Business Beautification Efforts To Be Judged Week of May 19

The Vienna business beautification program will continue this month with a judging of town businesses the week of May 19. The winning businesses will be recognized at the Chamber of Commerce dinner in June and will receive banners to display.

Judging will be carried out by a committee composed of representatives of the town government, the Chamber of Commerce and citizens. Vienna residents interested in serving on this committee should call the Public Information Office at Town Hall, 938-8000, or the Chamber of Commerce, 281-1333, by May 12.

The committee will judge four categories of businesses: retail stores, office buildings, food service stores and service stations. Areas of competition include litter control, grass and weed trimming, painting and repairs, and landscaping.

The business in each category judged to have made the most comprehensive beautification efforts will be awarded a banner. Two more competitions will be held this year, one in the summer and another in the fall, and from among these winners the committee will then choose the best-looking business of the year for special recognition.

All town businesses in the four categories are encouraged to participate.

Coed Softball League Forming

Copies of the proposed budget will be available for public inspection in the Finance Department at Town Hall beginning May 9.

Town Hall will be closed on Monday, May 26, for Memorial Day.

There will be no trash pickup that day.

The funds will be included in the budget for next fiscal year to be paid out after the budget is adopted and will not be part of the Town's annual donation to this organization.

Be Prepared When Fire Strikes

If a fire struck your house tonight, would you be able to escape? Every year, thousands of people lose their lives needlessly because they were not prepared. Your Vienna Volunteer Fire Department offers these tips that may well make the difference between tragedy and safety:

When a fire strikes, you have only a few minutes before it becomes deadly. It is important to have an escape plan developed. Know your house and where possible escape routes are located. Always have alternate routes in case fire has you blocked (windows, doors, etc.). Practice these plans often.

After escaping the fire, have a meeting place arranged for family members outside the house (the big tree in the front yard, for example). Here everyone can be accounted for, providing invaluable information to the fire and rescue teams responding to the scene.

Once you have escaped, never, never reenter the house. Call the fire department from a neighbor's house. Many people have attempted to save pets, clothes or other "valuables" and not escaped a second time. Remember that no possession is as valuable as your life.

Be prepared to inform the fire department where the fire is located and if anyone is trapped. If your neighbor's house is on fire, stay calm, call the fire department and (without entering the house) attempt to help and account for all members of that household.

Perhaps the most important factor in escape from a fire is to be aware of the danger in the first place. Although in some cases the state does not require smoke detectors, these are perhaps the most effective method of warning. It is strongly recommended that you invest in at least one smoke detector. Consult your Vienna Volunteer Fire Department for information on type and placement. More than 80 percent of home fire fatalities are caused by smoke asphixiation or toxic gases, not flames. In most cases, the flames from the fire never reach the victim.

Rabies Clinic at Fire Station

Rabies inoculation clinics for dogs and cats will be held on Sunday, May 18, from 2 to 4 p.m. at fire stations throughout Fairfax County, including the Vienna station at 400 Center St., S. These annual clinics are sponsored by the fire companies and their ladies auxiliaries, the Northern Virginia Veterinary Medical Association and the County Health Department.

In bringing animals to the clinic, dogs should be on a leash and cats should be confined to a box or basket.

A charge of \$4 will be made to vaccinate dogs over one year old. This vaccine gives protection against rabies for three years. Vaccine given to all cats as well as dogs under a year old protects against rabies for one year and costs \$3.

Certificates will be given to animal owners to verify each vaccination. Please keep the certificates for your records; they are necessary in order to obtain dog licenses.

Town dog licenses will be on sale at the clinic in Vienna for \$5 each.
