

Cable Ordinance Passed

The Town Council has adopted an ordinance to franchise and regulate cable television in Vienna. Franchises are expected to be awarded next year.

After several months of studying the cable TV issue, Council decided that the Town does not have sufficient financial resources or personnel to undertake a completely independent franchising process. The ordinance Council adopted October 20 parallels that of Fairfax County, and a joint Town/County solicitation of applications and award of franchises is planned.

The Town still retains the option to withdraw at any time during the process and award its franchise to a firm other than the one selected by the County. Town Manager Brack Bentley represents Vienna on the County's Franchise Evaluation Committee.

Once franchises have been awarded, construction of the cable system must begin within one year, and 20% of the system must be completed each succeeding year until the entire system is finished in five years.

Jitneybus Needs More Riders

After three months in operation, the Vienna-Oakton-Tysons Corner Jitneybus System has yet to meet two criteria considered essential for its success.

Fairfax County transportation officials say the Jitneybus should average 10 passengers per trip at a per passenger subsidy of \$2.29. So far, each trip has averaged only five passengers at a subsidy of over \$3 per rider.

Opinion survey results and phone calls received at Town Hall indicate that citizens think the Jitneybus is a good idea to help reduce traffic congestion and to provide local transportation for those without access to an automobile. Many residents have requested that service be expanded and have suggested improvements in the system. However, it is unlikely that any major modifications will be considered until ridership increases.

Two previous attempts to provide jitney service in Vienna failed through lack of patronage. The present system was inaugurated last August as a one-year pilot project. There is only one way to assure its continuation — ride the Jitneybus!

Virginia Voters to Decide Four Constitutional Issues

At the November 4 election, Town of Vienna and other Virginia voters will be asked to vote yes or no on four proposed changes in Virginia's Constitution. The four ballot questions are presented below, with brief explanations provided by the League of Women Voters.

Question 1. Shall the General Assembly be authorized to convene for a limited period of time to consider legislation vetoed by the Governor? There is at present no provision in the Constitution to enable the General Assembly to make recommended changes or to override vetoes made by the Governor after the legislature has adjourned. The proposed amendment would provide for a three-day session to reconsider bills vetoed or returned by the Governor. No other business could be conducted during this session, which could be extended for not more than seven additional days if approved by a majority of both houses.

Question 2. Shall the maximum indebtedness a city or town may incur be decreased? The Virginia Constitution limits the amount of money a city or town may borrow up to 18% of the assessed value of taxable real estate in the city or town. The proposed amendment would lower the debt limit to 10% of assessed value. Only long-term borrowing by general obligation bonds would be affected.

Question 3. Shall the General Assembly be authorized to permit certain tax exemptions for personal property which is designed for continuous habitation, owned and used by persons not less than 65 or disabled? Since mobile homes are classed as personal property, not as real estate, their owners are not now eligible for tax exemptions. The proposed amendment would permit the General Assembly to authorize localities, at their option, to extend equivalent property tax relief to eligible persons who own property, such as mobile homes, that is used as a permanent residence.

Question 4. Shall the General Assembly be authorized to permit certain tax exemptions for property whose purpose is to replace oil or natural gas generating equipment installed after December 31, 1974? The proposed amendment would exempt, or partially exempt, from taxation generating equipment installed for the purpose of converting from oil and natural gas to coal, wood or other alternate sources of energy. The generating equipment must be used in manufacturing. Each locality could decide whether to give such tax relief, for how much and for what length of time.

The Freeman Store is operated by Historic Vienna Inc., the Town's non-profit organization for historic preservation and restoration.

Town Needs Christmas Tree

The Department of Parks and Recreation needs a 12- to 14-foot evergreen tree, preferably a spruce, for the Town Christmas Program on December 7. Residents who have trees to donate should call 938-8000, ext. 277. A parks and recreation crew will be sent to cut down the tree shortly after Thanksgiving, and will clean up the property afterwards.

Residents who use live Christmas trees (balled and bagged) may also donate them to the Department of Parks and Recreation for planting throughout the town.





Results of Town Council's September 22, 1980, Meeting

- * Authorized the mayor to write a letter to the Freedoms Foundation recommending that the Vienna Optimist Club receive an award.
- * Denied the request by principals in Vienna Square Joint Venture I for lot coverage of 78%, but approved lot coverage of 76%.
- * Adopted a proposal to provide for an emergency light to facilitate exit of emergency vehicles from the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department. Funds for the light will be taken from the contingency reserve account.
- * Approved the acquisition of two K-9 dog teams for the Police Department at an approximate cost of \$6,000, funds to come from the contingency reserve.
- * Approved an additional drop inlet to the Mill Street drainage project at a cost of \$575, from budgeted funds.
- * Accepted the lowest qualified bid for three police squad cars from JKJ Chevrolet, Vienna, for an amount not to exceed \$24,284.87, \$20,500 from budgeted funds and \$3,884.87 from contingency reserve.
- * Accepted the low bid by Cunningham Associates Inc. for two steel bridges at a cost of \$7,535. The balance of budgeted funds (\$16,000 budgeted) will be returned to the contingency reserve account after installation.
- * Gave first reading to a proposed ordinance to regulate and franchise cable television systems within the town.
- * Directed the Town Attorney and the Town Manager to draft a Transitional Parking Ordinance to be presented to Council by the end of the year.
- * Gave first reading to a proposed ordinance relative to erosion and siltation

control.

* Gave first reading to an ordinance to regulate dealers in precious metals and jewels.

Results of Town Council's October 6, 1980, Meeting

- * Rejected all bids received for two 1981 pick-up trucks, opened on September 30. Directed that the invitation to bid be re-advertised in November, to be opened early in December.
- * Reappointed George D. Hicks, Fannie N. Travis and Audrey Brown to the Board of Architectural Review for three-year terms. Reappointed Stuart Liss as the architect member of the Board for a one-year term.
- * Recommended to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors that county rezoning application 79-P-140 (and SE-80-081) to rezone two acres at the Cedar Lane/Idylwood Road intersection from R-1 to R-5 for townhouses be denied.
- * Adopted a resolution supporting the Greater Washington Board of Trade in its annual anti-crime campaign.
- * Took no action on the Transportation Safety Commission's recommendation to place a stop bar and "Do Not Block Intersection" sign on Maple Avenue at Branch Road.
- * Adopted the recommendation of the Transportation Safety Commission for the posting of "No Parking" signs on both sides of Wade Hampton Drive between Roland Street and Glen Avenue.
- * Referred a request for the installation of "Yield to Pedestrian" signs at the Church Street/Lawyers Road intersection to the Transportation Safety Commission for recommendation.
- * Authorized the Town Manager to spend an amount not to exceed \$1,200 for recruiting expenses for the position of Chief of Management Services.
