#### Council Candidates

E. Ross Buckley has served on the Town Council since 1976. Before his election to Council, he was a member of the Economic Policy Advisory Commission, the Bicentennial Committee and the Charter and Legislative Review Commission. A Vienna resident for eight years, Councilman Buckley lives at 108 St. Andrews Dr., NE and is an attorney with the Justice Department.

Vincent J. Olson was first elected to Council in 1976, after serving on the Planning Commission. He has been chairman of the Charter Review Committee and is currently Mayor Pro Tempore. Councilman Olson, a distributor for the Washington Post, resides at 603 Valley Dr., SE. He has lived in Vienna for 22 years.

Robert W. Robinson, a candidate in two previous Town elections, is a member of the Mayor's Advisory Committee and a board member of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department. He works in Vienna as a funeral director at Money and King Funeral Home. An 11-year resident of the town, he lives at 105 Wilmar Pl., NW.

### Spring Cleanup Begins April 14

This year's Spring Cleanup will begin on Monday, April 14. During the cleanup, Department of Public Works crews will pick up free of charge any discards left at the curbside, including brush, old furniture and used household appliances.

Residents are requested to wait until after April 6 to set out items for pickup in order to keep neighborhoods free of unsightly piles of refuse on Easter Sunday.

Public Works crews will start the cleanup in northwest Vienna and move clockwise through the northeast, southeast and southwest. The time needed to cover each section is hard to determine; therefore, all residents should have their discards at the curbside by April 14. Because cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other necessary public works duties, there is time for only one cleanup sweep of the town. Once a section has been covered, crews cannot double back.

Debris should be piled at the curbside, away from fire hydrants and water meters. Brush and branches should be placed in a separate pile to help the cleanup go faster.

## Student Government Day

James Madison High School government students will learn first-hand how the Town government operates on Student Government Day, April 14. Seventeen students, elected by their classmates, will come to Town Hall to spend the day. Each student will be paired with a Town Council member or Town staff member, become familiar with his or her job, and actually carry out some job-related task.

That evening, the students will return to Town Hall for their own Town Council meeting, using an agenda they have prepared. Fellow students will attend as interested citizens to speak on local issues of importance to them.

Town residents are invited to drop by Town Hall on Student Government Day and to attend the meeting that evening to see the involvement of our young citizens in the Town.

### What to Do 'til Help Arrives


A car accident is a traumatic event, and in the excitement and shock that follow, well-meant but often dangerous "help" may be offered by uninjured passengers or bystanders. It is easy to forget the dangers of the accident scene as well.

Many times, the rescue squad arrives on the scene of an accident to find an overturned automobile and a victim (or victims) who have been pulled from the vehicle by friends or bystanders. This can be extremely dangerous for both the victim and the "rescuers." If the victim has a broken neck or back, the pulling and twisting required for extrication could cause paralysis or even death. Also, it may cause the vehicle to move, injuring those attempting the rescue.

In most cases, trained rescue personnel are less than five minutes from the scene, and unless there is an immediate threat to life (such as fire or severe bleeding) it is best to wait for rescuers equipped to handle such an emergency. What should you do until help arrives?

- \* Have a passing motorist or bystander notify the police and rescue units.
- \* Protect the vehicle from fire. Gasoline often spills from a car damaged in an accident. Don't allow smoking near the vehicle, and if lighting flares place them so they cannot ignite the fuel. Take special precautions when placing a flare downhill from a spill.
- \* Protect yourself and victims from traffic around the scene. "Sightseers" may be looking at the damaged vehicle and not at pedestrians.
- \* If you stop to help or are on the scene, allow room for emergency equipment to park. Usually an ambulance, fire truck and one or two police cars will respond. If rescue crews are already on the scene, avoid lingering around the area.
- $^{\star}$  Once rescue personnel arrive and take responsibility for the victim(s), make yourself available to the police on the scene and relate any pertinent information you have about the incident.

### Two in Mayor's Race

# Town Election May 6th

The Town election will be held on Tuesday, May 6. All voting will take place at the Community Center, 120 Cherry St., SE from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voters arriving at the polls after 7 p.m. are prohibited by law from voting; those already in line at that time, however, will be allowed to vote.

Charles A. Robinson, Jr., is running for a third term as Mayor, challenged by Councilman Donald E. Upchurch. Two incumbent Councilmen, E. Ross Buckley and Vincent J. Olson, and Robert W. Robinson will be on the ballot for three Council seats. Wanda C. Pellicciotto, a Council member since 1976, will not seek reelection.

The Town election is nonpartisan. Winners are determined by popular vote, and will serve two-year terms beginning July 1. Call the Vienna Newsline, 938-4499, for election results one to two hours after the polls close.

#### Mayoral Candidates

Charles A. Robinson, Jr., has been a Council member since 1962 and Mayor since 1976. Prior to then, he served on the Board of Zoning Appeals and on the Planning Commission. Mayor Robinson is an attorney in Vienna and Deputy General Manager of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. He has lived in Vienna for 27 years, residing at 124 Courthouse Rd., SW.

Donald E. Upchurch is a 19-year resident of Vienna. He has served on Council for five years. Before becoming a Councilman, he was chairman of the Town's Economic Policy Advisory Commission. As a member of Council he served as chairman of the Town Manager Selection Committee. Councilman Upchurch is a retired Air Force officer and lives at 505 Roberts Dr., NW.

# Last Minute Car Tag Sales

The Department of Finance at Town Hall will remain open until 7 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, April 14 and 15, for last minute sales of 1980 Town vehicle licenses. Licenses must be displayed by April 16.

Fees are \$20 for vehicles having a gross weight of 4,000 pounds or more, \$15 for vehicles less than 4,000 pounds, and \$8 for motorcycles. Citizens may choose a metal strip tag, stick-on bumper strip tag, or windshield decal style license.

# Survey Shows Satisfaction With Town Services, Facilities

The results of the citizen survey contained in the January Newsletter have been tabulated, and the responses show that Vienna residents are generally satisfied with Town facilities and services.

Street maintenance, trash collection and the overall efficiency and courtesy of Town employees were all rated satisfactory by most of the citizens responding to the survey.

Residents were about evenly divided on whether traffic is a problem in their neighborhoods. Of those who said it is, the majority (77%) named speeding as the biggest problem, followed by excessive traffic, noise, through trucks and non-residential on-street parking.

Response was also divided concerning enforcement of traffic laws against moving violations. 46.5% said enforcement is about right, while 35% said it is not strict enough. Only 4% said enforcement is too strict, and 14.5% had no opinion.

On the question of neighborhood police patrols, 44.5% thought the frequency of patrol cars to be about right, with 46% in favor of increased patrol. 9.5% had no opinion.

Of those residents who use the Town's parks and recreational facilities, participation is pretty evenly divided among athletic programs, hobby classes and special events. Many citizens (45%) feel a need for more recreational facilities, particularly a public pool followed by tennis courts, bike paths, neighborhood parks and playing fields.

Significant Town contributions to historic preservation, such as restoration of the Moorefield house, are supported by 58.7% of the survey respondents. 21.3% said they do not support such contributions, and 20% had no opinion.

The last survey question dealt with funding for various Town programs, and in all cases the majority of citizens said levels of spending should remain the same. However, a large number thought that spending should be increased for police patrol (48.8%) and control of traffic flow (43.6%).



#### Results of Town Council's January 21, 1980, Meeting

- \* Reduced the bond amount for Wilson Estates Subdivision from \$185,066,00 to \$18.506.60.
- \* Appointed Richard L. Fisher as the Planning Commission member to the Historic Windover Board of Review to fill the unexpired term of Bennett Moss, the term to expire May 1, 1981.
- \* Adopted a resolution in support of State Senate Bill 85, to control the possession and distribution of drug paraphernalia.

#### Results of Town Council's February 4, 1980, Meeting

- \* Referred a request for stop signs at the intersection of Lawyers Road and Malcolm Road to the Transportation Safety Commission for study and report.
- \* Approved the development plan of Tech Center I only in drawings. Directed that all requirements of the Fairfax County Fire Marshal be met. Found that the contemplated development plan of Tech Center I will 1) constitute an industrial development of sustained desirability and stability, 2) will be in harmony with the character of the surrounding neighborhood, 3) will be consistent with the overall long-range plans for the Town of Vienna, 4) will not result in traffic hazards, and 5) that the plan indicates that it will be adequately landscaped, buffered and screened.
- \* Granted the following site plan modifications requested by Beulah Road Associates: 1) to permit the wall of the building to be within six feet of the side property line; 2) to permit lot coverage of 76.6 percent; and 3) to permit parking in front of the building as shown on the drawing. Waived curb, gutter and sidewalk requirements and directed that \$7,856 be placed in escrow with the Town to cover the cost of future installation of these improvements, and \$900 to defray possible cost of tree removal should the construction activities result in destruction of trees located in Town right-of-way adjacent to the property, the \$900 to be returned after the trees have lived for two vears.
- \* Made the following appointments to the Planning Commission: Jerry S. Barnett to fill the unexpired term of Bennett Moss, the term to expire Feb-

ruary 24, 1981, and John A. Everhard to fill the unexpired term of George Lovelace, the term to expire January 17, 1983.


## Join in Cleanup Days Saturday, April 12 & 19
