Voted to take no further legal action on the delinquent sanitary sewer assessment of James and Lillie Thomas. Directed the Director of Finance to continue his efforts to secure payment through existing procedures.
- * Authorized the Director of Finance to forward the list of 1977 delinquent (uncollected) real estate taxes to the Fairfax County Circuit Court for the purpose of recording the unpaid taxes as liens against the properties upon which they were assessed.
- * Voted to reimburse Mr. Harold I. Miller for the delinquent taxes on the Tapper property in the amount of \$123.38 for the period 1974 through 1975 from contingency reserve.
- * Accepted the recommendation of the Town Charter Review Committee for an amendment dealing with vacancies in the office of Mayor.
- * Authorized the Town Manager, as of January 1, to revise the refundable meter deposit required of all new residential water and sewer service customers to \$50, this deposit to be refundable, without interest, after three years.
- * Recommended to the Fairfax County Office of Transportation the adoption of routes B north and C south for the paratransit system as modified by the town Planning Office.
- * Accepted the timetable for improvements to Park Street with a completion date of June 1981. Directed that the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation be formally notified of Council's decision not to utilize federal and state funding.
- * Voted not to participate in the Housing and Community Development Act of 1977 as an integral part of Fairfax County.


Results of Town Council's December 4, 1978, Meeting

- * Approved the final plat of the Greenhoot Fischer property, a resubdivision of Lot 24, 300 block of Locust Street, with a waiver to permit lots of less than 10,000 square feet due to the unusual topography of the site and its location abutting the service area of the shopping center. The following variances will be noted on the plat: 1) six-foot ornamental brick wall to be constructed the full length of the 10 lots at the rear of each lot at the highest point of each lot before sloping toward the shopping center; 2) steel guard rail anchored in concrete to be placed at the rear property lines where they adjoin the service drive of the shopping center; and 3) a solid wood gate to be furnished by the builder in the rear wall of each lot.
- * Adopted an ordinance relative to abandoned vehicles.
- * Directed the Town Attorney to prepare the necessary amendments to the Town Code relative to tax relief for the elderly to conform with a similar ordinance in Fairfax County and authorized the Town Clerk to advertise for a public hearing on the amendments.
- * Authorized the Town Manager and the Director of Public Works to take the necessary action to improve the sight distance and safety factors at the intersection of Park Street and Tapawingo Road.



Results of Town Council's December 18, 1978, Meeting

- * Approved the recommendation of the Charter Review Committee relative to proposed changes to the Town Charter to be forwarded to the General Assembly for approval.
- * Set February 12 as the date for a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the Town Code relative to providing tax relief to the elderly by providing for exemption and/or deferral.
- * Set February 12 as the date for a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance, repealing the transitional zone regulations and rezoning presently existing transitional zones to the adjoining residential zone. The amendment would provide for the simultaneous vesting in the present owners of property presently zoned transitional and their successors in title the right to continue the present uses after rezoning as continued conforming uses and not non-conforming uses.
- * Deleted Section 18-13 of the Town Code pertaining to transitional parking and amended Section 18-137.1, "Commercial Parking in Residential Zones." to include the former transitional lots.
- * Approved a request for the installation of a street light between 429 and 431 Center Street, North.
- * Extended the current moratorium on consideration of applications for transitional zoning and transitional parking to April 16, 1979.
- * Appointed the following members of the Transportation Safety Commission: Ronald Braun for a one-year term; Wilburn R. Compton and Rodger W. Seeman for two-year terms; Lois Kirchschlager and Charles Appleby for three-year terms, all terms to begin January 1, 1979. The reason for the staggered terms is to prevent all seats becoming open at one time in the future.
- * Denied the request of Vienna Little League for a donation of \$2,000 to help defray the cost of the 1979 Virginia State Little League tournament to be held in Vienna next summer.
- * Adopted a resolution recognizing the 111th anniversary of the founding of the First Baptist Church of Vienna.

Volunteer Tutors Needed

Fairfax County's Volunteer Learning Program (VLP) needs volunteer tutors who will work with an adult in an individual tutoring situation.

The large number of learners in the Vienna area who have registered for tutoring assistance with the VLP includes many in their late teens and early twenties. Most are high school dropouts who now realize the value of having a high school diploma and are studying to take the high school equivalency exam. Those who pass the exam are awarded a General Educational Development (GED) certificate, which is recognized by most employers and many colleges as being equivalent to a high school diploma.

Other learners need tutoring in fundamental reading and math skills.

The VLP, sponsored jointly by Fairfax County public schools, the juvenile court and the public libraries, offers a choice of daytime or evening tutor training workshops to prepare volunteers for tutoring assignments.

Following completion of the workshop, the VLP staff matches the tutor with a learner, based on the tutor's interests and diagnostic testing of the learner. The two meet at a time and place convenient to both, usually at a public library. Tutoring sessions, which are free, generally last one to two hours, two days a week. Books are provided by the VLP.

Volunteers may register for the workshop, which consists of four sessions, by calling 691-2343 between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on weekdays.

Two workshops are scheduled to begin in January. A daytime workshop is scheduled for Wednesdays from 11:30 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. beginning January 24 at Patrick Henry Library. Participants should bring a sack lunch; beverage will be provided. An evening workshop will meet on Thursdays from 7:30 to 10 p.m. in the juvenile court building in Fairfax City beginning January 25.

CROCHET

Anne Miller has worked with all kinds of handiwork and crafts, including knitting, macrame, sewing, beadwork, quilling and cookery, but her favorite is crocheting, which she has done for 35 years and taught for the last ten.

GYMNASTICS PROGRAM

Debby Maglioto teaches tumbling as well as gymnastics. Debby was on her school's varsity gymnastics team all through junior high and high school, and she participated as a diver in the Northern Virginia Swimming League.
