# ViVa Vienna is back!

ren't we all ready for some good news and a bit of fun? This certainly will fit the bill for an event-hungry, interaction-starved community: The three-day ViVa Vienna festival that has beckoned, spun, and entertained generations of Vienna residents returns this Memorial Day weekend.

However, this year's festival won't be the ViVa Vienna of the past. The Rotary Club of Vienna, with support from the Town of Vienna, is bringing the perennial fun-fest back in an altered format to accommodate covid precautions and maintain the community's health and safety. All events and most areas will require advance tickets or reservations, and attendance in various festival areas will have capacity limits. Attendees will not be able to simply show up spontaneously and gain access.

To be held May 29-31, the 2021 festival will spread out across several central Vienna locations to provide socially distanced zones for carnival rides, entertainment, and vendors.

"Safety is our top priority," says Rotary festival chair AJ Oskuie, "and there will be required signups for rides and music. Still, we're so excited to be able to bring back this galvanizing community event. We've heard from so many people that they really hope Viva Vienna can return this year. We want people to show up [after registering in advance], have a good time, be safe, and try to get back to a sense of normalcy."

"I am so happy that the Vienna Rotary Club will be holding ViVa Vienna again this year," says Mayor Linda Colbert. "It has been a long year without events, and the Vienna community has been looking forward to gathering and having fun together. Telling children that there will be no ViVa once was hard enough; the ones I have talked to this year say it's OK that it will be a little different, at least we are having it!"

About 20 carnival rides and games and five festival-food vendors will set up in an area bounded by Dominion Road and Mill Street and Ayr Hill and Church. To gain admittance to the carnival area, participants must purchase colored wristbands online in advance; the wristbands will be good for an approximately two-hour period. Everyone who enters the area must purchase a wristband, and children must be at least 12 years old to enter

# **Takeaways from Code Create residential standards visual survey**

s part of Vienna's zoning code update, 856 Town residents responded to a residential standards visual survey that included 15 questions intended to solicit feedback to inform the Code Create Vienna update. Responses were shared with Town Council and the Planning Commission at a joint conference session March 31.


In the survey, residents chose how they personally aligned with given statements related to residential standards, with response options ranging from "strongly disagree" to "strongly agree" and three options in between.

The strongest support for change identified by the survey was in allowing covered porches to encroach into front yard setbacks with 83% of responses somewhat or strongly agreeing.

Similarly, the survey demonstrated a strong desire for porches, patios, and covered decks to be included in the additional allowable 5% lot coverage, currently permitted only for open decks; more than 70% of respondents were supportive of each of these structures being allowed. A follow-up question related to having an additional 5% lot coverage for outdoor living accessories (in addition to open decks) had a slightly lower percentage of supportive responses (62%). Respondents selecting "none of the above" increased from 15% in the first scenario to 29% for this increased lot coverage option.

The survey also indicated interest in the potential allowance of accessory living units (ALUs) in residential areas; 56% of respondents somewhat or strongly supported

this idea. The most popular type of ALU identified was an interior basement (73% of respondents supported), followed by living areas above the garage (69%), attached to the main house (60%), and in a converted garage (56%).

Survey results show that 77% of respondents somewhat or strongly agree that cottage housing is an appropriate land use in areas next to businesses, shopping centers, and office buildings. Cottage housing is a form of higher density residential development, generally defined as a grouping of small, single-unit houses clustered around a common open community area. The majority of survey respondents would not restrict cottage housing residency by age.

Finally, 86% of survey respondents somewhat or strongly agreed that new, multi-unit developments should provide

open space proportionate to the number of units in the development, with open lawns, a mixture of hardscape and landscape, gazebos and other shade structures, and pet areas all receiving more than 50% supportive responses. Play equipment and swimming pools or other recreational facilities received the least votes.

Following the March 31 joint conference session, Town Council and the Planning Commission encouraged staff to work with ZoneCo, the consultant working with the Town on the Code Create Vienna effort, to draft standards for outdoor living spaces, lot coverage, ALUs, and cottage housing for further discussion.

without an adult. The ride zone will be limited to 750 people per two-hour entry period; participants will be asked to exit the area and rides will be disinfected during the last 15 minutes of the period. Rides will operate at 30% capacity. (These numbers may be subject to change depending on state guidelines in place at the time the festival is held.)

"Please be aware that kids – or anyone for that matter – will *not* be able to just show up and gain access to the rides or entertainment areas." Oskuie savs.

The live entertainment area at the Town Green will be divided into pods of up to five people, which must be reserved in advance for onthe-hour performances. Due to covid safety precautions and to allow audiences to exit and enter the area, all shows will be 40-minute sets.

Entertainment over the three-day festival will include multiple performances by Fat Chance, the Great Zucchini, Rocknoceros, Superfly Disco, Vienna Singing Princesses, and Wylder. In addition, a Memorial Day Ceremony will be held at 1 pm Monday, May 31. Attendance in the entertainment zone will be limited to approximately 80 people per time period.


For updated information and to purchase a two-hour ride zone wristband and/or reserve space for performances, visit vivavienna.org.

About 160 craft vendors, community organizations, and businesses will set up at Caffi Field. Entry will be limited to about 550 people at a time with one way in and one way out. No advance signup is required to enter the vendor zone, which will be open 10 am-6 pm Sunday and Monday.

Masks will be required to be worn by all attendees. Hand sanitation stations will be set up throughout the festival area, and covid screenings will take place at entrances. This year there will be no shuttle from the Vienna Metro station nor Madison High School. In addition, bicyclists on the W&OD trail will be rerouted between Ayr Hill and Maple Avenue, and cyclists will be asked to walk their bikes from Maple Avenue to the community center during the festival.

"We're hoping that this year's festival will be hyperlocal, and people can generally walk to the festival sites," says Oskuie. Additional public parking areas can be found at viennava.gov/parking.

Other than festival food in the carnival area, there will be no food courts. Festival attendees will be encouraged to patronize restaurants



and businesses in the downtown commercial area.

"I am proud as a Rotarian," says Colbert, "that we have so many people dedicated to putting in the many hours necessary to make this event happen. Not only will it be a great time for those attending, but it will raise money that goes directly back into the community. The Town and Rotary are working together to ensure a safe event. I look forward to seeing people and having fun at this year's ViVa."

The Rotary Club of Vienna will donate 100% of this year's festival proceeds to support local organizations.





# Liberty Amendments Month celebration beginning to take shape

n just a little over six weeks, the Town of Vienna will launch an inaugural monthlong event that will celebrate four constitutional amendments that together provide rights and inclusion for people who previously had been excluded. This celebration may serve as a model for other communities throughout Virginia – and the country.

"This is really a hybrid event," says
Events Coordinator Lily Widman, "in that
it's as much about education, awareness,
history, and bringing the community
together as it is about entertainment. It feels
like a really unique movement. It's exciting
to hear the different voices and ideas shared
and to see the community really come
together in planning events in celebration
of Liberty Amendments Month."

Widman notes that about 45 community organizations, including churches, service groups, businesses, not-for-profits, schools, elected officials, arts groups, and scouts are involved in planning Liberty Amendments events. Activities that may be offered in celebration of the Constitution's 13<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup>, and 19<sup>th</sup> amendments include lectures, weekly film series, book conversations with authors, performances, walks for justice, historic bicycle tours, community art projects, a quilt project, exhibits, mock trial for students, oratory contest, a showcase of women musicians and artists, and more.

Up to 30 events may be offered over a four-week period, Widman says, from June 19–July 19.

The monthlong celebration will kick off June 19 with First Baptist Church of Vienna's Juneteenth Celebration, which offers artistic performances that celebrate Black culture as well as a vendor area that features Black-owned businesses.

"We here at First Baptist Church of Vienna have been celebrating Juneteenth for many years," says First Baptist Senior Pastor Dr. Vernon Walton, "and it is exciting to see the increased interest in this longstanding tradition. We are excited to have the opportunity to partner with the Town of Vienna and to have our annual Juneteenth celebration kick off the Liberty Amendments Month lineup."

The Juneteenth celebration will take place from 11 am-3 pm in the church's parking area and will be available via livestream on the Town's and church's social media platforms as well.

Each week will feature events celebrating one of the four recognized amendments with a weekly kick-off event. The monthlong celebration will conclude with a multicultural event July 17. This event will feature handmade goods, foods, and music and arts performances representing different cultures around the globe, and especially highlighting women- and Black-owned businesses.

"It's been wonderful," says Widman, "to have all of these amazing voices come to the table to talk about what this could be and how best to educate people about and celebrate these liberties and to find unique ways to engage everyone in the community."

# Pedal power: Participate in inaugural Tour de Hunter Mill

he inaugural Tour de Hunter Mill on May 15 rolls through Vienna – and you're invited to grab your bike helmet and pedal along. Whether you're taking the five-mile family route or the longer 15- or 20-mile route through Vienna, the ride begins at the Reston Community Center at Hunters Woods and takes cyclists through the Hunter Mill District via scenic routes.

"The Tour de Hunter Mill is a great opportunity for Vienna residents and everyone else who enjoys biking in the Hunter Mill District to come together to enjoy a scenic ride that highlights the many treasures and resources in our community," says Fairfax County/Hunter Mill District Supervisor Walter Alcorn.

Registration is limited to 150 riders and, if not already sold out, is available at fairfaxcounty.gov/huntermill/2021-tour-dehunter-mill. The cost is \$25 per adult (16 and older). If registering as a family, purchase one ticket and send an email to huntermill@ fairfaxcounty.gov to inquire about family pricing. Registration includes Tour de Hunter Mill socks and a \$5 donation to the Fairfax Alliance for Better Bicycling.

The longer routes take the W&OD Trail to Vienna, where the first rest stop will be located at the Town Green. From there, riders will take quiet roads and trails to the Spring Hill Metro station and the second rest stop. Riders may then continue on the 20-mile route by bike back to Reston or may take the Metro to the Wiehle-Reston East station before continuing by bike to Hunter Woods in Reston.



Long-route riders start from 8:30-9:15 am. Family-route riders will take off between 9:15 and 10 am. Post-ride food, fun, and prizes will be available from 11:30 am-1:30 pm.

All participants in this rain or shine event will be required to wear a mask and remain six feet apart at all times while at the Reston Community Center, each rest stop, and within the Metro system if riders use that option.

With 3,539 ballots cast, Charles A. Robinson Jr., who received 1,841 votes, was elected as Vienna's next mayor in May 1976. According to a special edition of the Town newsletter, the total number of voters represented the heaviest turnout at one polling location in the history of Fairfax County and the largest turnout ever (to that date) for a Town election. Robinson would go on to serve as Vienna mayor until his death in 2000.

## Tour, presentation highlight Vienna's rich African-American history

n 2017 First Baptist Church of Vienna - literally the first church in Vienna - celebrated its 150th anniversary, commemorating not only its longevity milestone, but also sparking renewed interest in the rich history of Vienna's African-American community.

As part of the church's celebration, First Baptist members and longtime Vienna residents Sylvia Taylor and Gloria Runyon, whose family's Vienna roots date back seven generations to the early 1800s, set out to build both a van tour and presentation related to Vienna's African-American history.

"What started out as an idea to celebrate First Baptist Church's 150th anniversary," says Taylor, "led to the creation of a bus tour where we would start at the church and then make stops around Town to tell the tale of Vienna's Black history."

"At first I didn't even know that one of my great-grandfathers lived in one of the houses on the tour," says Runyon of the 22 important sites featured in the tour, including churches, schools, cemeteries, parks, homes, and other landmarks as well as several longtime Vienna families and their contributions to the community.

Runyon and Taylor, who also are Historic Vienna Inc. members, have found enthusiastic audiences for the information they've compiled, which they've made available via an approximately one-hour video presentation at historicviennainc.org. Like the van/bus tour,



Part of the presentation focuses on schools for "colored" students. First Baptist during its first 23 years functioned as both a place of worship for families and a make-shift school for children. In 1890, a one-room Vienna Colored School was built at the intersection of Lawyers and Malcom roads. In 1939, a threeroom school on Nutley Street, the location today of Louise Archer Elementary, was built and later named after the original school's first principal, who also was an African-American community leader.

sections of Town.

The tour and presentation also highlight Sarah Walker Mercer Park, which was named after Louise Archer Elementary's chief custodian, a leading figure at the school and in the community.

"Of the 22 historic sites that are on our tour, we selected 11 of them for the presentation," says Taylor. She and Runyon continue to research Vienna's African-American history and to expand upon their work. "There is so much intertwined between history and community," Taylor adds, "and we hope that people will watch the presentation and eventually go on the tour with us."







#### A match made in bee heaven

ymbiotic relationships exist throughout the natural world – and in the Town of Vienna, too, as evidenced by the alliance of a local Girl Scout Gold Award candidate and the Town's Conservation and Sustainability Commission (CSC).

Last year Morgan Oglesby, a local resident and senior at Georgetown Visitation Prepatroy School, undertook efforts to increase native plants and protect wildlife habitat in Town in an effort to earn her Gold Award. Simultaneously, the CSC wanted to continue to protect the Town's monarch butterfly and bee populations as it sought recertification as a Community Wildlife Habitat through the National Wildlife Federation and a Bee City USA through the Xerces Society. To earn Bee City USA certification, Vienna must demonstrate projects that create and enhance native pollinator habitat, reduce pesticide use, and increase public awareness.

"I knew I wanted to do something with local vegetation and wildlife," says Oglesby. "I was looking over research materials and was surprised to see my hometown of Vienna was one of only two Ree City LISAs in Virginia. I was both surprised to

two Bee City USAs in Virginia. I was both surprised and excited to look into what that meant and determine how I could use my goal of enhancing the environment to earn my award to also carry on that title for the community."

Ultimately Oglesby reached out to Director of Parks and Recreation Leslie Herman, who connected her with the CSC – and it was a match made in bee heaven.

CSC member Bob Robinson reviewed Oglesby's goals related to native plants and was thrilled to realize how her efforts could benefit the Bee City, USA application – not to mention, Vienna's wildlife.

"Morgan presented a huge portfolio of environmental upkeep and native plant vegetation that would not only help our Bee City application's cause, but also further additional CSC goals,

> including our annual monarch butterfly pledge, milkweed population, and even stormwater management."


> > Oglesby and the CSC would ultimately take on six initiatives to up the ante on efforts to make Vienna more sustainable for wildlife. They worked together to rebuild local gardens at schools, install native plants at Town parks, and educate residents about environmental and natural resource issues and encourage them to help make

Vienna more sustainable. Oglesby has been working with the parks and recreation department to create

YouTube videos and demonstrations on how to plant native gardens at homes. "My hope is to revitalize local plantings

not just from a Town perspective, but also so that residents can carry on and do the same," Oglesby says. "I have been fortunate to work with the CSC on native plant sales, summer classes, and to put information together for this year's Green Expo."

The results of these collaborative efforts – in addition to creating a more wildlife- and pollinator-friendly community? The CSC submitted its Bee City USA application in February, and Oglesby will receive her Gold Award in September.







## 'Bee' a pollinator guardian

pring is exciting as the tiny inhabitants of our gardens emerge. Hundreds of butterfly caterpillars, fireflies, beetles, and bees appear, after hiding through winter in last year's dead leaves and empty flower stems. Birds arrive to search relentlessly for caterpillars to feed their young, and frogs call for mates. All this life appears in your yard when you install native plantings, remove invasive plants, and eliminate pesticide use.

Why native plants? Most insects can survive only by feeding and reproducing on specific native plants they have evolved with. Unfortunately, many plants sold at mainstream nurseries are nonnative or cultivars, and a yard full of these is essentially a desert for insects. Take action and choose to be a guardian of a healthy backyard ecosystem. Include an abundance of native trees, shrubs, perennials, groundcovers, and sedges in your yard, and leave only a minimum of lawn. Wildlife will arrive and give balance to your sliver of earth.

Ready to get started?

- 1. Start small Do what you can.
- 2. Think layers Trees have the highest all-around value, shrubs are critical for birds, and flowering perennials support pollinators in the summer while their seed heads feed birds in the winter
- 3. Add variety Vary bloom times, plant in drifts (typically oddnumbered groupings).
- **4. Plan 365** Support the entire lifecycle by leaving fallen leaves and spent flower stems for overwintering insects. Don't clean up old brush until temperatures are consistently above 50 degrees Fahrenheit to allow time for native insect eggs to hatch.

#### **Town Council Actions**

The following items represent recent Town Council actions, but do not constitute official meeting minutes. The most recent approved Town Council minutes, agendas, and meeting videos are available online via viennava.gov.

#### March 22

- Set a public hearing for April 12 regarding the fiscal year 2021-22 operating budget and directed the town clerk to advertise a notice of public hearing.
- Set a public hearing for April 12 regarding fiscal year 2021-22 proposed water and sewer rates and directed the town clerk to advertise a notice of public hearing.
- Set a public hearing for April 26 regarding the fiscal year 2021-22 real estate tax rate and directed the town clerk to advertise a notice of public hearing.
- Set a public hearing for April 12 to consider vacation of the public alley adjacent to 131 Wilmar Place NW and directed the town clerk to advertise a notice of public hearing.
- Formally approved previous emergency procurement approval to increase the purchase order with Siemen's Industries by \$4,000 for HVAC integration services at the community center, bringing total cost of the project to \$33,874.
- Approved emergency waiver of purchasing procedures and expenditure of \$40,012 to relocate the gas line at 301 Center Street as part of the police facility construction project.
- Approved an increase in spending with VAPFS, LLC-Hire Strategy for a temporary front counter clerk in an amount not to exceed \$5,000, bringing total cost to \$46,000.

- Readopted and extended the Continuity of Government ordinance, originally approved by Town Council at its April 13, 2020 meeting, for an additional six-month period to September 30.
   Council also directed the town clerk to advertise a notice of adoption.
- Approved equipment upgrades to the Town of Vienna cable access channel in an amount not to exceed \$119,285.40.
- Approved \$61,000 in additional spending with Whitman, Requardt & Associates for right-of-way services related to the Park Street NE sidewalk improvements project.
- Awarded a contract for an Old Courthouse Road NE sidewalk project to Sagres Construction Corporation in an amount not to exceed \$1,402,691.

#### April 12

- Held a public hearing regarding the fiscal year 2021-22 budget. Following the public hearing, Council directed the town clerk to advertise a Notice of Intent to Adopt the FY 2021-22 budget at its May 17 meeting, following consideration of the real estate tax rate.
- Held a public hearing regarding fiscal year 2021-22 water and sewer rates. Following the public hearing, Council directed the town clerk to advertise a Notice of Intent to Adopt water and sewer rates and fees for FY2021-22 at its May 17 meeting.
- Held a public hearing regarding an alley vacation request at 131 Wilmar Place NW. Following the public hearing, Council approved an ordinance to vacate the portion of the public alley adjacent to 131 Wilmar Place NW upon payment of \$4,413.38 from petitioner Anthony Pettoruto and

- submission of a deed of consolidation. Council further authorized the mayor to execute the necessary documents.

## Early intervention is key to mosquito control

e're all looking forward to enjoying warmer weather, but nothing ruins enjoyment of your backyard like pesky mosquitos! The mosquito you likely are encountering is the Tiger mosquito, introduced to the United States in 1985. Unlike our native mosquitos, this insect is active all day long and enjoys hanging out in shady areas, such as among English ivy. It lays its eggs on edges of hard-sided containers with even very small amounts of water (bottle caps, corrugated drainpipes, and tree holes), and the eggs can be dormant for years until inundated with water.

Unfortunately, broadscale spraying of pesticides, intended to kill adult mosquitos, is environmentally harmful and often not effective. These sprayings kill many beneficial insects (including mosquito predators like dragonflies and damselflies) and contribute to the serious issue of pollinator decline. Studies have shown that fogging kills only about 10% of adult mosquitos.

So what to do? Experts suggest a two-pronged approach:

- Source control Conduct a weekly search of your property to remove all water pockets. Remember, these mosquitos lay eggs next to very small amounts of water.
- Early intervention Instead of spraying adult mosquitos, kill mosquito larvae in water, thus breaking the life cycle. The earlier in the mosquito season you do this, the better. One of the most effective and least-toxic biological controls is Bacillus thuringeinsis or Bt, marketed as Mosquito Dunks<sup>TM</sup>. Bt can be sprinkled in its granular form after a rain or used in "dunk" form. You can add dunks to birdbaths or ponds (they won't harm other animals). Better yet, make a mosquito larvae trap by filling a dark bucket of water with straw, water, and a Bt dunk

Studies have shown that the most effective mosquito control is achieved when a neighborhood comes together to fight mosquitos by placing traps in front and back yards. So, join with your neighbors and together you can enjoy a non-toxic, mosquito-free summer! **V**
