Spring Cleanup April 16th

The town's annual Spring Cleanup will begin on Monday, April 16. During the cleanup, Public Works crews will pick up free of charge any discards left at the curbside, including brush, old furniture and unwanted household appliances.

Residents should pile their debris at the curbside, taking care not to cover up fire hydrants or water meters. Brush and branches should be placed in a separate pile to help the cleanup go faster.

Public Works crews will start the cleanup in the Southeast section of town and proceed clockwise through the Southwest, Northwest and Northeast. The time needed to cover each section is hard to determine; therefore, all residents should have their debris at the curbside by April 16. Because cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other necessary public works duties, there is only time for one cleanup sweep of the town. Therefore, once a section has been covered, crews cannot double back.

Jitney Questionnaire Enclosed

Enclosed in this *Newsletter* is a questionnaire card on the jitney bus system proposed for the Vienna-Oakton-Tysons Corner area. If you are interested in having this system, please take a few minutes to answer the questions and return the card to Town Hall. A strong expression of support from the citizens of Vienna might help the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors to decide whether or not to provide funds to put the system into operation. The Board has deferred this decision because expected system costs exceed original estimates.

Last summer, both the Town Council and the Board endorsed the concept of a jitney system that would run through the town's residential areas, and up and down Route 123 to Oakton and Tysons Corner. There would be fixed routes, but no fixed stops along the routes; riders could hail the bus anywhere. A 25¢ fare was proposed. Hourly schedules were planned, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on weekdays, and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays. In addition, a lunchtime shuttle service was planned for the Tysons/Westgate/Westpark area.

The jitney is designed primarily to provide a neighborhood-oriented alternative to the private automobile, and it should help to increase the mobility of the young, the old and those without access to a private auto. It is believed that sustained public support of a Vienna jitney bus system would help to conserve energy resources, reduce air pollution and relieve traffic congestion. The Vienna Planning Office urges your participation in this questionnaire.



May 1 Is Election Day

Voters will elect three Town Council members in the town's annual general election on Tuesday, May 1. Councilmen Raymond E. Hicks and Donald E. Upchurch are seeking reelection, and Douglas A. Brook is running for his first term on Council. Neil M. Walp, who has served on the Town Council since 1969, announced earlier this year that he would not seek reelection.

Polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Community Center, 120 Cherry St., S.E. Voters arriving at the polls after 7 p.m. are prohibited by law from voting; those already in line at that time, however, will be allowed to vote.

Call the Vienna Newsline, 938-4499, for election results one to two hours after the polls close.

Town elections are non-partisan, and winners are determined by popular vote. Council members elected on May 1 will begin their two-year terms on July 1.

Raymond E. Hicks was first elected to Council in 1973. He has also been a member of the Transportation Safety Commission, Planning Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals. Currently, he serves as Council's representative on the town's Police Pension Advisory Board. Councilman Hicks has (Continued Inside)

Town Hall will be closed on Friday, April 13, for the Spring Holiday, which coincides with Good Friday. There will be no trash pickup that day. This holiday will also be observed by Fairfax County government offices.

Council to Consider Two Northwest Land Use Matters

At its regular meeting on Monday, April 2, the Town Council will consider two matters relating to land use in the Northwest section of town, the proposed Windover Heights Historic District Ordinance and a petition to pave and open Church Street from Lawyers Road to Pleasant Street. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. at Town Hall.

A public hearing on the Historic District Ordinance was held on March 12. The majority of citizens in attendance expressed support for the ordinance, the purpose of which is to protect sites of historic significance and preserve the character of the Windover neighborhood. Under the ordinance, any new construction or major alteration of the exterior of buildings within the district would be subject to approval by a Windover Historic Architectural Review Board.

A petition by residents of the Windover Heights area to open Church Street was presented to Council on February 26. The petition asks that the street be opened to connect Lawyers Road and Pleasant Street in order to accommodate traffic that will be generated by the new 301 Tower Building on Maple Avenue and channel it away from the residential area, and to delineate more clearly the boundary between the commercial and residential zones.

In 1976, Council voted against constructing Church Street past the Post Office after a majority of speakers at a public hearing expressed opposition to its opening.

1979 Town Car Tags on Sale

An annual license tax is imposed by the town on all motor vehicles. Fees are \$15 for motor vehicles weighing under 4,000 pounds, \$20 for vehicles 4,000 pounds and over, and \$8 for motorcycles. The town issues a sticker or tag as evidence that the license tax has been paid.

Town of Vienna residents are not required to obtain a Fairfax County sticker. Many town residents were erroneously mailed county license applications by Fairfax County. If a County sticker has been purchased, a refund may be obtained at the Massey Building upon return of the sticker and receipt.

Town of Vienna stickers and tags may be obtained either by mail or in person in the Finance Department at Town Hall Monday through Friday from 8:15 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Town Hall will be closed Friday, April 13, but will be opened for extended hours on Thursday, April 12, and Monday, April 16, until 9 p.m. Stickers or tags must be displayed no later than April 17.

Annual Charity Ball May 5

One of the signs of spring in Vienna is the annual Invitational Charity Ball, sponsored by the Vienna Woman's Club and the Vienna Policeman's Association. Proceeds from the ball are used to help Vienna residents in need or in emergencies, to sponsor sports programs and other youth activities, and many more community service projects.

Ayr Hill Celebrates 50th

The Ayr Hill Garden Club will celebrate its 50th anniversary with a Standard Flower Show on Saturday, April 21, from 1 to 5 p.m. at Hunter House, located just outside of town at 9601 Courthouse Road. The public is invited and there is no entrance fee.

In 1929, at a Vienna bridge club gathering, Ayr Hill Garden Club was organized for the purpose of stimulating interest in gardening and beautifying the Town of Vienna. Landscaping the grounds of the one commercial bank in Vienna (on the corner of Church and Dominion), the little library (now moved to Mill Street), Bouton Hall (now Penny Wise) which then housed both the Post Office and the Masonic Hall, and the triangle in front of the Presbyterian Church became the first projects of the Ayr Hill Garden Club.

Club Wanted Vienna on the Map

Prizes were offered for the best lawns and for improvement of the outside appearance of businesses. A stone retaining wall was built at Vienna Elementary School and the library was made structurally sound at the club's instigation. According to club minutes, a committee was formed in 1931 to "protest to the AAA and Washington papers that Vienna is not designated on the road maps of their several publications." In 1935, a member "was requested to write the Railroad Companies with regard to cleaning their Right of Way in Vienna." In 1937, "It was suggested the Arlington and Fairfax RR paint their wayside stations."

In 1937, the Ayr Hill Garden Club became "keenly interested in having suitable signs erected at the intersections designating the streets in the town of Vienna." In 1938, the question was raised whether "anything could be done to save the shade trees on Maple Avenue when the street is widened." And in 1939, a committee was named to formulate a petition to change the name of Vienna back to Ayr Hill (as it was known for nearly 100 years).

During World War II, the club was active in the Red Cross sewing unit of Vienna, sponsored "furnishing a day room at Ft. Myer," and furnished flowers to Ft. Belvoir Hospital.

Town Entrance Markers Erected

In 1950, money was approved to pay for the entrance markers to the town. Several months later, it was reported that the planting of the entrances was completed. In June 1952, a letter from the garden club was written "to the Highway Department in Richmond seeking better control of parking in front of stores at Tysons Corner and to express an urgent need of a stop and go sign or signal at the intersection there."

In 1954, it was "reported that the property on which the Salisbury Spring is located on Lawyers Road (and Windover) was presented to the Ayr Hill Garden Club by Mrs. Salisbury on condition it be beautified and turned over to the Town of Vienna." Maintenance and beautification of the spring continues to be a club project, although the club deeded the property to the town some time ago.

Through the ensuing years, the Ayr Hill Garden Club has continued to encourage the beautification and improvement of Vienna and Fairfax County through its many projects. It has also assisted many new garden clubs in their development and sponsored their entry into the National Capital Federation of Garden Clubs, of which Ayr Hill is a charter member.

Take a Walk on the "Hill"

The Ayr Hill Garden Club will hold its annual "Walk on the Hill" Sunday, April 29, from 2 to 5 p.m. The walk is a tour of the Windover Heights area, including the proposed historic district.

The "hill" encompasses Windover Avenue between Lawyers Road and Lewis Street, Walnut Lane, West Street, Pleasant Street and Lovers Lane. Parking is available at the Maple Avenue end of Pleasant Street. There is no charge, and refreshments will be available.

Amateur Photography Contest

The Department of Parks and Recreation will sponsor a photography contest and exhibit at the Community Center April 7 and 8. Hours are noon to $5 \, p.m.$ on Saturday and 1 to $4 \, p.m.$ on Sunday.

Entries will be judged by local professional photographers, and first, second and third place ribbons will be awarded in each category.
