Band to Paint House Numbers



Cable TV Hearing Planned

At its October 1 meeting, the Town Council will set the date for a public hearing concerning cable television in Vienna. The hearing will probably be held later this month, perhaps October 22 or October 29. Look for announcements in local newspapers or call the Vienna Newsline, 938-4499, following the October 1 meeting.

The main issue for discussion at the hearing will be whether Vienna should adopt its own cable TV franchise ordinance or participate in a franchise granted by Fairfax County. Towns are legally empowered to grant franchises, but the county staff has pointed out that it may be difficult to attract a cable operator to a small area like Vienna. The county has proposed to bear all administrative costs and pass along to the town a proportionate share of revenues, if Vienna elects to be included in a county franchise.

Council wants to be sure that the town's best interests are served and protected in this matter. Citizens and potential Vienna cable TV operators are encouraged to attend the hearing and make their views known.

Halloween Parade October 24

The 33rd annual Invitational Halloween Parade, co-sponsored by the Vienna Chamber of Commerce and the Vienna Jaycees, will be held on Wednesday, October 24 (rain date October 25). The parade will begin promptly at 7 p.m.

In keeping with the parade's futuristic theme of "Halloween 2079," the grand marshal and emcee will be "Captain 20" from WDCA-TV. Many cartoon characters will be on hand for the kids, including Woodsy Owl, Smokey Bear, Scooby Doo, Yogi Bear, Big Bird, Cookie Monster and Hush Puppy.

This year, the parade will also be highlighted by many high school bands. Of course, colorful floats, marching units and military brigades are part of the parade.

The parade will step off at Branch Road and Maple Avenue and move down Maple to Courthouse Road. The units will turn left at Magruder's and left again on Locust to Waters Field where the parade will disband.

Fred Regar is chairman of the Chamber of Commerce parade committee, which is responsible for selecting parade entries. Questions about the parade should be directed to the Chamber at 281-1333.

Orlich Rezoning Back on Agenda

At its October 15 meeting, the Town Council will consider a request by Mr. Dan Orlich that a portion of the Alice Marie Young property in the 500 block of Church Street, N.E., be rezoned from town houses to transitional.

Mr. Orlich had originally requested that the property be rezoned to commercial use. The Planning Commission recommended that this application be denied, and Council subsequently voted to defer action on the application for 11 months. At Mr. Orlich's request, Council has reconsidered this decision to defer and placed the matter on the October 15 agenda for further consideration and possible action.



Results of Town Council's July 16, 1979, Meeting

- * Referred to the Transportation Safety Commission for review and recommendation a petition requesting that the town install four-way stop signs at the corner of Glyndon Street and Ayr Hill Avenue.
- * Approved the final plat of the Council Square II subdivision, subject to the posting of the appropriate bond.
- * Authorized the Town Manager to negotiate an agreement with Vienna Presbyterian Church for construction of a driveway entrance in exchange for a dedication by the church to the town of the island at Church and Mill Streets and other segments of property. The cost of the driveway is not to exceed \$2,500, to be paid from budgeted funds.
- * Accepted the bid by Calico Industries, Inc., of \$8,467.50 for polyethylene refuse bags, the amount to be paid from budgeted funds.
- * Adopted a resolution expressing Council's intention to maintain the town police force during the period July 1, 1980 to June 30, 1982, and thereafter. This action was necessary in order for the town to be considered for state grant funds.
- * Adopted a five-year town land use plan.
- * Approved the corrected final plat of the resubdivision of land of P.S.S. Partnership (the Glen subdivision).
- * Voted to advise the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors that the town has "no objection" to the Board's approval of county rezoning application #78-P-133, provided that the owner applicant proffer the development conditions recommended by the county staff.
- * Approved a resolution expressing to the Board of Supervisors the town's opposition to any commercial use south of Old Courthouse Road and urging that the plans for that area remain the same.
- * Waived the requirement for three additional parking spaces at the One-Hour Martinizing Laundry, 328 Maple Ave., E., as long as the present owners continue their exclusive use of the premises for the present purposes.
- * Reappointed Mr. John Brenkus to the Planning Commission for a full three-year term.

Results of Town Council's August 6, 1979, Meeting

- * Granted the request of Applied Systems Corp., 215 Mill St., N.E. to use two office type trailers for 60 days while repairs are made to the building.
- * Requested the surveyor of the Peterson Lane Park property line adjacent to 611 and 612 Roberts Dr., N.W. to drive stakes marking the line so that the tence can be placed in the proper location.
- * Granted the request of Mr. Matheis for a 10 foot wooden fence from the 75 foot red maple tree to the sidewalk instead of a combination 6 foot wood and 4 foot brick wall, for the purpose of saving the tree.

- * Accepted the off-site improvements of the Shahraam Subdivision into the town's maintenance system.
- * Scheduled a public hearing for Saturday, September 15, at 10 a.m. concerning restoration of the Moorefield House.
- * Took no action on the installation of four-way stop signs at Kingsley Road and Frederick Street.
- * Directed the Town Manager to advertise annually in the Town Newsletter the various boards and commissions of the Town, including name, function, composition, means of application and such other information as he deems necessary to communicate adequately the opportunity for citizens to serve on these bodies. Further, the Town Manager is directed to advertise in the Town Newsletter specific vacancies in the various boards and commissions when two or more such vacancies exist simultaneously. The Town Manager is to design an appropriate form for applicants for these positions and submit it to Council for review.
- * Authorized the Town Manager to negotiate with the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority to provide an exit for the six businesses on Maple Avenue affected by construction of the W&OD trail and bring his recommendations to Council.
- * Appropriated \$25,000 from the contingency reserve fund to continue the repair and patching of concrete curb, gutter and sidewalk around town.

Results of Town Council's August 27, 1979, Meeting

- * Elected the Mayor to be the voting delegate for the town at the Virginia Municipal League conference in Roanoke September 23-25. The Mayor Protem will act as alternate.
- * Approved the application of the Marworth Corp. to remove the wooden planter at One-Hour Martinizing, subject to the planting schedule presented, and to realign the parking.
- * Appointed Mr. Neil Walp as a member of Historic Vienna, Inc., for a term of three years.
- * Accepted the low bid of \$66,020.50 by Hawkins Electric Co., College Park, Md., for construction of Phases II and III of the town traffic light improvement program, to be paid from budgeted funds with a fund transfer.
- * Adopted an amendment to the town/county agreement for sewer billing operations to provide for new billing costs to be paid by the county for town billing services.
- * Approved an agreement between the town and James H. Hayes Lodge #529, IBPOE, to provide for continued town use of the lodge parking lot in return for paving of 385 square yards of asphalt at a cost not to exceed \$1,000.
- * Approved the installation of four-way stop signs at the intersection of Ayr Hill Avenue and Glyndon Street and "'Stop Ahead" warnings at the appropriate locations.
- * Increased the fee for special trash pickup service to \$20 per truck load, effective January 1, 1980.
- * Reapproved the final plat of Lot 29, Murmuring Pines.
- * Requested the Town Manager to investigate the problem of trash and litter in the town's commercial areas and develop a series of alternatives for Council to consider in remedying the situation.

Results of Town Council's September 10, 1979, Meeting

- * Accepted a letter of credit from the National Bank of Fairfax in lieu of a bond for the Ayr Hill East subdivision, subject to the approval in format by the Town Attorney.
- * Directed the Town Manager to write a letter to the Fairfax County School Board expressing Council's desire that the School Board reconsider the withdrawal of bus service from the Vienna Woods and Courthouse Road areas to Oakton High School. Council agreed with parents that the pedestrian route,

especially the Courthouse-Sutton Road intersection, is dangerous.

- * Approved the installation of a flashing light to denote the school crossing zone on Park Street, S.E.
- * Set October 1 as the date for a public hearing on a proposed ordinance relative to parking for the handicapped.
- * Accepted a bid of \$5,532 by Capital Equipment Co., Richmond, Va., for a leaf loader, a bid of \$3,739 by Capital Equipment for a spreader and a bid of \$7,195 by John C. Louis Co., Fairfax, Va., for an air compressor, all equipment to be purchased from budgeted funds.
- * After reconsidering its decision to defer action for 11 months on an application to rezone a part of the Alice Marie Young property on Church Street from RTH to C-1, Council directed that the matter be placed on the October 15 agenda and requested a recommendation from the Planning Commission by that time.
- * Requested the Mayor to draft a proposed resolution endorsing the Madison High School Band's project of painting house numbers on curbs and mailboxes, and agreed to donate paint to start the program.

Results of Town Council's September 17, 1979, Meeting

- * Authorized the Madison High School Band to undertake a program of painting house numbers on curbs throughout the town and to solicit donations for this service. Voted to provide a supply of spray paint to get the project started.
- * Remanded the application of Hammond T. Gunnell, Jr., to the Historic Windover Board of Review for a determination as to whether the proposed Williamsburg architectural design is incongruous to the old and historic aspect of the surroundings.
- * Approved the installation of a street light in the 300 block of Tapawingo Road, S.W., as requested by the residents.
- * Adopted an ordinance amending the zoning code to provide for conditional zoning through the acceptance of proffers.

The new addition to the Vienna Volunteer Fire Station will be dedicated at 11 a.m. on October 13. Open House will also be observed and the public is invited to attend both of these activities.

The addition provides new bunkroom space, a dining area, a new day room, additional office space on the first floor, and expanded meeting hall and kitchen facilities on the second floor. Also, a new entrance and elevator have been installed to improve access to the "Flame Room" meeting hall.

The Open House will give citizens a chance to visit their fire station to learn about fire prevention and fire suppression.


